A decade of Christmas cheer in review

A decade of Christmas cheer. The passing of time brings many changes in Lincoln County, generally for the good, and a review of the Christmas season over the past ten years will surely bring to mind... things forgotten, and we hope the memories are pleasant.

December 27, 1958 was a big day in the Sanchez - Vega families, Della and Leandro Jr. were married that day. During this same week ZoZo Lions were spreading good cheer among needy families, Lions W.F. Ball, Arrell Posey and Homer Reid on the committee.

In the 1958 Christmas issue of the News, prepared by Paul Baker, property owners who would like to have paving, curb and gutter are again reminded to make their wishes known to the trustees. ZoZo has those things now. Red Canyon was in business this year, with holiday lights decorating the (mystery where it went) chapel and entrance gates.

While toasting your toes Christmas day you can ruminate on where these people, all in business in ZoZo 10 years ago, are now - Marvin Roberts, Price's Creameries, Ken and Mary Schoenecke, Leah and Luther King, Mr. and Mrs. Doll Ray, Shelton S. Dodson, Gladys and Harry Morris, Maxine, Carlos, Sharon and Joe, Mr. and Mrs. W.F. Ball, Leo Robinson, Mr. and Mrs. W.L. Burnett, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hoyer, Clarence and Jo Shaw, Jerry Cook, Mr. and Mrs. Ashby F. Roselle, Pick and Janie Warden, Bill and John Foster.

There never was a better town booster than Margaret Rench at Capitan - A pretty lighted tree, striking tree in window, rotunda on the roof, lighted candles in the window, a star glows, Nativity scene - all are so beautiful and worth driving miles to see.

Christmas 1959 may be remembered because it was 'white'. Snow started falling December 14 at Corona and continued for three days with high winds piling up the drifts 10 feet high in places. Some people were snowed in for a week.

Carrizozo fire department has done more than put out fires over a long span of years - they've provided the goodies that are one of the real good parts of Christmas, no gain involved, just good cheer. The firemen were hosts to Santa December 24, 1959 just as in years prior and every year since.

Christmas 1959 news was the fire which destroyed the thorium mill at Capitan. ZoZo had winning basketball team that year, Beltran, Crenshaw, Hill, Ricker, and Vega beating Tigers Kerr, Huey, Smith and Pruitt 54-43. The custom of bringing Christmas greetings to Lincoln County people from merchants of Roswell, Alamogordo, Socorro, Ruidoso is one of long standing - so it was in 1959.

Three children perish in fire

A police sergeant's three preschool children perished in a flash fire at Ruidoso Saturday which engulfed their small apartment Saturday night after their mother had left for work and their father was driving across town to pick up a baby sitter. Dead were the three children of Sgt. and Mrs. Fred Yockey - Rick, about 4, Shawn, about 2, and Rhonda, about 10 months. Firemen found the charred remains of the children about an hour after the fire engulfed the family's living quarters at Old Mill Lodge on Sudderth Drive.

Cause of the fire had not been determined, although one neighbor said he had heard a noise which might have been an explosion.

Christmas 1961 found a couple of new names on the Lincoln County News masthead, one of them now has new newspaper, new wife, new baby and another due, and the other is still here working his fool head off. Wallace

Olds is the 1961 partner, now at Red Lodge, Montana.

Front page pictures were pretty bad (new press installed following year), but news about the same for Christmas time. The Trinity Methodist choir went to Stallion Site to present program of Christmas songs. Joy in ZoZoland, sorrow in Tigerland,

Loss of sleep and bad weather causes numerous wrecks on 54

Snow and ice plus driver going to sleep brought on a rash of wrecks December 20 and 21, State Policeman Andy Benavides investigated three, the first at 8:50 a.m. Dec. 20 thirty-one miles north of Carrizozo on US54 where Sharon K. Eckert, student at University of Arizona on way home to Medicine, Ohio, apparently went to sleep at the wheel and caused near head on collision with south bound car driven by Maud Belle Eford of Corona.

Allice Otto, also student at Arizona U., was a passenger in the Eckert car, both girls were taken to Carrizozo hospital not seriously injured.

Stella Belle Martin was a passenger in the Eford car, both Mrs. Eford and granddaughter Stella Belle were taken to Ruidoso hospital with serious injuries. Miss Martin was taken to El Paso Sunday for surgery.

Also on December 21, Frank Pineda of Santa Fe, who had been visiting his sister in Carrizozo, ran off the road at 8:00 p.m. about 15 miles north of Carrizozo and turned over one time. He hit a soft shoulder which caused him to lose control of his car. Mr. Pineda was hospitalized in Carrizozo, mostly bruised.

On December 21 Peter Davenport, in Air Force at Kirtland in Albuquerque, swerved his car in attempt to avoid oncoming vehicle which was taking too much road and the Davenport car hit and embankment, bounced several times but did not turn over. The oncoming car that caused the wreck did not stop.

A brother, John Alce of Albuquerque, was a passenger in the car. The road was icy where the accident occurred.

Patrolman Bob Watson...stigated another minor accident six miles north of Carrizozo on Saturday.

State Policeman Benavides and Watson have good advice for all drivers -- traffic is heavy, roads can be treacherous... don't drink, drive with care.

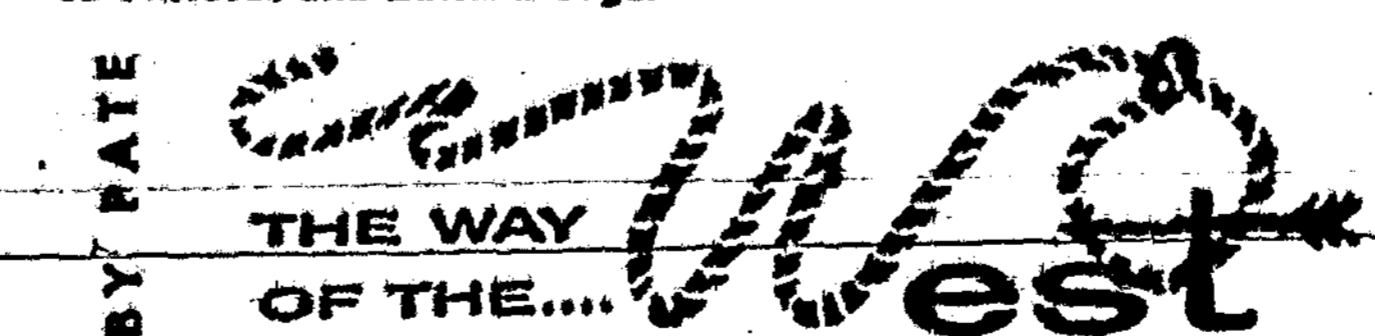
the police department about 5:30 p.m. to say she was leaving for work at a local restaurant and asked her husband to pick up the baby sitter.

Mama is sitting beside la ventana, shining her rolling-pin, para manana.

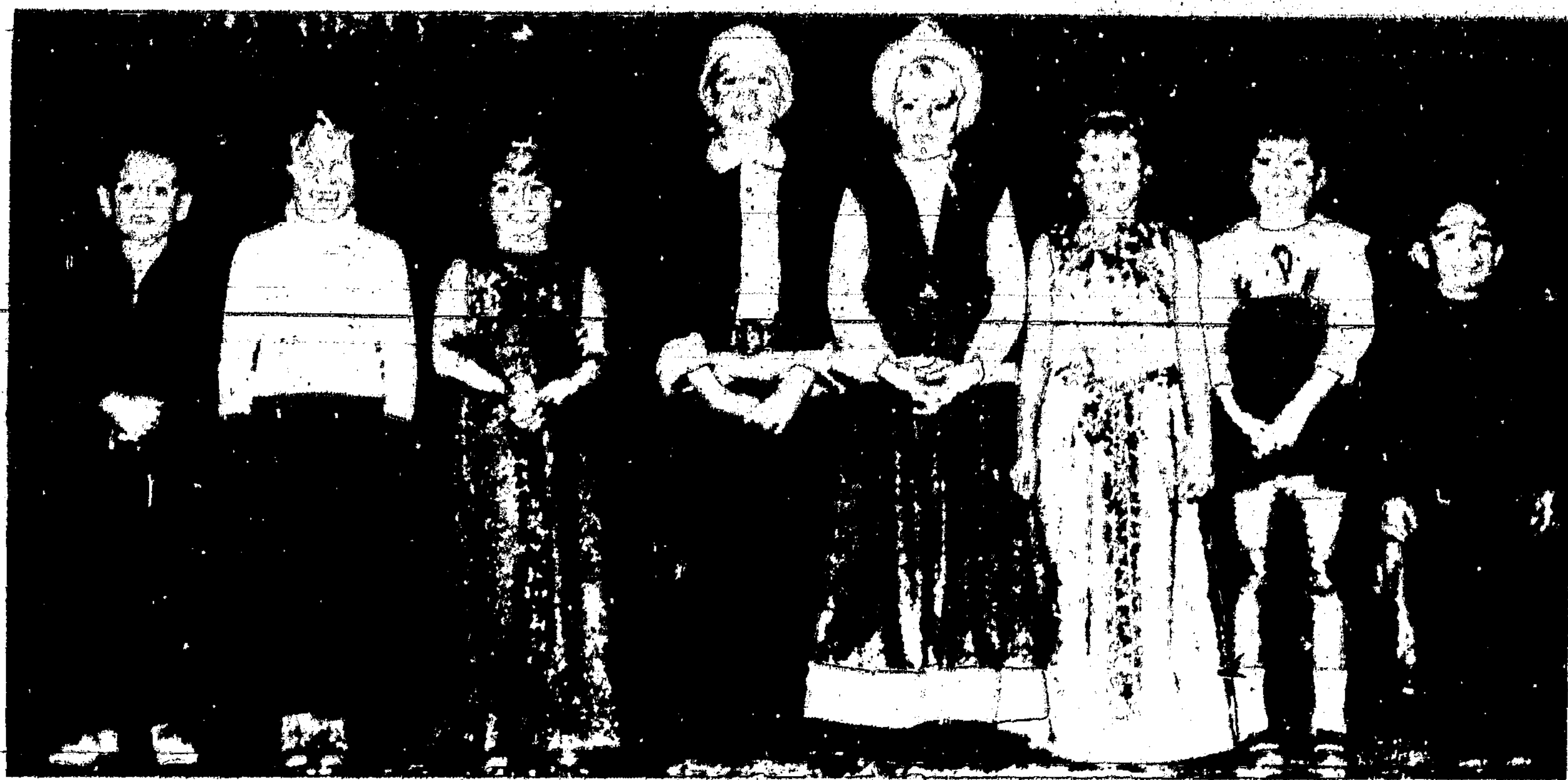

Unusual Christmas ad in this issue, listed all staff members and patients at Fort Stanton TB Hospital, Mrs. T.E. Kelly presented a musical program with help of Zozo band at Woman's Club.

Christmas 1962 found the Capitan Tigers beating the Grizzlies for their Christmas present 63-59 and Santa Claus duo in town Saturday, candle-light service at Nogal Presbyterian, first annual Christmas program at BAPTIST Church, Methodist choir singing at Fort Stanton, the News planning a 'first baby contest'.

School boards were being asked what should be done to improve education, much the same questions as are being asked today. Ruidoso Downs right in the middle of a village ruckus which finally slumored down to slow burn, Mrs. Sofoman Sanchez was severely burned when can of gas used for cleaning floor flashed.

J.S.C. was writing Fort Stanton column, one of best ever carried by News, and this week Joe Chavez was telling about deer on the table for holiday feasting, Margaret Rench report the Christmas lighting is growing at Capitan, more added each day. Another good columnist now missed by the News was Kit Carson, writing a colloquy of a Christmas for this issue.

Christmas 1963 was the brightest ever in Carrizozo -- according to News headlines -- and there was a snow covering to add beauty. One of our favorite pictures was in that issue, showing snow covered wagon wheels, Ruidoso school superintendent and board member resigned after big fuss up there.

L.Z. Manire, the News weather man reported a low of 7 degrees on December 7 and high 56 on the 18th, no moisture up through the 23rd.

How did Capitan and Carrizozo basketball game come out? Zozo beat them on the 10th 67-64, was host to 4-team tournament at Christmas time.

Mabel Rentrow had more attention than she probably wanted this Christmas, in the hospital with two broken wrists. Santa Claus made appearance at Lincoln Station with gift for all the children, reported by Roger Gordon, Betsy Hooker, writing Claunch News, told of new baby in Charles Parrish family.

Christmas 1964 doesn't seem long ago but it was. The News front page had big picture of Capitan second grade... they'll all be big boys and girls now. Arrow Gas was in business here, John Clegg flipped his car, school consolidation first hit the news and stirred up storm, some of which has happened -- and more consolidation coming next year.

First big snow of 1964 year hit Lincoln County Friday afternoon, work started making room for Enco Station, annual Cedevale Christmas party brought two communities together and vis-

Christmas 1965 seems like it could have been just last week, time flies so fast. Curtis Payne hits 27 points as the Grizzlies beat the Tigers 73-71, court-house roof is sagging (real bad engineering several places in that beautiful building), Hollis Cummins in new store at Capitan, Schnappes, Otis and Waldo got a holiday bath.

The 1965 Christmas News carried review of 1917 in Lincoln County, with this message "If the tragedy of Golgotha be so renewed after nineteen hundred years what hope can we have?"

Christmas 1966 was something special for the News and Carrizozo -- it was the first issue of the News (Dec. 15) ever printed off-set, the picture of contractors here for bid opening on recreation center was better than the photo -- the recreation center a real special gift to the community from Jackie and A.N. Real slick book paper was used in December 1966 because right size newsprint was not available. We can remember the carpenter, electricians, plumbers and printers all working in a new plant, not near complete. The editor made this comment:

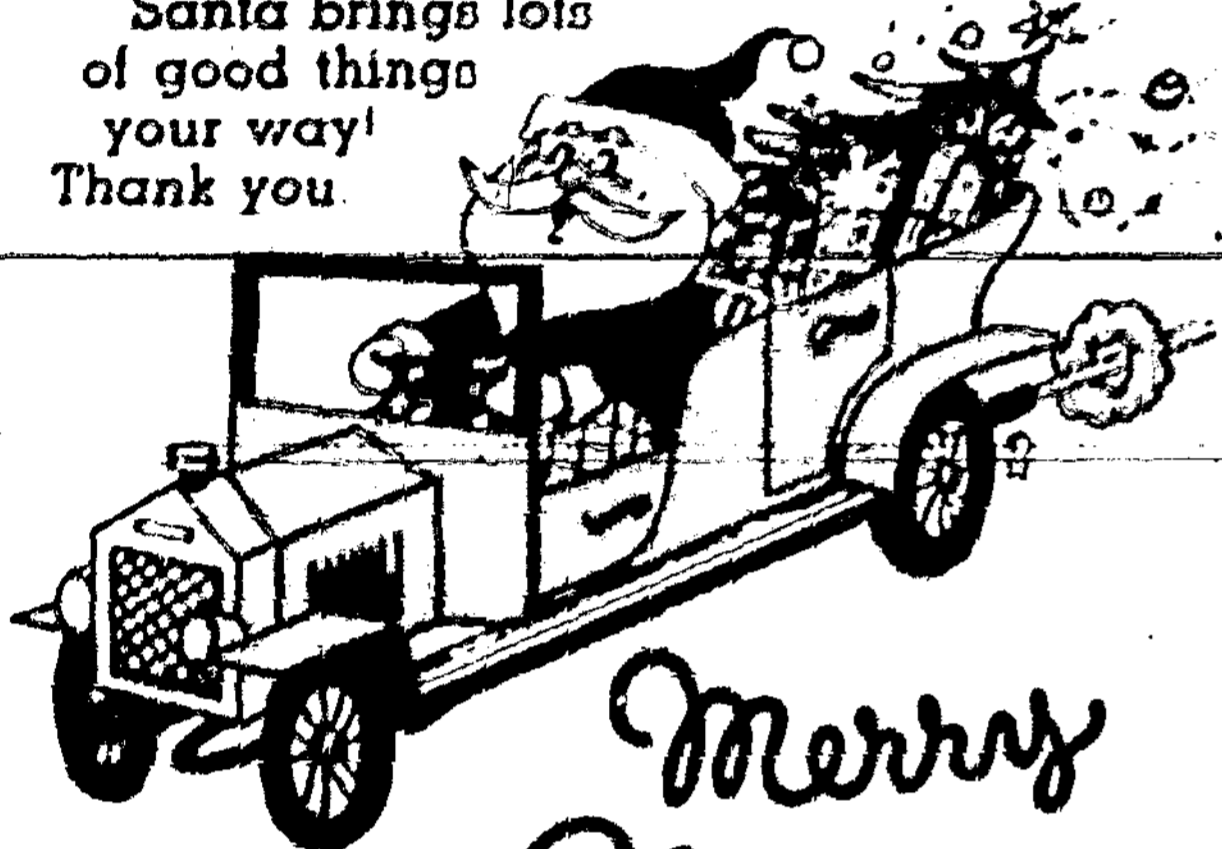

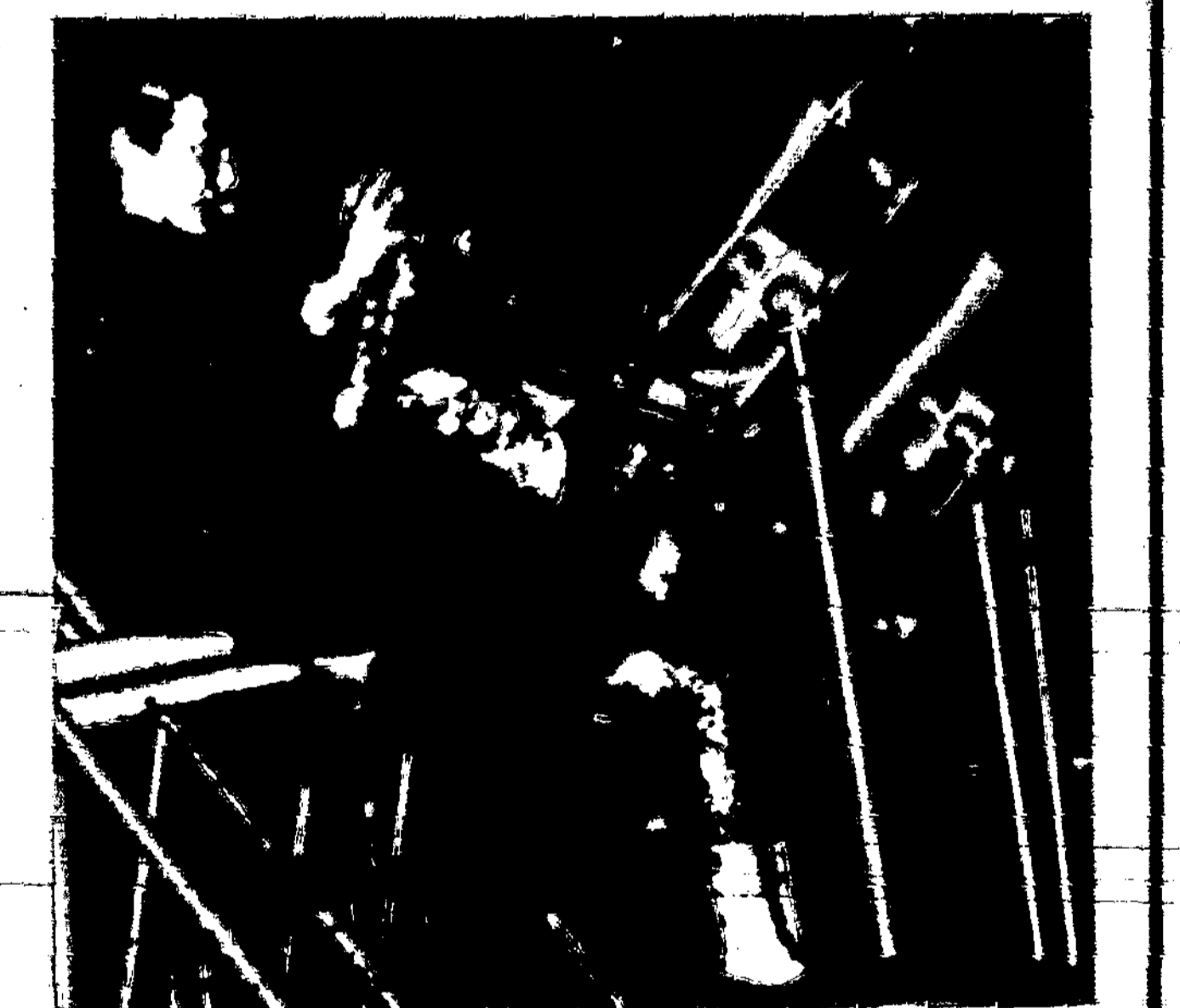

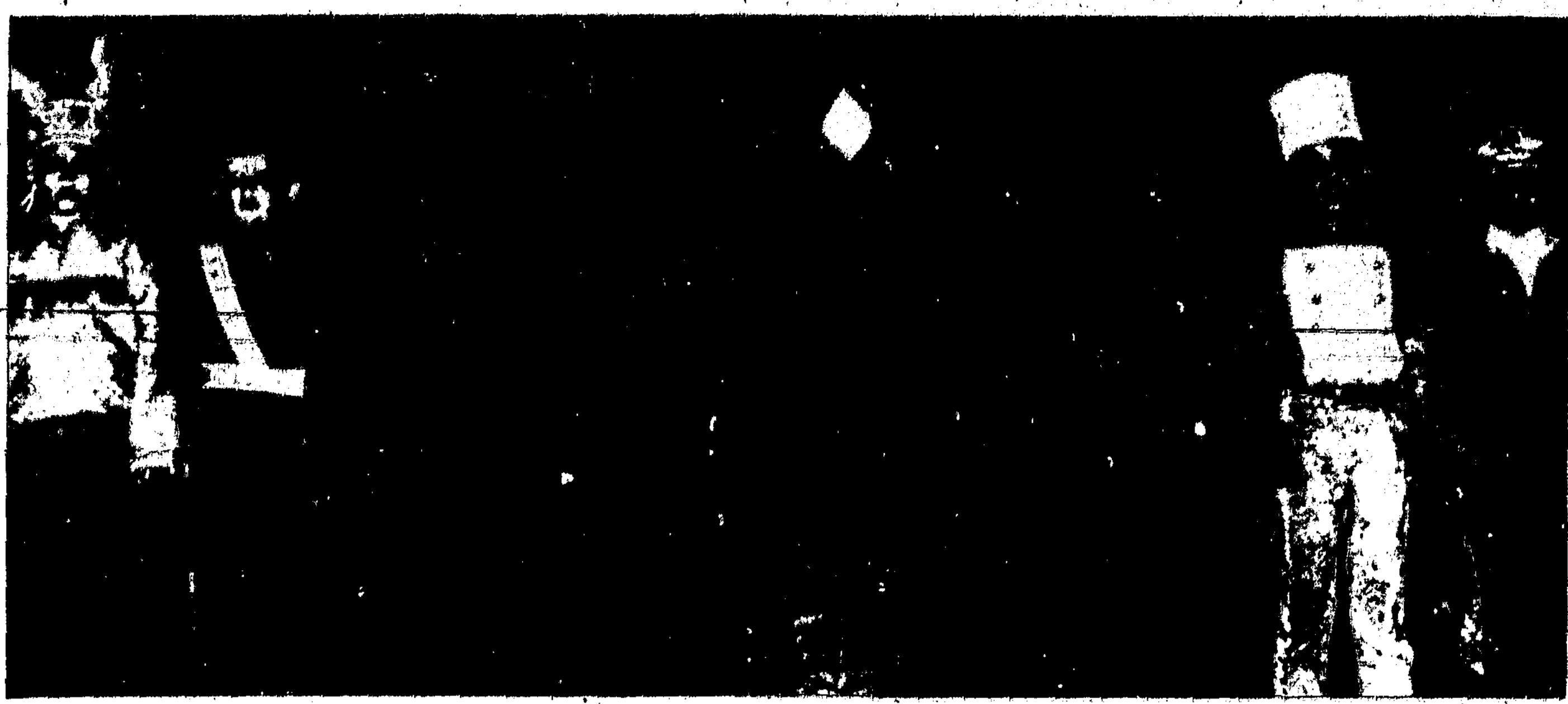

By Don Stark

Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce members enjoyed a buffet lunch at the Recreation Center last Tuesday and reviews happenings of the past and plans for the future.

Joe Light, president, introduced Don Stark, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce at Ruidoso, as guest speaker. His talk follows.

After that introduction I feel like the colored girl that went before the judge asking for a divorce. The judge wanted to know why. She said, "Well Judge it's like this, I met him on Friday; I married him on Saturday, now I want a divorce on Monday. That was the most over-introduced man I ever met."

A young Jewish boy entered a Klu Klux Klan meeting. One of the officials jumped up and said, "You don't belong here and you sure can't join." The boy answered, "Who said anything about joining. I'm selling sheets and pillow cases."

I'm not selling anything except perhaps an idea. If I had a title for my remarks tonight it would probably be "What is a Chamber of Commerce and what it takes

to have a Chamber of Commerce."

If you discussed this subject with a dozen people you would probably have a dozen answers. I will give you my interpretation and I certainly don't expect everyone to agree with me.

Communities don't just happen -- they are built -- they are built by men and women with ideas -- men and women with a vision -- visions of moral and economic growth and strength in their community. People willing to invest their time and talents -- money and initiative to insure that moral and economic growth.

I believe we will all agree that the entire State of New Mexico has been asleep at the switch. Lincoln County and our individual communities are certainly no exception.

All too often we hear the remark, "We can't do this or do that, we don't have the money. We have 60-some children in school for every wage earner, we have a terribly lower capita income, we have no industry to assure us a payroll."

If you talk with 100 people you will hear 95 reasons why we have been asleep at the switch. I agree we are not a wealthy area, but I can't buy the idea that we are a poor area. We are rich in many things. Granted, we have our limitations, but I firmly believe that even with the obstacles we have to overcome, we can unify our people behind a well-planned program and accomplish a dramatic breakthrough.

If other towns can -- so can we.

I believe every community should have a live, wide awake, thinking, progressive Chamber of Commerce. It is virtually impossible to build a progressive town without one. The C or C is the one organization in which the lines of demarcation which ordinarily separate people of a community into social, religious and racial groups, are entirely removed.

Therefore it is the one and only institution which can bring together in a voluntary manner all of these diverse elements for the advancement of the community as a whole. Only when the idea of a Chamber of Commerce is translated into terms of cooperative effort are we conscious of its dynamic power. The real meaning and power of the Chamber of Commerce is evident you analyze its effect upon the community.

The Chamber of Commerce takes an active part in the civic and commercial activities of a constructive nature. It mobilizes the citizens behind a program

of community betterment. It is the voice of the town. It reflects the ideals of the community. It expresses the aspirations of the people.

It gives direction to the aims of the citizenship. It reduces the unorganized elements to an organized unit. It is the heart of worthwhile enterprises. It is the magnet that draws the outside world into your midst. It is the clearing-house of civic pride. It is the powerhouse of progress and -- finally it is the composite picture of your town as its citizens would have it.

Realizing a Chamber of Commerce is a must, we should all put our shoulders to the load and work not only to sell our own business but to sell our entire community. If we have the attitude and the idea that we have somewhat been left out -- take a second look. Let's call what we have.

I'm reminded of the story about a salesman calling on a small community general store to sell advertising. The owner said, "Man I've been here 40 years I don't need to advertise." The thinking young salesman pointed across the street and said, "Mr., they have been selling religion for over 1000 years yet each Sunday morning they ring the bell!"

Yes, we must advertise and sell -- sell what we have. Each of our communities have varied things to work on -- agriculture -- ranching -- tourism or retirement, go on and on. Many communities are succeeding and selling with great success the retirement program.

However what item we decide to concentrate on, be it one or all, we still need our Chamber organization to carry the ball and get the job done.

To have the organization to do the work takes money. To get the money takes memberships. To get the memberships takes a program of work. Being mercenary, I feel the most important part of our Chamber of Commerce is membership. It is the guts of our organization and without membership we don't

survive.

When selling memberships we must remember we are dealing with business people. People used to dealing in two things -- a product and a price. Our program must be set up as an attractive product. It must be a product to meet the needs of the entire community. If our product fails to do the job, our people will cease to buy. It must produce results. Results that can be translated into dollars and cents for our community.

In essence, let the people write the program and they will underwrite it. Our program must be profitably and truthfully sold. We must have a realistic price tag -- a price tag keyed to our community.

However, we must not sell our program too cheap. Our people are expected a full value Chamber of Commerce -- full value for a fair price. Our program should schedule today's

activities, in view of tomorrow's needs.

Yes, a Chamber of Commerce takes a lot of work, planning, and above all a lot of doing. It

takes being at the right place, at the right time, with the right foot, in the right door.

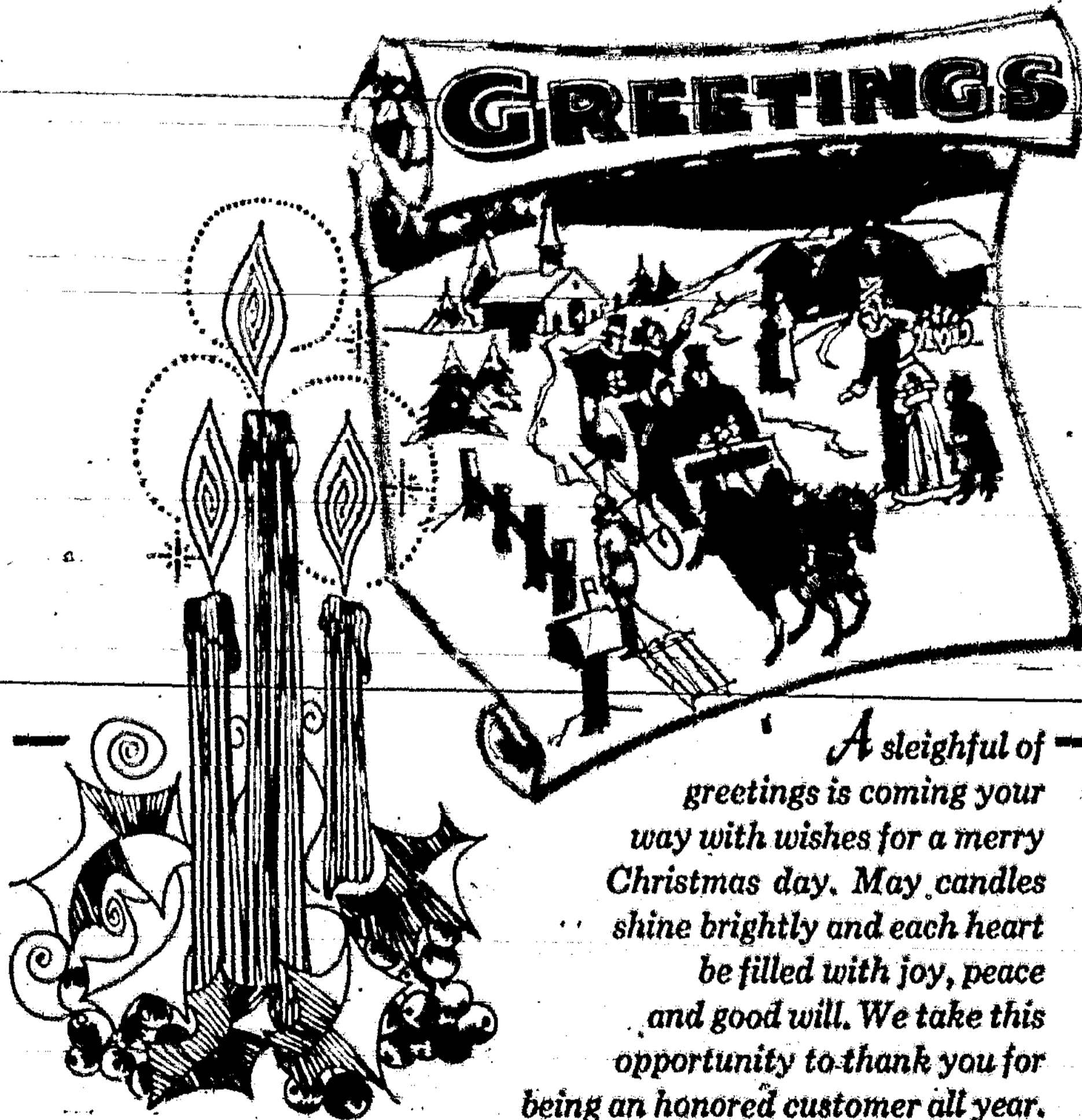

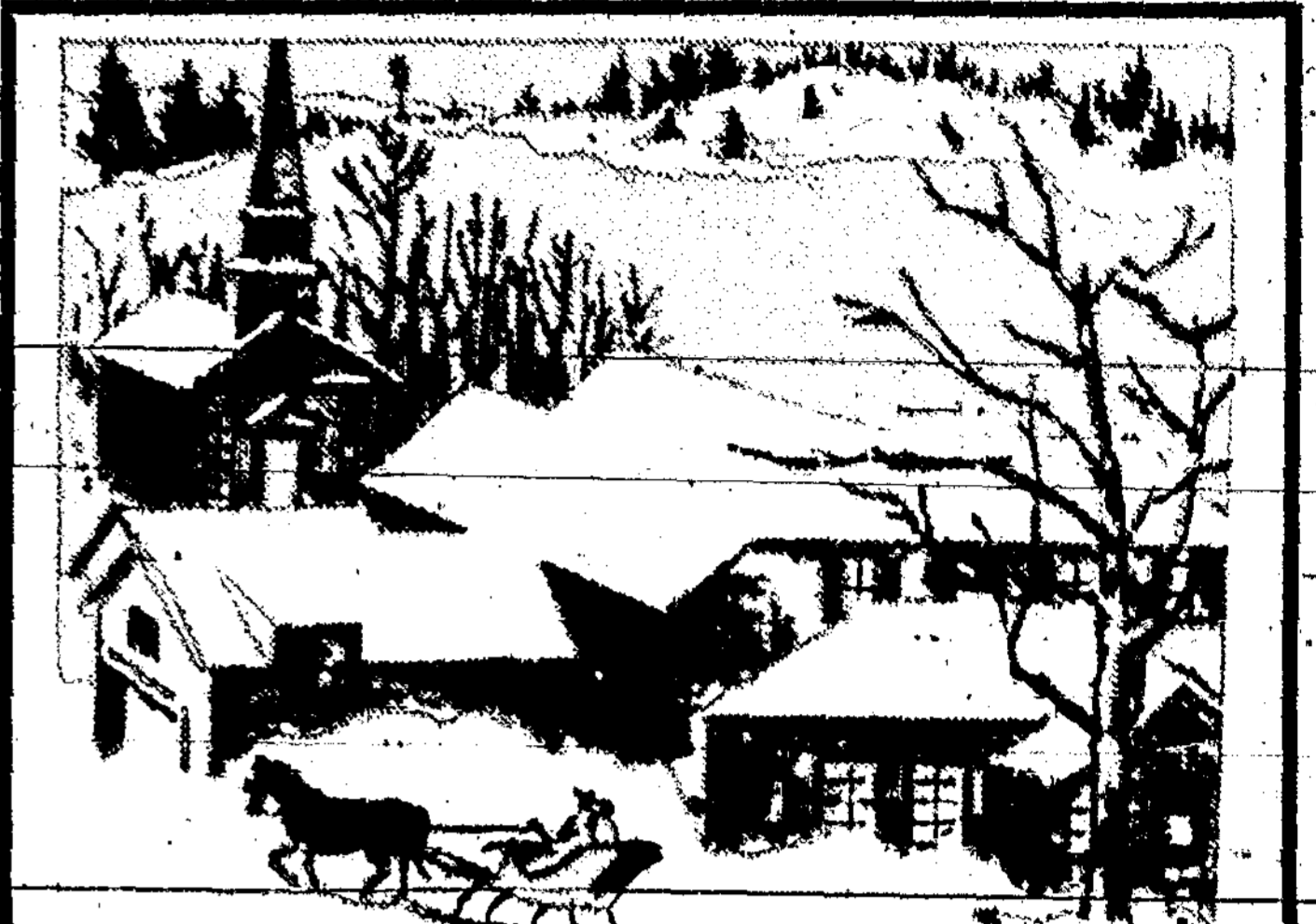

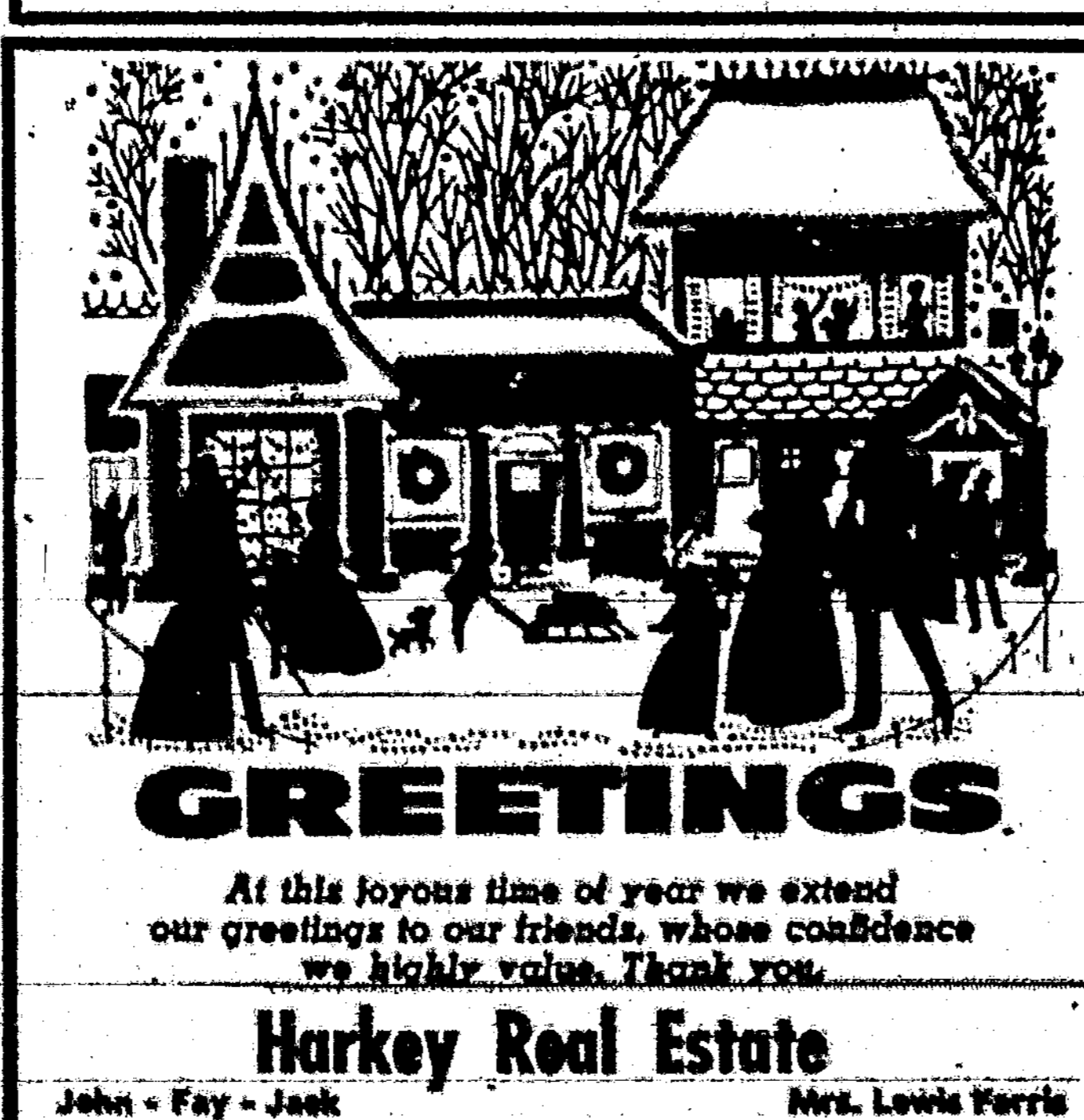
