Dotson mill to increase output

The pictures accompanying this feature news article (Page 4) show the first and only mineral operation to start up in Lincoln County and keep going — in a period of years spanning several decades. This is the iron ore mill operated by Carl Dotson.

Mr. Dotson set up a pilot operation over a year ago and during the past winter the mill has been rebuilt, enlarged, enclosed and plans are to add a wet magnetic drum concentrator, classifier and dryer in the next 60 days. Right now one conveyor belt feeds ore into the mill, there are three conveyor belts bringing magnetic concentrate, jig mill concentrate and wash gravel from the mill. The wet magnetic drum will feed a fourth conveyor belt with the most valuable iron concentrate to be recovered.

Dotson and mill superintendent Frank Lindsey figure they are sending \$2,400 worth of micron-size iron suspended in water to the slush pond each eight-hour shift. Lindsey estimated that the pond held around 300 tons of micron-size iron prior to it being cleaned out the past weekend.

Delivery of micron-size iron to International Minerals and Chemical Corp., a potash industry in Carlsbad, is on schedule for August following installation of the wet magnetic drum. The tailings from the slush pond will be recovered at that time.

Iron ore being processed for the past year comes

from tailings' pile at the Jones Mine and this will continue until they are all used up, then open-pit mining will start at Yellow Jacket, a mine that is visible from town looking to the northeast.

The mill is producing enough iron ore to supply Ideal Cement Plant in Tijeras Canyon with 50 tons of material every 24 hours, seven days a week. In addition ore is being trucked to Southwest Portland Cement Co. at Bushland, Texas near Amarillo. The mill has capacity for more than this demand and will be producing much more iron ore of three grades when a second shift goes to work in May.

Getting the bugs out of the new mill operation has taken some time. There are motors and belts all over the place. Getting the valuable slush-mud out of the pond was a new problem the mill crew was working on last week.

Machinery for wet magnetic recovery of the micron-size iron has been located and will be installed in the near future. The Dotson mill is bothered some by wind at this time of year. Where they were spending \$400 a month for water this cost has been cut to about \$40 a month with installation of slush ponds so water can be re-used.

Frank Lindsey is superintendent overseeing entire operation for Carl Dotson. Bob Smith operates the crusher and N. W. Hartley is mill operator. Jack Brazel is watchman. Truck drivers are Ed Neiderstadt, Bud and James Littleton, Nat Chavez, Glen King and Troy Webb.

DANNY DOES THE FIGURING School building contract goes to Hunter & Co.

"They say they will build anything"

Bids for construction of new school building in Carrizozo were opened Tuesday night at school board meeting and contract awarded to James E. Hunter & Company, Inc. general contractors of Albuquerque on its low bid of \$96,966.00. Next low bid was \$93,827.00 from Gilles Construction of Alamogordo.

Danny Armstrong, son of Mr. and Mrs. Welcome Armstrong of Carrizozo is a student at the University of New Mexico on a General Motors scholarship and works part-time as chief estimator for Hunter and Company. Danny did the figuring on the Carrizozo school job, and

apparently figured just right, low enough to get the job and yet close to second low bid.

Work on this new building will start May 27, right after school is out.

James E. Hunter and James D. Schumacher, general manager of Hunter, attended a special Chamber of Commerce meeting Tuesday following the bid opening and discussed updating the Carrizozo Town Masterplan with Johnson Stearns, Fred English, George Maki, Ziggy Lessau and Boyd Harper. Paul Payton covered the meeting.

Schumacher pointed out that larger towns and more heavily populated states of the nation have been receiving the bulk of federal grants and aid because they have people who work full time at putting through the government red tape.

Carrizozo would need to adopt zoning ordinance before any urban renewal, special impact, rent supplement, rental housing, low income housing or other programs of this type could be instigated.

The one program that could be financed in Carrizozo right now would be an extended care building which would be built adjacent to, but not connected to, Lincoln County Municipal Hospital. This project has been discussed in past years and would be good addition to hospital work being done. Mr. Schumacher will return to Carrizozo and discuss the extended care program with hospital board.

Demolition of unsound structures is one of the programs which could be instigated in Carrizozo, again this would have to come after town council adopted zoning ordinance.

Ray Roper hit in head

During track practice at Carrizozo school Friday Ray Roper, son of Mr. and Mrs. Barney Roper, was hit in head by shot put by Scott Shafer.

Roper was taken to Roswell medical center that evening where he stayed until Sunday. On Tuesday Ray was taken to El Paso for EEG tests. He is back in school today, still suffering from concussion but apparently will recover from the accident. Doctor's instructions are not to participate in track this week.

Phone Rates Go Up in ZoZo

Mountain States Telephone has filed tariffs to carry out a State Corporation Commission order increasing rates for many telephone customers in the state. Monthly rates for one party business telephones will be increased \$2.25. Rates for extension telephones will be increased by \$2.25 monthly to level of charge now applied in larger cities. All changes are effective April 22.

PROBATE COURT JUDGE CANDIDATE ANNOUNCES

Herbert Smith of Rufisco announced this week that he will be a candidate for office of probate judge in Lincoln County on the Republican ticket. Mr. Smith has been a resident of Lincoln County for 35 years, and a Republican party worker for the past 34 years, 18 as precinct chairman. The primary election is August 27.

Money asked for conservation

New Mexico Senators Clinton Anderson and Joe Montoya presented a joint statement to senate appropriations subcommittee on agriculture this week supporting a nationwide increase of \$39,459,000 in soil conservation service appropriations.

They singled out activities in south central mountain area, including Carrizozo, Capitan, Rufisco and Alamogordo, which are being organized by local people to improve economic conditions and to enhance natural beauty of entire area and attract more tourists and industry to area.

This mountainous country is near large population centers such as Albuquerque and El Paso and offers great opportunities for small homes and outdoor recreation. Future of people in this area depends on how well their renewable natural resources are used and developed. The Soil Conservation Service with soil and water districts, is assisting numerous groups of local people in carrying out measures designed to accomplish objectives of local people. We estimate that at least four additional technicians are needed in this small area alone if

adequate progress is to be made. The need of people for assistance in developing and using their natural resources is increasing at a very rapid rate. Yet, federal appropriations for the soil conservation service to provide this needed assistance is not only falling to keep pace with the demand but is actually being reduced. Budget estimates for appropriations to the Soil Conservation Service must be substantially increased or local people will not be able to avail themselves of many opportunities for economic growth through resource development.



Santa Rosa town council took a negative stand on relinquishing the cities' right to 2.25 mills which would have allowed the school to collect 4.5 mills thru-out the school district amounting to some \$15,000. Councilman Wilburn Young said, "Ordinarily I'm in favor of the schools, but this time I'm in favor of the taxpayers."









Spray your apple trees with Guthion, Diazinon, DDT, Lead arsenate, Deltay, or phosphatidon when 90% of apple flower petals have fallen. This petal fall spray is the first step in apple-worm control. One of the recommended insecticides applied soon after bloom are gone protects the calyx end of the apple. Sevin can also be used, but it will cause fruit within 30 days after full bloom. With the heavy bloom use Sevin on Golden Delicious and Jonathan to thin the apples.
The calyx, which is the part of the bloom that is left after the petals fall, is the favorite place for the first-hatched codling moth worms to enter the apples. By filling the calyx end of the young apples with insecticide, damage from the first brood worms is greatly reduced, to give apples complete protection from the first generation of worms and also the second and third generation which occur 30 to 40 days and 60 to 70 days after the first generation, one of the above insecticides should be applied every two weeks.
Use a fine-mist high pressure spray when applying insecticides to fruit trees. Thorough coverage is essential to fill the calyx ends of newly-formed apples. A fine mist spray is the only spray that will thoroughly wet and cover an apple tree. Enough spray to wet all fruit, leaf and bark surfaces is also essential. It generally takes 10 to 15 gallons of spray to completely wet a 10 to 15-year old apple tree in the petal fall stage.
Before applying spray for worm control, examine the leaves, twigs and bark for the presence of other pests, look for aphids, spider mites, leaf rollers and powdery mildew on the leaves. Check the twigs and bark for scale insects and woolly aphids. Also make sure that honey bees are not active when you spray your trees. Honey bees should be protected because they are necessary for cross-pollination of many apple varieties. Failure to get a good crop of apples is often due to a lack of bee activity or a lack of other varieties for cross-pollination.
Plant protection chemicals such as insecticides and fungicides are essential tools for growing a clean crop of apples. However, to use them effectively and safely, the directions on the label must be read, understood, and followed.
Ever wonder just how clean your laundry is when washed in cold water? Recent experiments have produced some startling results. In the experiment the laundry of two families was first washed in hot water with no disinfectant. The average number of bacteria per inch for

family number one was 2,275 and for family number two, 1,650. When laundry in cold water scientists found 8,000 bacteria per square inch for family number one, and 20,284 for family number two. The difference in bacteria count is therefore almost 7,000 more in the first family, and 20,000 more for the second family when cold water was used in the washing machine.
However, synthetic fibers, particularly the resin-treated fibers, are less likely to develop wrinkles when washed in cool water. Heat in the water can set wrinkles, and unless a cool water rinse is used, these wrinkles are present then the clothes come out of the washer or dryer.
Some homemakers prefer a cool wash for many of their colored clothes, and the saving in hot water expense is another factor promoting the cold water wash.

If you are reluctant to give up the cold water wash, consider the addition of a disinfectant to sanitize your clothes and kill the bacteria. Both liquid chlorine and quaternary disinfectants provide good protection with either hot or cold water. Phenolic and pine oil disinfectants are quite effective in hot water, but provide very poor protection in cold water wash.
I attended the wool sale in Roswell Monday. The wool prices ranged from 41 to 59¢ per pound. Ray Clark of Capitan received the top price for his wool that was predominantly fine with some half blood in it. The wool was one to five pounds per head lighter than last year. The average price was three to five cents per pound higher than last year but the income per head was generally slightly less, as fewer pounds of wool per head.
In its attempts to keep hazardous substances off the consumer market, the government has moved to ban carbon tetrachloride, a common household cleaner from interstate commerce. The Food and Drug Administration proposed to list carbon tetrachloride and mixtures containing this chemical as banned hazardous substances. The use of this chemical in fire extinguishers would also be included in the ban.
The use of the chemical in or around the home is a hazard to public health, the FDA said. Extensive label warnings are now required on products containing carbon tetrachloride but deaths and injuries connected with its use are reported every year. And since many other, safer substitutes are available, the use of this chemical is an unnecessary hazard, according to the FDA.
Swallowing carbon tetrachloride or inhaling its fumes can cause injury or death. Injuries that may result from the chemical's use include damage to the liver, kidneys, and nervous system, including the brain. The heart may also be affected. Carbon tetrachloride fire extinguishers are now banned in federal and some state institutions and buildings.
Protopam chloride a new drug for the treatment of organophosphate poisoning in humans, is available to ranchers and farmers working with organophosphate insecticides this spring.
Producers working and living in areas where organophosphate chemicals are in use would do well to make sure their doctors know about this new drug-protopam chloride and its availability of short notice. Growers involved in the application of these chemicals should make sure their doctors have protopam chloride supply on hand for safety's sake. Protopam chloride should be administered by a doctor. However, ranchers and farmers would do well not to rely on drugs to prevent organophosphate poisoning. Prevention through cleanliness is the way to ward off such poisoning. A person can carry a lethal dose of organophosphate chemical on his clothes or under his fingernails. If a handler of organophosphate insecticides expects to survive, he must not violate this rule; do not eat or smoke around the chemical or application equipment.
