County schools have money problems

Superintendents of five Lincoln County schools met with Lincoln -Sierra County Representativeelect Ralph Petty Jr. and County Commissioners - elect Charles A. Jones, Halt Lovelace and Don. Stark in Capitan Tuesday morning to discuss problems confronting schools of the county,

most having to do with finance. It was agreed by all present that the matter of re-appraisal for Lincoln County should be brought to a successful conclusion, the law case with original appraisal firm (Lon E. Nelson

Associates) ended and the job done. Probably the task will be more difficult than it sounds but the new commissioners will do everything possible to get the county re-appraised.

'The matter of money for all five schools covered a wide range and again, what is best for Lincoln County schools, as well as for most all small schools of the state, may not be what we get

County superintendents would favor a foundation program -but, only if such a program was

at least fair to the small schools. Lon Nelson of Santa Fe has asked that suit against him for failure to complete the Lincoln County re-appraisal program be dismissed, Judge Garnett R. Burks of Socorro has been named to hear the suit and Nelson's motion for dismissal. No dates have been set.

Supt. George White of Ruidoso, chairman of the meeting, pointed out that the Albuquerque school system has medical doctor on its staff, three psychologists, two psychatrists; art instruc-

tors for grades as well as physical education people, music and guidance people for the lower grades and other specialists throughout the system -- none of which are a part of the small school system.

It was not proposed by Lincoln County school men that such a system as Albuquerque be improved with state money at the expense of smaller schools.

Supt. Fermin Montes of Hondo said that the bigger schools are used to having big money and that . officials of smaller schools and

their elected representatives will need to keep their eyes and ears open as legislation is shaped

Supt. Glen Ellison of Carrizozo pointed out that Ruidoso with the best salaries in the county was only 61st in wages paid, in the state system which includes 89 schools.

Ralph Petty asked, do you want a foundation program, Supt. Duane Darling answered for the group -- it depends on what the foundation is,





Steering committee discusses projects

The sleering committee for the South Central Mountain Recourse Area met in Alamogordo on Nov. 7th to discuss progress on the various projects they are assisting and to consider new projects.

The meeting was attended by 24 people representing all phases of government and private industry. The purpose of the organization is to promote total resource development in Lincoln and Otero Counties through efforts of anyone who can assist, Dick Floyd of the Farmers Home Administration gave a very informative talk on the functions of PliA and the assistance available very informative talk on the functions the assistance available through that agency. The FHA program is directed toward supplemental financing, technical assistance, self help housing and credit services.

At present the steering committee has accepted 30 project proposals. All of these have had some action taken and, although several will take longer to accomplish, two have been completed. Construction is started on two others at present. These are community irrigation systems.

The projects received vary recreation developments, studies of various resources, roads, etc. The State Dept. of Forestry is conducting an inventory of wood uses and potential uses in the area. Ken Soles gave a very interesting review of progress on this project outlining potential for fuel, Christmas trees, and manufacturing process. Attempts are being made to bring a paper mill and a process for treating wood products by radiation to New Mexico. The radiation process produces a very hard wood product similar to formica from soft woods. This would provide a market for lowgrade timber and produce a very attractive and useful material.

The latest project accepted by the group was to help in lovestigating means of having the White Oaks cemetary designated as a historical sile. It is felt

this would help preserve and protect the cemetary.

Also at the Almogordo meeting the final draft for an RC&D protect application was approved. This will be submitted to the Department of Agriculturein Washington and if approved could provide additional assistance in development of the resources of the area.

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



Supt. White stated that his school board had cut off two teachers to give pay raises last year, and this was true throughout the county. All schools are running at a deficit, meaning that they are pumping cash balances into the operating fund which will make a pinch at the start of school next year.

Two Lincoln County schools have two teachers drawing top salaries of \$8200, two a. 77200 and one has top of \$7800.

Charles Jones asked question that set off a lengthy discussion and argument that was never concluded because superintendents did not agree on the answer. The question -- "Why do the sorriest teachers get the same wages as the good ones?

Supt. Montes told about experiment at Alamogordo where they tried a merit system for pay whereby a committee of teachers rated all teachers in the system with idea that poor teachers get lower wages and better teachersgethigher wages. It didn't work and nearly ruined the system, Montes said.

At Hondo they tried a system of giving added pay for increments, such things as having a blg family, driving long distance to school, coaching and teaching music in addition to teaching load. This worked poorly and was frowned on by state officials.

In the first place, tenure teachers are almost impossible to get rid of regardless of how bad they might be, a situation all superintendents agreed was tough.

The difference of opinion came in discussion of how to rate or sort out the good teachers from the poor teachers -- for the good of the pupils as well as for pay purposes.

Supt. Glen Ellison likes the Master Teacher plan whereby a class of first graders (or any other grade) would be tested at the beginning of the year, and the amount of input to be attained would be determined. It's not as simple as maybe it sounds here but the plan, unfirst proposed by Dr. Pat Lynch of N.M. University, has a sound and workable bace. Let's say that the graders should learn 600 related facts and maybe 50 concepts, plus numerous other things. Then at the end of the year tests would be given to determine how well the class

had mot its goal. In later discussion Supt, Darling came out with thought that money was not the important thing, teachers did their work ina professional manner and did not need be rated like under the

Master Teacher plan. The fact that a class of first graders spending a school year under a poor teacher would certainly handleap them for maybe the next six years if not all the way through school, was pointed out as one of the reasons why some teacher rating plan is necessary.

Jones had in mind the fact that school patrons and tax payers don't really know how much return they are getting on their

A district court decision has reopened an abandoned road in the Ruidoso Valley, ordering removal of a fence and setting aside a county commissioners' decision.

The judgement affects a portion of old U.S. 70 which was abandoned by county commissioners last April and later blocked when Elon Guthrie extended a fence across the roedway.

Fourteen of Guthrie's neighbors filed sult in September to have the abandoment declared vold and the feace removed.

The decision by Judge Richard A. Straley found that the old road was needed by the swing neighbors for access to the new highway.
