Plan for the future . . .

Having viewed the way cities and towns are developing, like El Paso, Alamogordo, Las Cruces, Albuquerque, it is plain to see that town planners are doing two things—1) developing a residential district, 2) building a shopping center to serve the residential area.

During the past 100 years other influences like railroads, highways through town, stockyards, manufacturing, military, etc. have carved up towns so that they are not just shopping centers and residential areas . . . but most all new growth . . . groups up business places so that shoppers can easily walk from store to store, and groups up homes so that hazards of trucks on highways, and noise of industry do not interfere with living.

Looking at the map of Carrizozo, what many people do not realize is that the town was platted "on the square" then the square turned about 45 degrees and the streets lead on the railroad which was the original reason for Carrizozo being a town.

Times do change. Thirteenth Street, fronting the railroad was once the major shopping area and passage way through town. Empty buildings, tumble-down shacks, and trees growing out of the sidewalks make this area a sad sight and proof of change of times. After 13th died, 12th Street became the trade street. In more recent years the move has been to Central Ave. (US54) and proposed location of new postoffice would jump the center of things clear to 9th Street.

Sad is the news that after 52 years of service with the railroad Joe Madrill, along with Paul Ortiz, Joe McDaniel and Abe Sanchez, have received 60-day notice of termination of their jobs. What this means is that trains will no longer be serviced in Carrizozo and something like \$500 a week payroll wiped out.

Paul Ortiz is the newest employee of the group. Paul started with the SP in 1941 and has worked on the railroad since that time.

This job loss follows another "trend of the times". Federal regulations have made it near impossible for small packing plants to operate. Poor health has forced Jiggs Sidwell to close his locker plant, and regulations are the major factor in keeping this going place of business from being sold. Mr. Sidwell had other helpers much of the time during his years in business.

Denver firm buys Zozo school bonds

Bids on \$150,000.00 worth of bonds, which will provide money for new school construction in Carrizozo were opened at the district school board meeting Tuesday night and the low bid accepted from Hanifen, Imhoff and Samford, Inc., of Denver, Colorado. This firm bid an interest rate of 4.3420. The next lowest (actually a higher rate of interest) was Quinn & Co. of Albuquerque at 4.369, next was 4.3647.

Bids for construction of the new school building have been received from five firms and will be opened April 23. Compton of Roswell, Hunter of Albuquerque, Hartley & Hust of Las Cruces, Giles of Alamogordo and Burnett of Clovis are the bidders so far.

There will be a special budget hearing in Santa Fe on April 25 at which time the \$150,000 will be moved into the Carrizozo school budget. About 40 days from April 9 board meeting the bond money is expected to be in hands of Lincoln County treasurer.

Four senior and four junior class representatives, all selected by their classes, met with the board of education to discuss handling of junior-senior banquet and prom. Conduct at this social highlight has been rather bad for the past two years and the junior and senior class representatives will have the responsibility of shaping up the program, making guidelines of conduct and seeing that the affair is carried out in proper style and manner all the way.

The alternative to the student body handling this function properly is to cancel both the banquet and the prom. Student representatives are Roca Sanchez, Donda Jo May, Scott Shafer and Buster Baker from senior class, Molly McKinley, Danny Monreal, Terri Olascoaga and Quill Bradley from junior class.

Easter vacation started Wednesday at 2:00 p.m., school will resume Tuesday, April 16, at 8:40. The last day of 1967-68 school year is May 24. Baccalaureate will be held May 19 and commencement May 21.

The Del Norte school band of Albuquerque, a 72-piece band and one of the best in the state will stop in Carrizozo April 16 for a concert in the auditorium right after lunch. There will be no admission charge, the public is invited. The band will lunch at Carrizozo school and continue its tour, next stop Roswell.

Plans are going ahead for May Day, one of the biggest and most entertaining events of the school year in Carrizozo. The program will be in the evening, Wednesday, May 1. Around 300 youngsters are involved in the program, all six grades and physical education classes of the high school. Mexican folk dances will be a special feature of this May Day. Grade teachers plan the program and issue a special invitation to all parents.

Homage to Saint Rita

What could be more fitting of this Easter season — when trouble is on the land, riots and strife in the big cities, desolation of abandoned buildings in the small towns, war taking young Americans in foreign land — than to pay homage to Saint Rita, the Patron Saint of the Impossible.

As Father Anthony Bolman tells the story, Saint Rita was a woman who first married and raised a family, then after they were grown and her husband gone she tried to join religious life, something she had wanted to do for some time, but could not because rules of religious orders made it impossible for her.

So, she kept on praying to be able to enter a convent. One day she walked up to wall of convent where gate was always kept locked . . . the gate opened and she walked in. When the Superior found out the circumstances she took that as a "sign" and this good woman was admitted to the religious life she desired — and became known as Saint Rita, the Patron Saint of the Impossible.



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Boys' school chapel construction soon

SPRINGER -- A project first discussed more than two years ago will reach fruition late this summer when construction begins on a chapel at the New Mexico Boys' School at Springer. Dr. and Mrs. A. N. Spencer, Carrizozo, are donating about \$100,000 for construction of the approximately 4,000 square foot red brick building. Mrs. Spencer is a member of the school's board of directors. The New Mexico Federation of Women's Clubs presented the

chapel-to-be with an organ, a piano and 100 hymnals at their state convention April 2 in Tucumcari, Mrs. Spencer said. But more donations of money for pews, carpeting, a bell, altar furnishings and office and classroom furniture are needed, she added.

The chapel will have a 240-person seating capacity in the sanctuary, enough to seat the entire population of the school. An office and a classroom each will be provided for the

Catholic and the Protestant chaplains.

The chapel was first proposed about two years ago by Fred Macaron, of Springer, then board chairman, Mrs. Spencer said.

Brochures were prepared and an attempt to get the state legislature to appropriate money was made, but it was unsuccessful.

The planned building will harmonize nicely with the buildings already on the

campus," Mrs. Spencer said. The new structure will be on a hill overlooking the other buildings at the school.

"All-faith vesper services will be held Sunday evenings," Mrs. Spencer said. The two chaplains would schedule their respective services Sunday mornings.


Architect for the project is Kern Smith of Carlsbad, who has been the school architect for many years, Mrs. Spencer said.

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

Where there used to be 100's of ranch hands, almost as many railroad workers and the county seat of Lincoln County was the headquarters for a vast area — smooth black-topped roads and the loss of jobs, all due to changing times, have made the small town smaller.

Only a few years back these places were operating in Carrizozo — city produce, Rollands, cactus bar, Shory Miller, Ford dealership, Yucca grill, upholstery shop, TV service, lumber yard, steak house, beauty parlor, numerous hotels, rooming houses, service stations, cafes.


During the decline of business — the basic support of towns — many nice things have happened to Carrizozo, like the new courthouse, recreation center, park, swimming pool, several school buildings, paving, natural gas, airport — but hardly a one of these fine happenings provided new jobs to support new families, to raise new children to live up the place.

This review of history is pointed in one direction. Another good thing is about to happen in Carrizozo — a new postoffice. As of now the government has lease of half block fronting "E" Avenue, in block where Glen Ellison lives, right across street from Chapel of Roses and Payton residence.

In view of trend all over the country it would seem logical for the government and Carrizozo town officials to "go with the times" — that is, locate the postoffice in what appears to be the prime business area of town. There will be many trucks in and out of the Carrizozo Zip Code center at all hours of the night and they bring the usual noise and traffic hazards which town planners try to keep out of residential areas.

Of even more importance is the door traffic a post-office develops — the major reason for growth of shopping centers. One stop, buy all your food, hardware, clothes, drop your mail, etc., is the way people are living now.

Our understanding of the postoffice situation is that every person in Carrizozo wants a new postoffice building and we're proud of the fact that Carrizozo is so located as to be the Zip Code Center. The government asks three things in acquiring land in Carrizozo for a postoffice, 1) Around 300 front feet by 120 deep for building and parking, 2) To deal with only one seller, 3) No buildings to be torn down.

A good question develops here. Shall town planners say, "This is the area we will try to develop and revive." That is exactly what urban renewal is doing all over the United States, trying to revive sagging down town areas and Carrizozo would do well to adopt the same thinking even if our town never grew beyond 1500 people in population. Let the town get in the real estate and tear-down business if necessary.

What do the neighbors think about proposed site of new postoffice? Austin Wooten welcomes this development. Paul and Eleanor Payton have decided that probably this new business would help the value of their property. Glen Ellison does not own his residence.

The important thing is certainly not "What do the neighbors care or think" but what will be best for the town. A postoffice located on the far end of "E" Avenue would not help business on the bank corner or in that area one bit. Our opinion is that the best interests of the town would be served if the new postoffice were to be located in the "down town" area, like within a block of the bank one way or another.

The conclusion — if Carrizozo is to take steps toward revival of its business and shopping area, and do what can be done to provide more jobs in an attempt to stop further "empties" it will be necessary that a lot of people express their desire for this to happen — particularly to the town council which would act as your representative.

Council members will certainly do what they think is best for the town. All that is needed is for you people to tell them what you think is best. We're all for ZoZo, in our own ways and this looks like a good time to get together — put the new postoffice where it will help a business district on the road to recovery.

Rosalie Dunlap was in Lincoln one day last week. We don't see her often and miss her since she is working at Fort Stanton.




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
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
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Horrid TV last 3 weeks

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

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ORDINANCE NO. 95-A AN ORDINANCE RELATED TO MUNICIPAL SALES TAXES; AMENDING SECTION 2 OF ORDINANCE NO. 93, PASSED, ADOPTED, SIGNED AND APPROVED August 21, 1967; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE Town of Carrizozo, NEW MEXICO:
Section 1, Section 2 of Ordinance No. 93, passed, adopted, signed and approved August 21, 1967 is amended to read:
"Section 2, DEFINITIONS, As used in this ordinance:
A. "Bureau" means the New Mexico Bureau of Revenue, the Commissioner of Revenue, or any employee of the Bureau exercising authority lawfully delegated to him by the Commissioner.
B. "Buying" or "Selling" means any transfer of property for consideration or any performance of service for consideration.
C. "Contracting" includes, but is not limited to, constructing, altering, repairing or demolishing any:
(1) road, highway, bridge, parking area or related project;
(2) building, stadium or other structure;
(3) airport, subway or similar facilities;
(4) park, trail, athletic field, golf course or similar facility;
(5) dam, reservoir, canal, ditch or similar facility;
(6) sewage or water treatment facility, power generating plant, pump station, natural gas compressing station or similar facility;
(7) sewage, water, gas or other pipeline;
(8) transmission lines;
(9) radio or other tower;
(10) water, oil or other storage tanks;
(11) shaft, tunnel or other mining appurtenance; or
(12) similar work.
"Contracting" also includes:
(13) leveling or clearing land;
(14) excavating earth;
(15) drilling wells of any type, including geismograph holes or core drilling; or
(16) similar work.
D. "Engaging in business" means carrying on or causing to be carried on any activity with the purpose of direct or indirect benefit.
E. "Gross receipts" means the total amount of money or the value of other consideration, received from selling property in the municipality, from leasing property employed in the municipality or from performing services in the municipality, and includes any type of time-price differential and receipts from sales of property handled on consignment but excludes cash discounts allowed and taken.
In an exchange in which the money or other consideration received does not represent the value of the property or service exchanged, "gross receipts" means the reasonable value of the property or service exchanged.
When the sale of property or service is made under any type of charge, conditional or time sales contract or the leasing of property is made under a leasing contract, the seller or lessor may elect to treat all receipts under such contracts as gross receipts as and when the payments are actually received. If the seller or lessor transfers his interest in any such contract to a third person, he shall pay the municipal sales tax upon the full sale or leasing contract amount.
"Gross receipts", for the purpose of the business of buying, selling or promoting the purchase, sale or leasing as factor, agent or broker, on a commission or fee basis, of any property, service, stock, bond or security, includes only the total commission or fees derived from the business.
F. "Manufacturing" means combining or processing components or materials to increase their value for sale in the ordinary course of business but does not include contracting.
G. "Person" means: (1) any individual, estate, trust, receiver, cooperative association, club, corporation, company, firm, partnership, joint venture, syndicate or other entity, including any gas, water or electric utility owned or operated by a county, municipality or other political subdivision of the state; (2) the United States or any agency or instrumentality thereof, the state of New Mexico or any political subdivision thereof.
H. "Property" means real property or tangible personal property. Tangible personal property includes electricity.
I. "Leasing" means any arrangement whereby, for a consideration, property is employed for or by any person other than the owner of the property.
J. "Service" means all activities engaged in for other persons for a consideration,

which activities involve primarily the performance of a service as distinguished from selling property. "Service" includes contracting and all materials employed in contracting are to be treated as part of the service. However, sales of materials that will be employed in contracting to persons engaged in contracting are sales of tangible personal property.
K. "Tax" means the municipal sales tax.
L. "Use" or "using" includes use, consumption or storage other than storage for subsequent sale in the ordinary course of business or for use solely outside of the municipality.
M. "Municipality" means the Town of Carrizozo.
Section 2, EMERGENCY. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure on the grounds of urgent public need. It is therefore to become immediately effective upon publication as provided by law.
Section 3, EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance, shall be effective on and after April 9th, 1968.
