Dust fogs up new Carrizozo airport

Engineer Tom Mann of Roswell told the story at council meeting Tuesday night of the happening in Roswell back in 1906 when the sun came up in the west for five straight days because it couldn't buck the strong east wind.

Tuesday in Carrizozo winds were blowing with such force and raising so much dust on the new airport runways that no plane could have landed because they could not see ground.

Mann reported to the council that after letting of bids for airport building and lighting the strips on May 7 will be the right

time to determine how much money will be available for black-topping the airport runways. A cash donation of \$5,000 for this purpose was received by the town Monday from an anonymous donor.

The council granted request from Supt. Glen Ellison that 2.25 mills tax be levied over entire school district instead of just the town. Under this arrangement, common statewide, the school receives around \$9,000 and remits back to the town the portion due the town. Carrizozo town employees

Juan Jiron, Paul Utley, Jesus Verdugo, Nasario Montes, Marcos Villescos met with the council to talk over maintenance problems. Buddy Hill will handle park work until May when he takes over swimming pool maintenance. The town will probably put on one more man for park maintenance around Memorial Day. Juan Jiron is the "pusher" for maintenance crew. Dogs picked up around town are kept five days if they have no collar, seven days if they have collar and are unclaimed -- then destroyed. The town has been

feeding several for two months and then operation will cease this week.

Marshal Choncho Morales has been working seven days a week without relief man for two months or more. The council upped pay slightly for relief man who must supply his own uniform and told Marshal Morales to hire the man.

Back-hoe owned by town is worn out, will try to get money in budget for replacement. Ordinance suggested requiring removal of old junk cars, no action. Council wants list of outside jobs, as first step in

getting rid of them. More letter writing about getting rid of abandoned buildings. Town needs tires, these will be bought two at a time. Town workers will get holiday pay if possible. Vernon Petty appointed mayor pro-tem.

Spelunking is new experience

The group then entered the most impressive part of the trip. A large room filled with flow stone and stalagmites, made the hazardous crawl worthwhile. I saw new formations that were beyond accurate description. A few were soda straws and bacon rind. The water containing minerals flows down the center of the formations and forms a hollow stem known as soda straws. The bacon rinds are formed by water flowing from the sides of the ceiling and making formations several feet in length and resembling bacon even with a dark strip in the center of the formation. We finally came out after 8:30 p.m.

Jim Dillard and the other State Park people were impressed with the area and are very interested in developing the area as a state park. They are now concerned about the area being vandalized before it can be prepared for the public to see and appreciate. Anyone entering the caves should observe the saying, "Take only pictures and leave only footprints." I would hate to see this excellent natural attraction ruined.

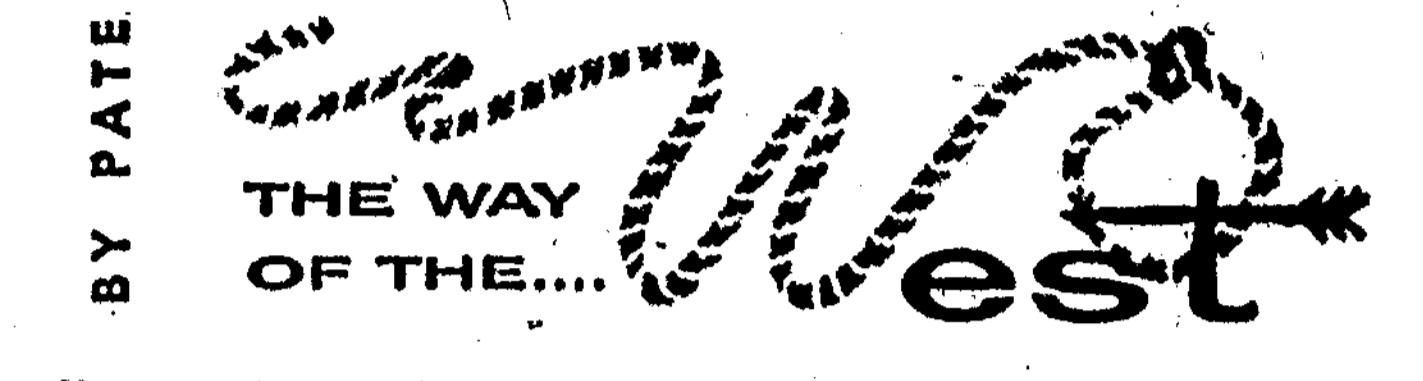
The annual Horseman's Clinic is this Saturday, April 6, at the Agriculture Building on the New Mexico State University campus and will feature several talks on the proper care of horses and demonstrations on the training and showing of horses. Beginning with registration at 8:00 a.m., speakers and their topics in the morning session are: -R. C. Barham, manager and trainer, Pat Dunning Ranch, Carrizozo, "Foot Care"; -John J. Durkin, NMSU Co-operative Extension Service

entomologist, "External Parasites of Horses"; -Leonard P. Blach, DVM, Deming, "Horse Diseases, Treatment and Prevention"; Santa Fe, "Internal Parasites of Horses"; -Hal Hopson, DVM, Deming, "Horse Diseases, Treatment and Prevention"; -Mrs. R. C. Jones, Jones Ranch, Tatum, "Selecting Horses for Jumping, and Judging Events";

A panel composed of state horsemen will discuss their experiences with various horse health problems. Bobby Rankin, NMSU, will conduct a question-answer period, the "Question Box".

Clinic participants will meet at the university rodeo arena in the afternoon following a barbecue beef lunch by the Block and Bridle Club. Mrs. R. C. Jones will give a demonstration on the training and showing of jumping horses. Santa Rosa horseman and trainer Jack Kyle, will present an arena demonstration on the training and showing of roping horses.

Mr. Tom Bragg is in the Carrizozo hospital and has been for some time. He is 93 years old.

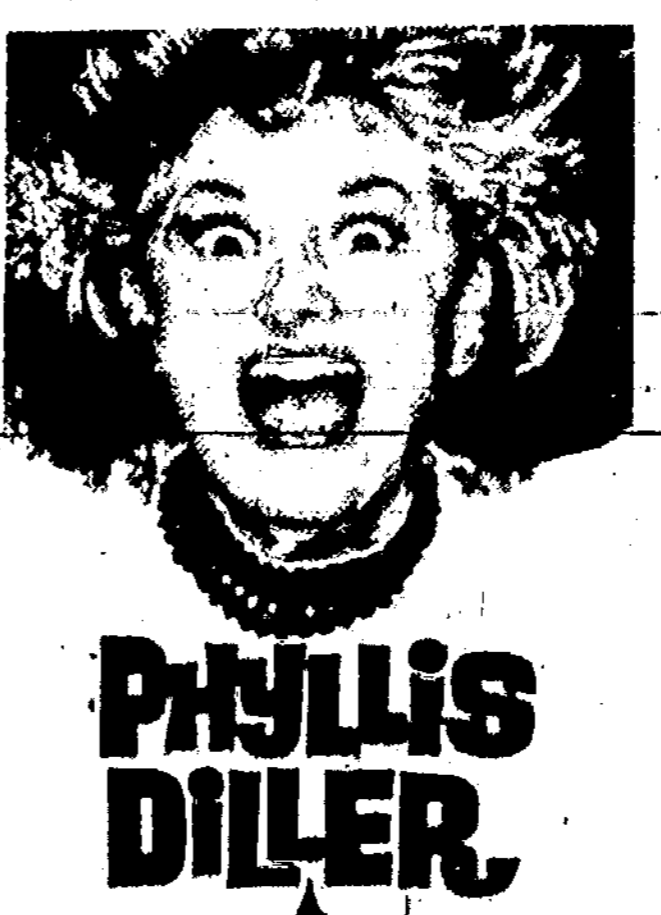

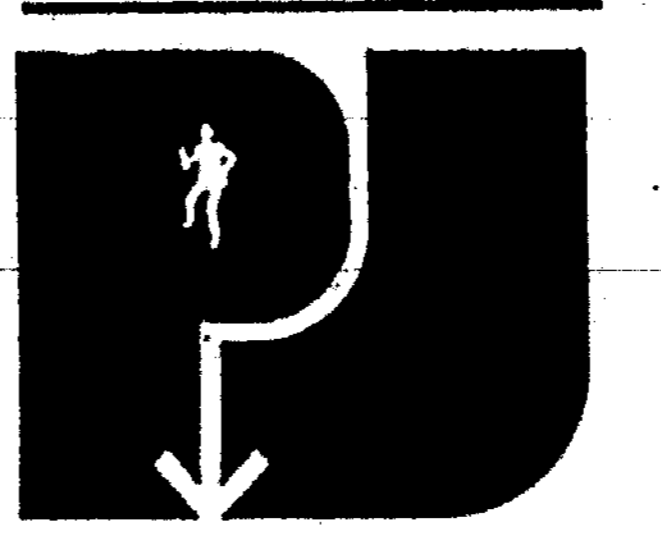

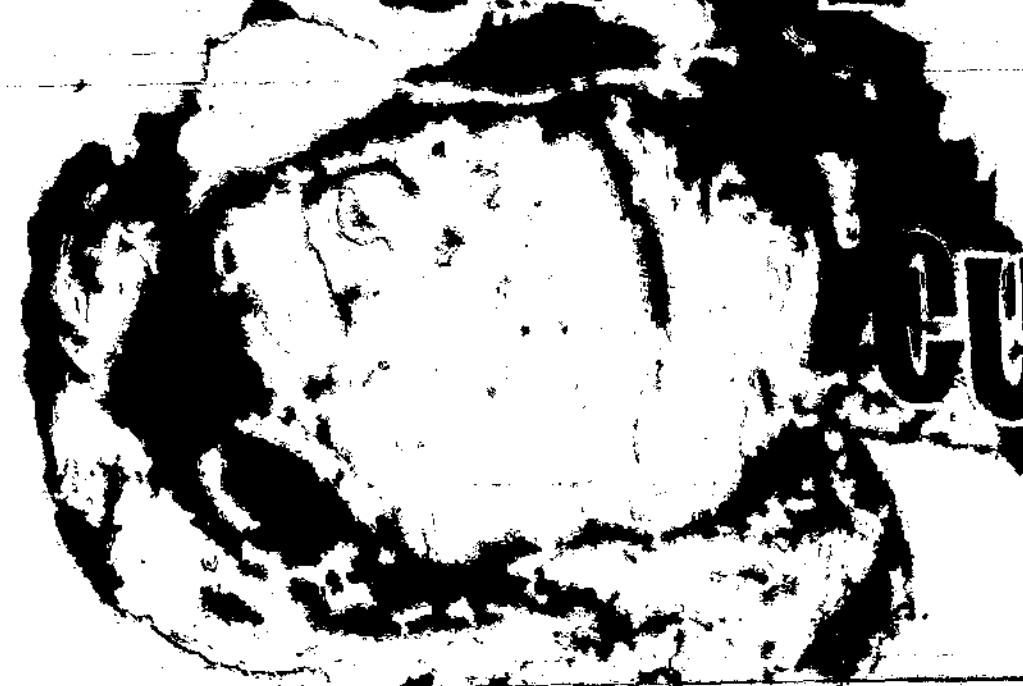
