### Zozo asks return to Class C

Carrizozo school has sent letter to New Mexico Activities Ass'n asking return to Class C which mostly concerns football scheduling. The change should be effective for the fall of 1969.

Average daily attendance (ADA) during 1967-68 school year was 135 which qualifies Carrizozo for Class C. In the previous year ADA soared over 150 and the school was moved into Class B competition against the wishes of school officials.

The ADA for first 20-day report is 140 and an average for the year is expected to run around 130 or less.

Carrizozo would like to go into the Southwest District with Corona and Reserve, and asks that Mountainair be given its

choice of staying in this district or going into the Northwest District, which is short of teams.

A letter October 7 from U.G. Montgomery, executive secretary of the Activities Ass'n states that Carrizozo's request will be a matter for the conference to decide, the matter to be discussed October 24 at general business meeting.

The Carrizozo Athletic Club is serving potluck supper before the game in the cafeteria. Donations of food, money, and time will be welcomed at this event. Prices are reasonable and preschool youngsters free. Funds from this event, and others sponsored by the club, are used for the benefit of the Carrizozo athletic program.

The really big event of the entire program is the football game with a tough Clondcroft Bear team. The Bears are undefeated, are big and fast and are expected to put the Grizzlies to a severe test.

A homecoming dance will be held in the gym after the game, music by group from Tularosa. Alumni are invited to attend, limit of one guest to each. Dance time is 10 to 1.

On Saturday there will be two special games, good chance for excitement in each. Capitan and Carrizozo 7th and 8th graders will battle it out starting at 1:30. Zozo Bee squad will play Dexter at 3:00 p.m.

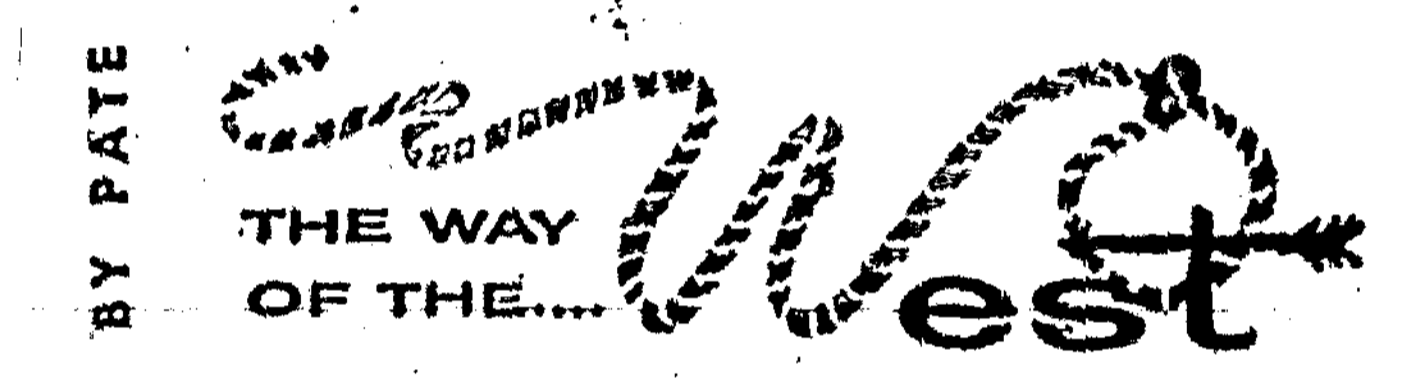

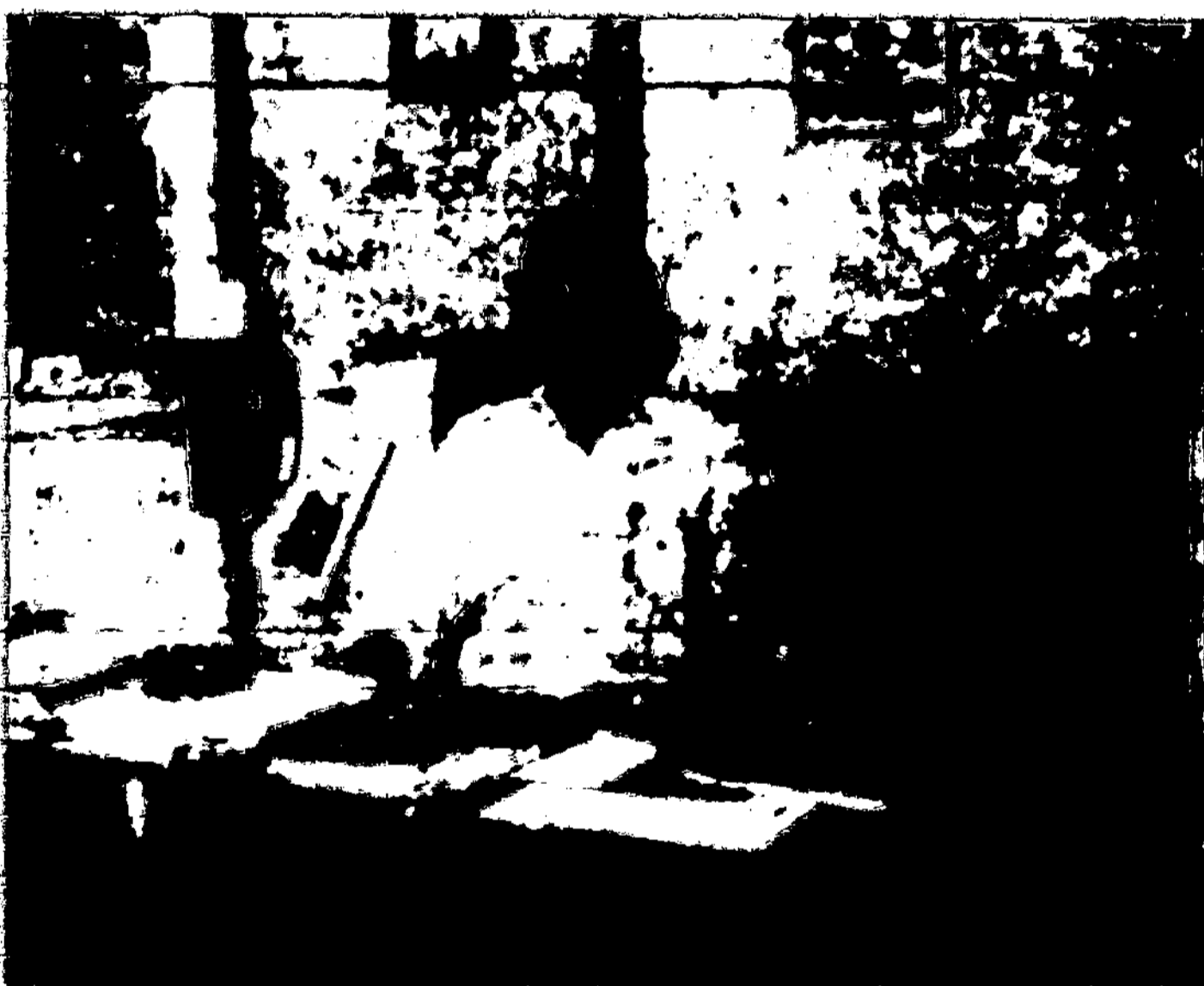

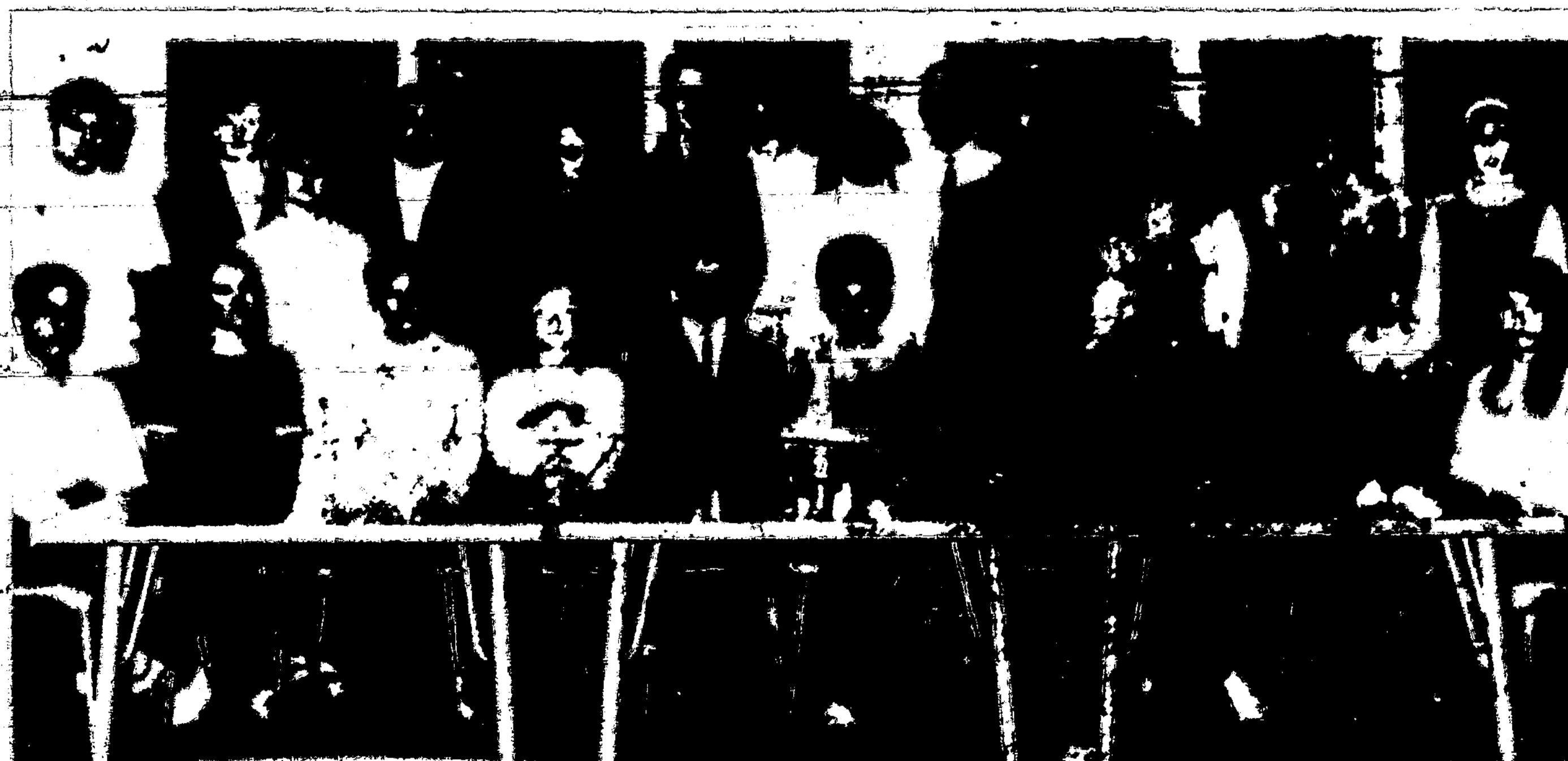

In 1941 he bought a home in Roswell, but continued living on his ranch in Lincoln County until 1963, when on account of his health, he moved to Roswell where he spent his remaining years.

Besides his wife and daughter Mrs. T. J. Latham, he is survived by eight grandchildren, Thelma Sue, Linda and Jim Latham; Ann, Kathy, Pamela, Patricia and William Ernest Richards, and two sisters, Mrs. Hazel King and Mrs. Helen Spencer both of Clovis. His son preceded him in death February 1967.


The nine week course covers branch training in armor for newly commissioned officers with special emphasis on duties of a tank platoon leader.



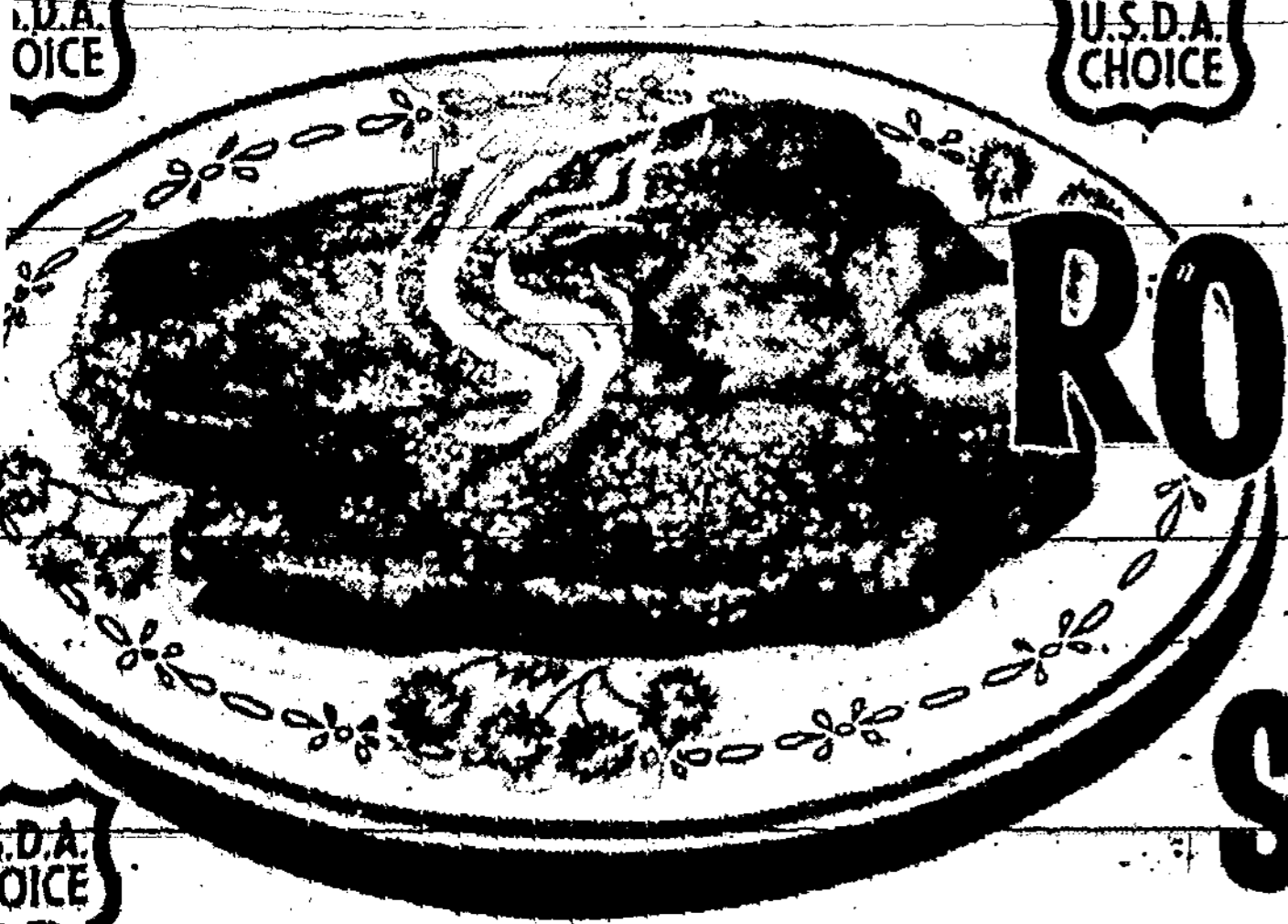

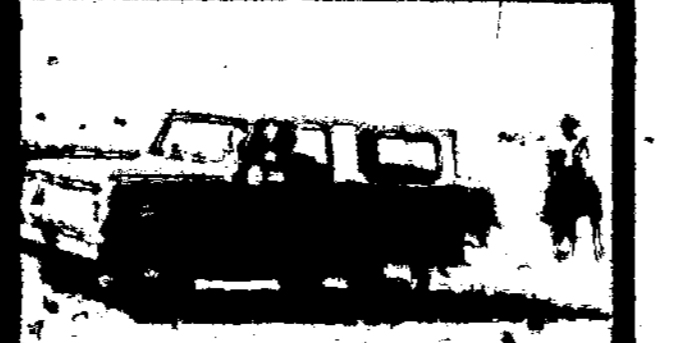
