The annual Carrizozo Grizzly relays will be run and jumped off on Laubs Field Saturday, March 30. Preliminary and field event will be run off in the morning, the finals in the afternoon.

The list of entries is long this year with fourteen teams of 20 or more boys coming to Carrizozo, plus coaches, bus drivers, parents and friends

The singles and doubles were held March 16-17 in Ruidoso. Johnson Stearns did the best for Carrizozo, and Leon Reed hit a good lick in the singles. The doubles team of Leon Reed and Billy Means came in 2nd, and team of Marcos Villegas and Joe Light came in 4th in the tournament.

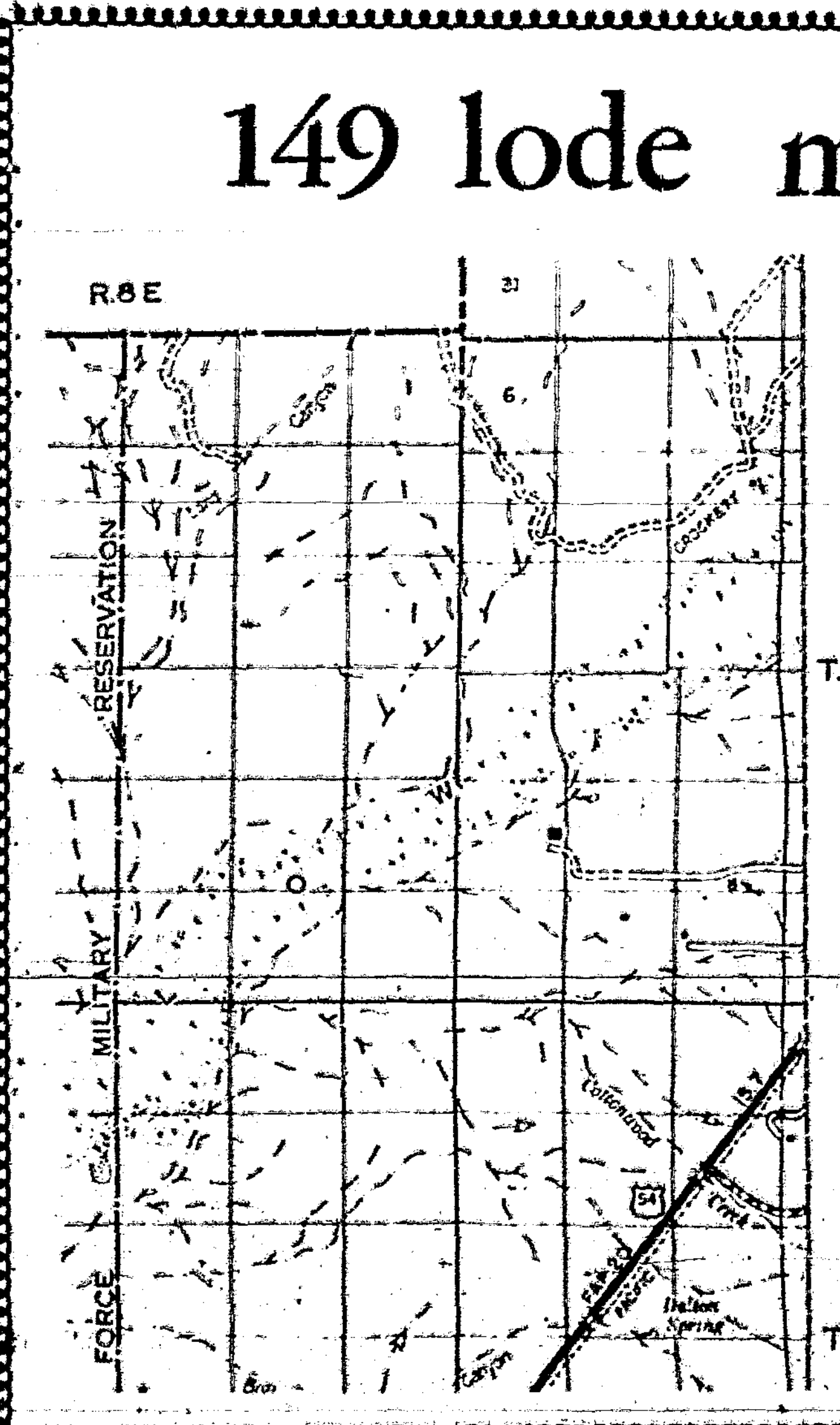
Before school closes the chorus will perform at another school and so will the band. The band will march on parade in Tularosa May 11.

## 149 lode mining locations filed

Lincoln County Clerk Ince Hast and Assistant Alice King had a pretty big job handed them this week when 149 lode mining location notices were filed in the courthouse by E. E. Nowell, Box 412, Denver, Colorado.

Lode mining claims run 20 acres each, which makes the total stakeout 2980 acres. Mach #1 is in Section 3, Township 8 South, Range 8 East NMPM. These claims can be located on the map by going southwest from Carrizozo on US 54 toward Oscuro. Range and Township 8 about the military reservation on the west, both Socorro and Lincoln County on the north, include Long Canyon, Crockett's diggings, the Malpais lava flow cuts diagonally across the acreage from southwest to northwest.

There has been core drilling in this area with 72 feet of potash reported in 1950, and a uranium strike reported later. One other possible mineral of interest would be sulphur.

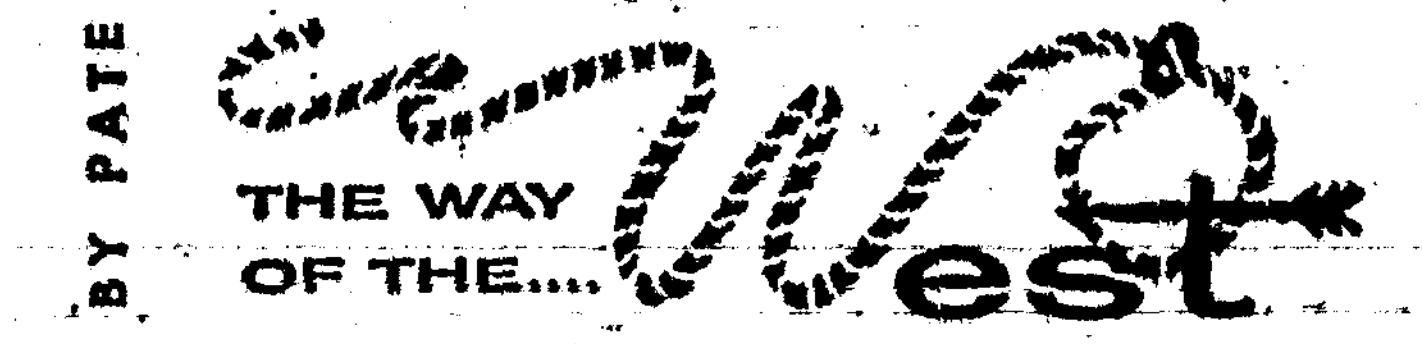
Clerk Ince Hast said they record mining claims right along but rarely do they have so many in one group.

## Chaplain Kline recalls 40 years

Chaplain Alfred Kline of Capitan does not remember why April Fool's Day was the point of his entry into the "Ministry of the Gospel of Jesus Christ". This was exactly forty years ago next Monday. Not many applicants would choose this as the day to mark the beginning of such a sacred calling. Circumstances somehow got this date.

Within forty years, come history repeats itself. On April 1, 1928, when Chaplain Kline was first licensed to preach in the Church of Christ, the "Great Depression" was about to happen. Most people put their effort into financial security, only to find, one year later, that all over our country 40 billion dollars was suddenly non-existent. Millions of people were penniless.

Now, forty years later, the nations have started a stampede for gold to get financial security for "me-firsters". Financial security for tomorrow is a shaky guess. Chaplain Kline believes history is a pattern but relentless teacher. He believes history is saying "Trust in God" and "Be Strong in the Lord".

Forty years has given an inside relationship with several denominations. He was licensed in the Church of Christ, ordained in the Congregational Church (now United Church of Christ), affiliated with the Unitarian Universalist Association and has, for the past seven years, served as pastor of Methodist Churches in New Mexico. His name is so listed in each of the National or State Yearbooks of the above four denominations. He cherishes this inter-denominational fellowship, and believes all churches need to know each other far better and much faster.

This is his 27th anniversary of being commissioned a U.S. Army Chaplain, during which time he was Deputy Senior Chaplain of First United States Army in Germany 1944-45, supervising more than 400 chaplains.

War and peace have fascinated the thinking of this chaplain. He was on military duty for a fourth of his 40-year ministry. He was in front-line combat for 2 1/2 years. The chaplain loves his country more than ever and thanks God for every day he can spend with his family in Lincoln County.

District 5 Adjutant Fructoso Osorio reminded the gathering of the spring convention March 31 at Ruidoso, registration at 10:30 a.m.

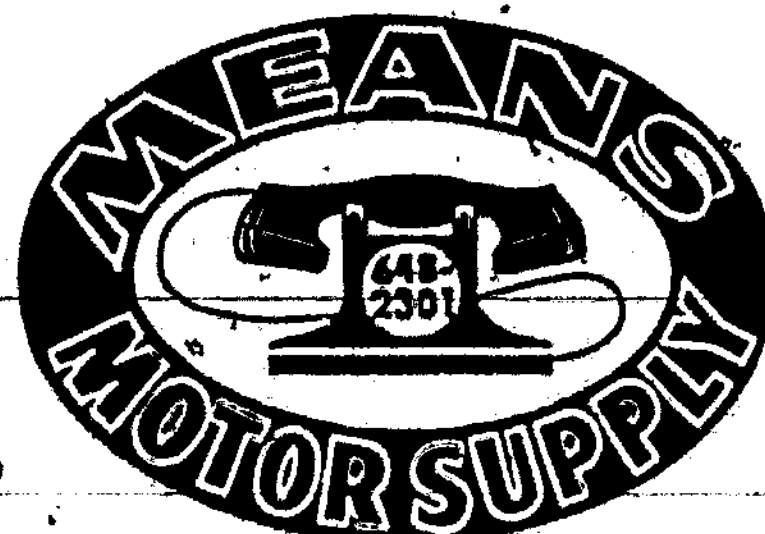
