Zozo asks return to Class C

Carrizozo school has sent letter to New Mexico Activities Ass'n asking return to Class C which mostly concerns football scheduling. The change should be effective for the fall of 1969.







On June 8, 1927 he was married to Myra Pfingsion daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert H. Plingsten of Lincoln, N.M. To this union were born a daughter Evalyn, and a con

In 1941 he bought a home in Roswell, but continued living on his ranch in Lincoln County until 1983, when on account of his health, he moved to Roswell where he spent his remaining rears.
