## This Week In Lincoln County

### Christmas Mail Picks Up

Roy Harman, postmaster at Carrizozo Sectional Center, told the News Wednesday that Christmas "mail action" started Monday and he expects a gradual increase through the next two weeks. Postmaster Harman said all mail is cleared out of the Carrizozo postoffice each day, for one reason there is no space for storage or holding mail.

### Eight Inches At Lincoln

Edward Penfield measured the snow fall at Old Lincoln Town Thursday, after a heavy fall Wednesday and figured they received eight inches of snow. More snow has fallen since last week.

### Commission Meets 10th

The present Lincoln County Commission of Bob Shafer, Max Oliver and Joe McKnight will meet December 10 to open bids on bonds for county officials for the next year and to tend to other business. This commission will have one more meeting to sign record for business complete to end of the year. The commission elect, composed of Charles A. Jones, Holt Lovelace and Don Stark, will meet with the outgoing board December 10.

### One Case For Monday

A jury will be selected Monday, December 9 to hear the case of Cleotear Coulter on charge of forgery. Atty. Bill Payne went to Alamogordo Wednesday to argue motion for continuance but expected it to be denied. Payne said the jury would probably have three or four cases to handle this term.

### Three BB Games Friday

An unusual schedule of basketball games will be played Friday night starting at 6:30 p.m. in Carrizozo gym, with the added interest of many door prizes to be given away.

The event is one for fund raising by Carrizozo Athletic Club, all monies raised going for Grizzly athletics in one form or another.

First half-game will be between Carrizozo 8th and 9th grades, expected to be a hot one by Coach Lee Fleming. The second half will be the 10th grade vs. the varsity squad and the sophomores are ready for battle.

The big game of the evening will be the Athletic Club vs. Corona with Carrizozo definitely the underdog because the Corona club has played several games, including one with the very fast Harlem Travelers.

Of added interest at Christmas time will be the many door prizes, all donated by Carrizozo merchants, which will be given away. Your ticket at the door will have a stub which will go in the drawing box.

Three big games, lots of fun, prizes -- Friday will be a fun night in Carrizozo.

### Evangelico Pentacostal Sued

Probably long forgotten in memory of most Lincoln County people is the church organization that once existed in San Patricio. This organization, known as the Centro Evangelico Pentacostal, Inc. Temple La Hermosa (Pentacostal Evangelical Center), held services in the old San Patricio jail which was the temple beautiful. The State of New Mexico ex rel (highway department) has started condemnation proceedings for right-of-way against the church organization, the Citizens State Bank of Vaughn and other claimants.

### Pole Climbers At Work

A crew of pole climbers, Kenneth LaMay, Glen Philpot, Wayne Langford and David Barber started putting up strings of Christmas lights across Carrizozo streets Wednesday and were expected to finish that day. ### Precinct Conventions Called

State Republican Chairman Robert C. Davidson has called precinct conventions for January 11.

County conventions, determined by state party rules, will be held January 25.

Davidson also has called a meeting of the state central committee in Albuquerque Feb. 22 - the date of the Republicans' annual Lincoln Day Dinner - to elect party officials. Davidson is expected to seek election to a full term as state chairman. He was named to the post last September when Rex Mattingly resigned as state chairman.

Party sources said a top-ranking Republican is being sought as speaker for the Lincoln Day Dinner.

## Texas team plays Michigan in Wool Bowl game Saturday

This Saturday's Wool Bowl football game could very well be a ground battle between the Cardinals from Henderson County, Texas, and the Raiders from Grand Rapids, Michigan. Both teams boast of outstanding backfield personnel with power and speed.

In their last outing against Navarro Junior College, the Cardinals used the versatility and blinding speed of halfback Jimmy White, a freshman from Fort Worth, to score three times against the Bulldogs. White, scampered for runs of 56, 71, and 7 yards in their 20-7 victory. It was simply a matter of out-racing the opposition.

Another cardinal halfback, Joe Gilliam, another freshman from Fort Worth contributed nearly 100 yards in 13 carries. John Griggs, fullback, picked up 65 yards in 11 tries. With the exception of quarterback, John Smrcina, the starting backfield for the Cardinals are freshman. Henderson County has either tied for or won the Texas Junior College football Federation championship outright for four straight years. The Cardinals started their unprecedented bowl career in 1965 when Coach Bob Baccarini's first team went 10-0 on the season and was invited to the Junior Rose Bowl in Pasadena, California. Henderson County J.C. was beaten 20-15 by Fullerton, California, but the Cardinals came in 9-1 on the

season in 1966 and were invited to return to Pasadena.

They won the 1966 Junior Rose Bowl and set all kinds of records while beating Pasadena City College 40-13. The Cardinals finished 8-2 on the season in 1967 and gained a spot in the Las Vegas, Nevada Bowl. They lost a 20-7 decision to Arizona Western Junior College of Yuma.

The Cardinals will leave for Roswell this Thursday morning and are expected to arrive around noon. It is expected that several hundred fans from Athens, Texas, will arrive in Roswell in time for the game on Saturday afternoon.

Kick off time is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. Pre game activities will begin at 1:10 p.m. with the New Mexico Military Institute Color Guard and the Grand Rapids Junior College Band performing in the flag-raising ceremonies. Immediately following the playing of the National Anthem, the 1968 New Mexico Class AA High School football champion, Artesia Bulldogs, will be introduced and presented a trophy by Mr. L.W. Curfman, President of the Southwest Grid Classic, Inc. He will be assisted by Mary Smiley, Miss Wool of America.

An outstanding group of acrobatic dancers from the Alcorn Academy of Dance in Roswell the Woolettes, will also be featured in pre-game activities.

## 'Peephole' drivers are dangerous

Marshal C.A. Morales warned Carrizozo drivers of the dangers of driving their cars with the windshield and windows covered with frost or ice.

"The 'peephole' driver," he said, "the individual who clears a small spot in the windshield, endangers not only his own life, but the lives of his fellow citizens." "State law," he added, "requires that all windows and the windshield be unobstructed, thus permitting the driver to see any danger that he might face."

Many serious accidents have occurred, it was pointed out, because the driver's vision was obstructed by ice or frost.

The few minutes that it takes to clear both the windshield and windows is just good insurance. Actually there is no reason for not having a clear field of vision. Scrapers are available, which remove the frost or ice rather quickly, plus a commercial de-froster which can be sprayed over the obstructed area.

"Drivers who fail to clear both windshield and window," Morales stated, "face possible arrest. Any individual who disregards his own safety, as well as that of others, must be dealt with according to the state law."

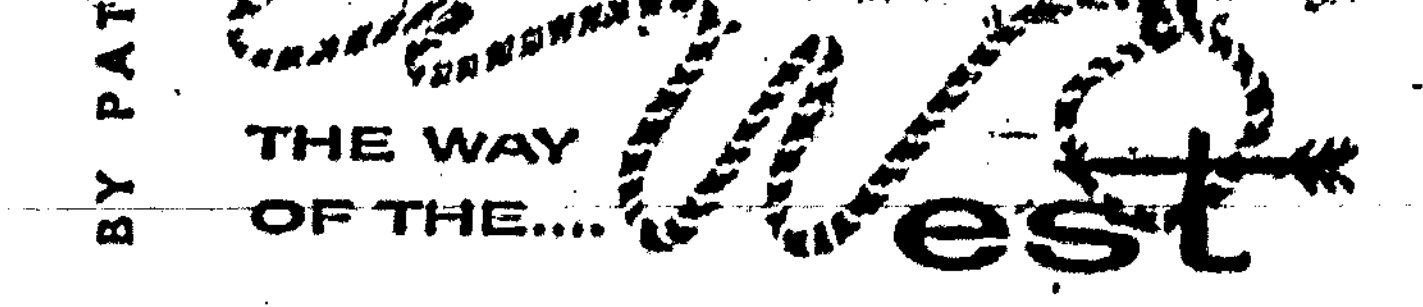

Mayor Johnson Stearns told the News Wednesday that the Town had received \$5,000.00 towards blacktopping the runways with help from town, county and state this last big step should be taken in the 1969 year, which will give Lincoln County an all-weather airport and one of the best in the state.

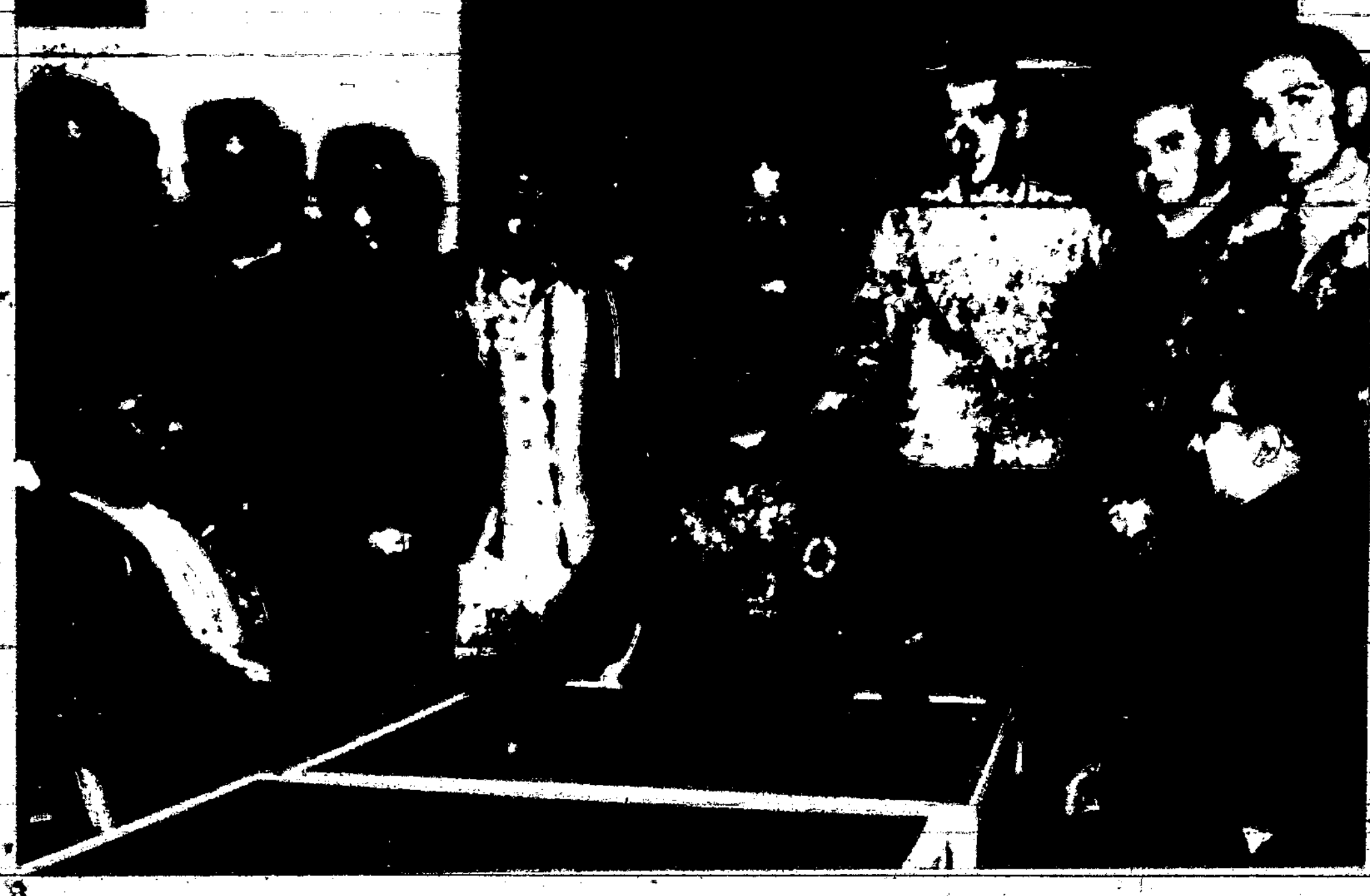
Possibly News readers could barely stand better acquaintance with Publisher Morse but we want you to try it. Following story is from his paper.

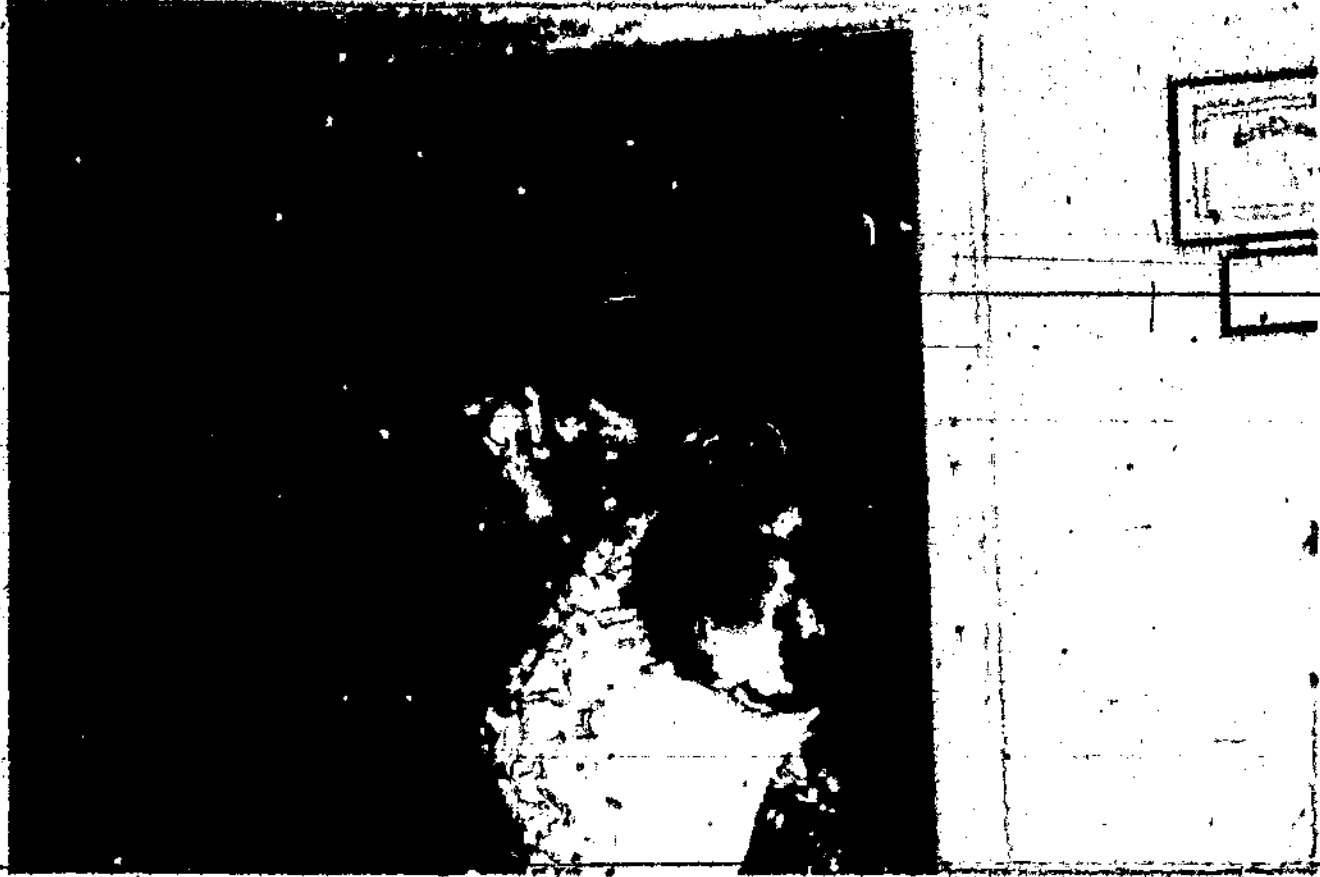
