## Mission team here 3 days

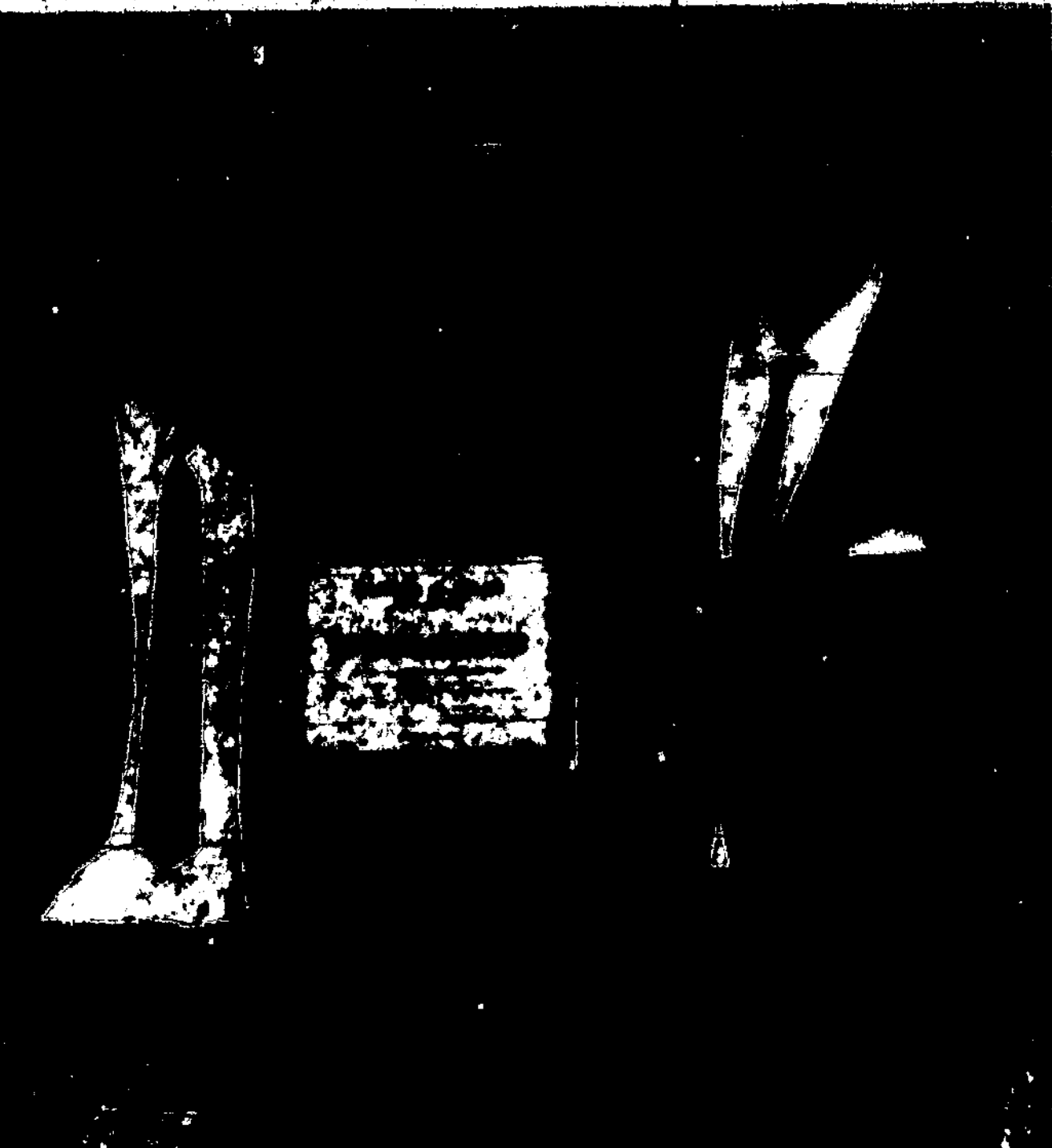

## Zozo rips Dexter

The Carrizozo Grizzlies came back from the defeat handed to them last week by Cloudercroft and swamped the Dexter Demons 55 to 26. The Grizzly squad on offense scored 8 touchdowns the first half and kicked 7 extra points and on defense they held the Demons to a field goal and 0 points. The Carrizozo Varsity squad saw very little action the second half of the ball game as the second squad played all but 2-00 minutes of the second half. Sophomore fullback Ray Roper opened the scoring for ZOZO on the third play of the game as he scampered 55 yards off tackle for the 1st touchdown. Sam Vega kicked the first of his 7 extra points, missing only one for the entire night. The tough inspired Grizzly defense, led by Danny Knight, Gilbert Archuleta, Charles Mackey, Jim Ham, and Sam Vega, held the Demons all night and forced the exchange of the ball rapidly to ZOZO.

The second time ZOZO received the ball, Ray Roper again sprinted off tackle for a 45 yard touchdown.

Ben Stuteville, the Junior right halfback added the third score as he dove off tackle and raced 40 yards for the T.D.

Quarterback Danny Monreal, the eighth leading scorer in the state in all classes, swept the right end for the fourth ZOZO tally and minutes later scored the fifth touchdown on a 25 yard run.

The Grizzly second unit backfield went into the game following the fifth touchdown and David Palomarez broke through a hole and scrambled 40 yards for the

sixth score. Gilbert Archuleta ran off tackle and then the Varsity went back on the field and added the final ZOZO touchdown on a 55 yard pass play from Monreal to Stuteville.

The Junior Varsity played well the second half but the bigger Demons managed to push across 4 touchdowns the second half.

The final score was 55-26. Carrizozo play the No. 1 rated school in Class B Friday night, the T or C Tigers. They play at T or C Friday October 25 at 7:30.

Carrizozo now has a record of 4 wins 2 losses and 1 tie. T or C has 7 wins and 0 losses.

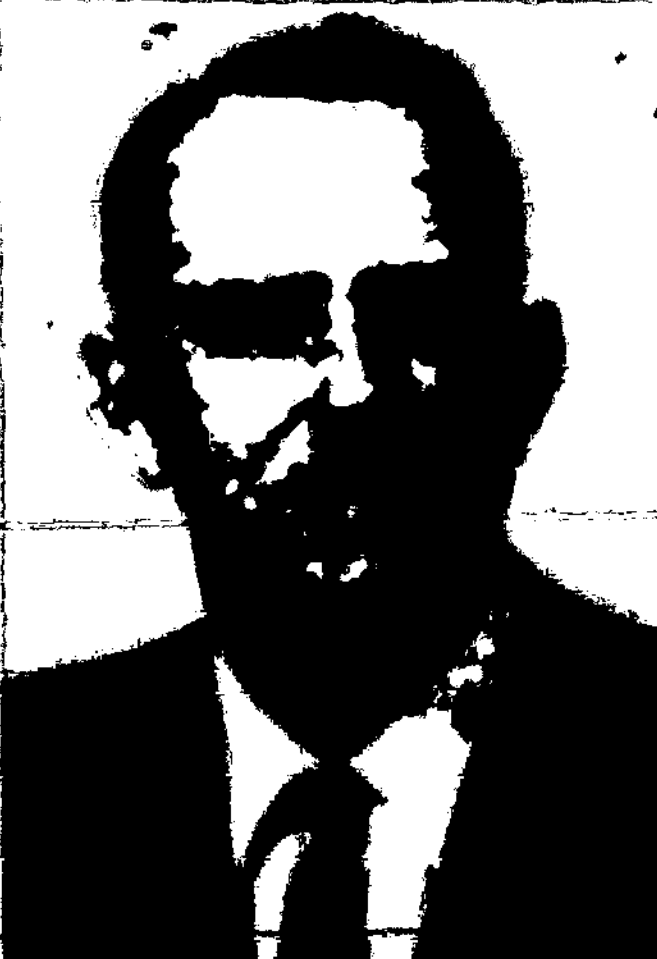
## Openhouse Nov. 3 for Zozo School

The new Carrizozo school lacks only minor details before it should be ready for acceptance by the school board and the company which issued the bond guaranteeing that James E. Hunter and Co. would carry out the terms of the contract has indicated that the building should be ready in a few days.

The Carrizozo board of education received a letter October 22 advising that all monies in possession of board should be held for the benefit of subcontractors and suppliers, come \$19,000. The Hunter Company has given notice to the bonding company that they are unable to complete any work remaining and are unable to pay bills of material men and suppliers.

The school board and architect think the building a good job, their main concern now is that all suppliers be paid in full and they hope that money on hand will cover such claims.

The planned "openhouse" occasion set for November 3 is firm, and there is no reason to change this date. Teacher room assignments have been made, the move to the new building should come about next week.

## Special to News office from the Governor

Gov. David F. Cargo said today that "Under no circumstances will Camp Sierra Blanca at Fort Stanton be closed". Cargo stated, "It is my understanding that Glen Walker, superintendent of Boys School presented a proposal to the new combined Juvenile Institutions Board which included as a possible alternative the transfer of Camp Sierra Blanca the use of the State Department of Hosp. & Institutions. "The Board has not approved the proposal submitted by Walker and certainly did not take steps toward the closing of the camp. Under no circumstances would we agree to losing the investment we have at Sierra Blanca. The camp will not be closed and will continue to function as a state facility."

In appointing the combined Juvenile Institution Board Oct. 1st, Cargo asked the new board to select an executive director for the combined operation and to begin steps to devise a juvenile after-care program for juveniles released from Boys School at Springer and the Girls Welfare Home at Albuquerque. "We have a great deal to do in this important area. I understand the board is moving as rapidly as possible to review the applications which I have received from all over the country from persons interested in directing the program."

A report in Roswell daily of October 21 quotes Fabian Chavez as follows: "The proposed closure of Camp Sierra Blanca at Fort Stanton was attacked Sunday by Fabian Chavez, Democratic candidate for governor, as an example of the "government by impulse" of Governor David F. Cargo.

This statement and the report are not accurate and Lincoln County people, for their own good and knowledge, should know this straight of the story about proposed closure of Camp Sierra Blanca.

## Star members enjoy O.E.S. Grand Chapter at Albuquerque

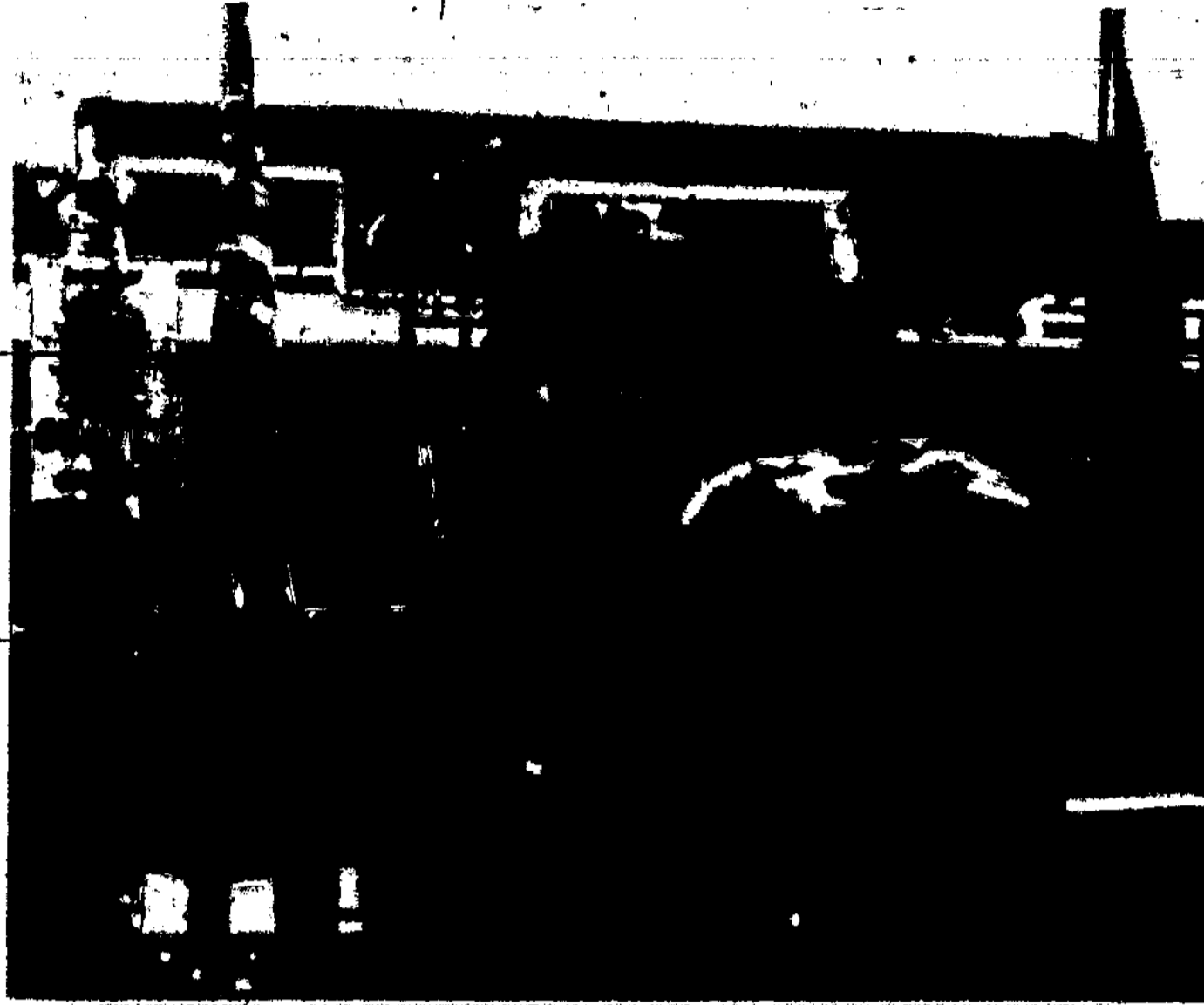

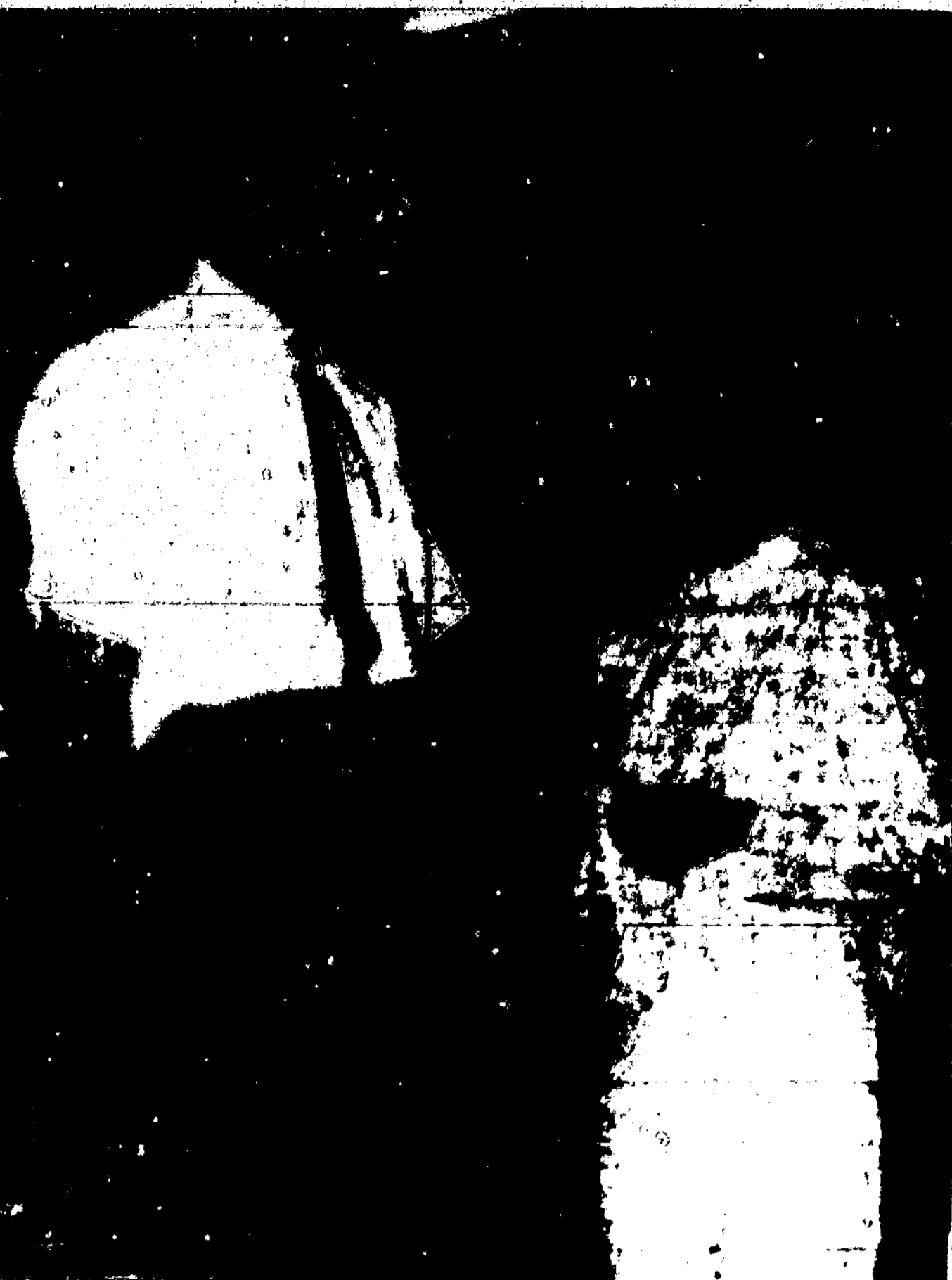

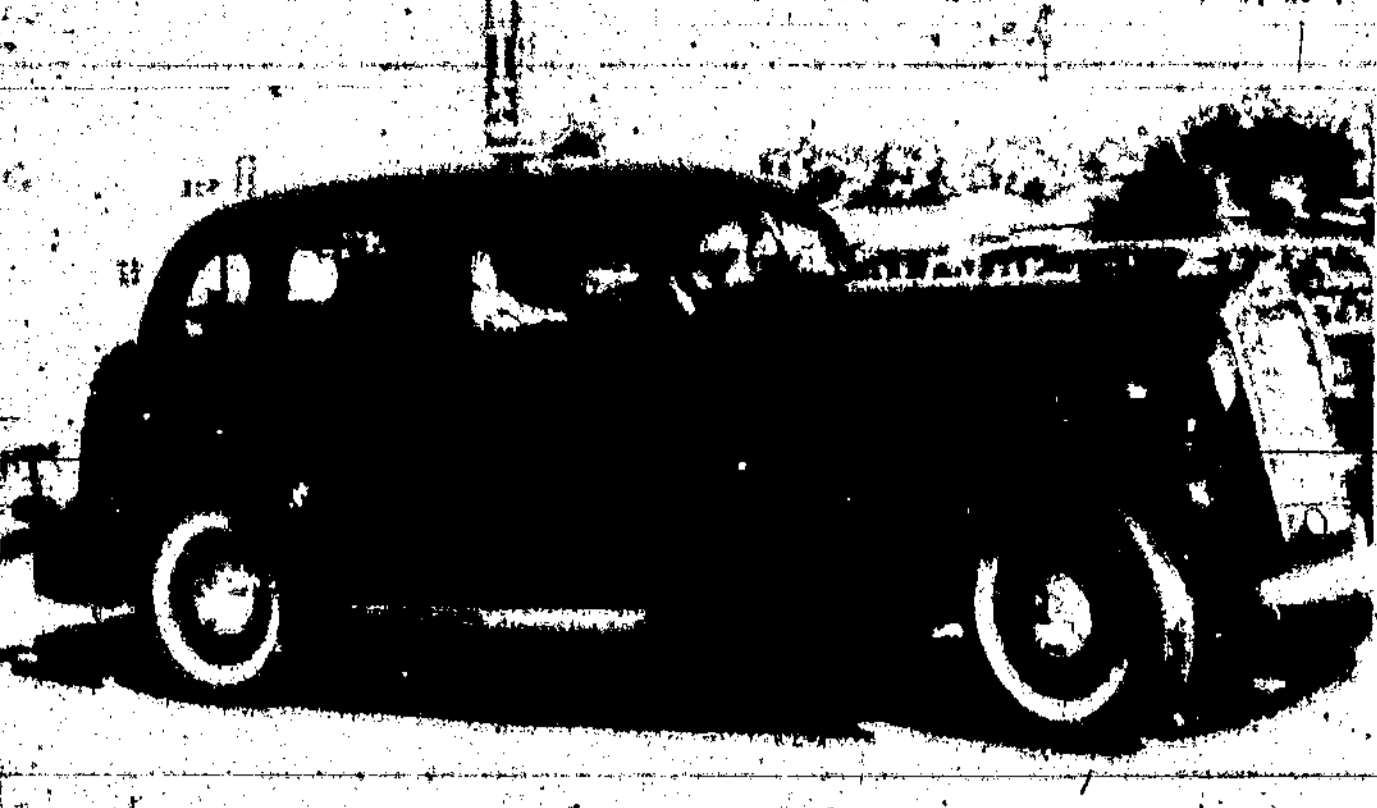
