May, Ortiz, Roper, Fuller, Traylor, Randle win contested races for town councilmen

Council meets 18th for swearing in

Carrizozo Town Council had a short session Tuesday night and will hold its last official meeting on Monday, March 18, to swear in the new mayor and council.

At a special meeting February 29, the council considered second proposal for construction of building at airport and lights for runways.

Some occupation license fees seemed short and town will write to state tax commission for sales tax information before accepting three of the license applications. Huffman Welding and Machine Shop was a new applicant for occupation license.

Building permits allowed to A. N. Spencer, new house and remodeling clinic, and to David Swift, siding on house.

Bills were read and allowed. Attending this meeting were Mayor Leandro Vega, Councilmen Vernon Petty, Joe Ventura and Buster Smoot; Elfred Jones; Nellie Lee Baker and Paul Payton.

Capitan, Carrizozo and Corona had good weather for election day Tuesday and good vote turnout in all three towns where there were contests for town council.

Carrizozo had six candidates for two council positions, May topping the list followed by Ortiz as vote getter. The vote in Carrizozo is hard to figure, and probably has no clinch answers as to why people were voting for whom, 329 votes cast.

Austin Wooten and Friday Sherrill put some action in a race for magistrate with Wooten coming out ahead by 30 votes.

\$15,000 cash flies South

Since school money is so closely tied together with state-wide reappraisal, the progress of reappraisal in Lincoln County got a good going over. Lon E. Nelson Associates, the Lincoln reappraisal company, gave \$15,000 to outfit expected to do aerial mapping, the fellow took the \$15,000 and went to South America leaving Nelson holding the bag, broke and in no condition to finish the job in Lincoln, said Sen. Joe Skeen.

Supt. George White said he had just learned that Jesse Kordegay is out and Haskell Smith is in to represent the Department of Finance and Administration with the

particular job of seeing reappraisal work completed in the state. Supt. Bill Hall said he'd about given up trying to budget for next year.

Sen. Skeen told of the Senate's investigation into the reappraisal program, the findings were generally bad: (1) The Dept. of Finance had no communication with reappraisal contractors. (2) There is no communication between contractors. (3) There is no standardization state-wide or even in counties. (4) No guidelines set down to do the job.

The next move in Lincoln County is through the attorney general's office to get hold of work done by Nelson, then meet with new contractor for discussion of finishing the job — Dean and Company now appraising in Chaves County, the most likely prospect to finish the Lincoln job.

Sen. Skeen said that he expected a change in millage situation after reappraisal was complete, and the entire mill levy situation put on referendum basis. For instance, schools could receive 12-1/2 mills, and by means of referendum the school district could vote to increase the mill levy to raise additional funds. The counties will receive maybe 5 mills, and again this levy could be increased by referendum vote of people in the county. Cities and towns are coming in for 2-1/2 mills according to Sen. Skeen, and again the amount might be increased by vote of people.

The situation of corporate taxes was discussed. Trans-western plant which cost approximately \$2 million on the tax rolls at \$175,000, and some areas in the state receiving good chunks of corporate tax money with no school children at all. Skeen is a member of the legislative council which is going to supervise the completion of

reappraisal in New Mexico. Indian money cut in half at Ruidoso, Title III money cut to one-fourth at Corona, adds to school budgeting problems.

Lincoln County is one of the few in the state where reappraisal has been started but not complete, which puts it in position of needing to prove that a reasonable amount of appraisal work has been done, then schools might get the 1.7 mill money.

Resolution asks for improvements on 48

R. A. 'Hap' Canning of Roswell and Joe Skeen of Pecos presented a resolution to Lincoln County commissioners which requested that the County ask the State Highway Commission to put Highway 48 on list of roads to be improved. This road is best known as Pine Lodge road, used by school bus, mail truck, and ranchers north of Capitan.

Highway 48 heads west and a little north from Roswell and loops back in to Capitan. This road ought to tie into the paved road coming southeast out of Corona someday, was the comment at commissioner meeting.


Commissioners will probably approve the resolution but it will include three road projects in the county rather than just the one.

Lincoln school men figure on 1.7 money

Ruidoso Rotarians had Sen. Joe Skeen as speaker Monday noon and he told his audience, which included Supt. George White of Ruidoso, about Senate Bill 48 which extended reappraisal dates, and that if a county could show reasonable reappraisal progress then the schools could claim their 1.7 mills — possible even to get this money in present fiscal year — which amounts to around \$40,000 prorated out to five schools, approximately \$16M to Ruidoso, \$5M to Capitan and Corona, \$6M to Hondo, maybe \$8M to Carrizozo. Schools can use the 1.7 money in making up new budgets.

Supt. Duane Darling of Capitan and Supt. Bill Hall of Corona were at this meeting. All five county superintendents are expected to meet Thursday morning in Carrizozo to pursue the 1.7 funds.

Federals turn over title to land parcels



Walter Isaacs, from Bureau of Land Management office at Roswell, met with Lincoln County commissioners Tuesday to bring them up to date on BLM activities. One item being a

water pipeline going under a county road near Fort Stanton, a routine matter.

Of much more importance to the area was the presentation made by Isaacs concerning the block of land shown on map which included parts of Lincoln, DeBaca, Chaves and Guadalupe counties.

Under the Classification Act now being followed by BLM the Federal lands in this planning unit will be transferred from Federal ownership, the process probably taking up to ten years.

Lands in 13 western states where Federal ownership is high, have been blocked off into units and classified as follows:

- (1) Best, 60-90 percent Federal owned, government will keep, add to.
- (2) Fragmented, 50-30 percent Federal ownership.
- (3) Lands under cooperative agreement with other agencies.
- (4) Scattered parcels, no access, will be transferred from Federal ownership.

Several parcels of Federal land clustered in bottom-center of block represent old stock driveway now on Lloyd Wright's place. Applications are now on file with BLM for purchase or transfer of most parcels in the area.

Isaacs said that a series of public meetings would be held in the future to inform the public about transfer and sale possibilities of Federal parcels in this planning unit. BLM is meeting with good success to date in its moves from custodial to managerial arrangements where the government owns large blocks of grazing land. They now have more applications from ranchers wanting to go under grazing plan than can be processed at present.

Sen. Joe Skeen, present at the meeting on road business, said that some ranch owners were using the plan of transfer from private to government ownership as a means to hold their ranch together, or to escape inheritance taxes. Skeen said

the best thing that could be done now was to transfer Federal lands to either state or private ownership—government policies regarding lands might change, and in any case control would be closer to home.

Skeen said there was a time when it was the announced intent of government to return control of all Federal lands to state ownership, but that this had been changed, particularly by politicians in eastern states where government owns very little land, and now the government is retaining most of its large blocks of land and pushing for multiple use wherever possible.

The question was asked, what is grazing land worth. Isaacs said that an average unit including improvements might bring \$25 an acre, or \$10 to \$15 for grass land alone. The BLM now charges \$20 per animal unit for grass land, or \$3.96 per year for every grown animal.

The expert in the non-profit business of arranging land trades, state for Federal, or private for federal or state, or several different ways, is Charlie Crowder, doing good legitimate work according to men at the commission meeting.

The one BLM management plan in operation in Lincoln County is the Circle F Ranch operated by Al Snipes.

Sen. Skeen said the biggest complaint to be lodged against the multiple use situation is that the Federal government is basing this action on politics—meaning as a vote getter, mainly to please people in cities, and particularly in the eastern United States where the push came for multiple use. Skeen said people in the 13 western states have been shortchanged by the Enabling Act since New Mexico became a territory.

Isaacs said one of the reasons for BLM review of Federal land ownership was to eliminate outmoded land laws.

Maele Edmondson, who is in a Carlsbad hospital, is still holding her own.



Roundup

By Ralph Dunlap
Arturo Pacheco presided at the Lincoln County 4-H Council meeting last week and set the dates for county events. The Dress Revue was set for April 20th in Corona starting at 2:00 p.m. and at Hondo at 7:30 p.m. The County Livestock judging was set for June 25th at Hondo and Demonstration Contest for June 27th.

Election was held and the new president is Scott Shafer, first vice president is Arturo Pacheco, second vice president is Gordon Barham, and secretary treasurer is Celani Pacheco. County 4-H Camp will be June 10-13 at Scott Able 4-H Camp. The Lincoln County 4-H members will attend camp along with 4-Hers from Chaves and De Baca Counties.

Grasshoppers and their control will be discussed at the Corona School on March 13th at 7:30 P.M. S.F. Hutcherson and Duane Barhoff from Plant Pest Control division will explain the assistance available to ranchers in controlling grasshoppers.

Plan to attend the meeting so that you may better understand the range pest control program. Surveys indicate a possible severe grasshopper infestation in many parts of Lincoln County. If you had grasshoppers last year you stand a good chance of having them this year.

Plan to attend the meeting so that you can better understand the problems and make your own decision on the benefits of a control program.

Don't be in a rush to plant this spring. Delay sowing outdoors until after the last frost. Most seeds won't germinate well until the soil warms to about 60 degrees. They remain dormant and may rot. If you want to get started early, plant seed indoors about eight weeks before the last frost. If they are started sooner, the plants will be too large for transplanting. You can use sawdust in your flower beds or lawn if you add three pounds of nitrogen per 100 pounds of sawdust. This would be about 6 1/2 pounds of urea or 18 pounds of 16-20-0. Aspirin is the leading cause of accidental deaths among young children. Other dangerous items include bleach, turpentine,


