CARRIZOZO HAS CLASS OF THIRTY-FOUR

Graduation exercises fill county calendar

Baccalaureate for Capitan Class of 1968 was held last Sunday, commencement for this class of 14 will be Friday, May 17 starting at 8:00 p.m.

Sunday, May 19, a large Carrizozo class of 34 members will attend baccalaureate services in the school auditorium at 8:00 p.m. Commencement for Carrizozo seniors will be held the following Tuesday, May 21. Hono graduation will be held May 23 at 8:00 p.m.

Corona seniors will attend baccalaureate on Sunday, May 26, and grauate the following Monday night, May 27; both exercises at the school.

Dr. C.L. Kay, assistant president of Lubbock Christian College, will give the commencement address at Capitan. Dr. Kay received his M.A. degree from Eastern University at Portales in 1952. He has been head of the department of religion, professor of history and government, dean of students, vice president of public affairs before becoming assistant president.

During the last five years he has made over 2,000 addresses to organizations of all kinds over the southwest. For a number of years he was author of a weekly column entitled "The Spirit of America". Dr. Kay has received many citations and awards, among them the George Washington Medal of Honor presented at Valley Forge for his speech "Freedom is on trial".

Rev. Wayne Buchtel will give the baccalaureate address to Carrizozo seniors on May 19.

Rev. Buchtel is pastor of United Presbyterian Church.

A presentation team composed of Dondo Jo May, Linda M. Simpson, Scott Shafer, William Hightower and Wynell Hobbs will represent Carrizozo's 34 seniors at their commencement. Miss May will give the introductory, Miss Simpson, valedictory address, Mr. Shafer, the salutatory address, and Mr. Hightower and Miss Hobbs will make short talks as representative boy and girl.

George M. Bond, 47, was discovered dead in his apartment two blocks southeast of the courthouse Tuesday after Choncho Morales noticed that lights were not on and had not been on since Friday.

Marshal Morales went to the apartment owner, Mrs. Vincent Rell, and told her that he thought Mr. Bond must be awful sick or dead because he'd seen lights on in the apartment every night, but since Friday there had been no lights.

Mrs. Rell told him she did not have a key so Marshal Morales and Andreas Herrera went to the house to see if they could get in. Mrs. Rell came along shortly. The house was locked but it looked as if a side window had been forced, however it was too small for a man to get in so Mrs. Rell said "Let's break in the front door."

On entering the apartment they found Mr. Bond lying on a couch,

he looked asleep Sheriff Leandro Vega Jr. had arrived and Mrs. Rell asked him to touch Bond to see if he was sleeping. Sheriff Vega, said, "No, he's gone."

Bond had been down to the City Garage Friday and talked a long time with Mrs. Rell told her he was not feeling too good. Austin Wooten and Friday Sheriff were called and an inquest held that day.

Bond had been a resident of Hollywood and Capitan for the past 14 years and with his mother had operated a grocery store in Hollywood. His mother passed away in 1968 and the store was closed. He recently moved to Carrizozo.

He is survived by one brother, James B. Bond of Liberty, Mo., three sisters, Mrs. Jane Ann Wood of Independence, Mo., Mrs. Bonnie Lee Ison of Los Alamos, and Mrs. Patricia L. Crump of Carlsbad.


