## Supt. Bill Hall of Corona resigns position to teach



# Roundup

Last week the temperature got to 24 degrees at Lincoln, 28 at San Patricio and 7 at Ruidoso. All the apple blossoms out at this time in the Lincoln area were killed, but I did not notice any damage below San Patricio.

Bert Pfingsten smudged with his new oil fired heaters from 9:30 p.m. to about 7:00 a.m. and maintained the temperature in his orchard from 33 to 37 degrees although the temperature outside the orchard went down to 26. Bill Shreengost lit his smudge pots at 11:30 and maintained the temperature in the orchard until around 6:30 a.m. when a few of the heaters ran out of fuel. I believe that there was enough heat in the orchard to prevent any damage.

\*\*\*\*\*

It was around 28 degrees Monday morning near Lincoln. To get an accurate estimate of the fruit, we need to wait until after the late frost. The old timers say wait until May 9th.

\*\*\*\*\*

Lucio Zamora was spraying pollen on his apple trees. He has a solid block of Red Delicious and uses the pollen to get a fruit set as the Red Delicious will not set a crop unless it is pollinated by some other variety such as Jonathan or Golden Delicious.

John Cooper, Shanks Brothers, Marley and Whitney and Lincoln County Livestock received over 60 cents for their wool this past week. They all had a bright, light shrinking clip. The fine wools were commanding a premium. I know of one clip that received a bid of \$1.27 per clean pound in Roswell. Although this is not the top grease price, it is the top offer on a clean basis.

Powdery mildew often plagues home gardeners in Lincoln County. Powdery mildew is caused by a fungus which spreads from plant to plant by wind-borne spores. The fungus appears as white to gray moldy or powdery patches on leaves, stems, and buds. The mildew spots may enlarge until they cover the whole leaf. Many leaves will curl and become distorted. The disease is encouraged by warm days and cool nights. Poor air circulation and over crowding of plants also contribute to the disease incidence.

The fungus disease is prevalent on rose, euonymus, lilac, and photinia. It can be controlled by using one of several fungicides available at most nurseries, seed stores, and agricultural supply houses. Actidione PM and Karathane sprays have given good control of this disease but often must be repeated every 7-10 days. Sulfur and Phaltan will also help prevent disease development.

\*\*\*\*\*

If your evergreen plants have dead needles and dead limbs, their condition may be caused by winter drought, winter injury, salt accumulation or fungus infections. Although plants are dormant in the winter, they are still alive, and loss of water from leaves and needles continues. Rapid fluctuations in temperature in addition to drying winds and full sunlight can result in the loss of water from plants faster than it can be replaced from the roots. This results in the drying-out and death of the plant parts. Ice and heavy snow loads also cause mechanical injuries such as cracking and splitting. Very low temperatures can also cause damage. Various fungi also cause leaf blights and twig blights. When the needles become infected, they turn yellow, red or brown and begin dropping in large numbers.

To control the condition, collect and burn fallen needles and prune out and burn dead twigs, water during drought to a depth of three feet or more. Where practical, trees that have been attacked by a fungus should be sprayed with a fungicide such as maneb, zinab, phenyl mercury, fixed copper, or bordeaux mixture (4-4-50). Sprays are started when shoot growth is started and should be repeated two, four, and six weeks later. A wetting agent such as a commercial sticker-spreader or a common household detergent should be added to the spray for better coverage.

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


Dear Mr. Payton:




