Bids called for three projects

Nellie Lee Baker, Carrizozo Town Clerk, sent over a Notice to Bidders late Wednesday afternoon which calls for bids on construction of new addition to Fire Hall, building to be 66 by 24 feet of concrete block, and new roof on both new and present fire hall.

ROSE FESTIVAL RELAYS SATURDAY AT TULAROSA.

The Annual Rose Festival Relays are to be played in Tularosa Saturday, April 20th. The preliminaries will start at 1:00 p.m.; the finals will begin at 6:00 p.m. There will be some 17 schools, both junior and senior high, participating from surrounding areas.

The Wildcats won the Relays in 1961, 1962, and 1966. Eunice won in 1963, Hot Springs in 1964, Mid High in 1965, and Lordsburg in 1967.

Trophies will be given to the first three top teams in high school competition, and to the winning relay team in each junior high division. High point trophy will be awarded to top man in the meet. Medals will be given to the top three boys in each event and ribbons to 4th and 5th place. A trophy will also be given to the winning coach.

Carrizozo board of education will open bids on \$150,000.00 in new school construction April 23. Five bids have been received so far, construction expected to be started shortly after the bid opening.

The Town of Carrizozo is advertising this week and next for bid on airport project, these bids to be opened at 4:00 p.m. on May 7. The project consists of furnishing and installing lighting together with necessary underground cable, installing of control equipment, and connections to existing lighting for wind cone and rotating beacon.

The Town will be asking for bids in the near future for another project at the airport, which is the construction of building for office and quarters for airport manager.

Mexican Fiesta at Hondo to stress flamenco dance steps

In a colorfully decorated setting, over 60 Hondo High School students will present the 16th annual Mexican Fiesta on the evenings of April 26 and 27 beginning at 7:45. The festivities open with a Mexican dinner sponsored by the Hondo PTA with Spanish and Mexican music filling the air from everywhere. Serving begins at 5:00 p.m.

These internationally known dancers have been applauded by the hundreds of people who have seen them in their performances during the last 15 fiestas. The dancers acquired national recognition by being 1951

participants at the famous Tucson Festival of Arts, 1959 participants in the National Folk Festival in Nashville and 1967 participants in dancing engagements at the San Juan Capistrano Mission and Knotts Berry Farm in California. The dancers have visited Disneyland, Mexico City, Acapulco, and other points of interest out of state.

The girls' welcome dance, La Espanola, is beautiful in detail, as the Hondo girls mimic every step and movement of the gracious Spanish coprieta. In a new Spanish dance, El Novillero, a paco dobo, the dancers have all the charm and courtly manners of Old Spain. Two castanet dances add to the repertoire of Spanish dances.

Mrs. Fermin Montes, teacher of dancing in the Hondo Schools, will again present to this year's audience another great production in Latin American dances. As a very special treat at the Sixteenth Annual Mexican Fiesta will be the presentation of a Venezuelan dance, EL JOROPO. This dance will undoubtedly become one of the favorites with the spectators.

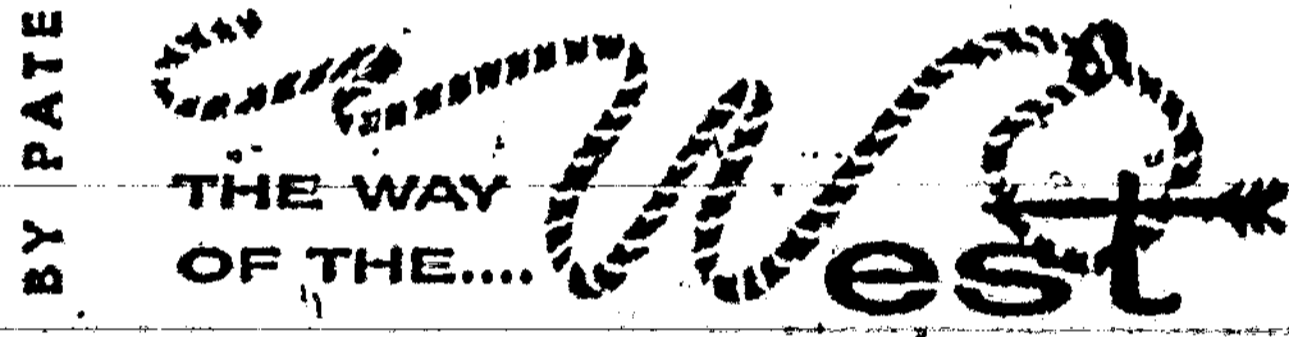

Judge Triviz resigns office

LAS CRUCES, N.M. — Judge Edward E. Triviz, Las Cruces District judge for the third judicial district, announced here Saturday he is resigning his position effective in July. His district includes Dona Ana, Otero and Lincoln Counties.

To take the office of State district Judge entailed a considerable sacrifice from my private practice, which took a good number of years to build, and on the basis of which practice certain obligations, including financial ones, were made. Such obligations and the interests of my family become impossible to discharge while continuance at this particular level of the judiciary.

During the 16 1/2 months in office I have disposed of over 3,200 cases, have voluntarily accepted out-of-district assignments to help in other districts, have sought to strengthen our juvenile procedures.

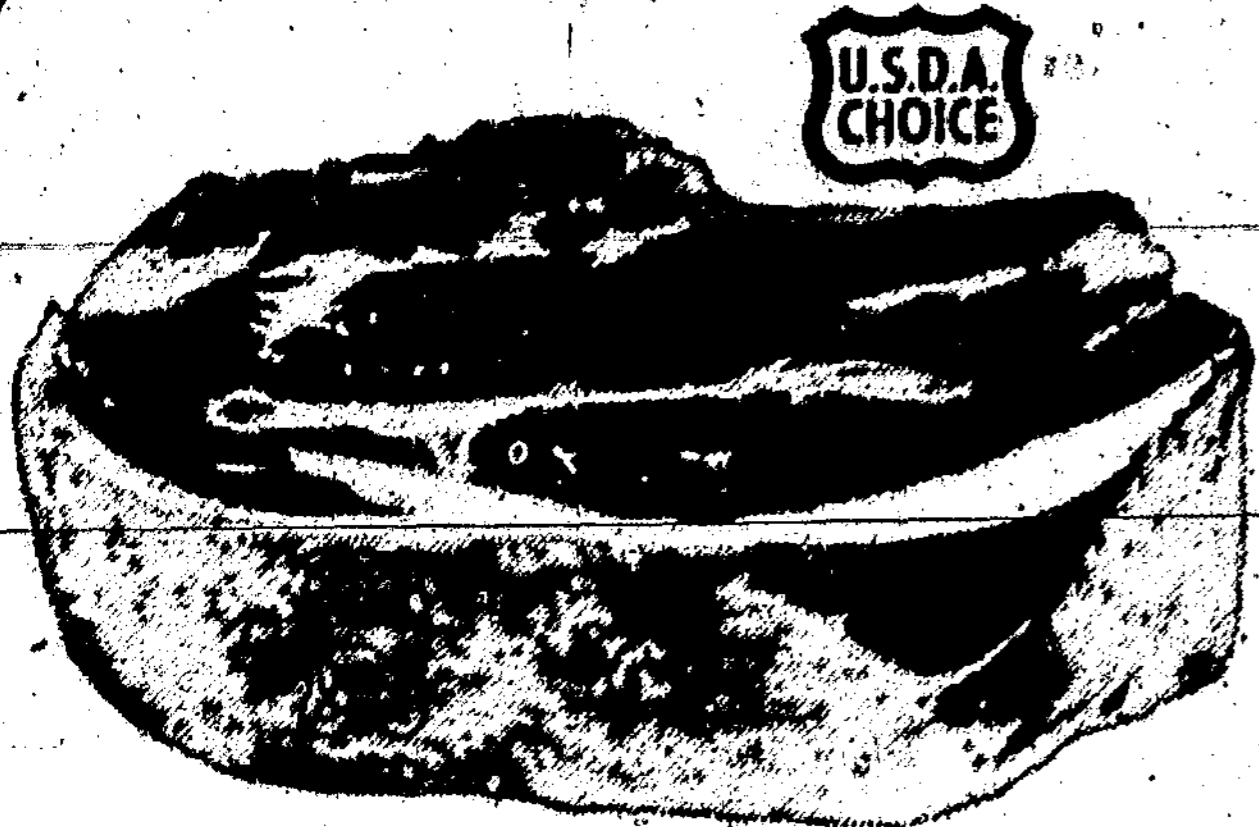

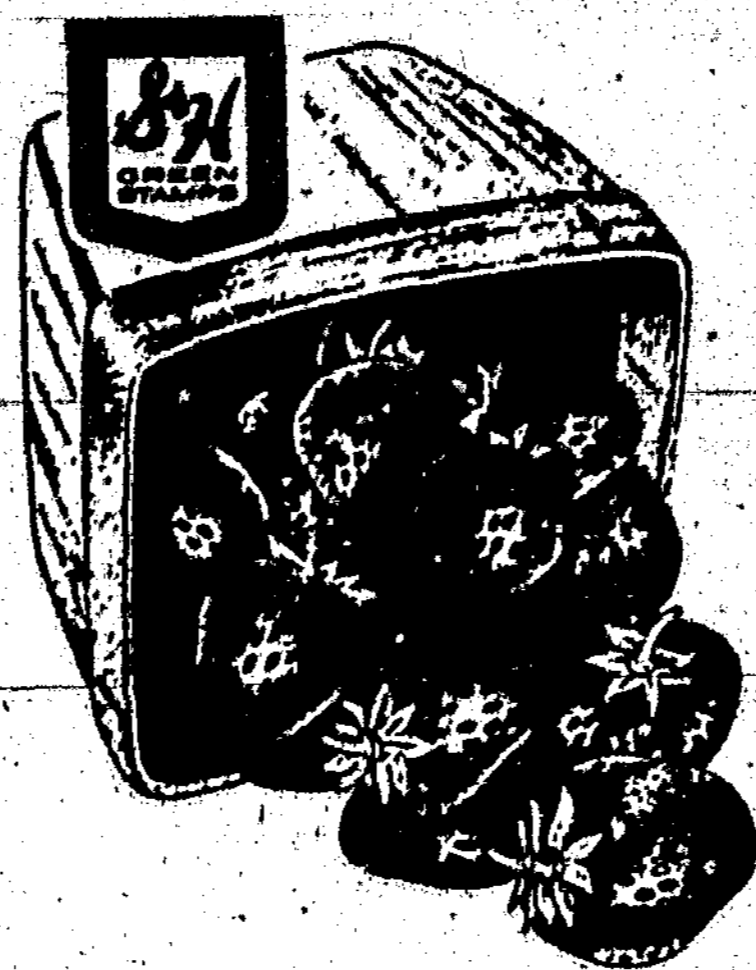

The Lincoln County 4-H Dress Revue will be held at the Corona School Saturday, starting at 9:00 a.m. The winners of the junior and senior divisions will represent Lincoln County at the district and state contests in July. I visited in the Hondo Valley Monday and the pear trees were in full bloom with some of the apples starting to bloom. I expect that the apples will be in full bloom by this week end. The danger of frost is still a threat to the fruit crop until early May. It takes a temperature below 30 degrees before it will hurt the fruit.

If you expect to sell apples they should have less than 5% worms. The only way to do this is start with the calyx spray when the petals fall from the apple blossoms and continue with a complete spray schedule every 10 days to two weeks.

Commercial fruit growers should order their spray material now so they will be ready to spray at the proper time. It is most important to

get the correct amount of insecticide per acre. All spray programs are figured on using 400 gallons of spray per acre. If you are using less than this amount of spray, you should increase the insecticide to get the amount per acre recommended for insect control.

If you have a fruit tree in your backyard, be sure to spray it to control the codling moth. Use Diazinon as a broad spectrum insect killer. It will control aphids, mites and thrips as well as the codling moth. Sevin can also be used to control the codling moth.

Present indications are for a good fruit crop in Lincoln County. I found some apricot and peach trees in blossom yesterday and still were not hurt by the cold weather. The apples are in the green tip stage and are not expected to start blooming in about a week or cool weather can slow the apple blossoms down.

Fruit frost forecasts are being given daily on the TV and radio stations in the Roswell area. The forecasts are given on the weather news cast at noon, afternoon and evening for the Hondo Valley. On critical days, an additional temperature will be taken at 4:00 P.M. The frost forecast will consider this temperature in making its evening forecast. Mr. and Mrs. Tom Barbers keep the local temperature records at the Lincoln County Branch sponsors the cost of the program.

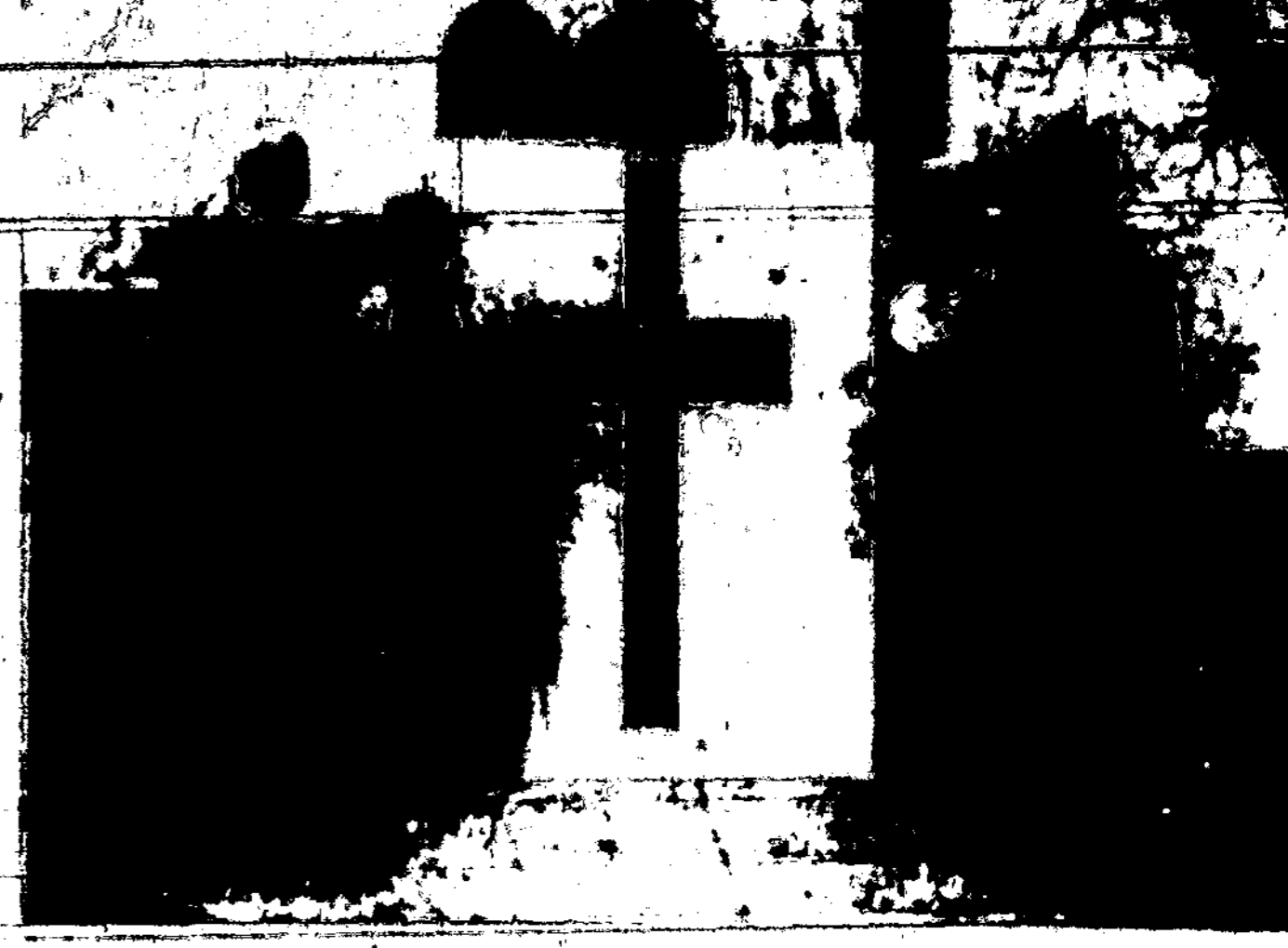
Visitors will be asked to vote for the pictures of their choice
