Filing rush swells candidate lists

Monday, February 5, the deadline for filing for town and village office in Lincoln County, was a busy day for clerks. Before the day was done there were five candidates for mayor in Ruidoso, five candidates for council in Carrizozo, a full slate at Corona, and a surplus of candidates at Capitán and Ruidoso Downs.

Carrizozo town council spent considerable time Tuesday night discussing "qualified town officials" with no ready answers as to who is qualified to file and/or to serve. State election code books define a qualified elector as person with six months residence in the territory which might be construed to be county, town or precinct, and the code indicated that any qualified elector could file for office. A Carrizozo town ordinance Chapter 4 1-4-2 reads "No person shall be eligible to serve as a member of trustees unless he shall be the owner of taxable real property and reside in the city."

Atty. Elfred Jones commented that over the years lots of election and candidate situations have been handled in a manner deemed best to suit some

political power, instead of the letter of the law. At the conclusion of the meeting, names of Carrizozo candidates were drawn for placing on the ballot:

FHA loans total \$2,293,880.00

A total of \$2,293,880 in loan funds has been used in Chaves and Lincoln counties to support family farms since the Farmers Home Administration program was expanded six years ago, Richard Floyd, local supervisor for the rural credit agency said today. \$490,510 was advanced in 1967 fiscal year.

Currently 7% of all farmers in Chaves and Lincoln counties are using the supervised credit services of the Farmers Home Administration.

The supply of Farmers Home Administration credit, which supplements the credit supplied by banks and other private credit sources is one of the measures recommended by President Johnson to provide family farmers an opportunity to earn parity of income. "These loans have assisted farmers to continue living in

Chaves and Lincoln counties and provide a farming livelihood for themselves and not give up and move to the city. They have helped many young farmers with little or no security get established. They have enabled ranchers to continue operating after droughts in the area, with feed and replacement livestock loans," Mr. Floyd noted.

Farmers Home Administration loans can be used to buy land, refinance debts, acquire livestock and equipment, pay fertilizer and fuel bills and pay other expenses connected with acquiring, improving and operating farms.

Latest in the yearly survey of farm ownership borrowers shows that in New Mexico on the average over a 5-year period, these borrowers have raised their gross cash incomes from \$13,600 to \$17,250, and made

gains in net worth. This gain in net worth assists farmers later to obtain their credit from regular commercial sources.

The incomes of farmers using Farmers Home Administration credit in Chaves and Lincoln counties in 1967 totaled approximately \$1,921,000.

Success stories of farmers and ranchers beginning with FHA credit are numerous and most farmers can describe several. Loans are made only to families who are unable to obtain adequate reasonable term credit from other sources. The program is tailored to individual family needs and loans are accompanied by technical assistance in management.

The Chaves county office is located in Room 168 of the Roswell Federal Building. This office services both Chaves and Lincoln counties.

Fire Department to build addition

Carrizozo town council spent a busy evening Tuesday going over bills, occupation license forms, police reports, election questions, and at the end of the meeting heard a request from Ziggy Lessau, chief of Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department, that the town advertise for bids for construction of 24 x 66 addition to present fire department quarters. Funds for such construction come through the state fire marshal's office. The town voted to approve the request and the advertisement for bids should appear in News of February 15.

The added space is needed for drying hose, some 400 feet of new hose lost because of improper drying. Chief Lessau told the council. This space would also be used for small emergency vehicle which would be used for out-of-town runs.

The department does not own such a vehicle but is expecting to acquire one in the future.

The Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department budget stands at \$7,000 and includes money for construction, with additional funds expected in the fiscal year starting July 1968. The addition will be cement block, cement floor, and new roof on present fire hall.

The January 31 vehicle report showed Zozo police car traveling 3,024 miles and using 261 gallons of gasoline and six quarts of oil. The garbage truck traveled 392 miles, used 95 gallons of gas, one pickup truck traveled 923 miles, used 68 gallons of gas, six other vehicles were included in the report from Juan Jiron, town foreman.

The January police report follows: 42 calls made, 7 arrests, 4 citations given,

3 traffic warnings. Thomas Hooker Jr. fined \$15 for speeding. Esquipala Padilla Sr. fined \$2.50 for expired brake and light sticker. Paul Brill \$5.00 for yellow line violation. Walter Gundersen \$5.00 for disobeying stop sign. Simon Chavez \$20 for drunkenness. Ralph Lopez Jr. \$15 for disorderly conduct.

Troy Sadler wants to borrow leather tools for use by his Industrial Arts class. Town officials did not know they owned leather tools, seemed like Troy and class would probably get to use them.

Election judges, clerks and alternates were appointed by Mayor Vega. Judges: Mrs. John McCollum, Mrs. C. A. Snow, Mr. L. Z. Mainre. Alternates are Carl Degner and Miss Minnie Lee Neill. Clerks are: Mrs. S. M. Ortiz, Mrs. Ray Warner. Alternates are Mrs. Sabino

Sandoval and Mrs. Lewis Farris. Carrizozo volunteer Fire Department held an election at its first meeting in January. Ziggy Lessau was elected chief, Nasario Montes is first assistant, Marty Voorbach is second assistant and Nat Palomarez is secretary.

The trustees gave consideration to the matter of crediting person committed to prison for nonpayment of fine or costs with more than the \$1.00 a day as at present. They voted to adopt new ordinance or amend old ordinance, as necessary, to up the figure to \$5.00 per day.

Trustee Buster Smoot said that commercial electric rates are much too high in Carrizozo and the town should have a representative on the board of electric cooperative serving the town. He said the town is entitled to more lights, that between the

state highway department and the electric co-op, the Town of Carrizozo has to pay light bill on signal at intersection of US54 and 380. He felt the town should not have to pay this bill. The council instructed Clerk Nellie Lee Baker to write letter to electric cooperative asking about representation on its board of directors.


Carrizozo recreation committee wants the Town to ask the electric co-op for parking lights at the center. The council passed this matter back to the committee. Report was given on proposed boy's club by Vernon Petty. He said a person known locally as Tony DeMarco, but having 16 aliases, had been raising funds around town to equip a club at Nike hall. Councilman Petty had information from Lincoln County Sheriff that DeMarco had a

record of 45 arrests and had served several prison sentences.

Question of traffic violators paying each to policeman was brought by Councilman Smoot. This matter has been discussed at meeting several years back, when local police said they would rather not be in position of taking cash. Smoot suggested that night radio operator at sheriff's office be equipped with receipt book and take the money (actually appearance bond money) when violators are brought in.

Signal light at railroad crossing was discussed. Smoot moved and Petty seconded a motion that SP railroad be requested to install signal light.

Attending the meeting were Mayor Leandro Vega, Councilmen Vernon Petty, Joe Ventura, and Buster Smoot, Elfred Jones, Nellie Lee Baker, Ziggy Lessau and Paul Payton.

Byron Yancey, patrol foreman at Corona, recently received two letters of commendation for his assistance at rescue operations involving a wrecked airplane, which had crashed in the Gallinas Mountains, during a snow storm. The aircraft had taken off from Alamogordo, enroute to Albuquerque, with passengers who had been delayed because of the storm. After the crash, one of the passengers managed to walk to a ranch house and summon aid for the men left at the site. Yancey had his blades working in the area, when he was contacted by the New Mexico State Police, to aid them in opening a road so the rescue teams could get to the wreck. The pilot was killed in the wreck and one passenger died the next day from injuries received. The letter from the office of Governor David Cargo read as
