Will know in week if site is suitable between Twelfth and Railroad in ZoZo

Dennis J. Lechniak, architect from the Denver post office was in Carrizozo Monday to look at post office site between 12th and Railroad. He made the comment that the site was ideally situated for vehicles and foot traffic and he didn't know why they considered another site with this one available.

Bill Wolf of Mann Engineering had a survey crew at work in Carrizozo to check elevations on the site. The PO department has

asked that the town furnish elevations and that the town board vacate 150 feet of alley which they are expected to do at regular meeting August 6.

The buildings would face 12th Street with entrance on that side. Parking lot and another entrance will face 6th.

Mayor Johnson Stearns was told that the post office department would notify him in a week if they wish to exercise their options on this piece of ground.

Capitan school is ready for opening August 23

Capitan school will open for the 1968-69 year on Friday, August 23 at 8:30 a.m. School will be turned out early that afternoon and regular classes convene again Monday.

The cafeteria will be open and lunches served at 30¢ per plate

same as year ago. Special milk will be increased in price to 4¢ due to increase in cost of milk. School busses will make their regular runs Friday. New people living in the community should contact the office of superintendent to make transportation

arrangements.

New students at Capitan school may pre-register if they wish to do so in the administration offices Monday through Wednesday, August 19-20-21. New students are not required to pre-register but it is helpful if they do so.

First grade students must comply with state health laws on inoculations and must also bring proof of age. All students must be six years or older on or before January 1, 1969.

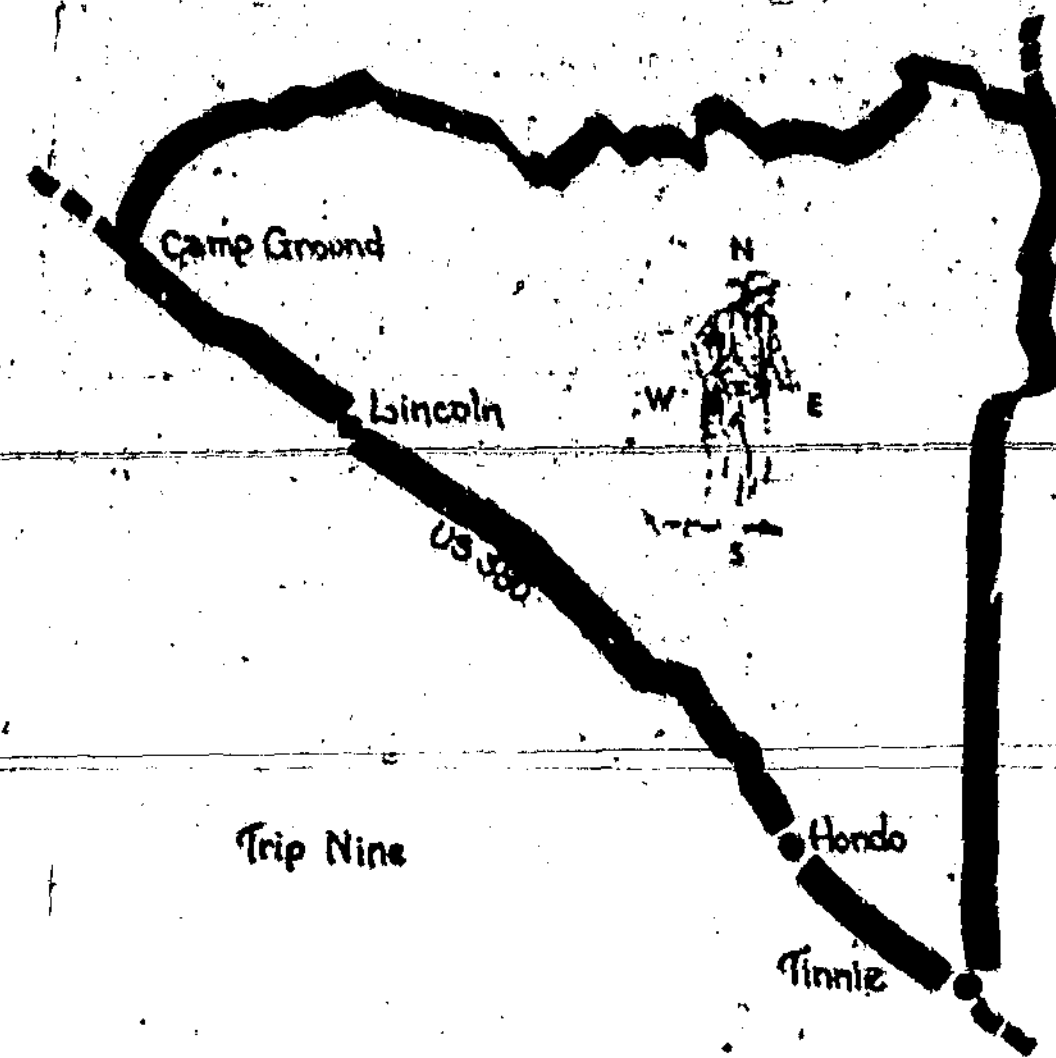
There will be a teacher workshop held at 9:00 a.m. August 22 in the home economics room.

Some shifting of program and staff has been necessary due to a 30 percent deduction in ESEA Title I program. Capitan will not carry on its planned pre-school program, and the position of elementary teacher aides has been eliminated. The number of deprived children that have been receiving free lunches will be reduced.

Utilities have been reworked during the summer. The school will be tied on to municipal sewer line by starting day-out conversion to natural gas is expected to be complete. New heaters have been installed in the primary building, the heat system changed in music room and amount of heat increased in cafeteria.

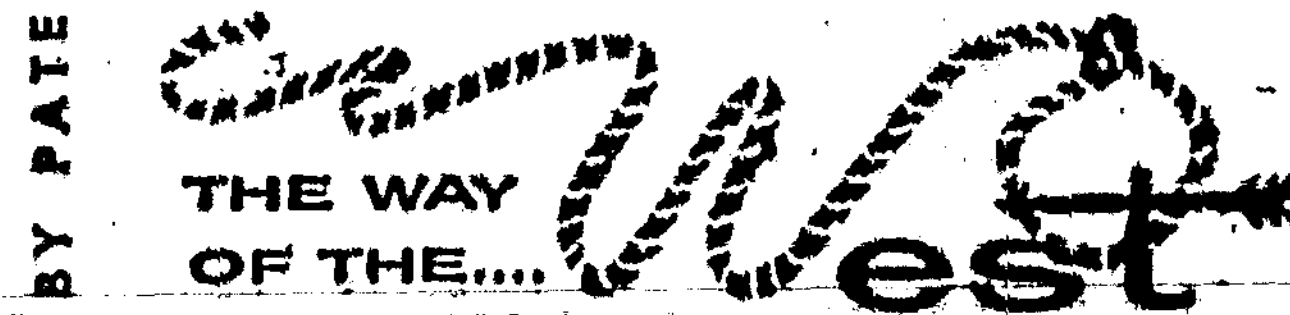

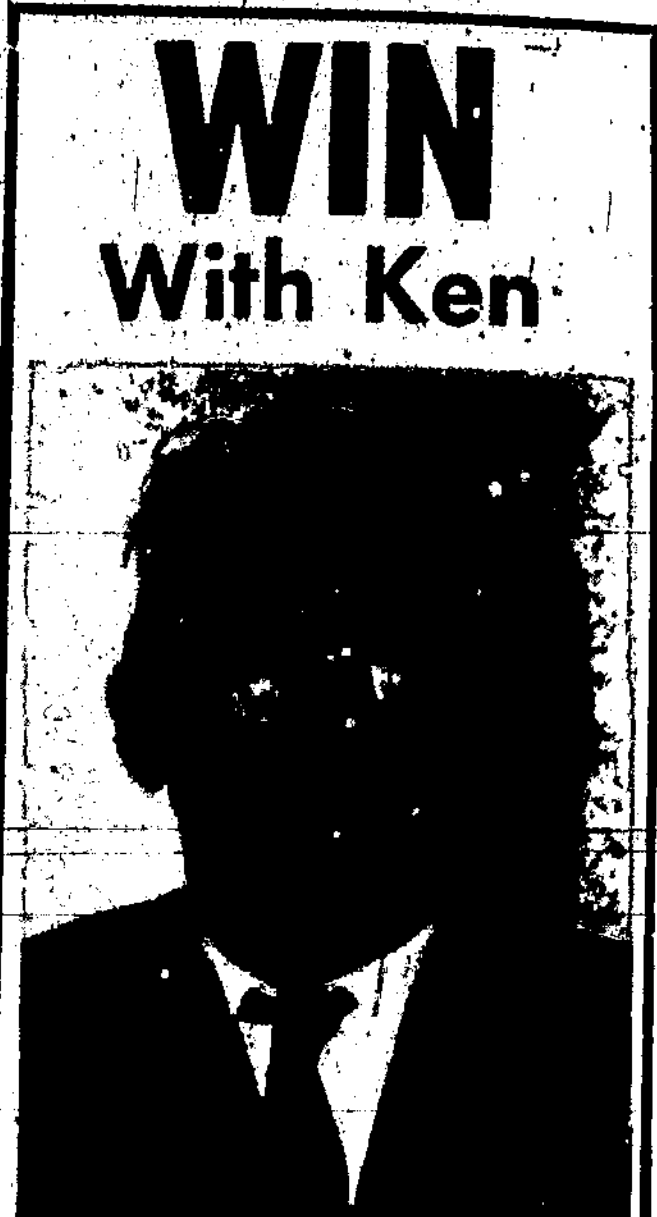
Talley - Montgomery wedding at Roswell

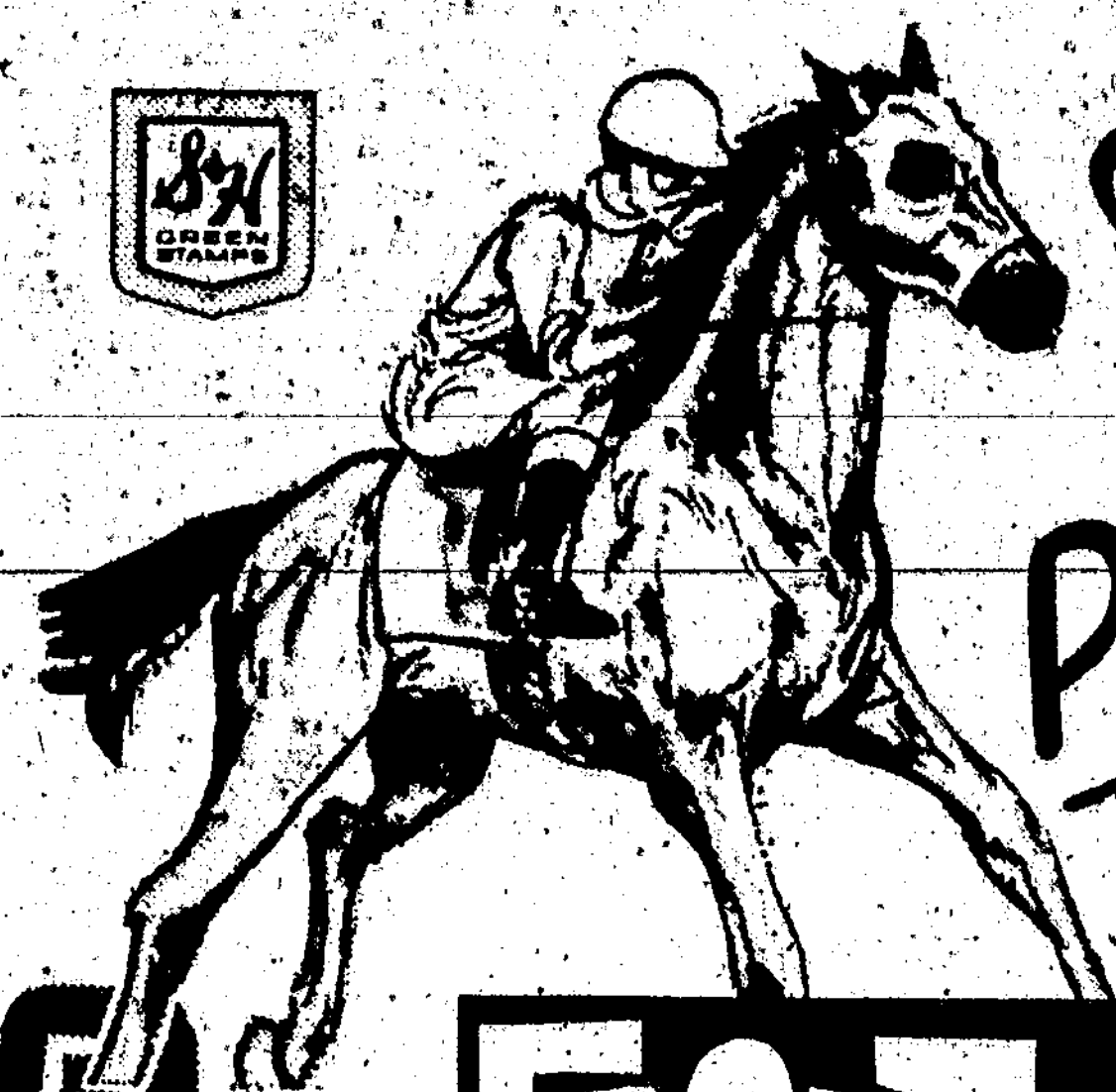

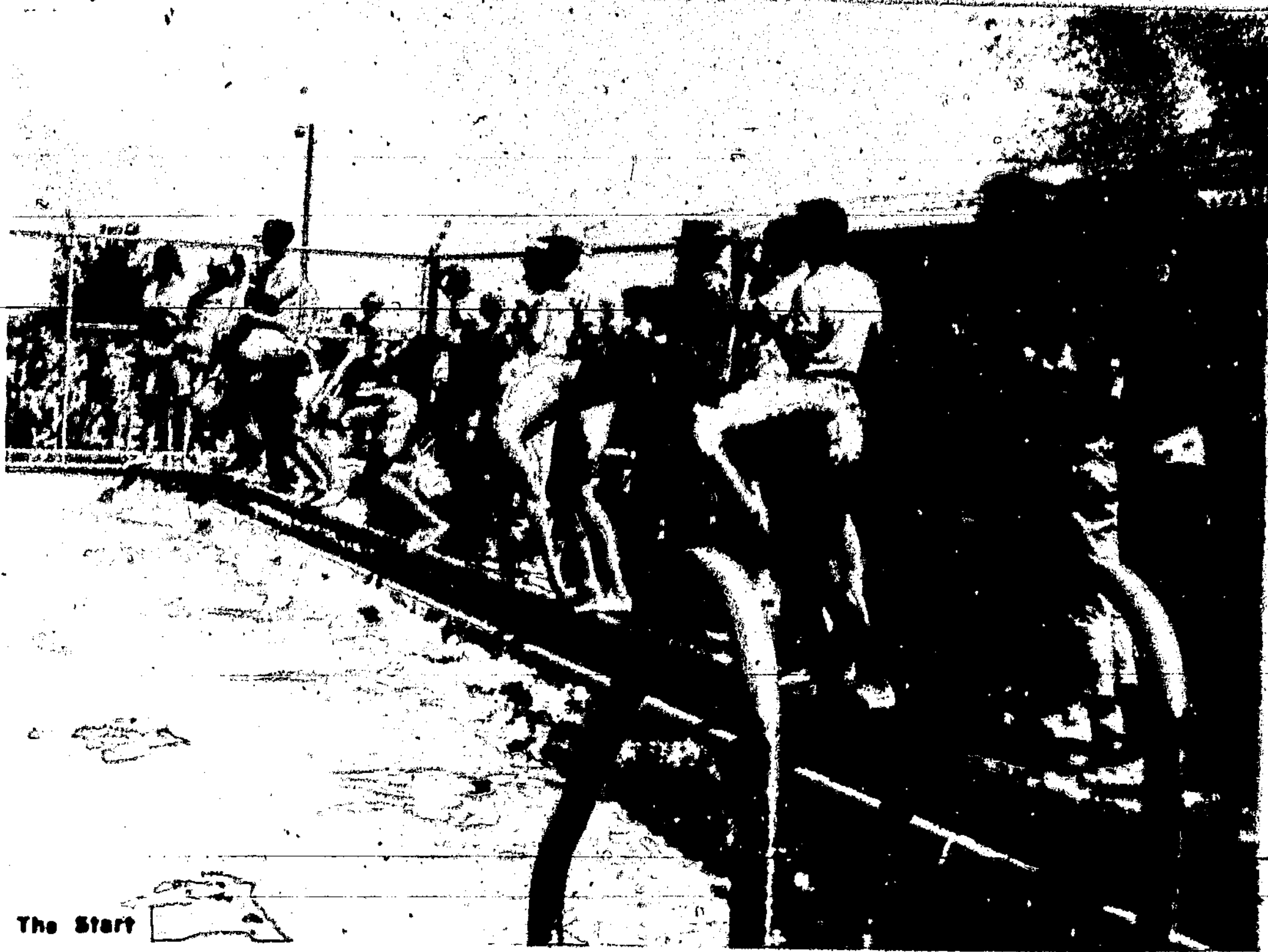

so that the rate can be measured. Some sprinklers may require six hours to provide one inch of water, while others may apply one inch in 45 minutes. When grasses have developed a deep root system, daily watering is not needed. Water applied twice a week or less often should be sufficient for most lawns. Nitrogen fertilizers applied in the summer to cool season grasses, such as blue grass and rye, often encourages lawn diseases. Apply fertilizers to cool season grasses in the spring and fall. Mow grass before it gets too tall; not more than one-half of the leaf surface should be removed at one time. Two inches is the best height for bluggass.

David McGee, Chairman of the Roswell Soil & Water Conservation District, announced today that the Roswell District has petitioned to merge with the Macho Soil & Water Conservation District. Both Boards, after considering the matter in joint meeting, at which "pros and cons" were aired, voted unanimously in favor of the consolidation, and have asked for a hearing. At this hearing, which will be held in Room 262 of the Federal Building on August 9th, at 1:30 P.M., cooperators will be given an opportunity to be heard on this proposal.

According to McGee, the thinking of the Boards is that the consolidation of the two Districts will enable them to serve the cooperators in both Districts to better advantage, in that much duplication of effort will be eliminated, and greater utilization of the available man hours in the Soil Conservation Work Unit will be realized.

The new District will be one of the largest in the State of New Mexico, comprising an area of approximately 2 1/2 million acres, with approximately 60,000 acres under irrigation. It will be called the Macho-Roswell Soil and Water Conservation District and will be composed of a seven men Board, which will eventually be made up of three supervisors from the old Roswell District, three from the old Macho, and one from the City of Roswell.

Both Districts were originally organized to assist landowners and operators obtain technical assistance on conservation of their natural resources. Now the District finds itself dealing with more and more diverse interests and more complex problems. Zoning and planning bodies, city and county officials, highway people, consulting engineers, tax people, and many others now seek from the District non-farm interpretations of soils information and better use of available water. Under the consolidation it is the opinion of both Boards of Supervisors that stronger more effective help can be given not only to farm and ranch landowners and operators but also to communities, people living in urban areas, and County City governments in the development and conservation of their natural resources.

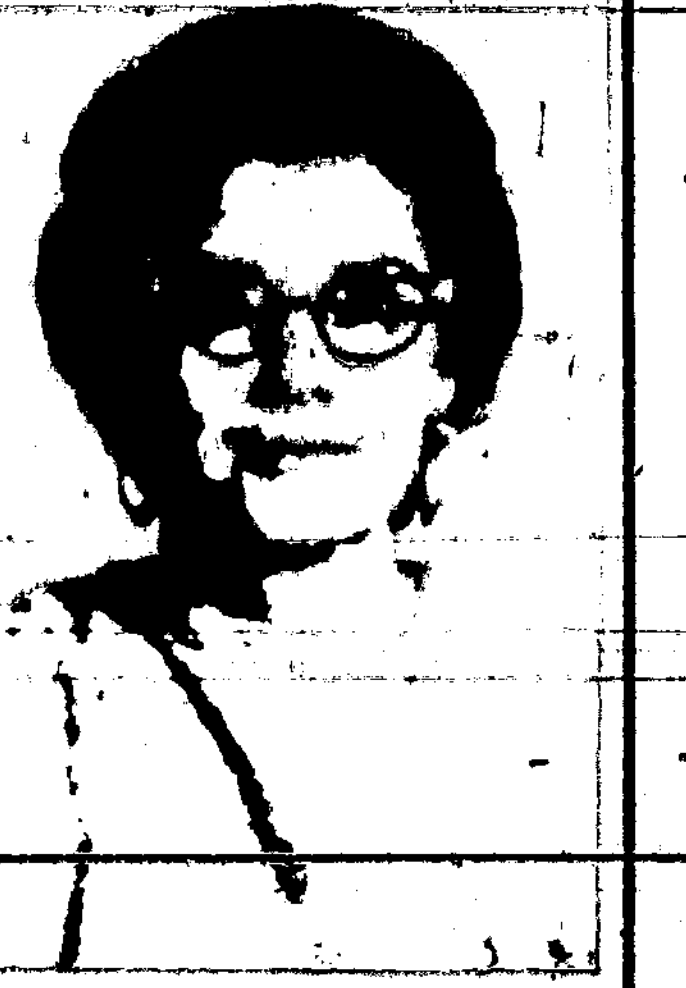
One of the goals of the new District will be information and Education work, reaching new audiences as to the necessity of wise use of our available resources. Among these are: homeowners, gardeners, outdoorsmen, builders, service, civic, youth and women's groups.

Another of the goals of the new District will be that of assisting small farmers and small ranch owners in developing their units into self-supporting units.

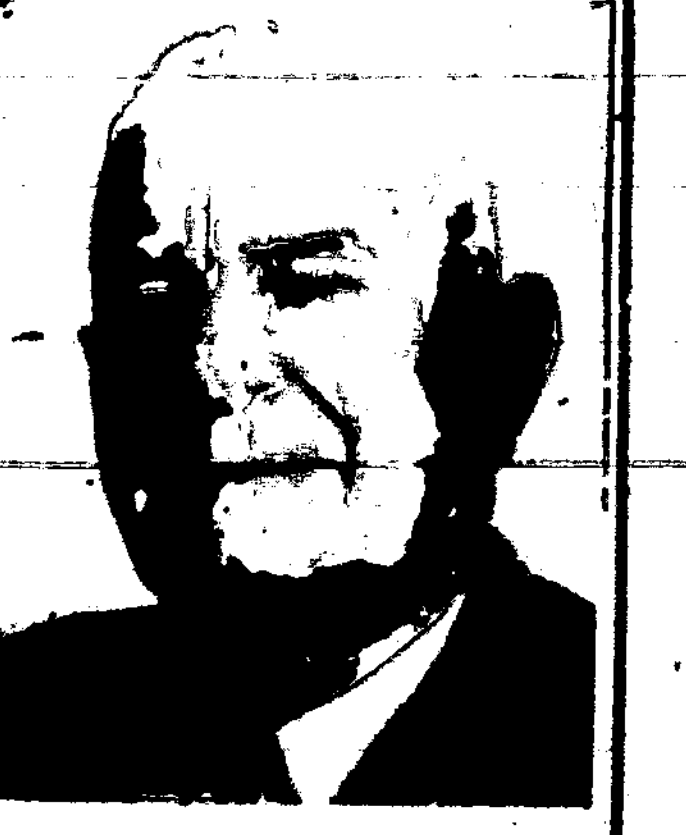

It often rains upside down

Washington -- It often rains "upside down" in the sudden fury of a summer thunderstorm. Strong updrafts may roar up at 60 miles an hour and carry raindrops high into the air before the water droplets grow heavy and plummet to earth.

So violent are the updrafts and downdrafts within the storm system that they can toss an airplane hundreds of feet in seconds, flip it over, or even rip off its wings.

An average summer storm produces 50 times the energy of the first atomic bomb, the National Geographic Society says.

Triggers hailstones
The storm may release a hundred thousand tons of rain and hailstones as big as grapefruit. The pelting hail flattens crops, splinters buildings, smashes glass, and kills animals, birds, livestock, and sometimes men. A hailstorm that struck Wichita, Kansas, in 1951 caused property damage in excess of \$14 million.

Paradoxically, violent storms also produce valuable fertilizer. Lightning frees nitrogen from the air, and rain washes it into the soil at the rate of a hundred million tons a year.

About 1,800 thunderstorms rage around the world at any given moment. The west coast has the fewest thunderstorms of any area in the United States--an average of less than five a year. The greatest number--some 90--strike a strip in Florida extending northeastward from Tampa Bay to Daytona Beach.

For all its power, a thunderstorm begins as a column of gently rising air--warm, moist

and walled by a chimney of cooler air. It is topped by a cottony cumulus cloud.

Such a thunderstorm "cell" of rising warmth, if conditions are just right, gains power as it lifts. Air expands and cools; it begins wringing out its load of water vapor. Droplets form and grow heavier. The cloud boils higher and darker. The cumulus becomes a thunderhead.

Ice crystals cap the cloud, but in its middle water drops grow heavy enough to overcome the updraft and fall. They drag cool air with them, the cold gust that blows out from the skirts of the storm.

Laced With Lightning
Massive charges of electricity form inside the thundercloud. Negatively and positively charged centers polarize within a thunderhead. Eventually, an electrical discharge flashed from one center to another or between

one and the ground. This is lightning.

The shock waves, as the lightning bolt expands along its length, is thunder. Because sound travels at about a thousand feet a second, the number of seconds between the flash and the thunder, multiplied by one thousand, tells roughly the distance between and observer and the storm.

A single flash of lightning seldom drains a storm cloud of its electrical energy. Repeated strokes down the same channel are common, and dozens of bolts can occur in one second. The old saying that lightning never strikes twice in the same place is false.

One belief that is true goes: "If you heard the thunder, the lightning did not strike you. If you saw the lightning, it missed you. If it did strike you, you would not have known it."
