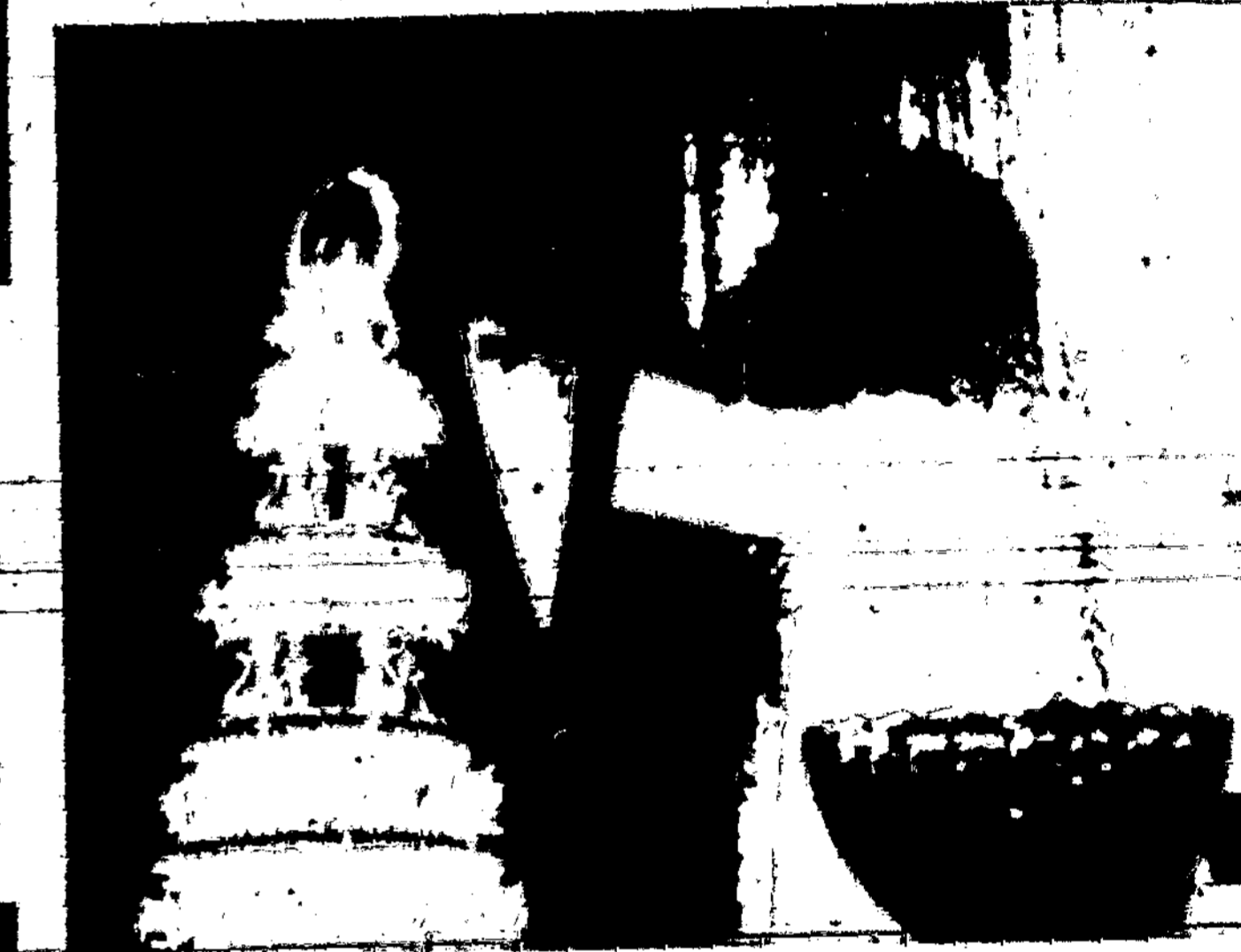

Game and Fish, brought to El Paso in a portable trap and transferred to a similar trap belonging to the Mexican Division of Forestry and Game. Captain David Alatorre Trejo of the Division of Forestry and Game in Juarez and Raul Hernandez Rodriguez, an assistant game management officer, were on hand to receive the big bruin and take it to Mexico. The bear was rather reluctant about his scheduled trip to Mexico, refusing to leave the New Mexico cage and go into the Mexican trap for almost an hour. The two traps were backed together and the doors opened but the bear stayed put. Beating on the metal cage, squirting the bear with a water hose, prodding him with a pole failed to budge the animal. Finally, after being worried with the water hose and the pole at the same time the bear gave up and lumbered into the Mexican trap. The bear was the first of several that will be given to Mexico by the Department of Game and Fish as a goodwill gesture and the transfer at the

U.S. Border Patrol headquarters here was the culmination of several months planning by the two game departments. It all started this past May when New Mexico Department Director Ladd S. Gordon and Captain Alatorre met in Juarez for a conference. Captain Alatorre indicated his country would like to have some bear to replenish dwindling stock in the Sierra Madres. As New Mexico has to trap numerous nuisance bear each year, some of these were offered to Mexico. Captain Alatorre only recently completed the building trap to transport the bear to Mexico. Plans call for approximately six bear to go to Mexico from New Mexico before the restocking project is completed. The program probably will be finished sometime next summer. More than three hundred species of birds have been recognized in New Mexico. Fifteen species of fur-bearing animals and thirty species of game are listed.

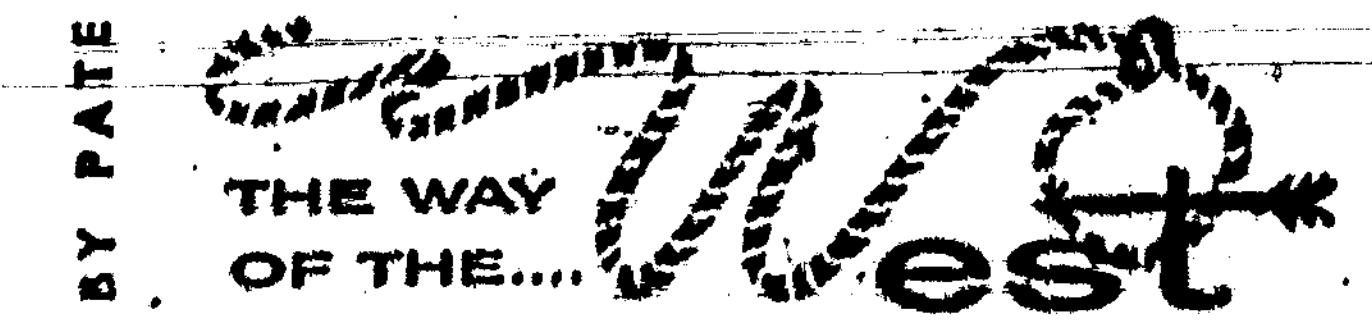

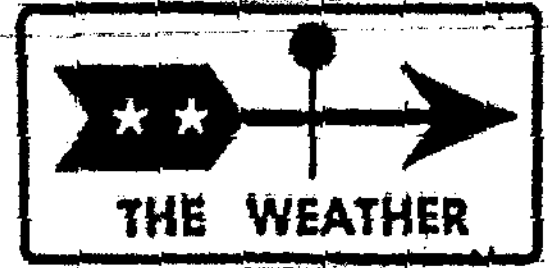
