Jury Being Called

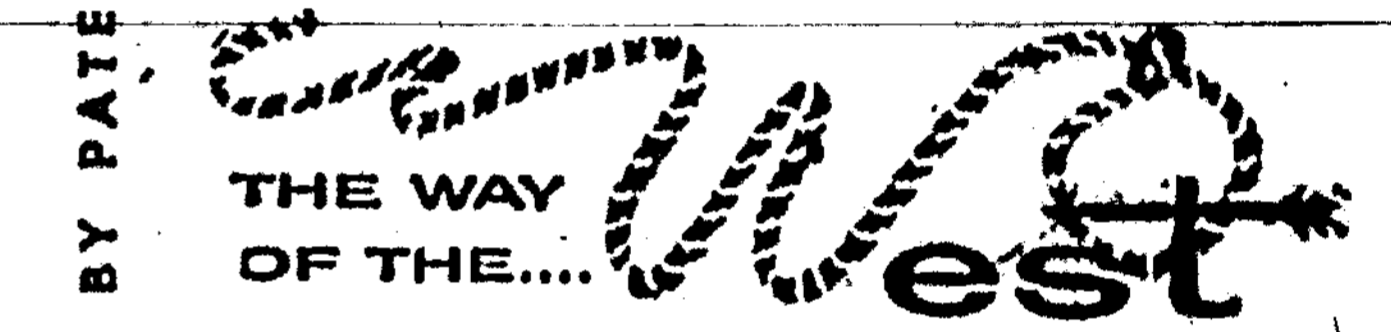

By paying one dollar plus the parcel post surface rate entitles them to go by air on a space available basis. The weight limit is 30 pounds and the size for these packages is limited to 60 inches in length and girth combined.

It isn't too early to start addressing your Christmas cards, the rate this year is six cents for the first ounce sealed or unsealed on Christmas cards. All post offices now have a stock of the Special Christmas 6 cent stamps on hand.

Your Post Office Department is expecting a record breaking mail volume this year. Additional trucks are being readied and placed at strategic points for use as needed to move the mail rapidly so won't you please h us by mailing early.

The class agreed to pay \$3.35 to help defray the expense for the dirty bags for Vietnam.

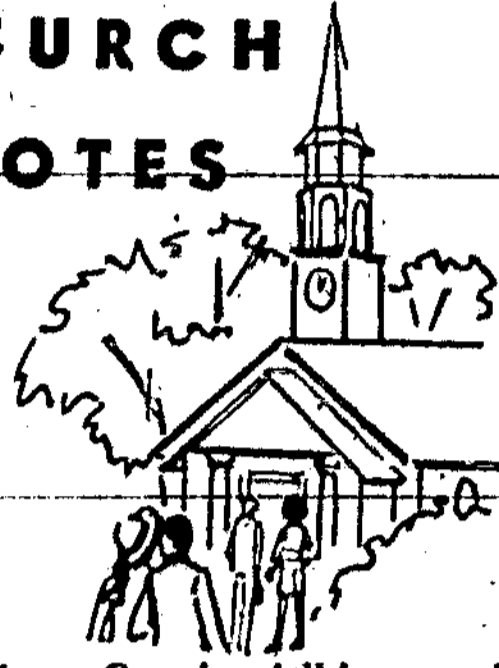
The class discussed and agreed to prepare gifts for people alone at Christmas, and was also agreed to give baskets of food for Christmas.

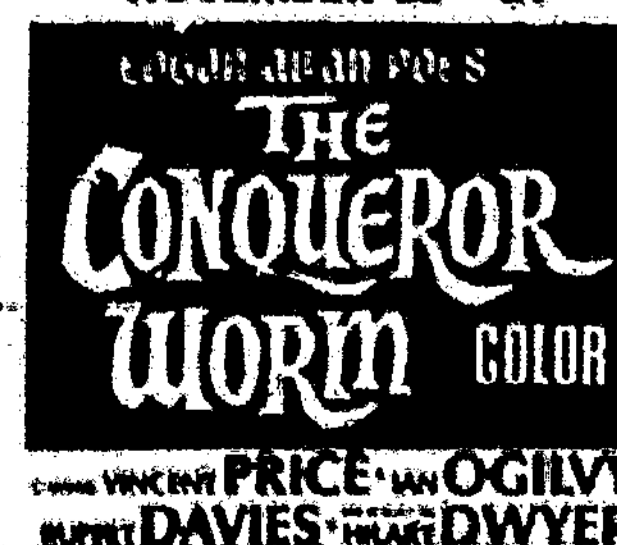

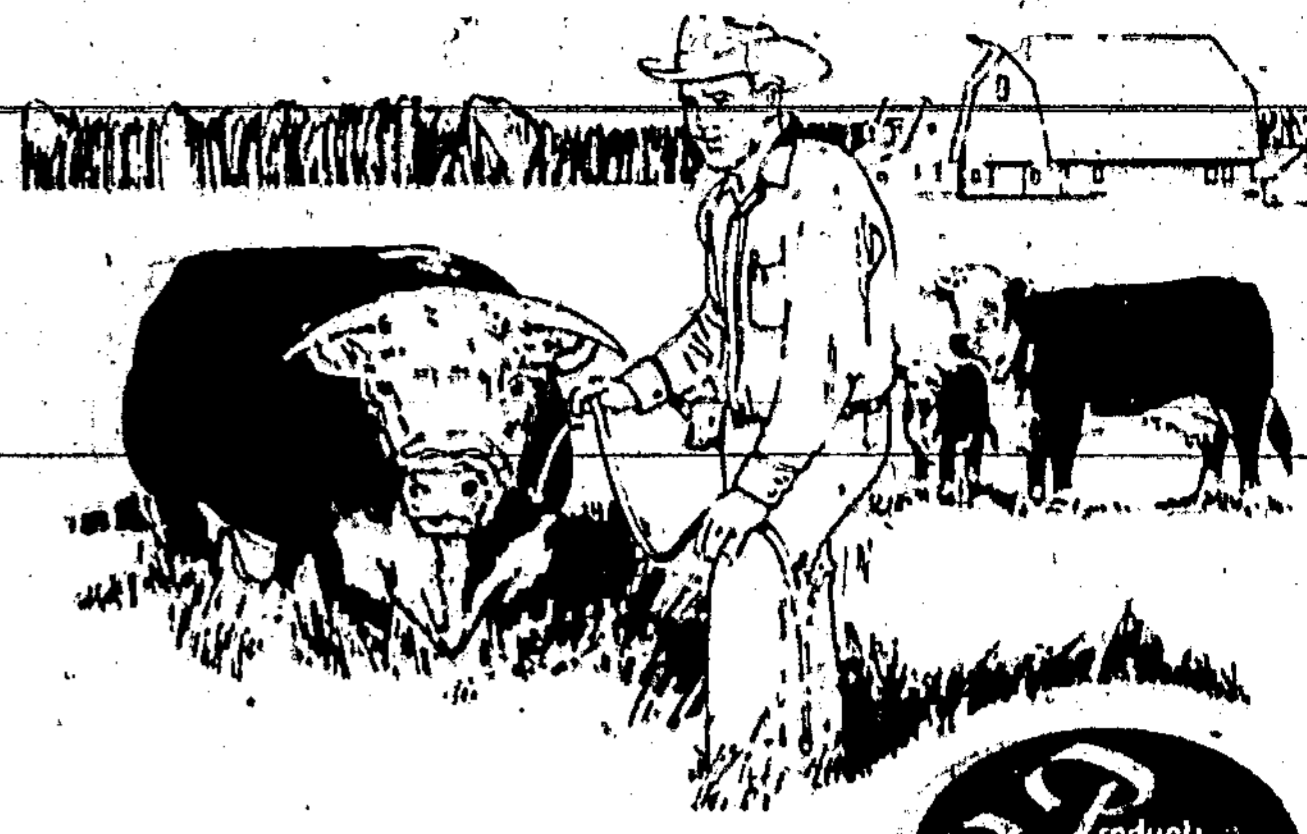

Steering committee discusses projects

The steering committee for the South Central Mountain Resource Area met in Alamogordo on Nov. 21st to discuss progress on the various projects they are assisting and to consider new projects.

The meeting was attended by 24 people representing all phases of government and private industry. The purpose of the organization is to promote total resource development in Lincoln and Otero Counties through efforts of anyone who can assist. Dick Floyd of the Farmers Home Administration gave a very informative talk on the functions of FHA and the assistance available very informative talk on the functions the assistance available through that agency. The FHA program is directed toward supplemental financing, technical assistance, self help housing and credit services.

At present the steering committee has accepted 30 project proposals. All of these have had some action taken and, although several will take longer to accomplish, two have been completed. Construction is started on two others at present. These are community irrigation systems.

The projects received vary from agricultural projects to recreation developments, studies of various resources, roads, etc. The State Dept. of Forestry is conducting an inventory of wood uses and potential uses in the area. Ken Soles gave a very interesting review of progress on this project outlining potential for fuel, Christmas trees, and manufacturing process. Attempts are being made to bring a paper mill and a process for treating wood products by radiation to New Mexico. The radiation process produces a very hard wood product similar to formica from soft woods. This would provide a market for low grade timber and produce a very attractive and useful material.

The latest project accepted by the group was to help in investigating means of having the White Oaks cemetery designated as a historical site. It is felt

this would help preserve and protect the cemetery.

Also at the Alamogordo meeting the final draft for an RC&D protect application was approved. This will be submitted to the Department of Agriculture in Washington and if approved could provide additional assistance in development of the resources of the area.

As earlier indicated, I will try to keep you advised from time to time with regard to developments on the Fort Stanton tract in Lincoln County. As you know, the Fort Stanton area is withdrawn, except for 1,326 acres which were transferred to the State of New Mexico for the State to use as a hospital. The other lands are withdrawn under Executive Orders of April 1 and November 1, 1899. Other than the 1,326-acre tract at the hospital, the lands have been under the custody of the Department of Interior (this Bureau) following relinquishment of the area by the Marine Hospital Service. Until recently, the lands were involved in a claim against the United States filed with the Department of Justice by the Mescalero Apache Indians.

We are now making a study of the lands leading toward the preparation of a long-range plan for future multiple-use management. The lands currently are being used for research purposes by the New Mexico State University at Las Cruces, jointly with the Agricultural Experiment Station and the New Mexico State Department of Game and Fish. Also, we have an application from the State Parks and Recreation Commission for one tract of land for possible recreation development of a cave. This application was filed under the Recreation and Public Purposes Act of June 14, 1926, as amended June 4, 1964.

there is a proposal underway locally, to develop a large airport on Fort Stanton to handle jet traffic, even though the United States has expended a large sum in completing the nearby municipal airport at Ruidoso.

Any of these applications would require cadastral surveys prior to allowance, because the lands in the Fort Stanton withdrawal are unsurveyed except for one metes and bounds survey on the boundary of the hospital tract. There are a number of problems involved, and we shall keep you informed of progress in the study as rapidly as it can be processed. Incidentally, we do not know whether consideration is being given to the possibility of park or recreational development at any other of the numerous caves in Southeastern New Mexico, many of which caves are currently being mapped by the Speleological Society.

Incidentally, too, you may be aware that there is considerable pressure to open Fort Stanton lands to mineral exploitation by both locations and leases. Allowance of any one sort of entry would probably lead to increasing pressures to allow all other entries which would soon probably render ineffective the research program of the University, Experiment Station and State Game Department.

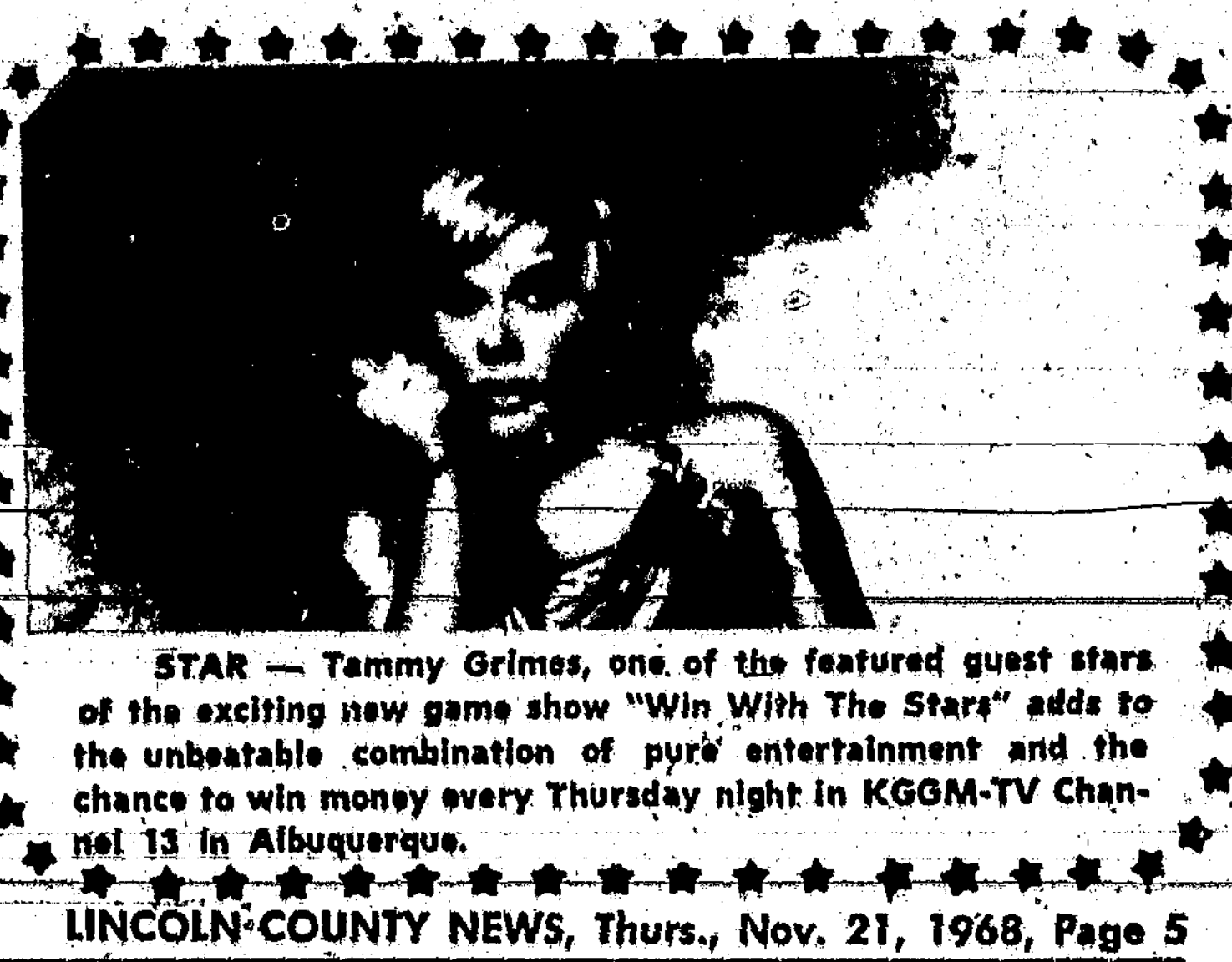
