### Ralph Petty is candidate



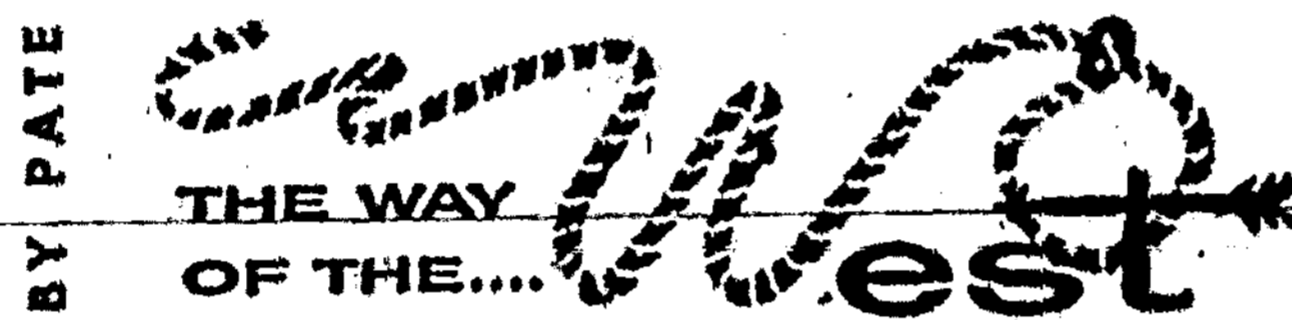
Ralph Petty, Jr.

The 10th annual Smokey Bear Stampede, biggest celebration held in Lincoln County, will be staged two days, July 3-4 at Capitan, New Mexico, birth place of Smokey the Bear.

The July 3 rodeo program gets underway at 7:00 in the arena at Capitan where bleachers will seat a large crowd, from 4,000 to 5,000 people attend this event on the Fourth of July.

Ratjen Bros. of Happy, Texas provide the rodeo stock and it is the kind you like to see in a rodeo area, wild and ready to go. Rodeo books close at 11:00 a.m. on July 3, headquarters at the rodeo grounds.

The contest for queen of Lincoln County will be held Wednesday night during the contest because the queen selected will reign over the Stampede, Lincoln County Fair in early September and represent Lincoln County at the State fair.

The Aggie Ramblers will play for dancing the nights of July 3 and 4.

The Fourth of July is a real bangup day in Capitan. A colorful parade forms in the morning and takes off down town at 11:00 a.m. Right after the parade there will be free barbecue for all stampede guests at the rodeo grounds. The afternoon rodeo starts at 2:00 p.m. and the night rodeo at 7:00 p.m. on July 4.

Rodeo events include: Barrel race and ladies pole bending.

A special calf scramble will be held for all boys and girls 12 years of age and under.

With added money for each event the total of prize money reaches \$3,000.00, in addition buckles are given in each event.

Capitan is a cool place to be, high in the pines on July 4, one of the reasons why so many people attend the Stampede and enjoy an outing in this Lincoln County town.

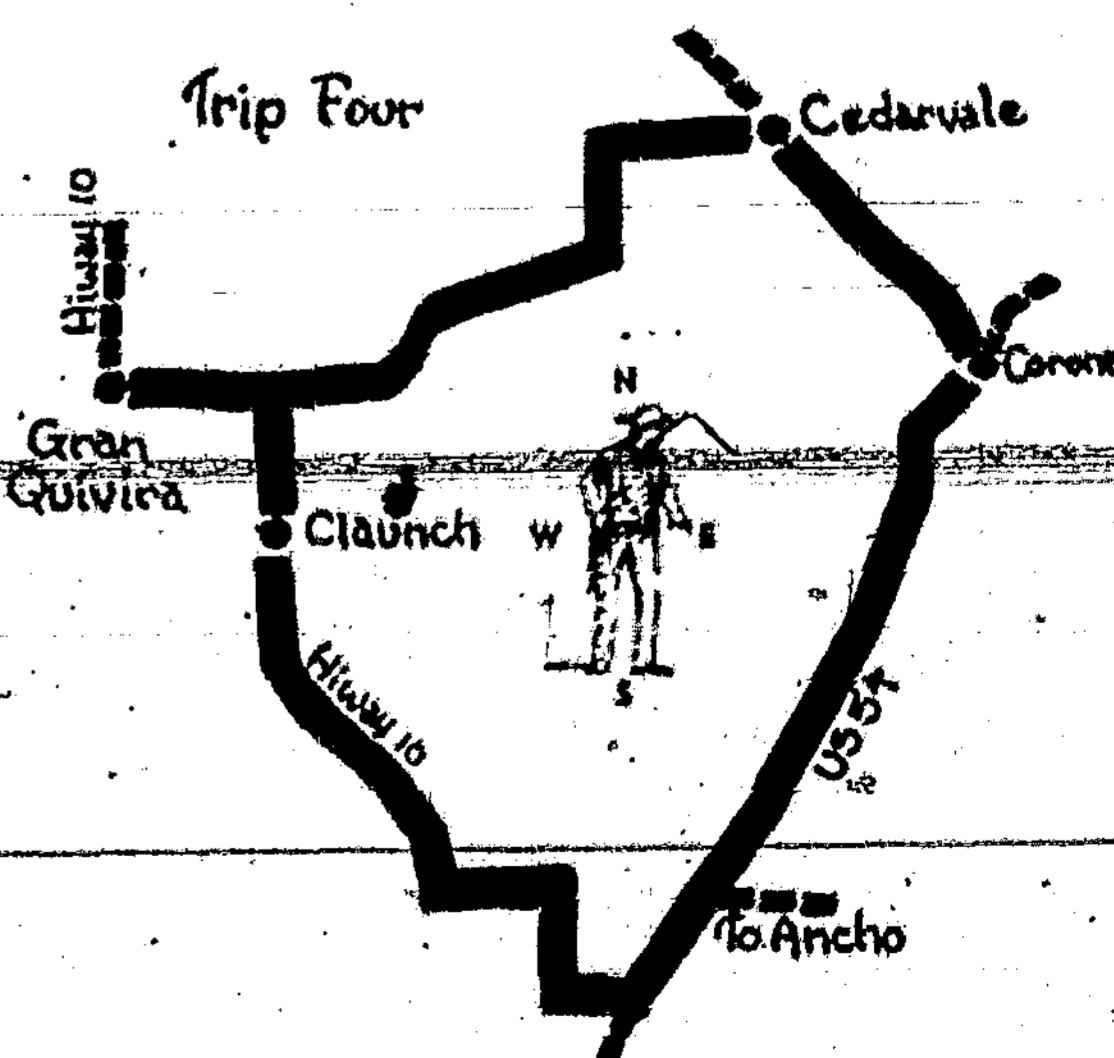

# ATTENTION CITIZENS:

## Do You Want To Save Your Guns?

THESE ARE THE PROPOSED LAWS--

3. 3603, by Senator Dadd, would include rifles and shotguns and ammunition in Title IV of the recently enacted Crime Control Act now on the President's desk for consideration.
3. 3604, by Senator Dadd, would require the registration of all firearms in the nation under a system to be set up by the Secretary of the Treasury. Registration would commence 90 days after enactment. The registration period is six months. Persons who choose not to register their firearms may, instead, within the six months registration period turn them in and thereby avoid prosecution under the Act. Further, no person may sell, deliver or otherwise dispose of any ammunition to any person who does not furnish proof that the firearms for which he is purchasing ammunition have been registered.
- H. R. 17735, by Congressman Celler, is a substitute for Title IV of the Crime Control Act. The basic important differences between the Celler Bill and Title IV are these:
  1. The prohibition against "mail order" and any interstate sale to individuals would be extended to rifles, shotguns, ammunition and components of ammunition.
  2. No federally licensed manufacturer, importer or dealer could sell or deliver any firearm or ammunition (including ammunition components) to a person under 18 years of age.
  3. A \$10 license would be required for the manufacture of small arms ammunition. (There is no exception for a handloader.)

UNLESS THE SPORTSMEN OF AMERICA CLEARLY EXPRESS THEIR VIEWS WITHOUT DELAY TO THEIR SENATORS AND CONGRESSMEN, INDIVIDUALS WILL BE PROHIBITED FROM ACQUIRING LONG GUNS IN INTERSTATE COMMERCE AND GENERAL FIREARMS REGISTRATION WILL BECOME A REALITY. INDICATIONS IN THE FORM OR STATEMENTS BY SOME PROponents OF RESTRICTIVE GUN LEGISLATION ARE CLEAR THAT THEIR GOAL IS COMPLETE ABOLITION OF CIVILIAN OWNERSHIP OF FIREARMS. THE SITUATION DEMANDS IMMEDIATE ACTION BY EVERY LAW ABIDING FIREARMS OWNER IN THE UNITED STATES.

Of all the speakers at Clovis meeting (including Payton) the liveliest was Gov. David Cargo. He's been at the job long enough to have learned how to parry tough questions with a smile and has been working with state government long enough to feel that he knows what and where the problems are. His audience was mostly Democrats, giving Gov. Cargo a good hand for his comments and good nature.

Strange mail department -- Hello There! Here's Tony and Judy at Harrahs in Reno. How's that for an introduction. Tony says he is expecting to see you on his vacation in the next week and half or so. I hope to meet you one day, too. Judy and Tony, (Tony we know, he is son only slightly wayward over being editor of Nevada Record-Courier. We don't know Judy.

Getting to where we can't read the fine print through our store eyeballs any more and would go to Juarez for new specs except we're scared they might fit like teeth some friends are wearing, ugh, bad!

Driving around Clovis after visit to newspaper office we passed music store window full of antique instruments, in for visit with owner Ted Raven who is undoubtedly a fine instrument repair man as well as musician. Over coffee we asked Ted if he had a straight soprano sax, sure

enough he did, somewhere, could not find right then but he had one. Home Sunday and Elfred Jones wrote check for this sax which was mailed to Raven for the day when he finds the instrument. Besides being a genuine antique this B-flat soprano instrument will be a fine addition to sound of Malpais Harmony Association. Read in Forbes magazine where cigar smokers start or stop smoking real easy and hurts the sale of cigars. We've found it easy to smoke a couple of stogies, then none for week or month.

News to us department -- Fort Sumner had small airbase during WWII, buildings still in place northwest of town.

General impression of Clovis is that the area is really going. Very few vacancies, either residential or business, new construction underway, lively looking business district, and crops growing all around. You might think that the hot, dry flat lands make tough living but the New Mexico towns really on the go are not mountain towns.

Price increases hit us this way -- cost of newsprint went from \$9.80 to \$10.40 per hundred on shipment received last week and freight cost on \$1054.56 worth of paper shipped from Albuquerque went up to \$131.82, about \$30 higher than last shipment. So, what can we do -- effective July 1 the Lincoln County News in county will be \$5 per year and out of county \$6. Per copy cost will go to 15¢. If you hurry there are a couple of days renewal time at the old price.

# SPORTSMEN LIKE CASEY TYPE LAW FOR GUNS

An advertisement in this issue of the news suggests that people interested in guns and shooting for recreation as we know it in this county write their congressmen regarding proposed legislation.

What is being suggested in place of such proposed legislation is a type of law which goes in force in Alaska July 23. It is called a Casey-Type gun law, and calls for mandatory sentence of not less than 10 years for committing certain crimes while in possession of a firearm.

The law reads: "A person who uses or carries a firearm during the commission of robbery, assault, murder, rape, burglary or kidnapping is guilty of a felony and upon conviction for a first offense is punishable by imprisonment for not less than 10 years."

"Upon conviction for a second and subsequent offense in violation of this section, the offender shall be imprisoned for not less than 25 years."

The new law drew praise from Rep. Bob Casey (Texas) who has proposed similar legislation (H. R. 6137) on a nationwide basis and in Washington, D.C.

Casey said, "This is the answer to our crime problem, and the growth use of firearms by criminals."

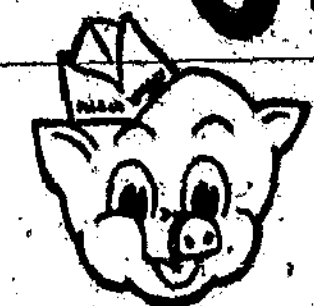

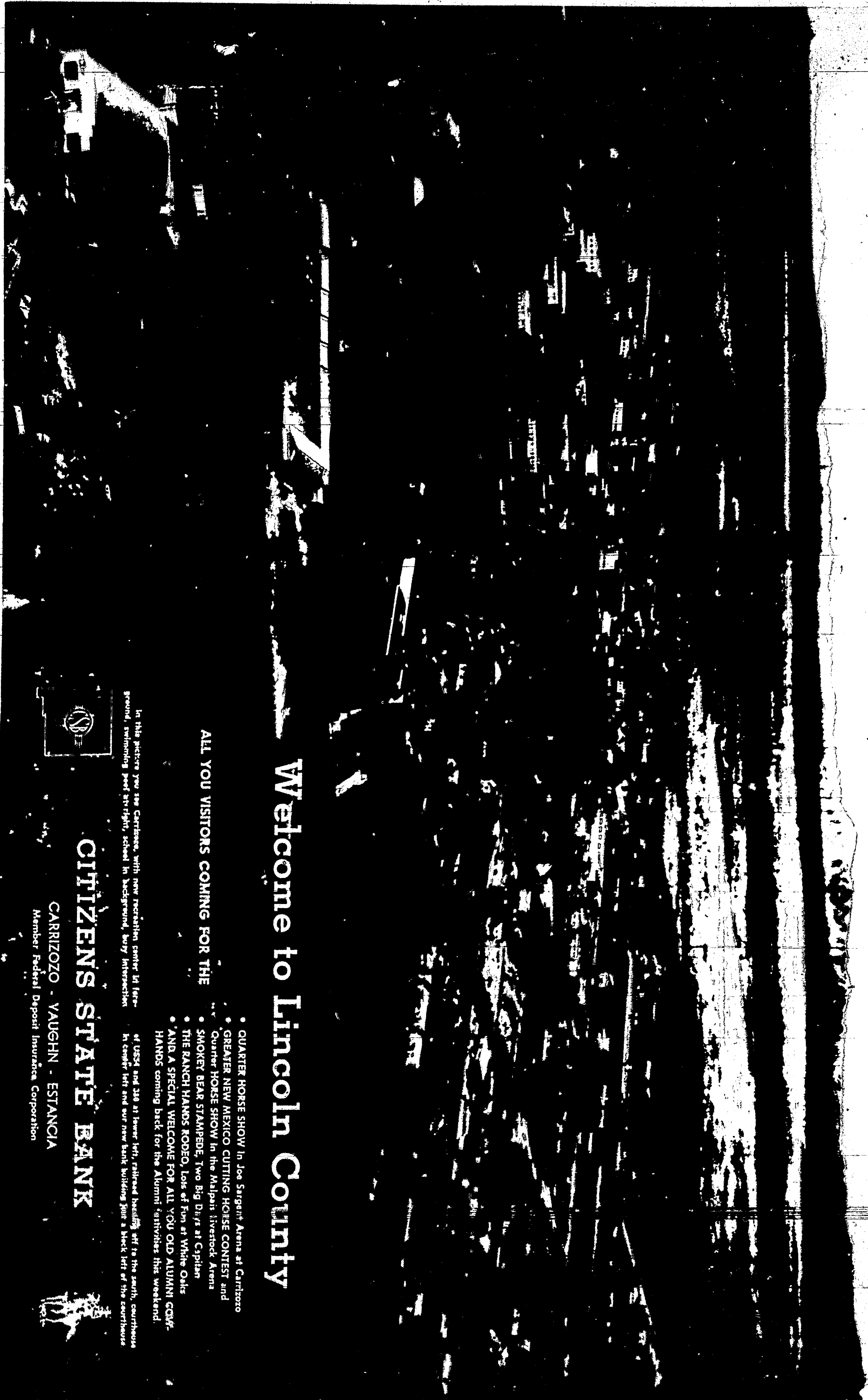
