Cemeteries may be historical sites

The Executive Committee of the South Central Mountain Resource Area met at Bob Scribner's High Mesa Ranch on September 24, 1968. Projects previously submitted were discussed and progress reported. One new project approved by Executive Committee.

The Steering Committee of the South Central Mountain Resource Area met at High Country Restaurant, September 24 with twenty five in attendance. An interesting program on activities of the Bureau of Land Management was presented by Mr. Phil Kirk.

Twenty nine projects have been approved by the Steering Com-

mittee. Bob Scribner gave a report on progress of these projects. Concerning the Dell City to Alamogordo road, a newspaper account was read of an accident on this unimproved road to Ceiniga School involving two teachers from Alamogordo, attributed to the poor condition of road and dust. This safety hazard will be offered to State Engineer Boles in further support of needed improvement.

Capitan Lake project, engineering completed and largely a matter now of the municipalities determining how much water belongs to each one.

Project No. 27, additional water for Nogal Lake, City of

Alamogordo has indicated they will transport free of charge in their line, any additional water for Nogal Lake. An investigation will be made of water rights that may belong to Department of Public Welfare at Ft. Stanton as a possible source of additional water for Nogal Lake.

Accepted Project No. 30, assistance to Carrizozo Woman's Club in their efforts to name White Oaks Cemetery as an historical site and also the Ft. Stanton cemetery. Also to lend assistance with Lincoln County centennial year.

Next meeting Nov. 7, 1968 at Alamogordo, New Mexico.

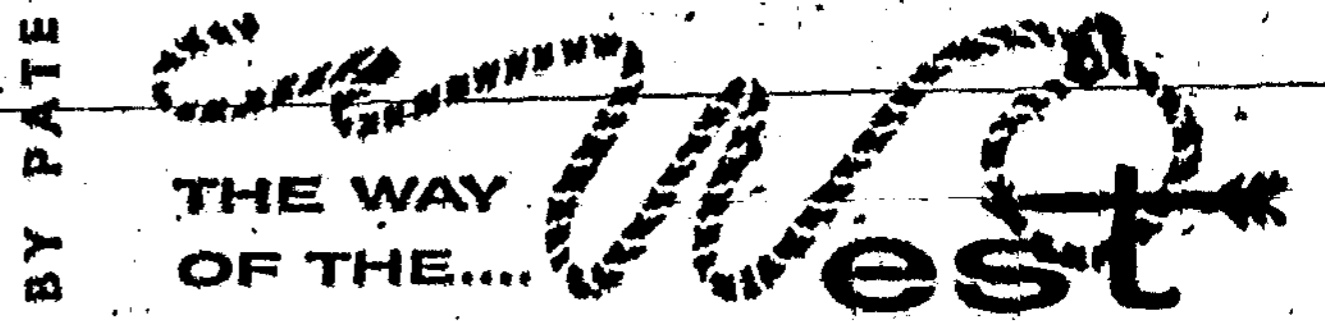
The Tigers came right back with a quick touchdown on a pass from Erwin Aldaz to Clark Taylor that netted 37 yards and the Tigers lone score.

This cheery message was received by welfare department, in accordance with your instructions, I have given birth to twins in the enclosed envelope."

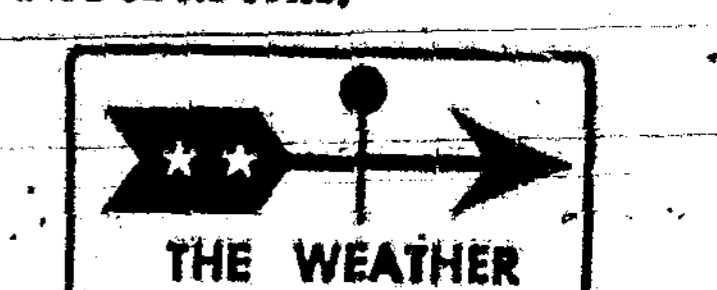

The new building for First Baptist Church in Capitan is nearing completion with only painting outside and in some work on parking lot remaining as the big jobs to finish.

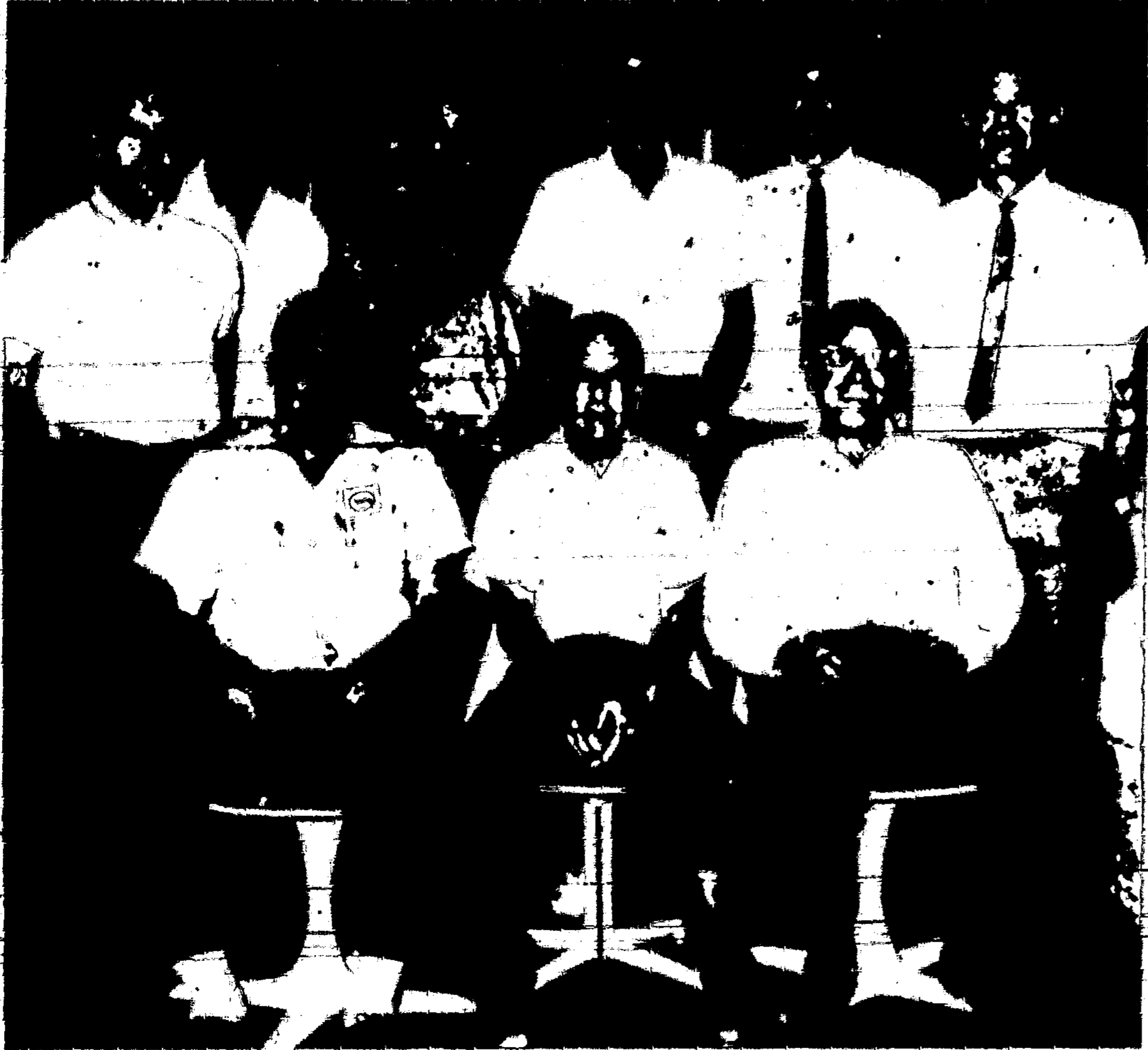

New Mexico State Fair

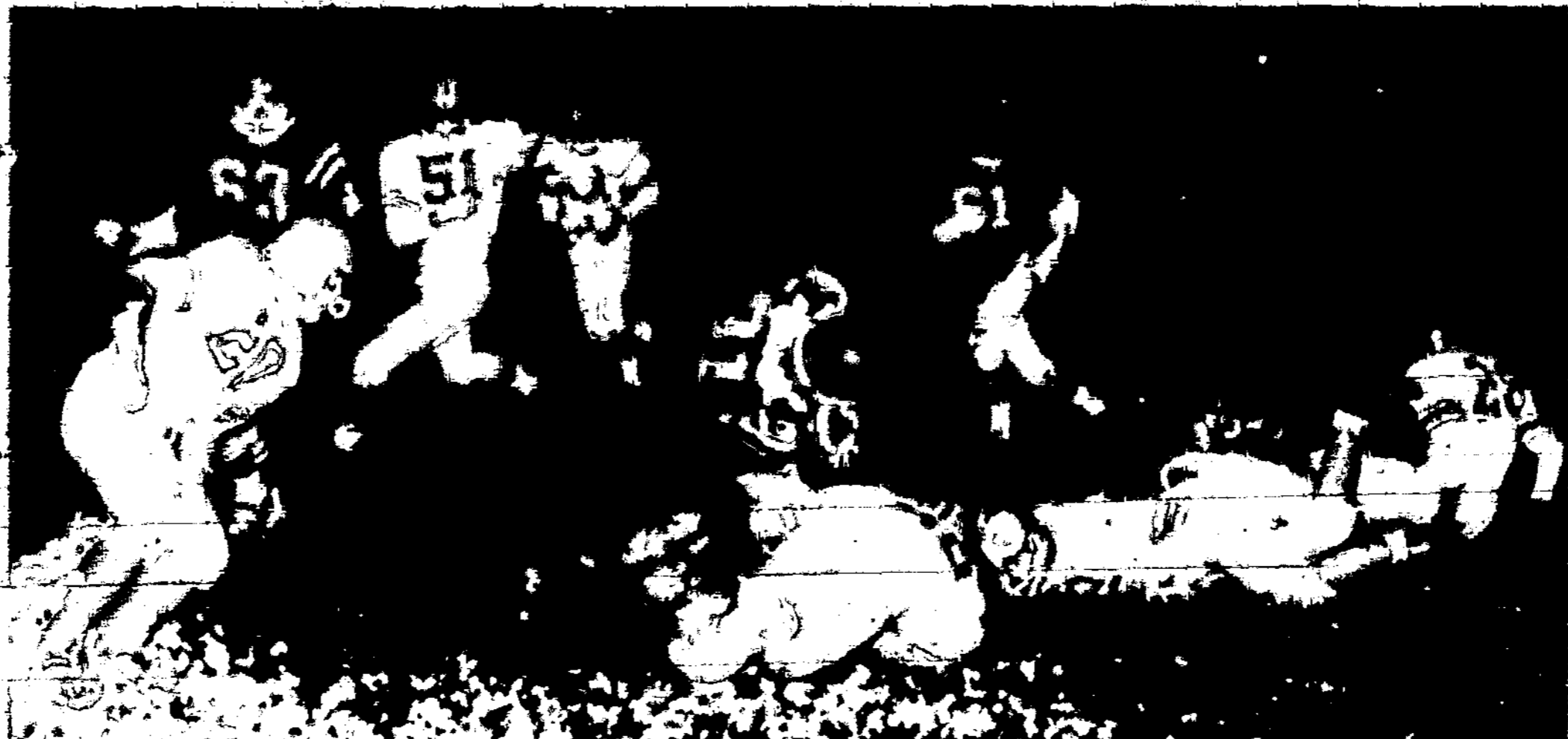

Sept. 11-21 dates set for 1969 fair

The dates of September 11 through 21 inclusive were set for the 1969 New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque, it was decided at a meeting of the State Fair Commission at administrative offices Sunday morning (22), the final day of the record-breaking 1968 exposition.

Beutler Brothers of Elk City, Oklahoma, have been producing the popular rodeo at the fair for many years and were approved for a two-year contract.

Art Frazier and his World Fair Shows was also okayed for a

two-year contract to provide rides and shows for the carnival midway.

In other action, the board heard reports verifying that the 1968 exposition broke most records, particularly in attendance and in racetrack pari-mutuel handle. The commission heard that through Saturday night, the handle stood at more than \$4,800,000, up some \$373,000 over last year, and expected to reach close to five and a half-million dollars.

They also heard that grounds

admissions through Saturday night were more than 556,000, up almost 30,000 over last year, and expected to peak well over 600,000 for the 11 day exposition.

The session was held to wrap up the meeting that started the day before this year's fair opened—on September 11—and has been recessed through this year's fair.

The board also set their next meeting for Wednesday, Nov. 13, at 10 a.m. at fair administrative offices in Albuquerque.
