## Eyes are tested for amblyopia



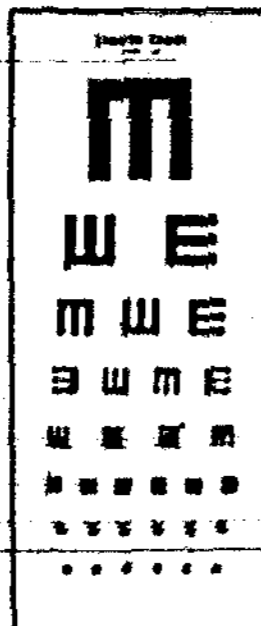

A disease of the eye which can cause total blindness if not detected at an early age, is known as amblyopia, also known as "lazy eye". If caught in time the disease is easy to control.

With nurse Alma Bradley, Beth Sadler, Florence Harper, Jane Shafer and Jean Simpson doing volunteer work the thirty members of Carrizozo kindergarten were screened before school was out for amblyopia.

Should their vision turn out to be poor the parents were notified. This program is sponsored by Telephone Pioneers of America.

The test is rather simple with a window card exposing one symbol at a time, and an "E" turned in different position and working from large to small type.

## Lawbreakers apprehended

Saturday morning about 8:30 the sheriff's office received a report of a stolen pickup belonging to Richard Vega. On checking around town it was learned that the pickup had been seen heading east on U.S. 380 about 1 A.M. Sheriff Vega located the pickup about four miles west of Hondo, abandoned in the ditch at the side of the road. As parked behind the pickup two boys ran away from it. When caught they were found to be runaway from Sierra Blanca. They said they had not stolen the truck, had merely stopped to see if there was any food in the truck. The sheriff brought them on to town leaving word with a nearby neighbor, Mr. Juan Mendillo to keep an eye on the truck. When he returned Mr. Mendillo called and said to come back that there were some men by the truck. When the sheriff's car approached the two men took off and after a mile chase were apprehended.

They were two escapees from the stockade at Ft. Bliss, Tommy J. Easton 19, and Richard Williams, 20. They admitted the truck theft, and also breaking into the cafeteria at the Carrizozo schools where it was estimated they had done \$175 to \$200 damage. They were filed on in JP court for car theft and burglary and are in the county jail in lieu of a \$2,500.00 bond each. The Provost Marshal at Ft. Bliss has put a hold order on them.

The two boys from Sierra Blanca will be returned to Springer.

Anyone owning and selling meat animals will be affected by this regulation. It prohibits the use of antibiotics on beef, cattle, sheep, swine, poultry and dairy animals.

For the best jobs haven't been started,

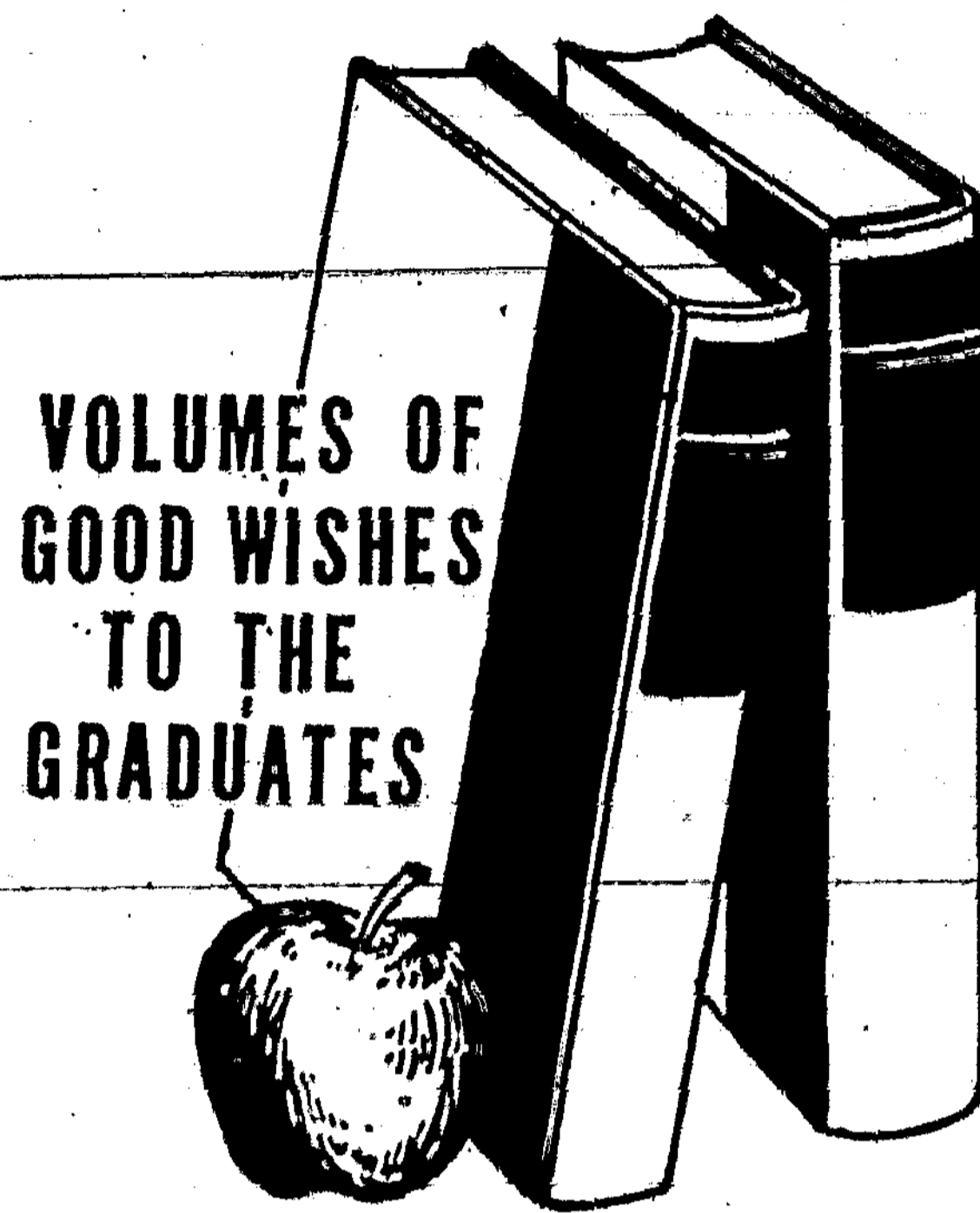
The best work hasn't been done.
