## Forty-five minutes of garbage at council

Carrizozo town council had a number of guests and started off short one member and attorney Tuesday night with opening of bids on gasoline and diesel fuel. Bid from Conoco was low, tax not included, LaMay bid was one-half cent higher but included tax. Both bids rejected.

Donda Jo May was present to apply for position of senior life guard at swimming pool and Patli English for position as junior life guard. Council voted to accept applications from both girls. The pool will open Memorial Day, with favorable weather.

Mabel Vigil asked the council to cut cost of garbage collection, \$4.00 too steep because not all businesses pay this much. The rates were set up by council several years ago. Mayor Stearns commented that the department was now operating at a loss. (Wednesday Mrs. Vigil checked town records and found several business places were not paying for garbage collection.)

Carrizozo garbage department requests that people do not put rocks, earth, or gravel in garbage cans. Such material should be piled by can if people want it hauled off and this is not a duty of the department, but a favor from the workers.

After about 45 minutes of garbage talk, back and forth, with few facts available because records were not brought into the meeting, the council thanked Mrs. Vigil and said they would take a later look at the situation. Twelve water bills totaling nearly \$300 were reported to the council as unpaid. Council instructed utility department to get the money or stop water service immediately.

Mayor Stearns asked Donda Jo May if she would find out about school helping with town cleanup, that the town would use its equipment and men to give the youngsters a hand this year. Miss May asked, "Is there any special place you want cleaned up?" Mayor Stearns replied, "Everywhere".

Volunteer Fire Department Chief Ziggy Lessau met with council for opening of bids on addition to fire hall. This is case where money is provided by state through fire marshal's office which will also OK rough plans for building, which sort of takes the supervision out of council's hands, but council must supervise the bidding which it did. Only one bid was received, \$9,200 for 24X66 building from C. C. Zimmerman of Socorro. This bid was accepted by council subject to approval of state fire marshal.

Bill Wolf representing Mann Engineering, had met with council for afternoon opening of bids on lighting airport. In the meantime the bids had been studied and the low bid of \$11,100 from Ross Electric at Socorro was accepted at the evening meeting. Bobbur of Albuquerque bid \$14,477 and AKCO of Roswell bid \$14,033. A total of 12 bids were received. The accepted bid is subject to FAA approval.

The project of lighting the field will be worked along with construction of office and housing at the airport. Bids will be asked next week on construction of headquarters and in about three weeks this contract can be awarded, with 120 days completion time, so that the lighting will be finished about the same time.

Mann Engineering is working on project of blacktopping the landing strips, with the town doing most of the work.

Bill Hendrix gave the council an insurance sales demonstration. He asked OK to meet with town workers Wednesday morning about accident plan. Council agreed to request.

Councilman Ortiz brought up subject of picnic tables and benches for downtown park. The council agreed such should be done, Joe Ventura will do the job of building three units.

Clerk Nellie Lee Baker will attend the 1968 Institute for town officials at Albuquerque May 16-17. One occupation license approved.

Councilman May brought up subject of wage raises for town employees and said that, "We ought to get with it, or forget it". It was finally worked out that sever rates will be raised about 25 percent which will bring in around \$200 more a month and each employee will receive a 15¢ per hour increase or thereabouts.

At 10:10 p.m. the clerk started reading bills, all of which were allowed. Meeting adjourned.

## House Bill 45 very tricky

House Bill 45 passed by recent legislature could have caught Lincoln County commissioners with their pants down and no place to run had many ranchers realized the full import of this bill.

Section 172-2-2 reads: "Appurtenances to be included in value of land -- property, real, personal, dams; reservoirs, tanks, canals, irrigation wells, pumps, stock water wells, water rights, private roads, etc."

The way county commissioners figure this could have effected assessments would have been to take \$2000 off every parcel in the county and the budget would have been completely shot.

Luckily few ranchers realized what had been handed to them. The way things are now the state sets the value on land and in the future this value will include the appurtenances.

Commissioners Shafer, McKnight and Oliver listened to sales message on use of new bookkeeping which was purported to save time and money as well as provide for greater accuracy in handling tax business. The commissioners were in favor of purchase but feel like incoming board (all three go out) should have some say. They will probably include money in new budget for purchase of bookkeeping and mailing equipment, and then confer with new board about purchase.

Sam Sloan of N. M. Veteran Service Commission, told the commissioners his service thought \$1272 was too high an assessment on parcel of land at Capitan. Improvements amounted to \$900, real estate \$282 and personal property \$50 in this instance. It was a case where the veteran was deceased and the widow remarried. Commissioners told Sloan they thought the assessment was fair.

Tom Sawyer of Farmington, representing El Paso Natural, asked that \$500 surety bond put up when company first came into county in 1953 be discontinued in view of fact that El Paso Natural has made substantial investments in county since that time. Commissioners agreed, bond discontinued.

The commissioners were acting as board of equalization Tuesday and also took care of business for regular May meeting.

## Armed Forces Day at Holloman 18th

Armed Forces Day, the day each year when military installations throughout the United States play host to their civilian neighbors, will be held at Holloman on Saturday, May 18, according to Lieutenant Colonel Vernon C. Markham, Holloman project officer.

The annual Open House here will be from 9:30 a.m. until 3 p.m. An aerial demonstration, static display of aircraft, a parachute team demonstration and many displays of equipment used by the various organizations based at Holloman are planned.

The theme for this year's observance has been "Established as 'Forces For Freedom.'" More than 20 aircraft of seven different types are scheduled to take part in the air show which will begin at 10:30 a.m. Included will be F-100, F-106, F-4 and B-57 jet aircraft, C-130 transports, a helicopter and a utility aircraft. Many of the planes are of the same type used in combat in Southeast Asia.

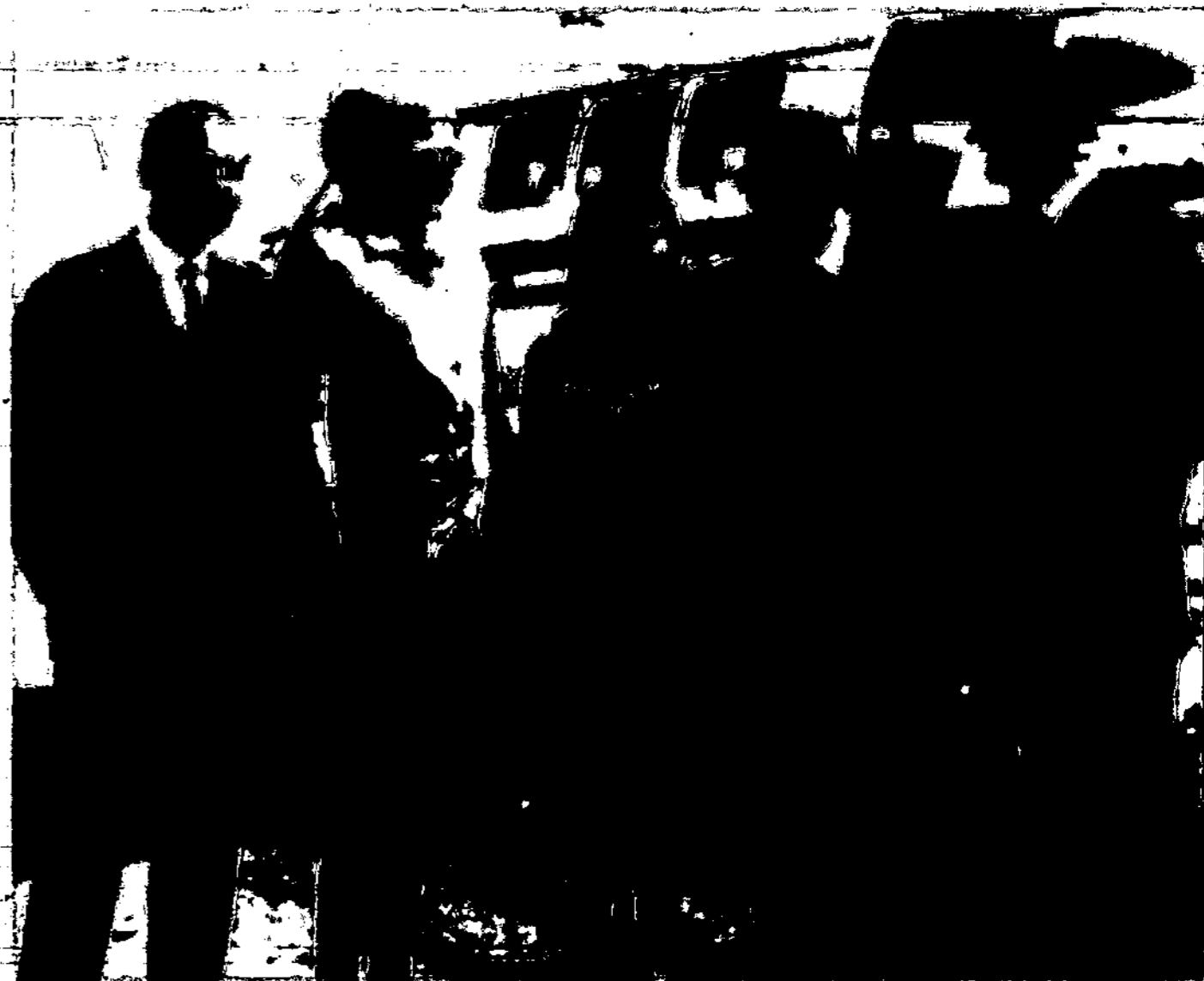

with the 'Girl of the Year' pin, by the president, Phoebe, then presented Marian Schlarb with a past president's pin.

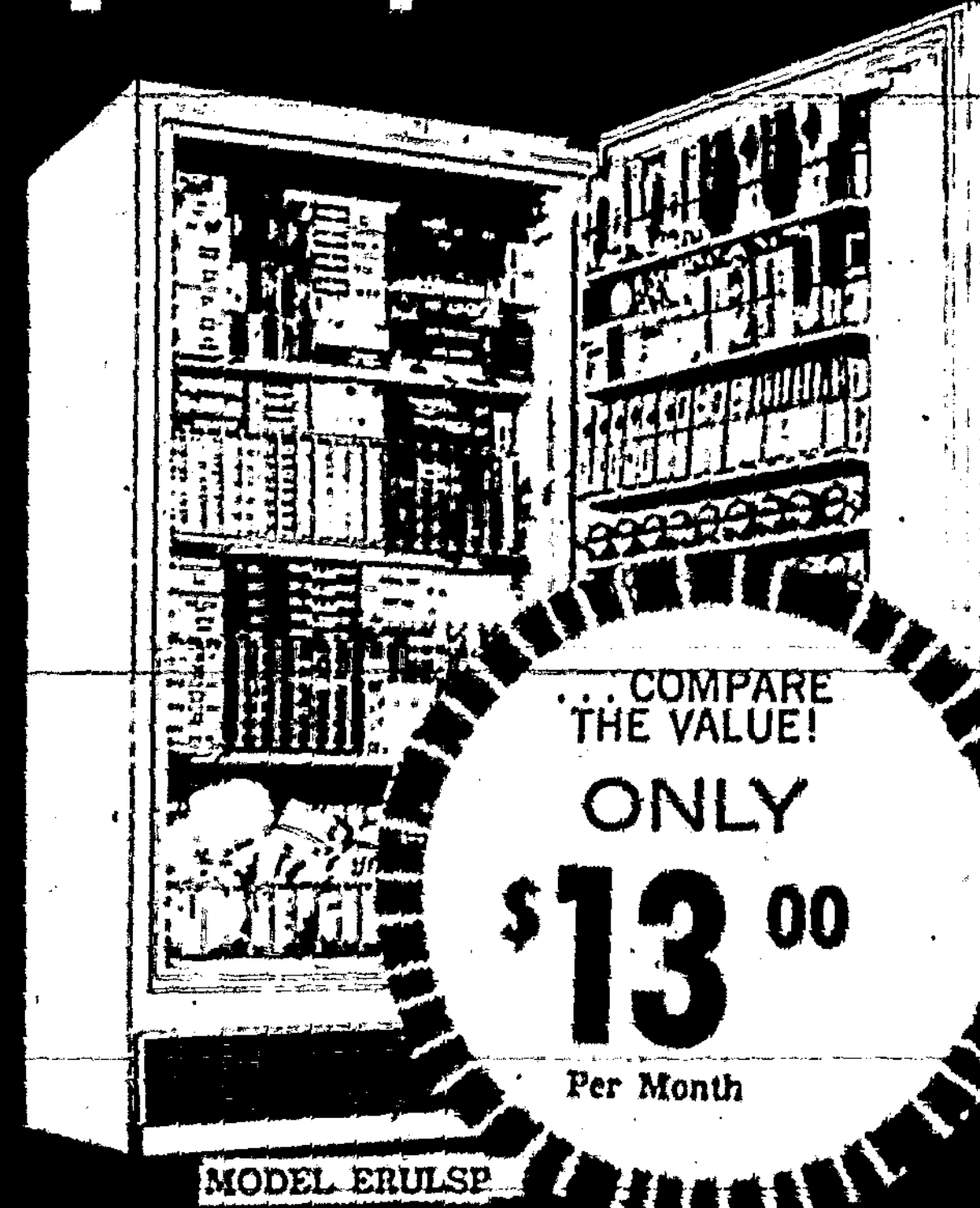

## Roundup

A near normal apple crop is anticipated in the Hondo Valley area for 1968. I looked at a few orchards from Picocho to Lincoln Friday morning and found that the Red Delicious are light but the size of the apples could almost offset the light fruit set. The Golden Delicious and Jonathan have too many apples and need to be thinned. I would

recommend Sevin within 3 weeks of full bloom.

Powdery Mildew was noted in one orchard. Use wettable sulfur or Karathane to control the Powdery Mildew.

The kinds of grasshoppers that cause damage to rangelands and crops will start hatching as the weather warms. In many areas there will be enough moisture in the soil from winter rains or snows to stimulate hatching when the soil is warm enough. In other areas it will take some spring rain to start the eggs hatching. Although some grasshoppers can be found in certain areas now, these species are the ones that spend the winter as adults or nymphs. These hoppers are not generally numerous enough to cause extensive damage.

Grasshoppers laid their eggs last fall. They usually pick sandy or soft, uncultivated soil. Many kinds will collect where there is vegetation to feed on while they mate and lay their eggs. These egg-laying areas are called "hot spots."

Hot spots in farming areas are usually on roadsides, ditch banks, fence rows, wasteland and uncultivated pastures. On rangeland, the hot spots are in sandy areas, flood plains or arroyos.

When the hoppers first hatch from the eggs, they are very small. They don't have wings and they can't hop very far. They stay confined in the spots for several days to a few weeks. The best time to kill them with sprays is while they are in these hot spots.

Farmers and ranchers should be on the lookout for hot spots and spray them before the hoppers spread. Spot treating hot spots takes less insecticide to do the job of controlling hoppers because the hoppers are easy to kill and less area has to be sprayed. If you wait till hoppers are big and flying, before you spray, large acreages have to be sprayed. The insects are harder to kill and they may have done extensive damage to crops and rangelands. For information on insecticides and rates of use, get the bulletin "Control Grasshoppers" from the County Office in Carrizozo.
