## Holloman trip cut 10 miles

Work on the access road to Holloman Air Force Base which eliminates 10 or more miles of driving for commuting employees in Tularosa, Carrizozo, Ruidoso, La Luz, and Cloudercroft is scheduled to start in six weeks or two months.

The State Highway Department is to gravel, shape and pave the road. Plans had been formulated to complete this project prior to late winter. The Otero County Commission was advised by Sherman Willis, the maintenance engineer for District 2, with headquarters in Roswell, that "providing there is minimum of bad weather, I anticipate the crews to begin final work in six weeks to two months."

He further advised that the material (gravel) is ready, and could have been installed before this time. However, with traffic over the road, the gravel would have had to be re-shaped to the bed before the paving could be done.



## PETE PRECIADO NAMED OUTSTANDING TRAINEE

FT. BLISS, TEX. (AHTNC) Pete T. Preciado, 19, son of Mrs. Stella Preciado, Captain, N. M., was promoted to Army private pay grade E-2 upon completion of basic combat training at Ft. Bliss, Texas, Jan. 26.

The promotion was awarded two months earlier than is customary under an Army policy providing incentive for outstanding trainees.

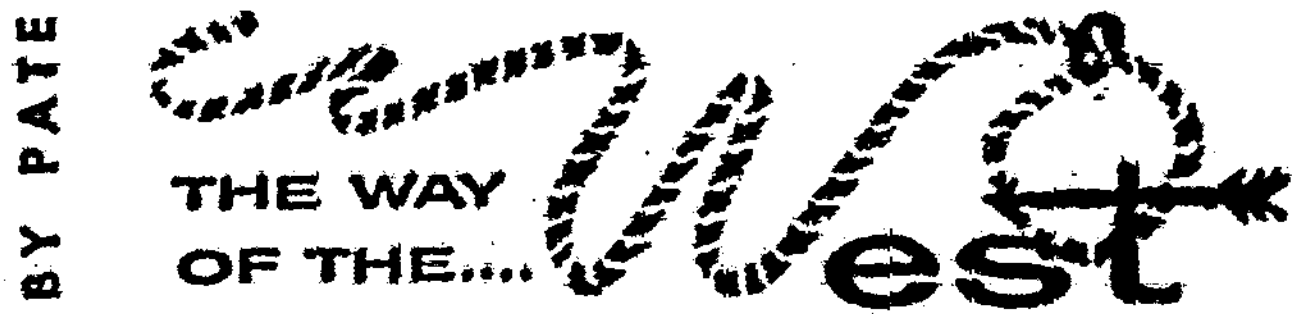
## No big issues at stake Tuesday

The Town of Carrizozo election is expected to be quiet affair even with five candidates for town council and two for magistrate. No big issues are at stake, some candidates express themselves as willing to serve if the voters want to elect them, and only one candidate for the top office, all indicates the quiet day Tuesday, March 5.

Polls will be open from 8 to 6 at the fire hall. Election judges will be Mrs. John McCollum, Mrs. C. A. Snow and Mr. L. Z. Manire, Clerks will be Mrs. S. M. Ortiz, and

Mrs. Ray Warner. In the 1966 town election winning council members polled 184 and 192 votes. The losing candidate 177. With five candidates in the race for two positions, winner will probably be decided on 150 votes, more or less. Total of 332 votes were cast in 1966.

Johnson Stearns is candidate for mayor of Carrizozo. Council candidates are Joe L. Ortiz, Tennis B. Smoot, C. D. May, Stegfred Lessau, Otto E. Prehm, and Joseph Light. The two candidates for municipal judge are Friday Sherrill and Austin Wooten.



Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce has 18 candidates for seven positions on board of directors -- a real healthy situation sounds like down here. Lincoln County folks enjoy a lot of quiet evenings while in the Rio Grande Bar at Espanola it took five officers to stop a fight, two fighters stashed in police car escaped while officers went in bar for more, probably a bunch of fighting Republicans.

## 5B Schools reprimanded

The New Mexico Activities Assn. Protest Committee Monday certified the results of the Dist. 5B basketball tournament but reprimanded four schools which participated for playing too many games during the season.

The committee certified Ruidoso as winner of the tourney with Cloudercroft second and Hagerman third.

Eunice coach Joe Langston lodged a protest during the tournament that Cloudercroft had played too many season games. The protest also named Dexter, Hagerman and Hondo.

Teams are allowed to play 18 regular season games and two invitational tournaments or 19 season games and one invitational. Langston later withdrew the protest but the schools named asked for a ruling anyway.

The committee ruled that due to lack of a clear-cut definition of tournament, it could not be stated precisely that the four schools violated the rules but issued a severe reprimand of them.

Teams expected to attend are Lordsburg, T or C, Ruidoso, Tularosa, Capitan, Corona and Cloudercroft, in addition to the host team.



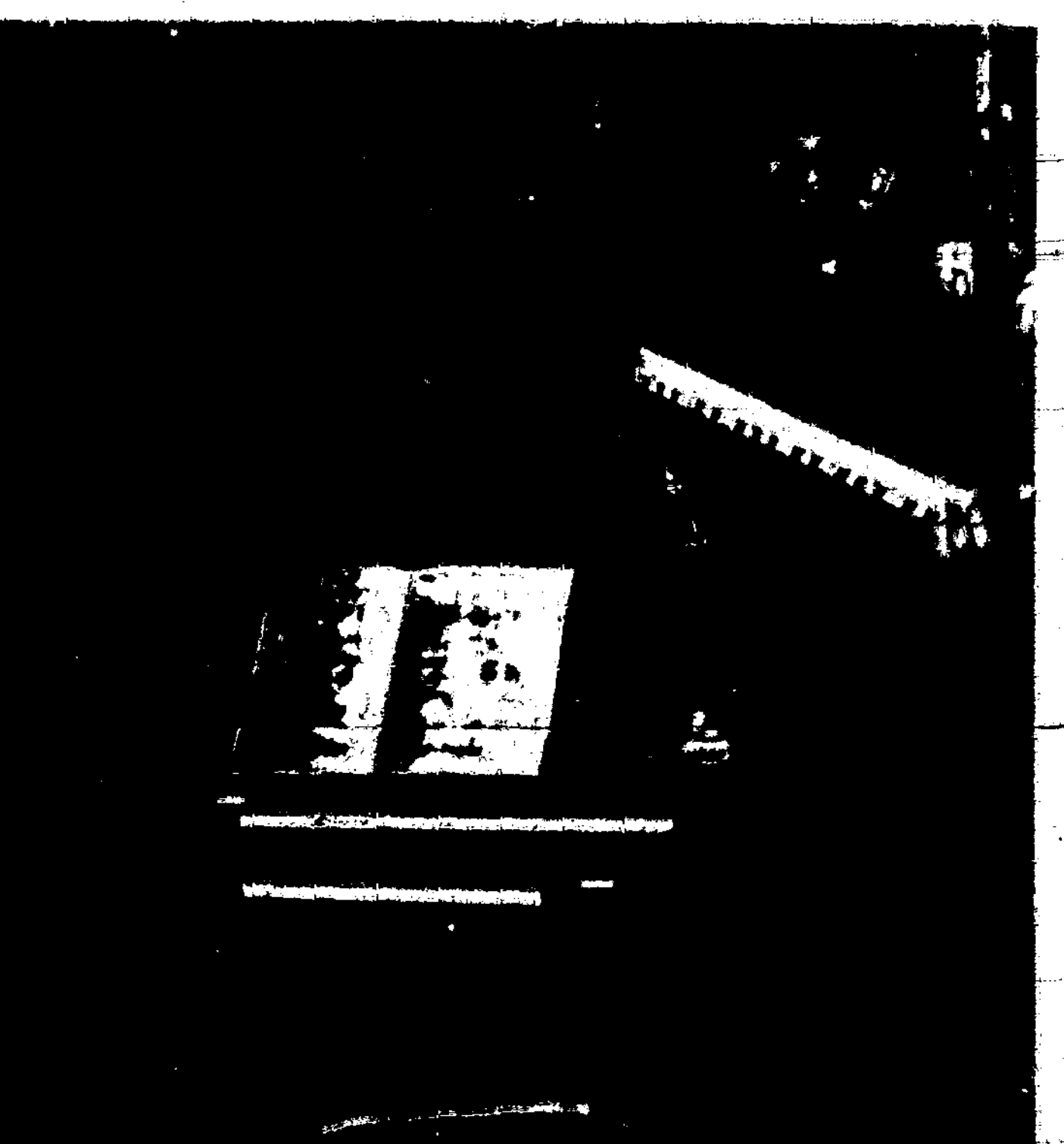

Dear Paul:  
Because world and national and local affairs are brought constantly to our attention nowadays, more and more people are taking an interest in government and finding it lacking in some of the fundamental and proven principles upon which this country was founded.

It is high time that we accept the fact that there are certain inalienable truths which cannot be removed by fuzzy, wishful

thinking. Rightly or wrongly, we the United States, have decided to police the world. It has been our avowed intention to thus halt the spread of Communism, protecting the weaker, smaller countries. While this is a laudable ambition, our methods are certainly open to an incredulous scrutiny by anyone even faintly acquainted with human nature. Weakness or hesitation of any kind merely encourages the lawless, either here or abroad.

We employ good, conscientious men in our police forces and then hamstring them completely when they attempt to keep law and order. By our irresolution we encourage the riots in our cities when, if the criminals knew that punishment would be severe and immediate such riots would probably never start. We have lost face throughout the world through our reacting both to Communist propaganda (which labels us the aggressor) and to Communist might. For the sixth consecutive year the Mobile Dental Unit is visiting Carrizozo. There are two units with Dr. Richard E. Taylor and Dr. Roald J. Sherrill of the State Mental Health Department in charge.



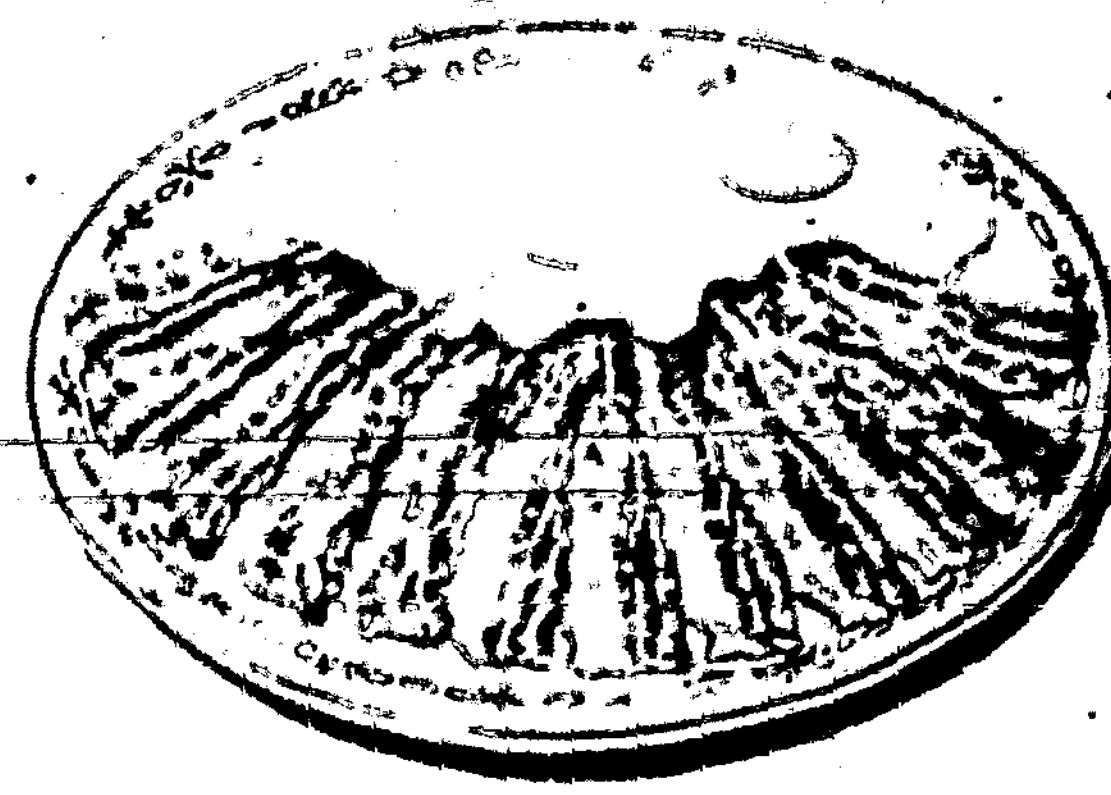

### Grazing Associations help farmer's income

Farmers and cattlemen elsewhere have been acquiring needed land resources by forming grazing associations and obtaining loan assistance from the Farmers Home Administration, the local County Supervisor Richard Floyd said this week.

A grazing association is composed of a group of farmers or ranchers who join together to acquire and develop land to provide seasonal grazing for livestock belonging to its members. The nonprofit association is owned, operated and managed by its members.

Small farmers or family ranchers, Mr. Floyd said, can increase their incomes, make better use of land and water resources and develop larger equity in their land through use of a grazing association.

Other advantages of an association include providing opportunities to improve livestock quality, gain bargaining power in the marketplace, build more stable operations and strengthen the rural community.

Results benefit the entire community Floyd said because associations accomplish better

use of land and water resources and provide expanded tax bases and more local buying power.

Grazing associations range in size from three to eighty members, depending on the number of livestock to be supported and dimensions and quality of the land.

Eligible members of an association are neighboring farmers or ranchers who operate family size units. Financial and technical assistance is provided by the Farmers Home Administration. Additional aid often is available through the Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The Bureau of Land Management, an agency of the Department of Interior, and State Departments of Agriculture also provide advice and aid to grazing associations.

Loans are amortized to associations for periods up to 40 years at an interest rate of 5 percent. Information and applications may be obtained from the local Lincoln-Chaves County Farmers Home Administration office at Roswell in the Federal Building, 5th and Richardson, between the hours of 8 and 5. The telephone number is 622-4090.

Mr. Floyd expressed the desire to assist local farmers and ranchers through the loan program.

### ELENA M. SALE, PIONEER RESIDENT PASSES AWAY

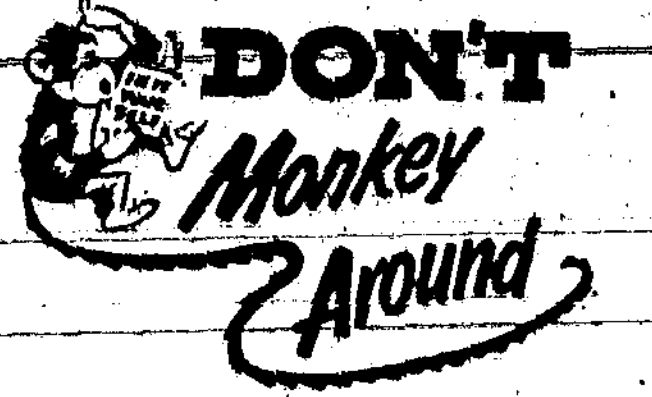

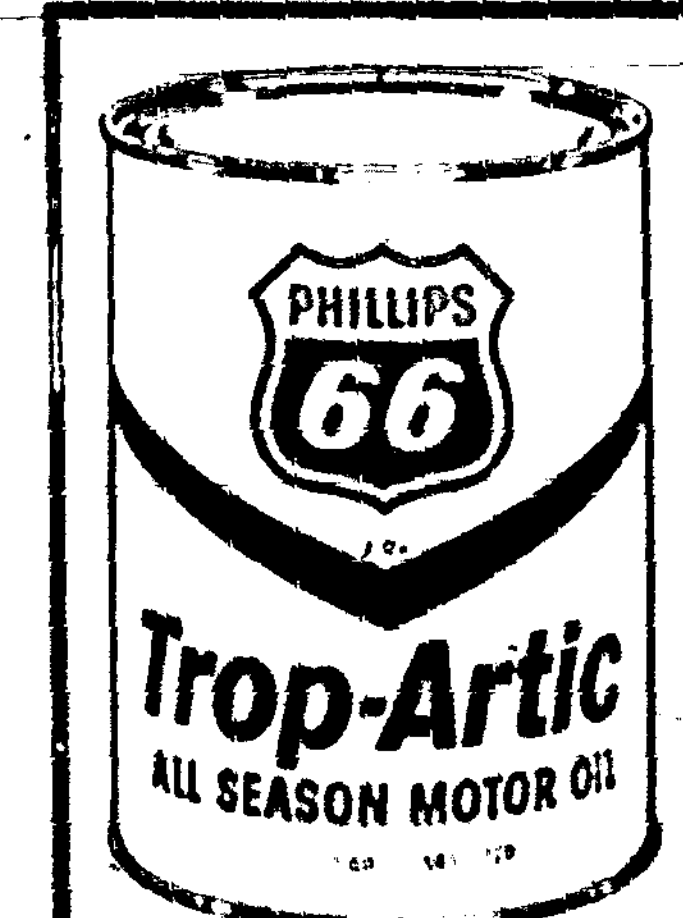

Lincoln County 4-H members placed 2nd and 4th in the senior judging and seventh in the junior division of the Dairy Judging Contest held last Saturday at Thatchers Guernsey Dairy in Albuquerque. Barbara Knight placed fourth in the junior division and Dan Knight, Gordon Barham, and Brenda Lynch tied for fifth in the senior division. There were 21 teams in the senior division and 30 teams in the junior division. Lincoln County had 26 members in seven teams in the contest.

Grasshoppers will be discussed on March 13th at meetings at Corona and Hondo. The meetings will start at 2:00 p.m. in Corona, and 7:30 p.m. at Hondo. S. E. Hutcherson and Dwayne Barthoff, Plant Pest Control Division, will talk to the group on control of grasshoppers and assistance available from the federal government.

Shearing started this last week in the southeast part of Lincoln County. Treat Ranch and Joe Skeen started shearing last week. Ivan Watson starts the last part of this week. The wool shown so far has been clean and light shrinking.

I visited local ranches this past week with Charles Gay. The cattle in one pasture are failing to hold their weight and respond to feed normally. Several possible causes were pointed out. First the grass was very low in phosphorus and protein. Second, the mineral mix

was not in a proper 2 calcium to 1 phosphorus ratio. One mineral mix had 16% calcium and 3.5 phosphorus. The phosphorus should have been 8% to be more available to the animal. Check your mineral feed tag and see if the phosphorus is in correct proportion.

Dean Boyd had the second highest gaining pen of bulls in the Tucumcari Bull Test at the 112 day weighing. He also had the 11th high gaining individual in the test. The bulls were weighed during the snow storm on February 13th and did not have a normal fill before the weighing. The top 100 of these bulls will be sold on March 22nd.

If your cattle are having trouble with lice this is the time to take charge by controlling these parasites. Effects of lice on cattle include poor weight gain, disease transmission, and maybe death in cases of extreme infestation. Lice are most bothersome in fall, winter and early spring. Lice produce severe itching and animals rub these areas, sometimes losing patches of hair. A frequent sign is anemia, with pale coloring. Affected animals are generally unthrifty and those suffering most include young calves, old stock, and poorly nourished animals. Treat lice-infested animals promptly to restore the animals gaining ability and avoid possible death loss. Dips, sprays, and powders are used to eliminate the parasites. Use Lindane toxaphene, Delnav or CO-ral to control lice. Don't use concentrations higher than those recommended, and be certain the insecticide is used according to the directions.

The demand for fertilizer is at an all time high and the best way to be sure that you have the right type and amount of fertilizer is to order it early this year. When storing early-ordered fertilizer, place it in a dry place. Be sure to give it room to breathe by leaving an air space between each stack of bags. Bags shouldn't be placed directly on a dirt or concrete floor because they will pick up moisture and become lumpy. It is also a good idea not to stack fertilizer more than eight bags high. Always keep fertilizer away from animals. It's good business to order your fertilizer early to insure your crops of receiving the correct amount and type of fertilizer.

## Teacher vote reported from reliable sources

The Lincoln County Bureau of Roswell Record made a check Monday of Lincoln County schools, account follows:

Teachers in all five Lincoln County schools Monday voted against "withholding services" or seeking "professional study days" as the statewide school finance hassle continued.

The vote was close in Carrizozo, while strong majorities opposed the NMEA-recommended action.

Here's a school-by-school report: CAPITAN -- Supt. Duane Darling said the Capitan Teachers Assn. voted "almost unanimously" against any protest action. "We're going to teach," he said.

CARRIZOZO -- A spokesman for the Carrizozo Teachers Assn. said the vote was 15-13 against asking the school board for "professional study days." "We knew we'd be turned down because we have a contract to fulfill," he said, "but many wanted a show of feeling by asking anyway."

CORONA -- A reliable source said Corona teachers voted largely against any action.

HONDO -- McKinley McTelgoue, elementary principal, said the vote was 17-1 against seeking the "study days" or striking. But, he added, the teachers were "in sympathy with an act of unity" by the state's teachers.

RUIDOSO -- M. B. McGuire, Ruidoso Education Assn. delegate to the REA vote was 28-7 against mass action. "Only one of the negative votes favored 'study days' and the other six didn't like either proposal," he said.

# There once was a time . . .

The woods around rural communities are full of people who at one time in their life left the rush-and-push of more settled areas and sought peace and quiet in-or-around a small town where some of the biggest fuses are over the quality of a neighbor's biscuits, dogs running loose, or which critter has the most tall feathers.

There once was a time when rural communities would feel the impact of nation-wide strikes, market-busts, new inventions like cable TV or dial phones. . . maybe two or three years after they happened.

There was a time when small towns took the newcomer, like teachers that happen each fall, right into their bosom and tried real hard to get them to fit in as part of the community, helping with church, civic, town work of all kinds. The advent of high-speed cars and straight smooth roads has completely changed the

small town in this respect, not only for teachers but any newcomer. Trailer houses are the thing now.

There was a time when each small-town mayor, with the help of his council, would run town affairs pretty much the way they thought was right or wrong. Same was once true of county business, once handled without interference by three elected commissioners. It could be said also that a few people in Lincoln County can still remember when school board members set down the policy, hired a superintendent and told him to run the school this or that way. Things are not like that any more.

We'd lay a bet right here and now that half the people in Carrizozo can't name half the teachers of their children, many they've never seen and never will identify. In the days when people were seeking out a refuge from the big city they'd know the names

of every person in the community, including the dogs. There was a time when church, school, lodge were the prime gathering and talking places of the rural community. They're long outdated now, in both importance and usefulness. As places to sound out neighbor opinion. You've got to stand between the home-owner and his television set to get his attention now. More than fifty percent of local population will never see the inside of any of these institutions.

All this crying over a set of impersonal typewriter keys is not intended to say we regret change of any kind. We revel in the many new developments and easier ways of life provided by thinking, working people. . . but, we do hate to see people change and they are, and it's not necessarily for the better.

No longer will the backwoods community, the rural town be free of national troubles. With

our administration pouring \$10 billion-dollars-down-big-city-rat holes it means only that more than ever the small town needs to look at its hole card. With small town teachers following, thinking, acting in the manner of national labor leaders, even though there be just a small minority doing such, it means that another area of control has been removed from local officials and leaders.

We grant teachers every right we reserve for us personally -- let them go to church or stay at home, vote as they please, live in tent if they like, buy all their groceries across the border, buy their car in Chaves county, we do not quarrel about personal rights. It does make us sad to think that our teachers are no longer responsible solely to the children and needs of our community -- they've got to consider edicts from above -- damn!

Janie and Jerry Sharp were home over the weekend.

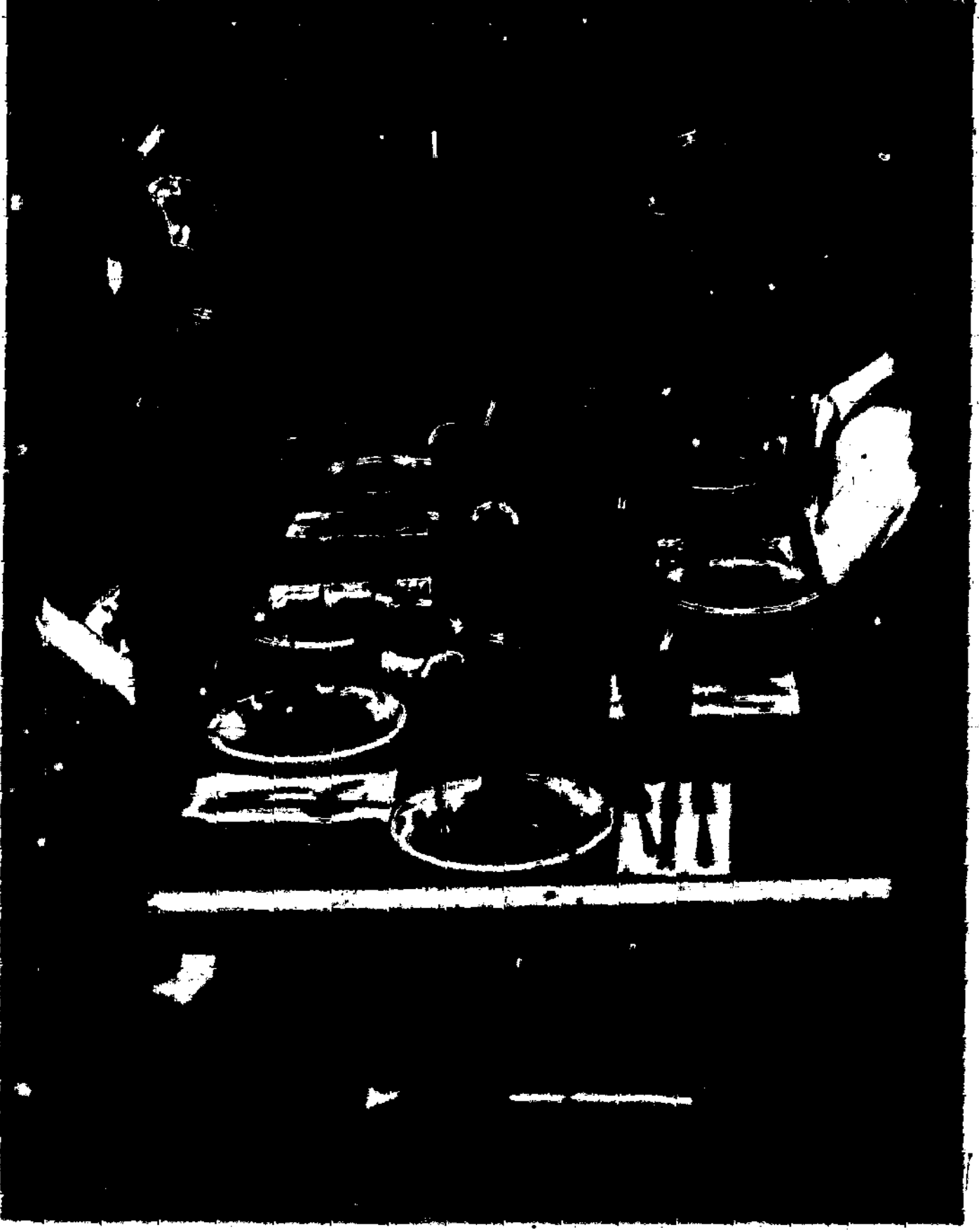

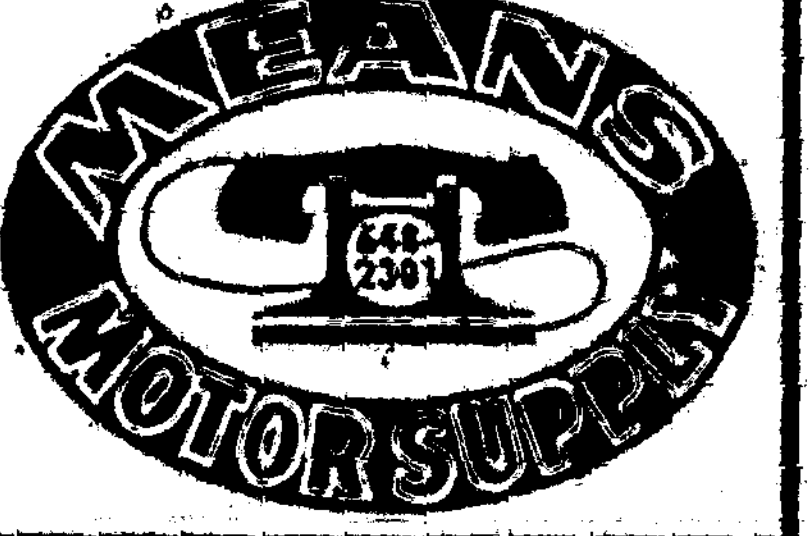
