

## One of the most decorated AF units comes to Holloman

One of the most decorated units in the U.S. Air Force began its redeployment from Spangdahlem AB, Germany, to Holloman AFB today (July 15). The unit is the 49th Tactical Fighter Wing, known as the "Fighting Forty-Niners." The wing has helped to defend this country while assigned to bases around the world during its honor-filled 27-year history.

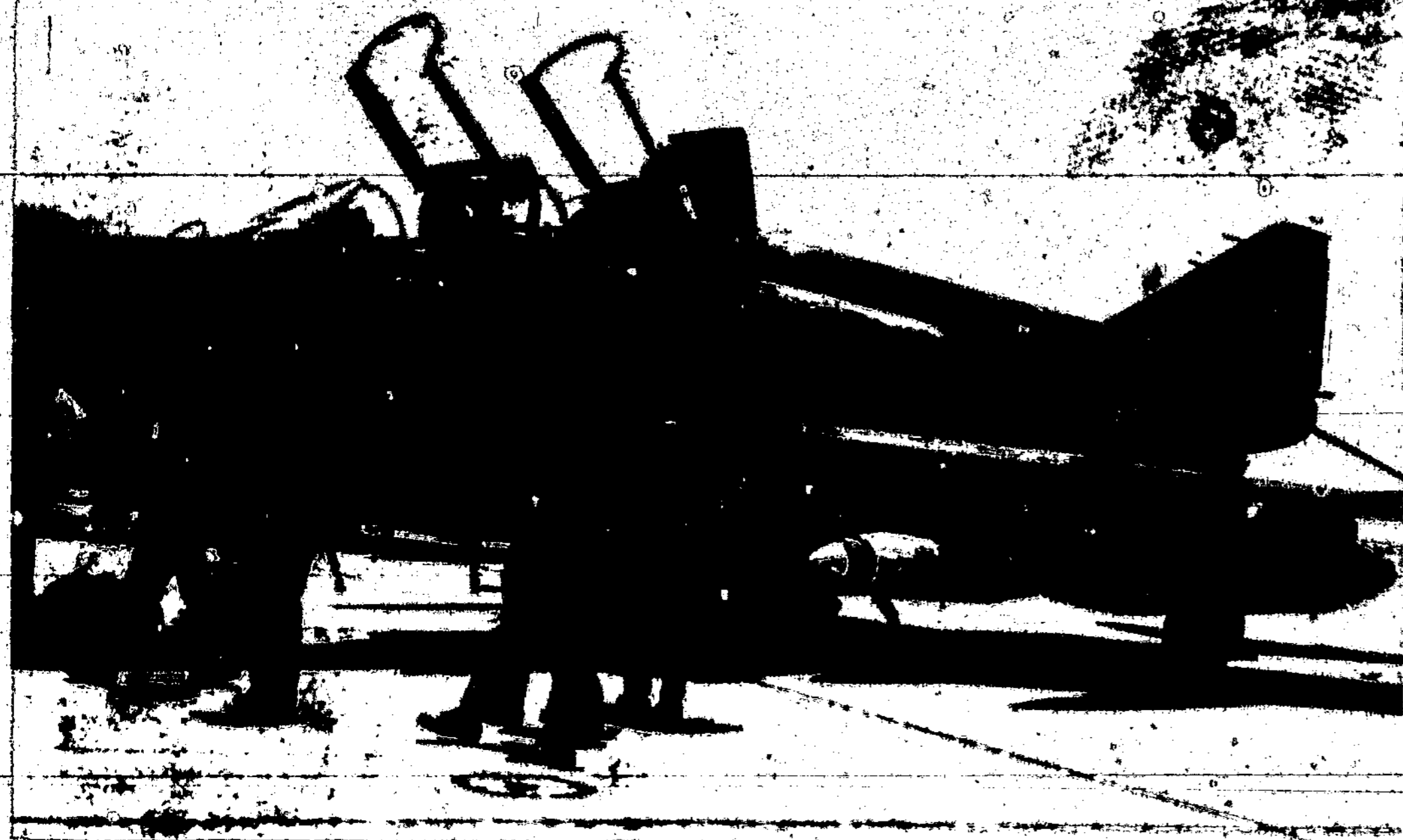
Activated in January 1941, the 49th first saw action in the Southwest Pacific against the Japanese when it became the first U.S. Army Corps unit to arrive overseas after the United States entered the war.

The list of the wing's battle honors reads like an outline of the Pacific campaign: Luzon; New Guinea; Northern Solomons; Papua; Philippine Islands;

Western Pacific; Leyte; Air Offensive Japan; China Defensive; and China Offensive.

After more than three years of combat, the scoreboard for the 49th showed 678 air kills, the highest for any U.S. fighter unit in the Pacific Theater. At war's end, the 49th numbered 43 aces who had served in its three squadrons (7th, 8th, and 9th) between 1940 and 1945. This list included the top American ace, Major Richard I. Bong, who recorded 21 of his 40 victories while he was a member of the 7th and 9th Squadrons.

Another first was chalked up by the 49th five years later when it became the first jet fighter unit to operate in Korea in support of the hard-fighting United Nations forces. Again the (Continued on back page)

## Nogal postoffice closes August 1

Talking with Fern Sawyer of Nogal Wednesday morning the News learned that Nogal postoffice has already received its notice of closing and this postoffice will be permanently closed August 2.

Fern said "It's sad that they do rural people this way, save money my foot, it will take twice the money to deliver this mail. My mother (Dessie Sawyer, New Mexico's Democratic national committeewoman) will have to go 28 miles for her mail when they close the Crossroads postoffice, cutting right in the middle of an oil field where oil people use Crossroads as their base. They will throw them all out if they get this done. They (the postoffice people) didn't tell any-

body, kept it quiet as a mouse until the trap was sprung".

The postoffice closing is a part of service cutback over the nation on part of the postoffice department.

"I've had a hundred phone calls from people trying to help me, and people who've contacted our congressional delegates. Mother sent a letter to President Johnson and people close to him. Marvin Watson is the boss, and the one who really gave the closing order.

Tony Taylor, Ladybird's brother and businessman in Santa Fe, has sent letter of protest. Dora is a pretty big farming community and their PO is going. Minnesand kept theirs and I understand it does not carry

as much mail as Crossroads. Ruidoso Downs is getting another postoffice, four or five blocks from Hollywood I've been told, and Aiko, just a small village is getting a new postoffice.

I asked mother, how you going to like all your oil checks getting out on that road for people to pick up. She told me, I'll drive 28 miles for my mail before I leave it sitting on a highway.

Johnnie Walker (U.S. Representative) introduced a resolution Tuesday to stop closing all rural postoffices as of July 1, and included in this resolution was request to cut out some crap we've been getting in the mail.

A wrap will probably be needed in the evenings.

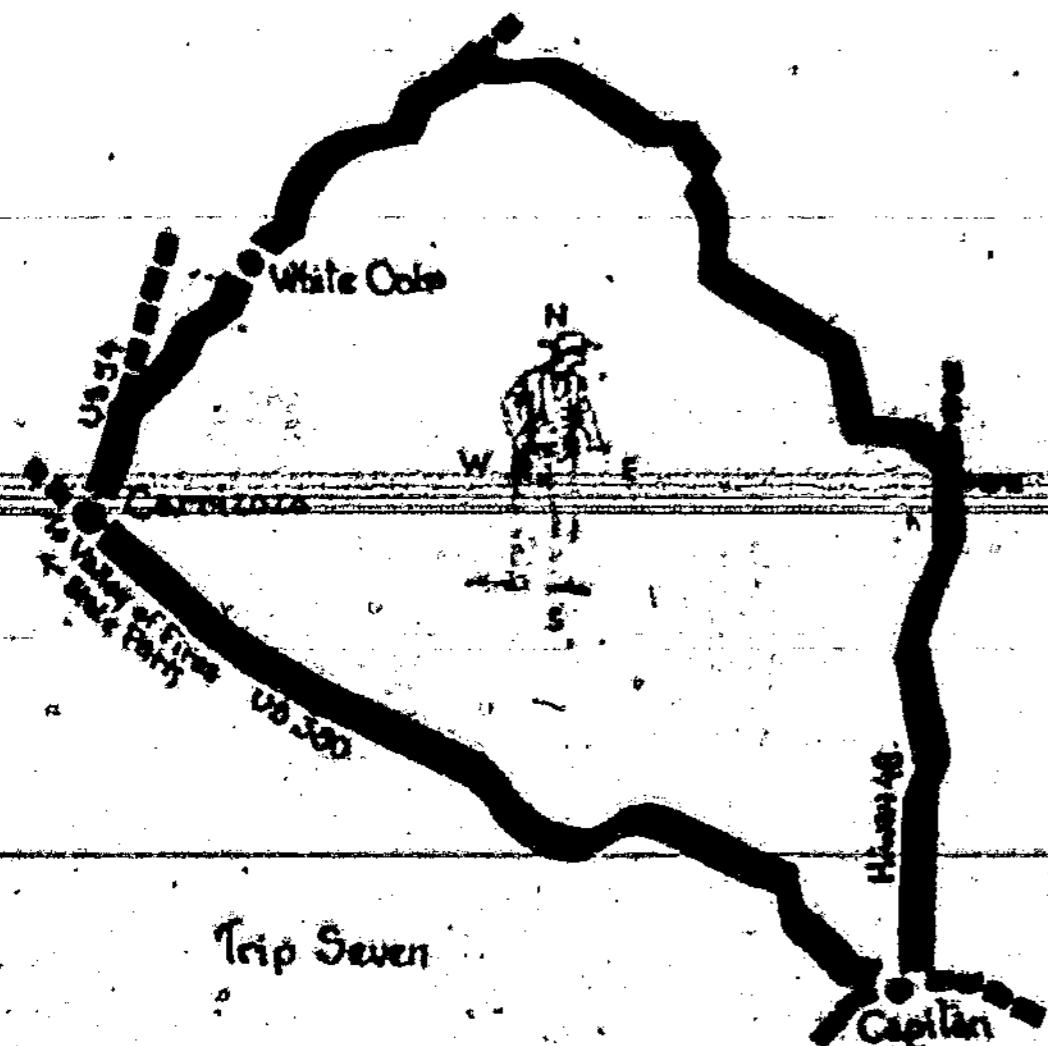

Washington -- The chunky porcupine--a pigeon-toed, bow-legged, buck-toothed rodent that waddles when it waddles--gnaws his way into trouble.

No gourmet, the porcupine likes almost everything but meat, and sometimes he'll eat that, too, the National Geographic says. His favorite food is the juicy inner bark of trees. One animal can maim or kill up to 2,000 trees a year.

A porcupine also favors all kinds of vegetables, fruits, plants, and nuts. Lacking these, he eats leather boots, cork handles on fishing rods, saddles, aluminum pails, automobile tire treads, the glue in plywood, and almost any object salt-soaked, almost any object salt-soaked from food or perspiration.

Eats Steering Wheel

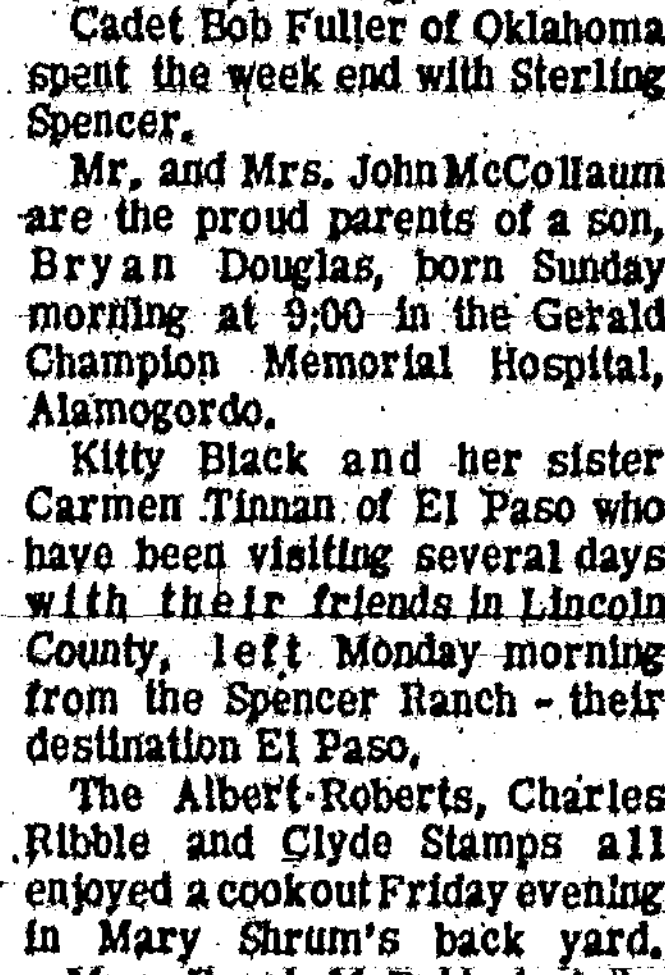
A forest ranger, who parked his car for weeks at a time near a lookout station, once carelessly left a window open. A porcupine ate all of the steering wheel except the spokes.

In some areas porcupines have a price on their head because of their bark diet. New York Hampshire and several New York counties offer bounties; other states have repealed similar laws as ineffective.

Despite bounties, porcupines thrive. The North American species -- Erethizon dorsatum, literally 'the irritable back' -- lives in the forests coast to coast, from Labrador to Tennessee and from Alaska to Northern Mexico. Others inhabit Africa, southeastern Europe, southern Asia, and South America.

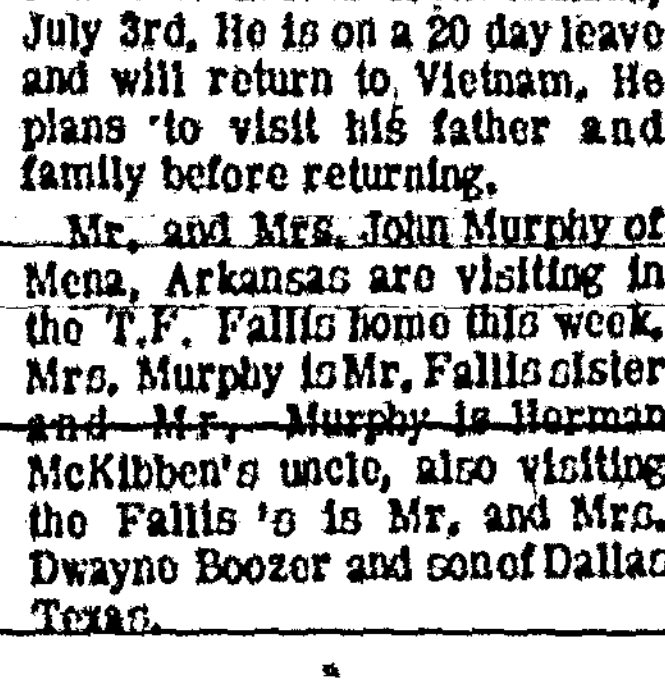

Flota received his law degree and served as state's attorney in Illinois before coming to New Mexico. By appointment he has served as assistant DA and magistrate at Truth or Consequences.



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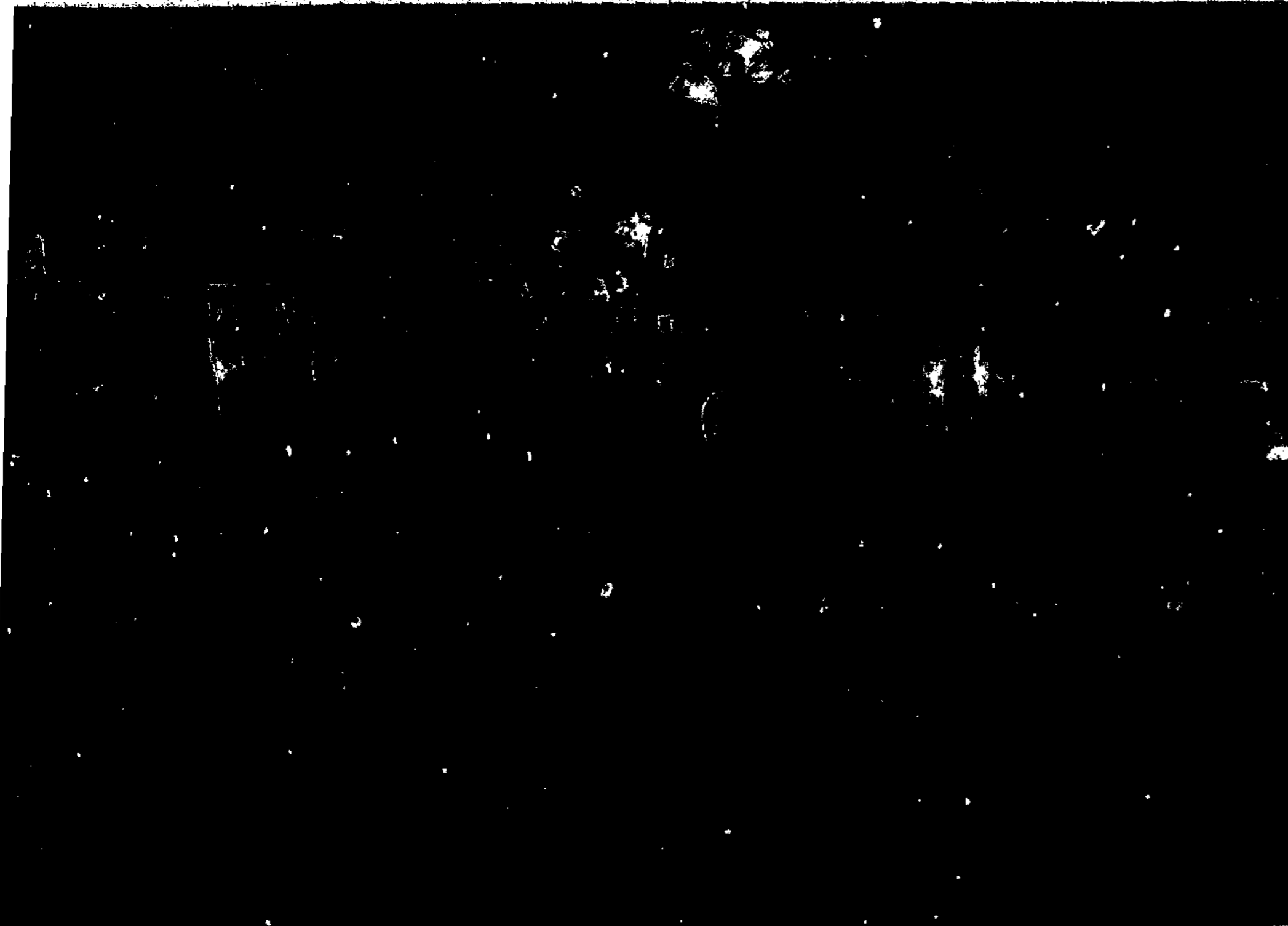

# Selling calves discussed

Selling calves was discussed at the Livestock meeting last Saturday July 13 in Corona.

Each one of the panel members discussed their operation as it relates to marketing.

Bill Dinwiddie told the services available for pooling calves for sale through their marketing organization. They help find buyers for the calves. They charge \$1.00 per head plus a membership fee for selling costs. They are in their second year of operation and sold 4,500 calves last year mainly to out of state buyers.

Walt Wilson, New Mexico director for producer marketing association, described the producers marketing procedures. In selling they will take consignments charging 25 cents per hundred weight or they will try to sell for the growers. They prefer to deal with large groups or a pool of calves.

Ernest McDaniel described the operation in the Glencoe calf pool. They have been selling as a group for 15 years with each seller having the option to sell or keep his calves when a price is agreed upon. They have no dues membership requirement. Their big saving was in trucking cost and lower shrink. They all deliver at the same day and place.

V.R. Barnett, custom feeding in the Pecos Valley said that a feeder must be competitive to stay in business. The custom feeder is concerned with buying feeding and selling the cattle. Grain costs from 16 to 19 cents per pound on steer calves and from 17 to 22 cents on steer yearlings. The gain on heifers will be 1.5 cents per pound more than steers.

Animals on a growing ration gain about 1.75 pounds per day. Cattle cannot be kept on a high grain ration for a long feeding period as they will develop liver trouble.

The custom feeds in lots of 100 to 150 cattle per pen with heifers in separate pens from the steers. They want cattle weighing 600 pounds when they come into the feed lot.

He would like to have cattle come into the feedlot knowing how to eat out of a trough and drink out of a tub. Dr. Bob Bond said that the Food and Drug Administration proposes to stop the use of penicillin, streptomycin, aureomycin, and chloromycetin on all meat animals. The protest period was extended to August 9th. The regulations are based on the assumptions that the antibiotics can be harmful to individuals. There is no information on how cooking, freezing and storage affect the antibiotic.

There are five major packers located within 300 miles of Corona and they use about 28,000 head a week. This is a big potential market that could help the cattlegrowers in the area. The meeting adjourned with the 35 people present feeling that calves in the area could be pooled to the benefit of everyone concerned.

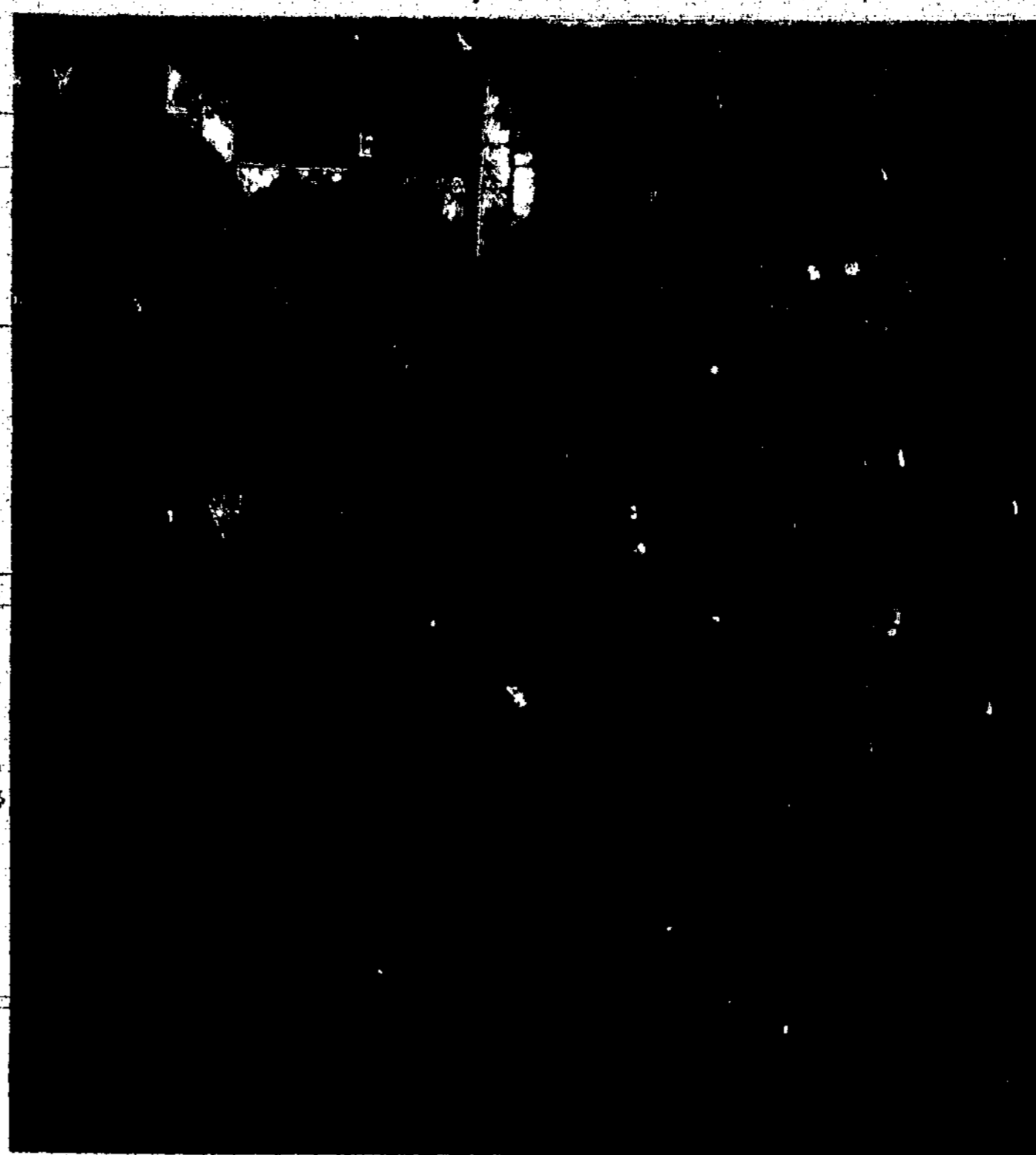

## Network of 695 association serve ranchers and farmers

Roswell, New Mexico --- The Federal Land Bank System, a national network of 12 regional banks and 695 local loan associations -- in its second half century of operations -- moves ahead this month with renewed dedication of purpose to meet the essential long-term financial needs of the nation's farmers and ranchers.

Mr. Vonnie Jasper, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Roswell announced that "Serving America's Farmers and Ranchers: Providers of Plenty," is the key slogan theme which has been officially adopted by the Land Banks and Associations to guide the credit organization during months and years ahead.

"Our system has coped with the variety of great demands made upon it during the past 50 years, all the while maintaining a dependable loan service to farmers and ranchers," Mr. Jasper stated.

He continued: "Despite times of complex adversity, the Land Bank System has grown into a farm and ranch financial institution of unparalleled strength and experience. In the years ahead we will continue to apply our imagination, wisdom, and flexibility in guiding and using our system so as to serve farmers' and ranchers' essential needs, whatever those needs may be and whatever economic situations may develop."

The multitude of demands on the money market for financing the war in Viet Nam, the country's domestic social programs and burgeoning industries, as well as the overall

need to control the monetary situation so as to combat inflation, impose important broad new responsibilities on all of the nation's lenders, he continued. Realizing these responsibilities, the Land Bank System for its part is continuing a policy aimed at maintaining maximum stability in providing loans to farmers and ranchers. This involves careful analysis of loan applications and prudent use of the money market with respect to bond sales for obtaining private funds for loans to farmers and ranchers. 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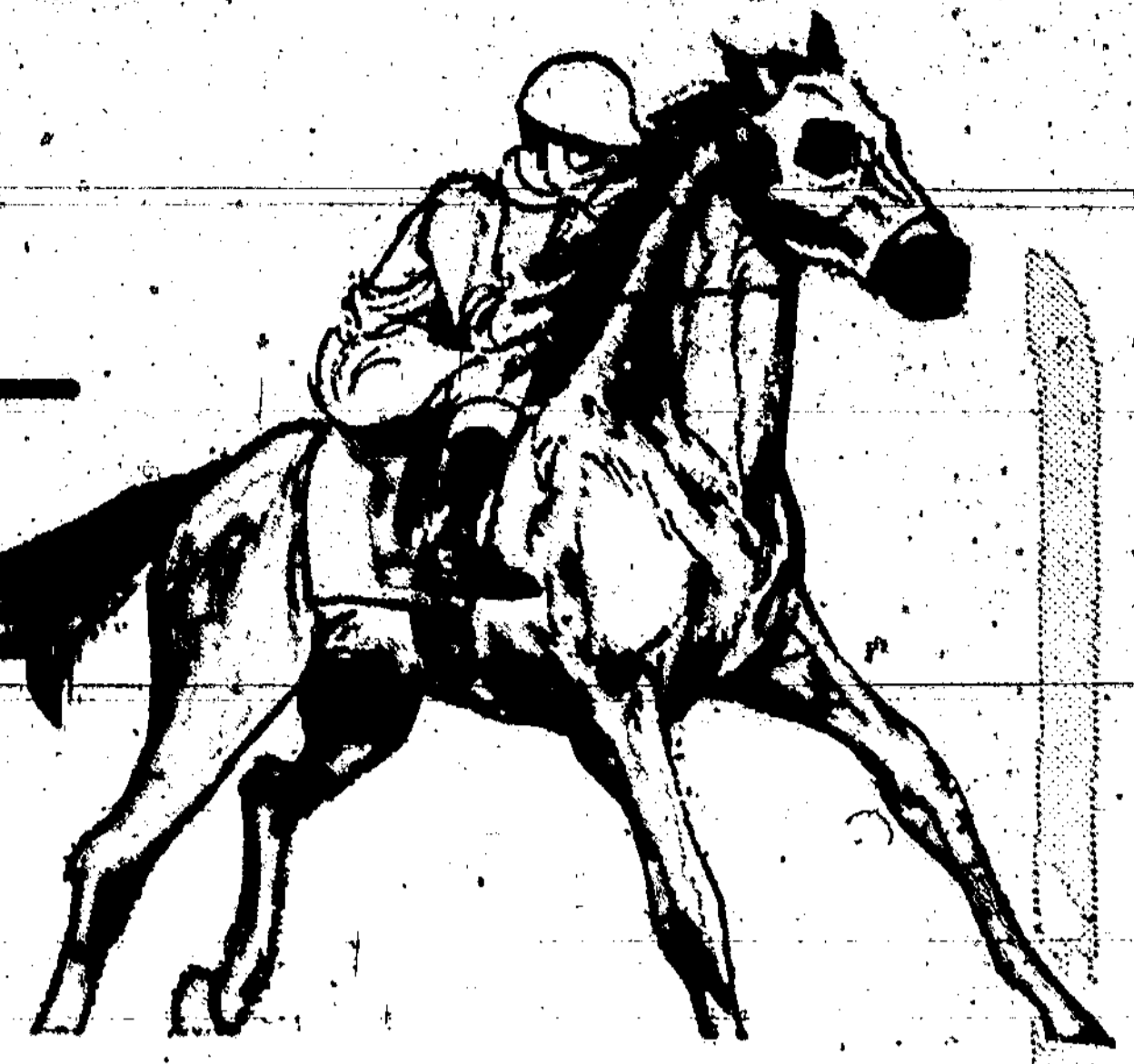


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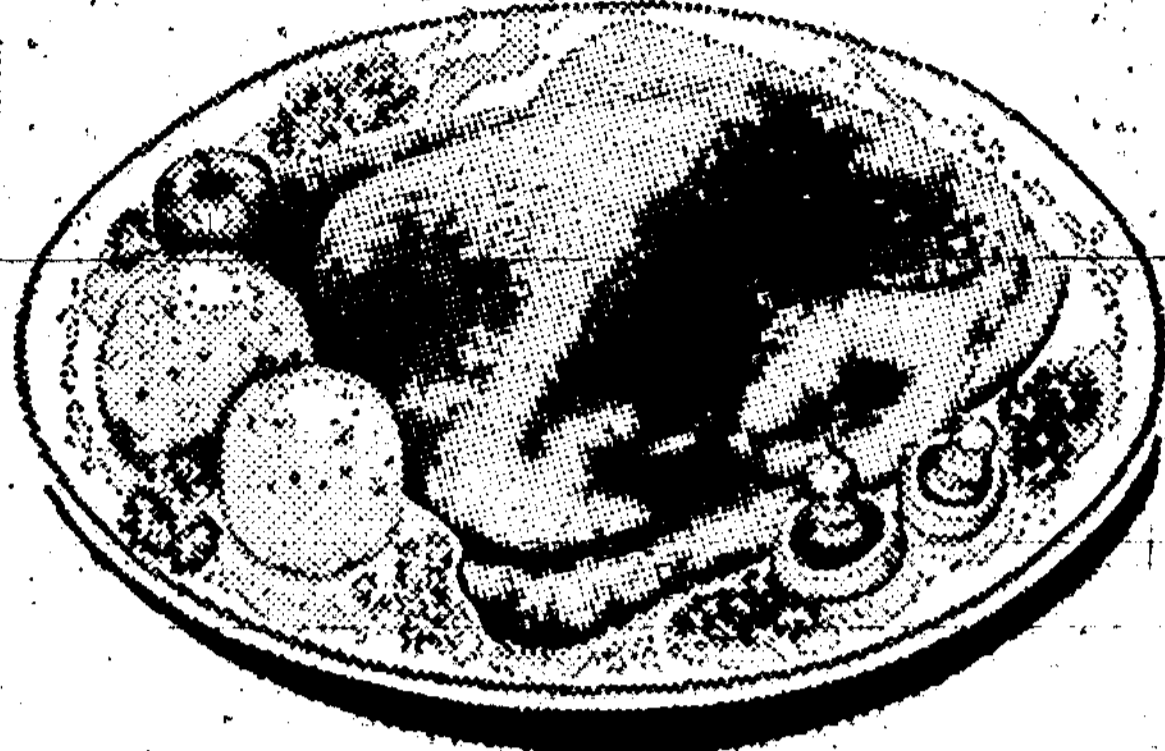


