Lincoln County voters of both Republican and Democratic parties will have choices enough to make voting in the primary election August 27 an interesting experience.

There are nine candidates for county commissioner, Charles A. Jones and Roman C. Nunez in District 1, Walton B. Wilson and Kennan Fuller in #2 and Samuel Montgomery in #3 on the Democratic ticket. Three Republicans, Don Stark, Wynema Tully and E. V. Morris are campaigning in District 3, Holt Lovelace has not primary opposition in District 2.

Clerk Alice King, Treasurer Mary K. Lynch and Assessor

Marian Schlarb run unopposed. Republicans have contests in both sheriff and probate judge races. W.G. Bradley and Ernest Sanchez are the sheriff candidates, Kenneth Nosker and Herbert Smith are going for probate judge office.

R.L. Sherrill and K.A. Huey are unopposed as magistrate candidates. Alton Gray and Austin Pritchett are opponents for Magistrate in Div. 3 on the Democratic ticket.

Lincoln is paired with Sierra County in election of state representative. Max Oliver of Ruidoso Downs and Charles Flota of T. or C. are opponents on the Republican ticket in this

two-county race, Ralph Petty Jr. is unopposed as Democrat.

The Woods are full of candidates for U.S. representative, particularly in District 1 where there are four Democrats and six Republicans competing. In District 2 Harold Runnels and E.S. Johnny Waler are the Democratic candidates, Ed Foreman is unopposed on Republican side.

It will be worth a night's loss of sleep just to hear the conclusion of the Democratic race for governor where Fabian Chavez, Calvin Horn, Bobby Mayfield, Harry Stowers, Mack Easley and Bruce King are on the ticket. David F. Cargo and Clifford

Hawley give Republican voters a choice for governor.

There are four Democratic candidates for lieutenant governor, Michael Alarid, Rex White, Russel Cappel, David Kelsey and Ralph Gallegos. Lee Francis of Cubero has Mary May of Alameda as Republican opponent.

State offices all down the ballot offer a choice to voters of both parties.

Lincoln County Clerk Inice Hust has sent out 30 absent voter ballots with 12 back in Wednesday noon. All absent voters ballots need to be returned by noon August 26 to get in the election.

Fourteen polling places in Lincoln County will open at 8:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m. for the August 27 primary.

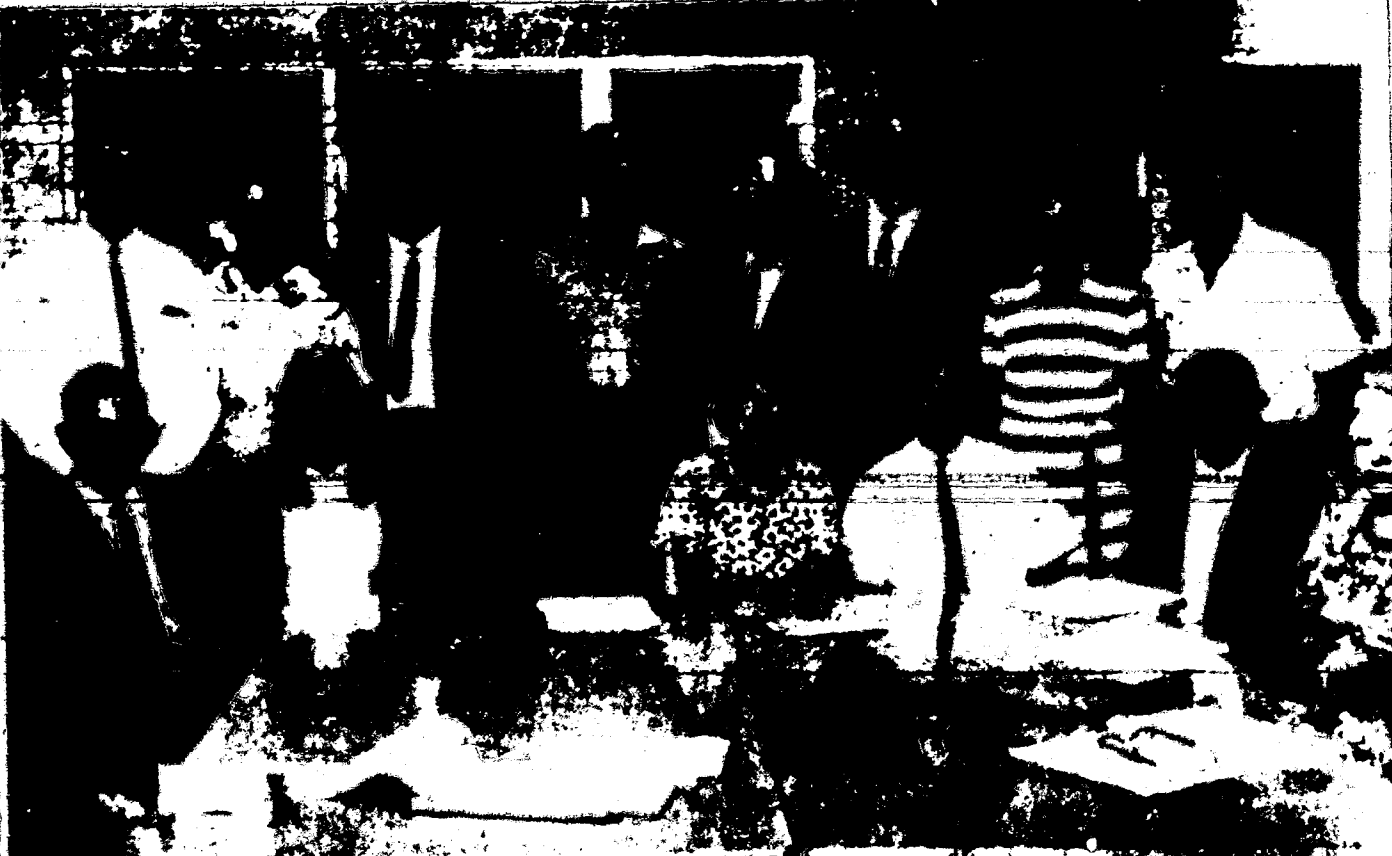
Postoffice site OK'd by department

Title to several lots involved is clear except for one deed lost 30 or more years ago and not recorded at the time it was made out. Since so many years have elapsed this item should not delay construction.

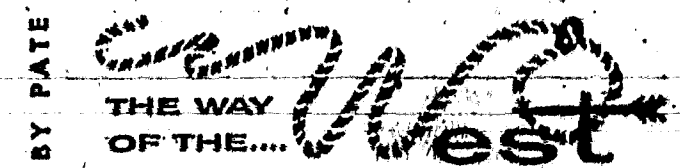

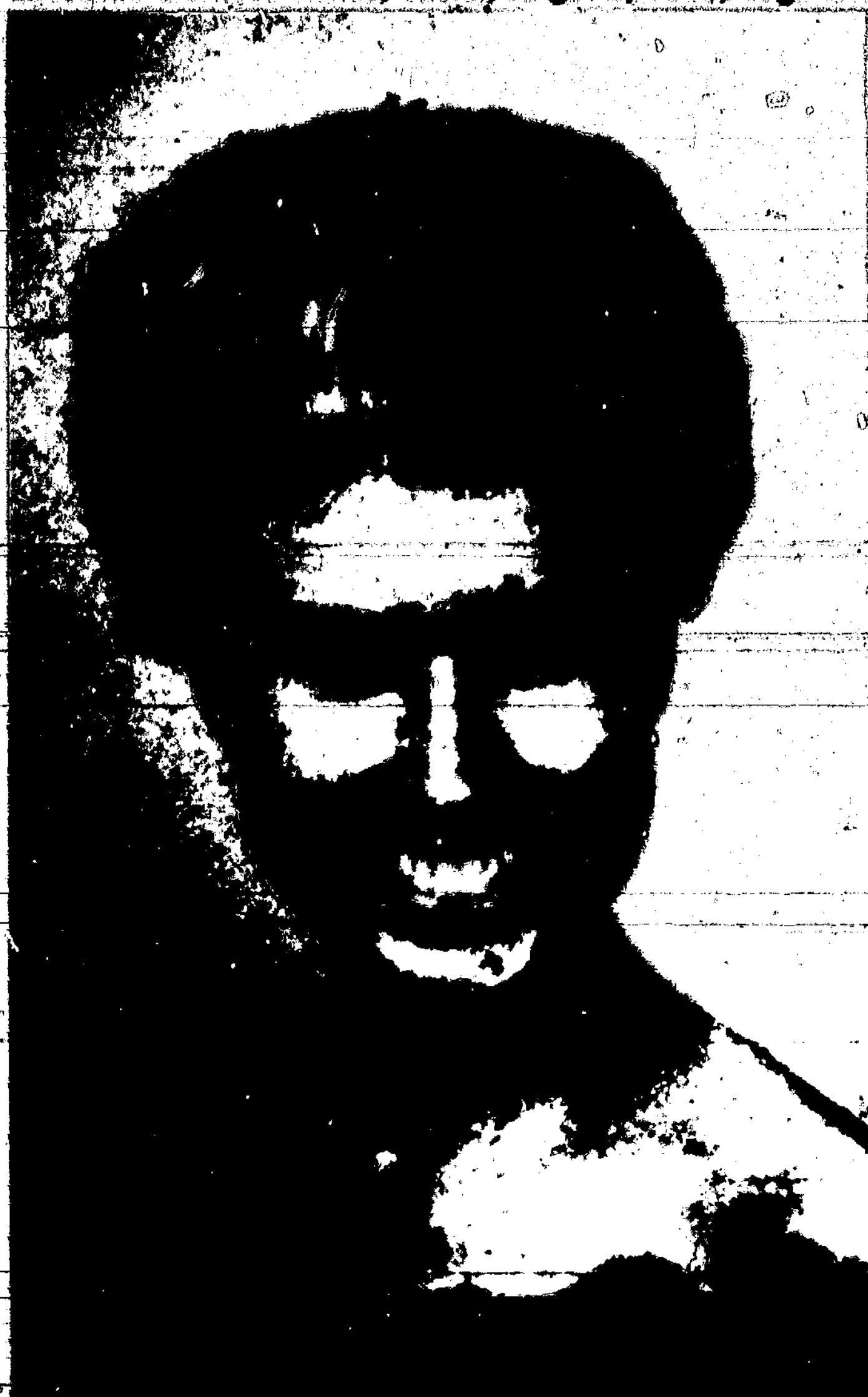

Brown - Tracey vows to be August 31

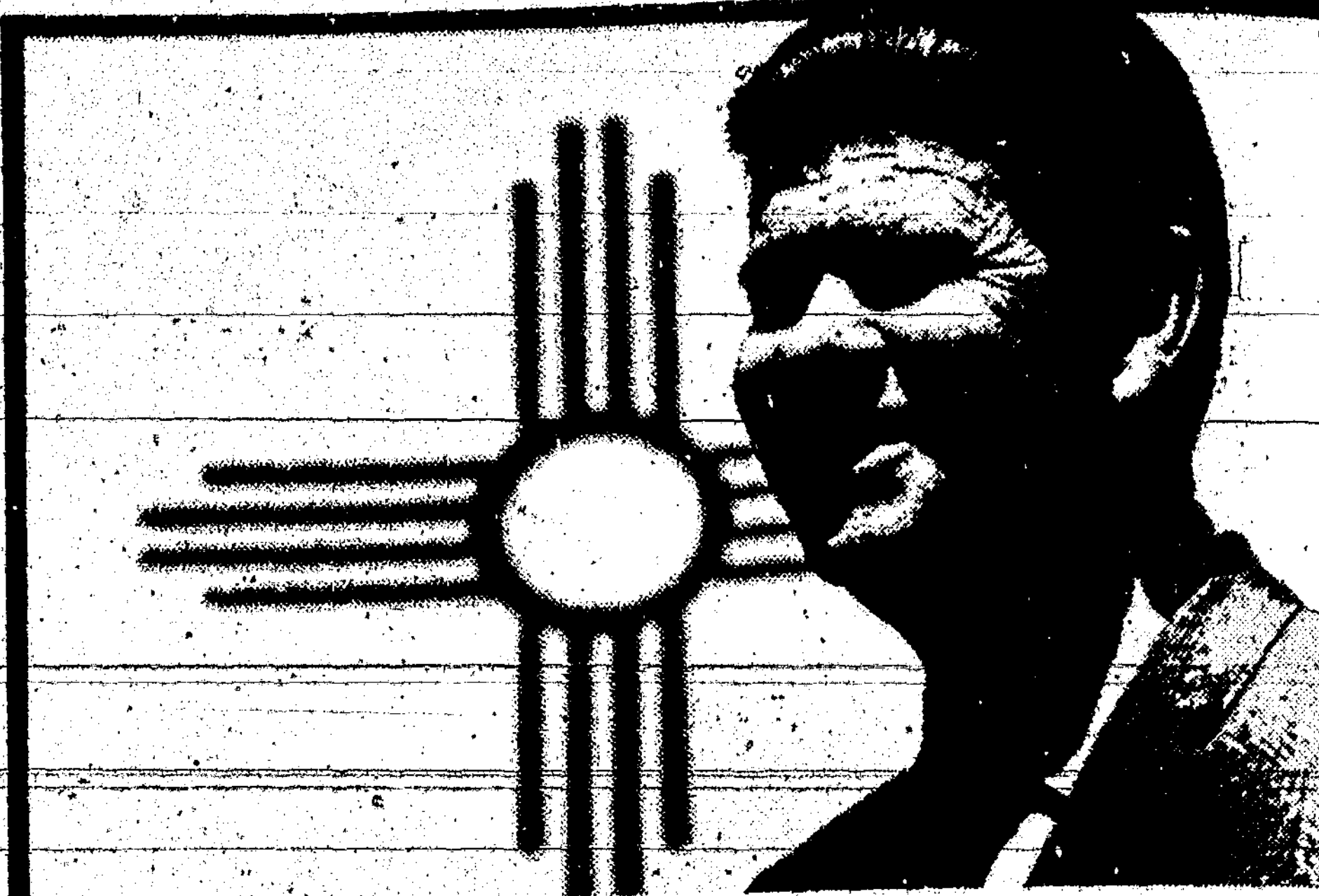

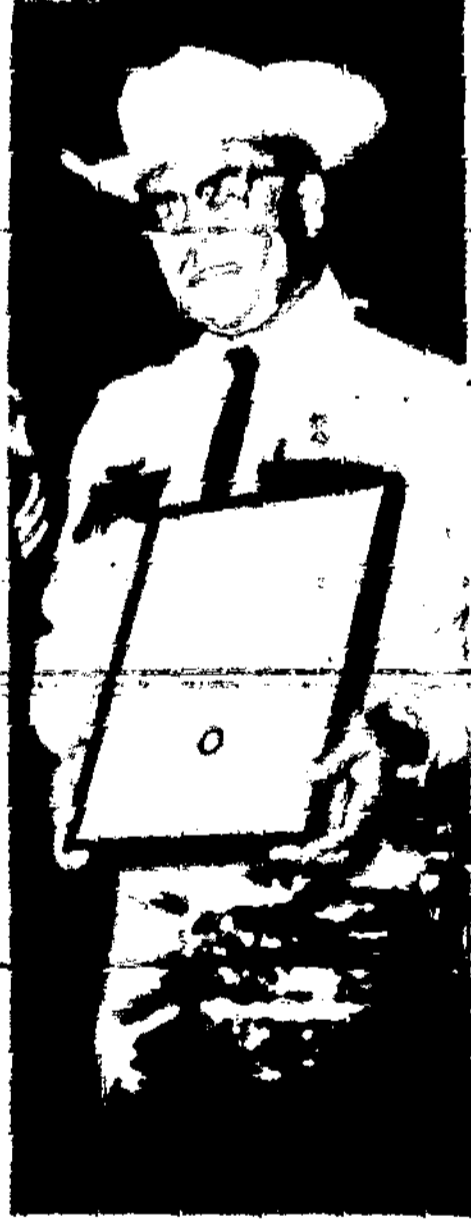

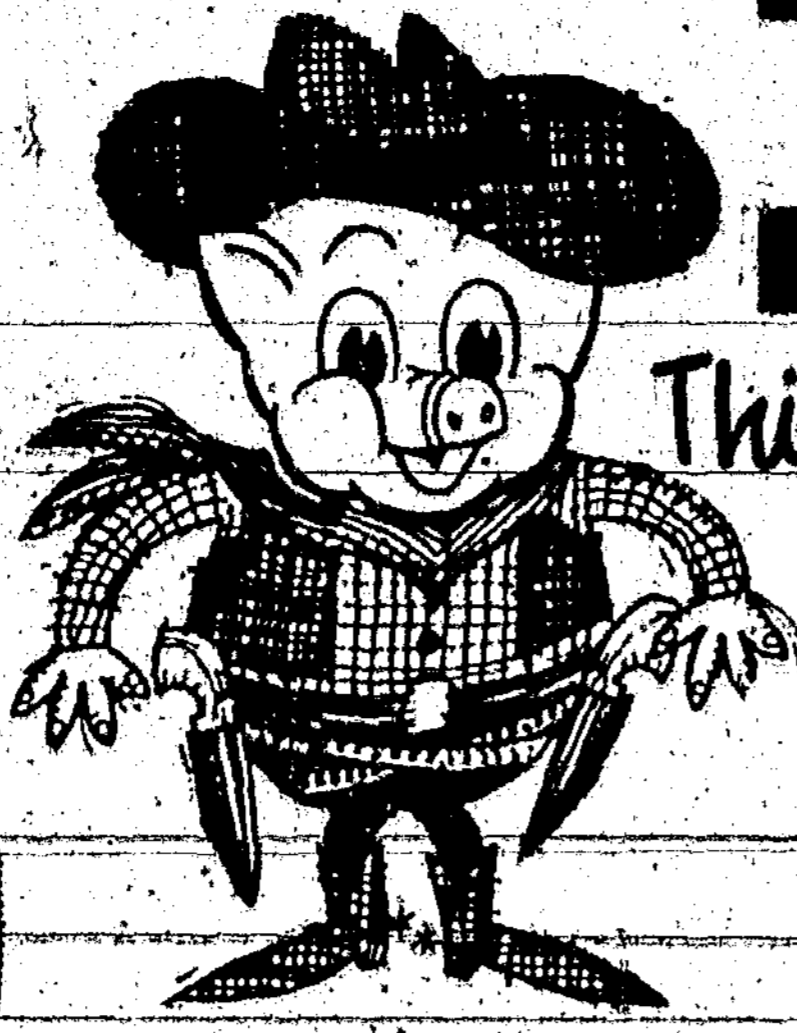

The Nogal and Ancho Presbyterian Churches will have a visiting minister this Sunday.

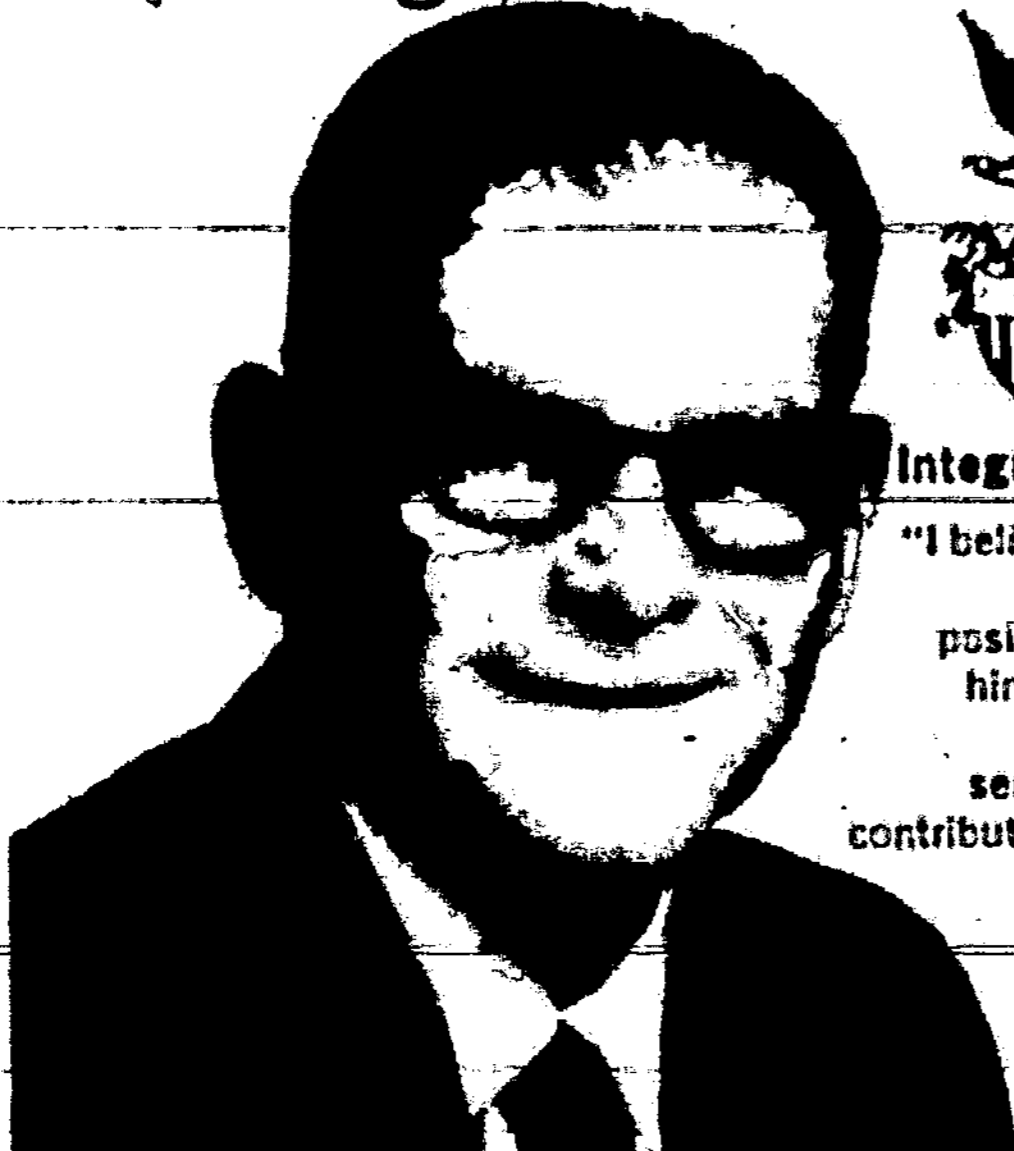
EMMA C. LAWSON CHAIRED STATE PLANNING COMMITTEE

These are annual meetings. 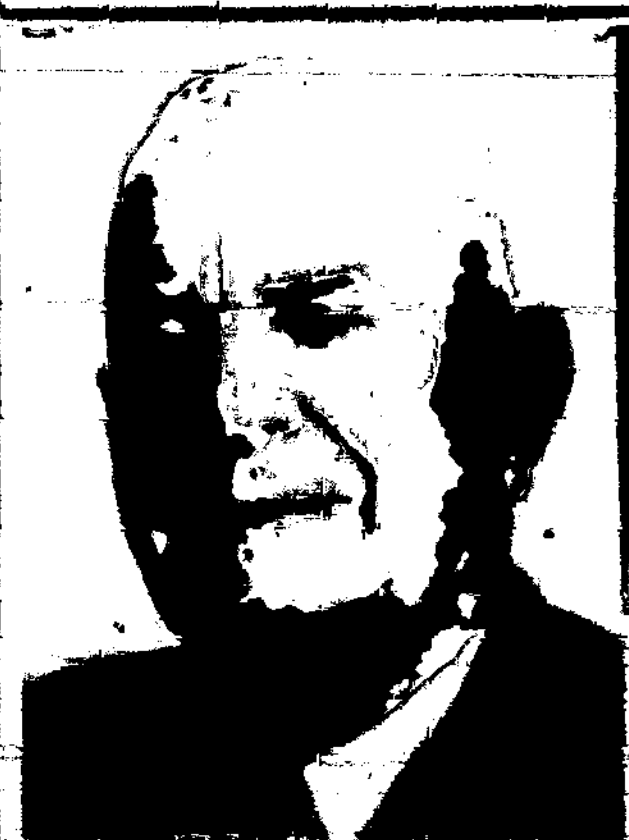

Jack Love believes court gone to far




