

Three business sales top the news in Zozo

After going along for years with some new businesses starting up and a few dropping out, all in one week three established and going business places in Carrizozo changed hands this week.

Vernon and Gweneth Petty have been wanting to lighten their work load of operating three places of business (Petty's, Franklin Variety, Motel) and numerous other activities and this was accomplished with the sale of the Petty Motel to Bud and Dorothy Payne.

The motel transaction was completed October 21 and the Paynes took over immediately. Bonnie Bradley will remain as motel manager, Bud expecting to do some maintenance work on the property.

The motel was built in 1948 by the Petties. An unusual note about the first motel guests - they were Mr. and Mrs. Zane Leslie who were married in December of '48 and spent their wedding night at the motel.

Bud expects to get out of the ranching business and told the

news that the ranch he has been operating will probably come up for sale by auction in December to settle the G. V. Clayton estate.

Eighteen years ago Mr. and Mrs. Petty bought out the interests of Burion Hardware,

building and all. They closed out the hardware stock and converted this store to a variety store, putting in a self-service operation which has spread over the country since that time.

Mike Petty was pretty small

at the time and Vernon recalls how Gweneth would take him to the store which she operated all of the eighteen years. This building was built by Mr. Burton for his hardware.

The Franklin Variety was sold to Ray and Marjorie Wells who have taken over the operation of this store. The building is a 25 x 90 and real full of merchandise. The Wells family will supervise the operation under the active management of Jovita Torres who has been with Franklin Variety for seven

years. Mr. Wells will continue his barber business and Marjorie her beauty business in Capitán. Mr. Petty expressed every confidence that these two families would do well in their new business ventures and would give good service to local people as well as travelers at the motel.

The third business transaction was sale by Mr. and Mrs. C.E. May of their lease of Western Texaco Truck Center to Bobby Herrera. This transfer will take

place November 1. Mr. Herrera worked with UNK May for year or so before going into the Army, and has been working at Western Texaco since getting out of service. Mrs. Herrera will do the bookkeeping for this business, as Mrs. May has been doing in the past. Duff will start working with Albert Roberts in distribution of Texaco products for the Ritter Company. The Mays had operated the Texaco service for eight years.

County election contests hot up

Lincoln County voters will go to the polls next Tuesday, Nov. 5, with more than normal amount of decision to make on filling county offices.

The race for State Representative for Lincoln and Sierra County tops the list, Ralph Petty Jr. of Ruidoso the Democrat and Max Oliver of Ruidoso Downs the Republican. Both candidates

have been campaigning hard in Sierra county as well as Lincoln. There are five candidates to fill three commissioners positions, Charles A. Jones, of Capitán in District 1, running unopposed. D.B. Stark, Republican, opposes Sam Montgomery, Democrat in District 3. Both men live in Ruidoso. Kennan Fuller, Democrat, opposes Holt

Loveless, Republican in District 2. Fuller and Loveless live in Corona area.

The race for county sheriff is getting to be one of the hottest Lincoln people have seen in many years. Ernest Sanchez beat a strong candidate in the Republican primary. Ernest is now deputy sheriff. S.M. Ortiz has eight years of experience as sheriff and is campaigning actively to fill this office. Sanchez lives in Hondo, Ortiz in Carrizozo.

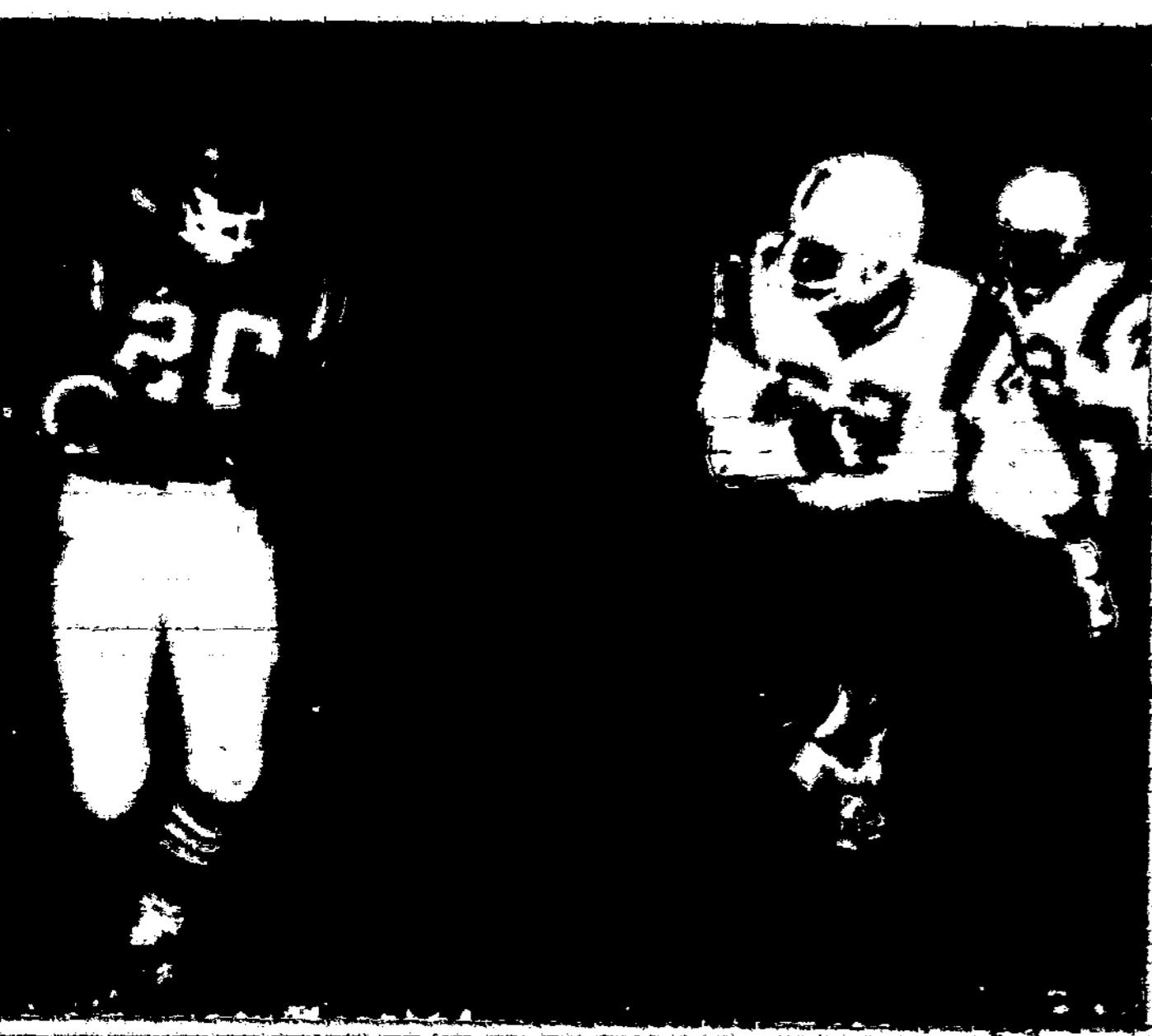
Alice King for county clerk, Mary K. Lynch for treasurer, Marion Schlarb for assessor, and Kenneth Nosker for probate judge are unopposed. Magistrates in three districts, Friday Sherrill in 1, K.A. Huey in 2 and Austin Pritchett in 3 are

unopposed.

In addition to county contests Lincoln voters will have choice of Johnny Walker or Ed Foreman for United States Representative. Both men have campaigned in Lincoln County. The governor race between David F. Cargo and Fabian Chavez Jr. may be close or it may not, depending on who you talk to.

There will be four choices for president and vice president plus candidates for state office representing the Peoples Constitutional Party.

Two questions will be on the ballot, one a hospital levy which Lincoln people should OK, the second, whether or not a constitutional convention should be called.

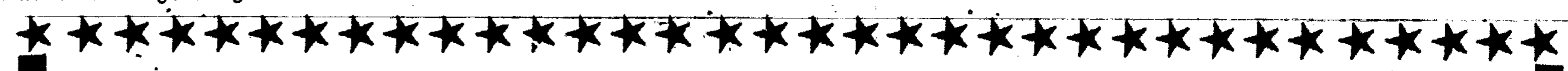

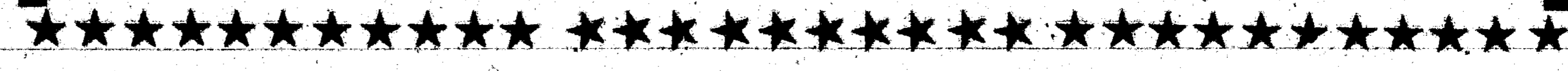

Four days later the car was delivered to me in Capitán.

This accomplishment in this case was fantastic. I am sure that without his experience and knowledge this matter would remain unsolved.

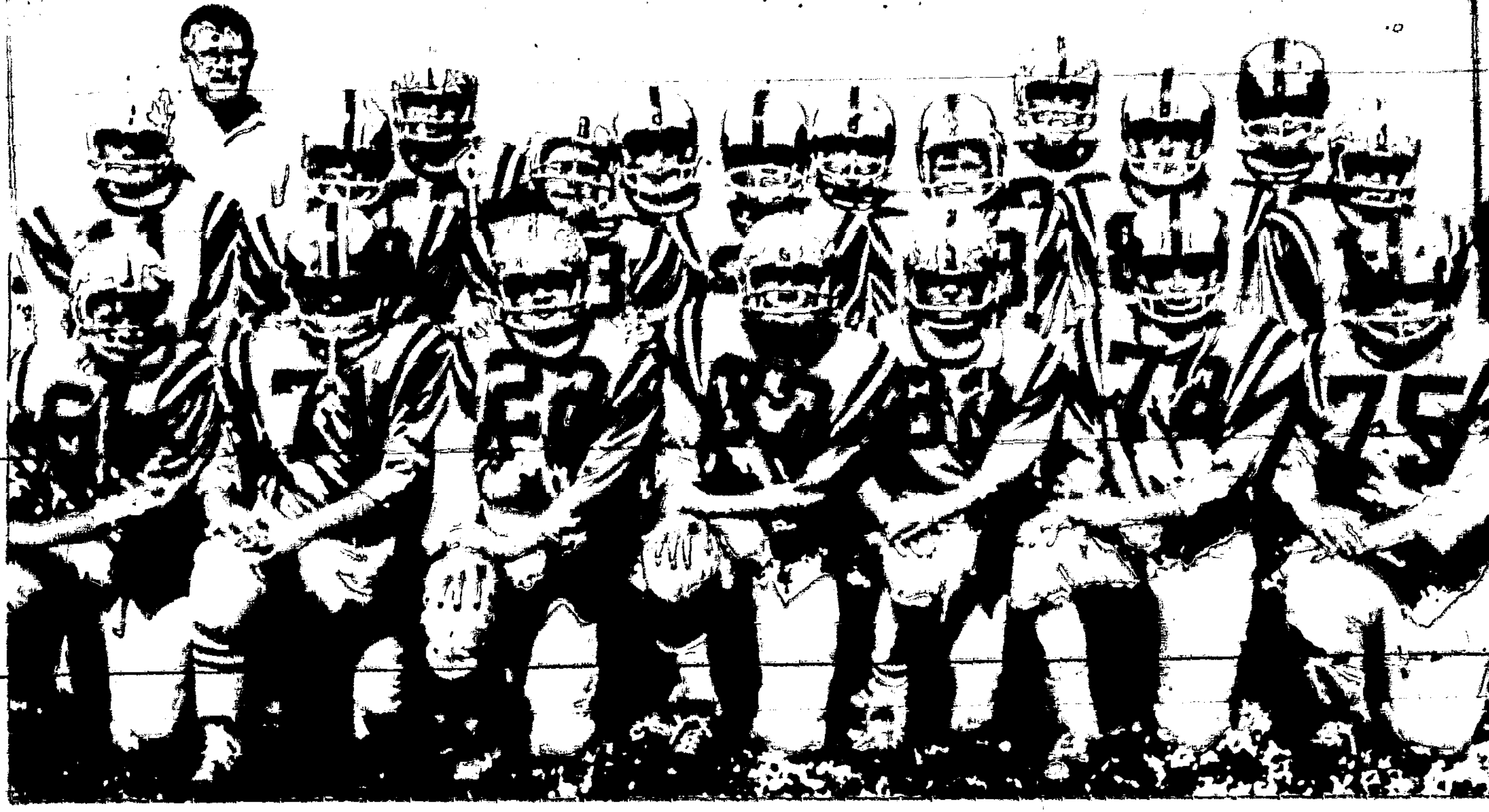

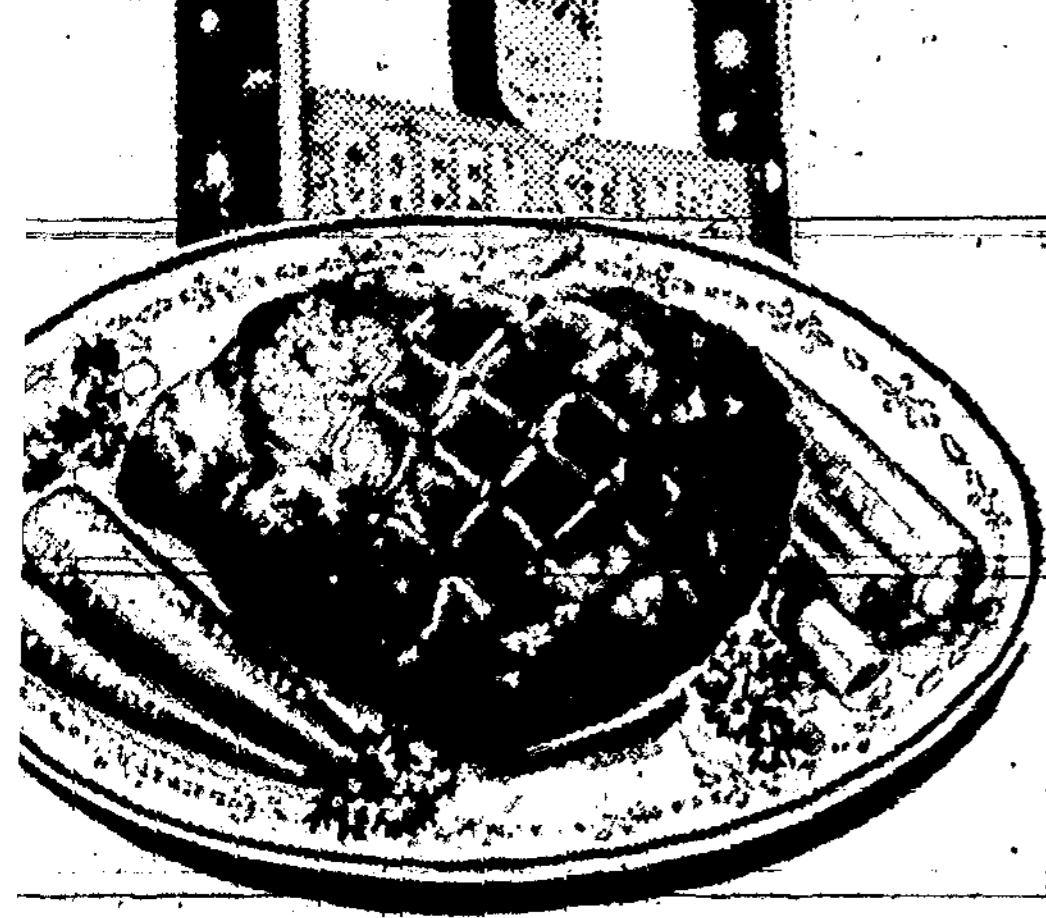

The section of State Road 37 from Nogal southerly for five miles is in our program for construction. This project was set for bid opening this month, and under normal conditions would have been advertised for bids on September 27, and bids opened on October 18. However, on September 6, 1968, all Highway Departments in the Nation received new rules from the U.S. Department of Transportation designed to reduce expenditures from the Highway Trust Fund by \$200 million in fiscal year 1969. This action places a moratorium on bid openings for the rest of this calendar year. Despite the many protests from all the States, it appears the order will not be rescinded and consequently our road construction program will be set back by several months.

1. There should be two members from each school district in Lincoln County on a county road planning board, so that plans for better school bus and ranch road maintenance may be made and carried out.
2. Federal participation in secondary road construction is available and it is my belief that in the best interest of all of Lincoln County this federal participation should be applied for.
3. Lincoln County has a county agent for the men in the county and I feel that there should be a home demonstration agent for the women.
4. Realistic commitments should be made by the county commissioners only when there are finances, equipment and manpower available, or can be made available on a certain date.
5. Promotion of Lincoln County is needed in the form of general advertising and booths at fairs. Money may be allocated from county funds for this purpose and if used wisely could promote Lincoln County quite well, in addition to the businesses who already are promoting the county.
6. Utmost diligence should be exerted by county commissioners to assure the enforcement of all tax collections to which the county is entitled.
7. Recreation facilities are needed in Lincoln County. At the present time the Fort Stanton caves should be pursued with the possibility of them being developed into a state tourist attraction. For better air travel to Lincoln County the land at Ft. Stanton could be requested for use as an airport to accommodate large aircraft.
8. I understand there is a surplus in county road funds. This I feel should be used in upgrading the wage scale of county road personnel and more and better maintenance of our county road system. This to be done without asking for additional taxation.
9. Closer cooperation and liaison is needed between the Lincoln County commissioners and the Lincoln County planning commission.
10. To strengthen Lincoln County better cooperation is needed between the county commissioners, the county council and various communities with in the county.

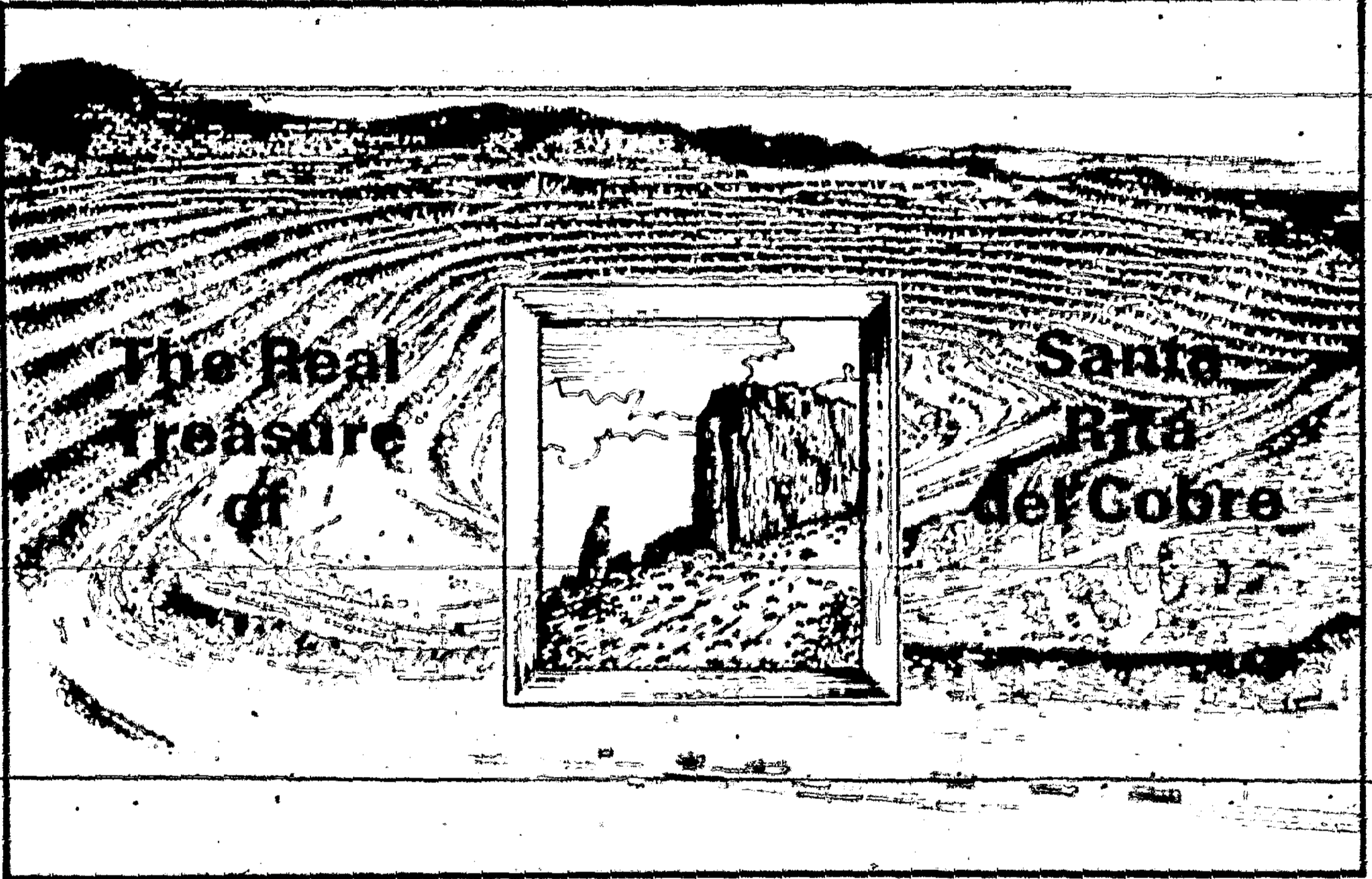

1. Elected county commissioners are the County Road Planning Board, are paid for the service and should be qualified to serve. I don't have the nerve to ask taxpayers to do my work for free.
2. Secondary roads are state roads. There are no federal funds available for county roads. There is not a truck bypass in Lincoln Co., and there are three that are needed. In one location there is a 100-foot right-of-way easement for that purpose.
3. The county agent's office is funded by about 70 per cent federal funds, and the home demonstration agent is funded the same way. I am for it if the federal funds are available.
4. Realistic commitments can't be made on any date and time because of weather and other conditions, such as repairs.
5. I am in favor of county funds under the New Mexico statutes to furnish the county agent funds for a booth at the State Fair and the County Fair.
6. Legally speaking, the county commissioners have no authority over other elected county officials, including the tax assessor-collector, and their employees.
7. The state representative will have to introduce a bill in the legislature to get the State Parks Commission to take over the Fort Stanton Cave for a tourist attraction. I am in favor of a County airport if funds are available.
8. Surplus in county road funds is a joke. Where total funds represent less than \$60 per mile for the total of 1,500 miles of road in a county of 5,000 square miles of area, the money on hand has to pay the expenses for nine months known and unknown until July 1, 1969. I am in favor of a wage scale equal to all First Class County and state road crews.
9. Commissioner's meet ings are public and are open to anyone wanting to attend and offer suggestions.
10. I am not obligated to any group, and promise to do my dead level best to serve impartially all of Lincoln County to the best of my ability.

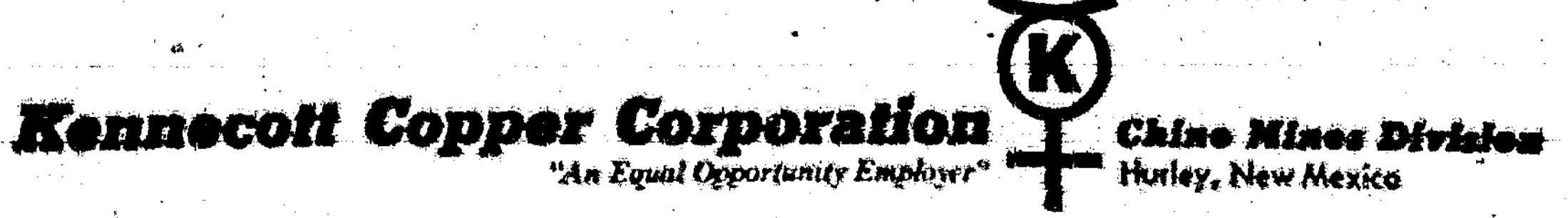

High on the summit of Ben Moore Mountain in Grant County is the "Kneeling Nun," one of New Mexico's outstanding landmarks. If you overlook legend and believe the geological record, the "Kneeling Nun" has been there for millions of years.
If you are a romanticist, the landmark came into being some 200 years ago, when a young nun, heartbroken over a tragic love affair with a Spanish soldier, climbed the mountain and knelt to pray. After snow had fallen for about a week, the young nun was found, according to legend, turned to stone and still in the attitude of prayer.
Years before copper was discovered by white men at the foot of the mountain, Mimbres Apaches are said to have made copper arrowheads, and even to have shod their horses, with the red metal.
Later, the Spaniards called the area "Cradero de Cobre," a nursery or planting bed for copper. This was Santa Rita del Cobre.
About 1800, a Spanish lieutenant colonel, Jose Manuel Carrasco, who resigned his commission after he had learned of the copper from the Indians, arrived in Santa Rita with a small party. He opened what later proved to be the second oldest copper mine in the United States, (Lake Superior copper deposits being the first).
His venture, as were others to follow, was doomed to failure by marauding Indians, or for economic reasons. Until 1860, Santa Rita remained virtually a ghost town.
From the California Gold Rush came disappointed miners looking for a new chance to strike it rich. They sought gold and silver, ignoring the copper. Over the ensuing years the Apache Indians continued to be troublesome, and it wasn't until near the turn of the century that a New York group formed the Santa Rita Mining Company.
Years of mining, however, had exhausted the high grade copper, and once again the mine closed.
Then in 1910, mass production of low grade copper ore - a new concept in mining - came to the old Santa Rita del Cobre.
Owned and operated by Kennecott Copper Corporation, the Santa Rita open pit mine now is about 1,000 feet deep and a mile across as the result of removing 750 million tons of ore and waste material. It has produced more than five billion pounds of copper - the real treasure of Santa Rita del Cobre.
The "Kneeling Nun," still atop this mountain of copper and still in her attitude of prayer, would have to agree.

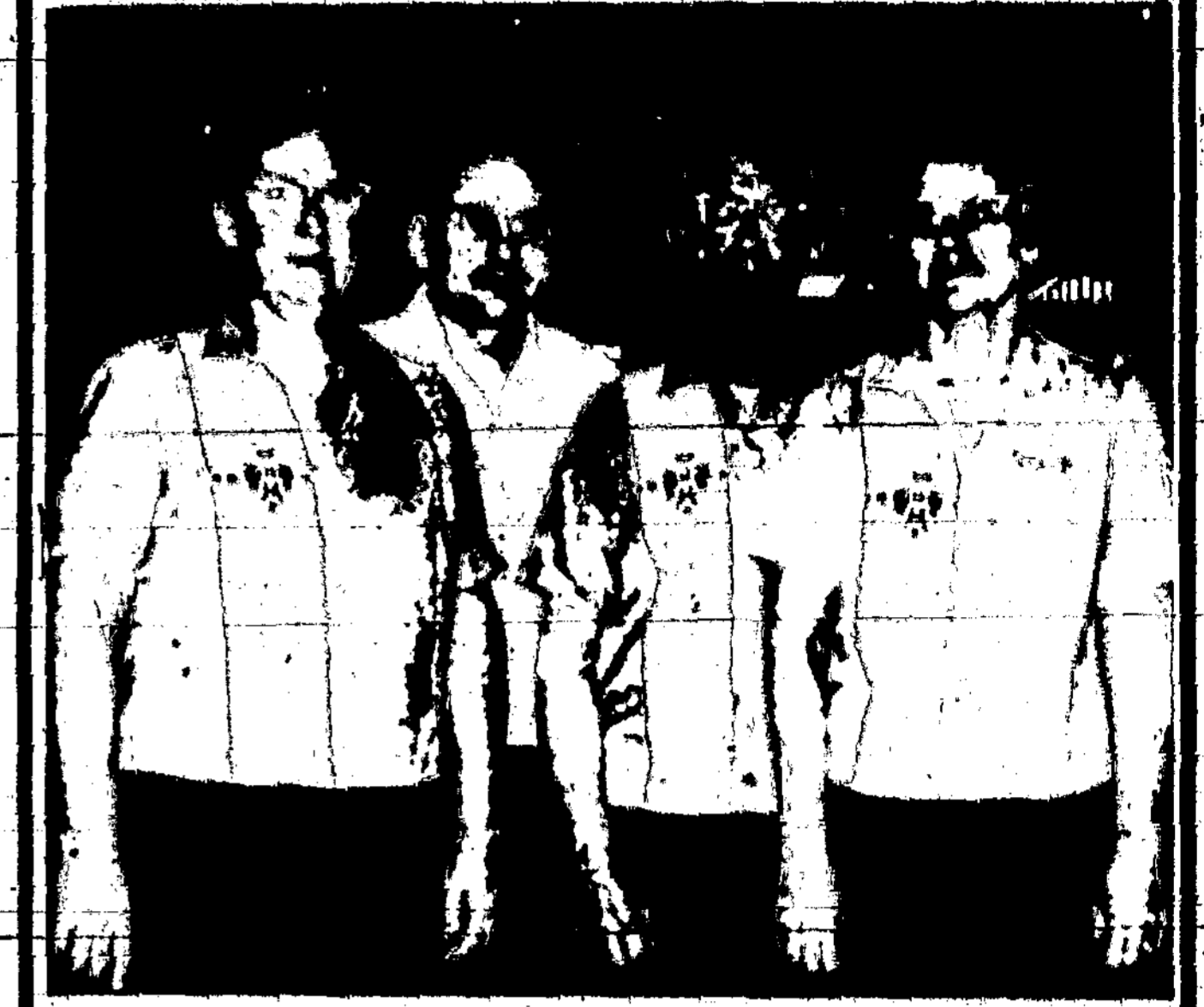
Sharon is 21 and married to Peace Corps trainee Jon Amastae. She received her B.A. in English from the University of New Mexico. As an Air Force

(This editorial first appeared in the Eacon Star-Democrat, Maryland and more recently in The Army Reporter when it was read by Frank Hayes.

Vietnam is still a pop art oddity 12,000 miles away. The public worries more about living with a possible tax increase. Officials worry about living with world opinion. The GI worries about living.

His world there is nightly blackout and mortar traffic. It's alive with booby traps that can blow his legs or his life to shreds. It's occupied with an enemy and an ally that look exactly alike.

He would give a month's pay for a sound sleep. And 10 years of his life for a night at home.

He is not a bit player in a comic opera conflict, not the trump in an international card game and not 12,000 miles away but as near as the muddy and bloody pictures in the newspapers.

Moreover, he is usually a very young American citizen in a hell of a fix. The average age of a combat GI in Vietnam is eighteen and a half.

But what a man he is! A pink-cheeked, tousel-haired, tight-muscled fellow who, under normal circumstances, would be considered by society as a halfman, half-boy, not yet dry behind the ears, a pain in the employment chart.

But right now, he is the beardless hope of free men.

He is for the most part unmarried and without material possessions except for possibly an old car at home and a transistor radio here.

He listens to rock 'n' roll and the 105mm howitzers.

He has learned to like beer by now because it is cold and because it is "the thing to do." He smokes because he gets free cigarettes in his C-ration package and it also is the thing to do.

He still has trouble spelling, and writing letters home is a painful process. But he can break down a rifle in 30 seconds and put it back together again in 23. He can describe the nomenclature of a fragmentation grenade, explain how a machinegun operates and, of course, utilize either if the need arises.

He obeys now, without hesitation. But he is not broken.

He has seen more suffering than he should have in his short life. He has stood among hills of bodies and he has helped to construct those hills.

He has wept in public and in private, and he is not ashamed in either place, because his pals have fallen in battle and he has come close to joining them.

And he has become self-sufficient; he has two pairs of fatigues, washes one and wears the other. He sometimes forgets to brush his teeth, but not his rifle.

He keeps his socks dry and his canteen full. He can cook his own meal, fix his own hurts and mend his own rips -- material or mental.

He will share his water with you if you thirst, break his rations in half if you hunger, split his ammunition if you are fighting for your life.

He can do the work of two civilians, draw half the pay of one and find ironic humor in it all. He has learned to use his hands as a weapon and his weapon as his hands. He can save a life or, most assuredly, take one. Eighteen and a half years old. What a man he is . . . already.
