



"A time for initiative"

Soil Stewardship Week, a nationwide observance which places emphasis on man's obligations to God as stewards of the soil, water and other related resources, will be celebrated locally May 19-26 according to Lee Straley, Chairman, Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District.

This year's observance, with the theme, "A Time for Initiative," underscores the responsibility which each citizen has in meeting the responsibilities of soil stewardship. The Carrizozo Soil Conservation District and some 3,000 companion districts throughout the nation, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands, through their State and National Associations, are sponsoring this event for the 14th consecutive year.

The Soil Conservation District will distribute, upon request, to churches of all faiths, bulletin inserts and booklets created particularly for this year's observance.

The materials were prepared by the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, in cooperation with a Soil Stewardship Advisory Committee composed of leading churchmen in the nation. The Committee consists of Rev. E.W. Mueller, Lutheran Council in the U.S.A.; the Rt. Rev. John George Weber, National Catholic Rural Life Conference; the Rev. Harold Huff, Board of Missions, Methodist Church; the Rev. Henry A. McCanna, National Council of the Church of Christ in the U.S.A.; and the Rev. Lewis Newman, Southern Baptist Convention.

The steering committee for the South Central Mountain Resource Area held their regular meeting May 14th with the executive committee meeting the same day. The meeting was held in the Four Winds restaurant in Carrizozo with twenty-six people attending.

Two new projects were accepted at the meeting bringing the total to 22. The new proposals were stabilization of gully erosion in Cox Canyon in Otero County and publication of the Otero County Recreation Potential Appraisal.

Progress was reported on several projects at the meeting. The Capitan Lake project has had much of the work completed on engineering and geology investigation during the past month. Also the Ruidoso Watershed Project has had the preliminary investigation completed and is now in the process of calculations for cost-benefit. Several possible sites for structures were examined.

It was also reported that two projects, the Lincoln County Recreation Appraisal and the Rosalia Lopez Community Irrigation Ditch at Tularosa, should be completed by the next meeting.

Several other projects such as the White Oaks Road and the Dell Valley Watershed project are showing progress.

Plans were made for the next meeting to be held the 18th of June. It is to be the annual meeting with election of officers. It is also planned to have a speaker from the Producers Livestock Marketing Association comment on the marketing of cattle in the area.

As of May 14th the South Central Mountain Resource Area has accepted the following project proposals for assistance.

1. Dell City to Alamogordo Road - assistance in securing a paved road from Dell City to the Cloudcroft-Alamogordo Area.
2. Wildlife Management - improvement in the management and use of the wildlife resource in the area, especially big game.
3. Livestock Marketing - improvement in the marketing of cattle in the area through use of associations and improved information.
4. Otero County Designation - assistance to Otero County in obtaining a review of economic status for designation of eligibility for economic development.
5. Providencia Community Irrigation Ditch - assistance in reorganizing the system with underground pipeline and diversion.
6. Maxwell Community Irrigation Ditch - assistance in reorganizing the system.
7. South Hale Community Irrigation Ditch - assistance in reorganizing the system.
8. Casey Community Irrigation Ditch - assistance in reorganizing the system.
9. Avant Community Irrigation Ditch - assistance in reorganizing the system.
10. Newcomb Community Irrigation Ditch - assistance in reorganizing the system.
11. Ruidoso Watershed Project - assistance to other local organizations to carry out a flood control program on the Ruidoso Watershed.
12. White Oaks Road - promote and assist in obtaining a paved road from U.S. highway No 54 North of Carrizozo to White Oaks.
13. Cornudas, North and Culp Draw Watershed Project - assist local sponsors to carry out a flood control program on these drainages in the Dell Valley.
14. Tularosa Community - Irrigation Ditch - assistance in reorganizing the system.
15. Rosalia Lopez Community Irrigation Ditch - assistance in

16. Nogal Canyon Community Irrigation Ditch - assistance in reorganizing the system.
17. Bent Community Irrigation Ditch - assistance in reorganizing the system.
18. Study of Irrigation Facilities in the Ruidoso, Hondo and Bonito Creeks - locate and map ditches, diversions, acreages etc.
19. Capitan Lake - assistance in obtaining a multi-purpose lake near Capitan and supply pipeline to the lake.
20. Lincoln County Recreation Potential Appraisal - assistance in publication and distribution.
21. Otero County Recreation Potential Appraisal - assistance in publication and distribution.

22. Gully Stabilization in Cox Canyon - assistance in controlling and beautifying the eroded area.

boys visit industries

Industrial Arts students enrolled in general woodworking, general metals and advanced general shop recently toured several large industries in Albuquerque. The primary purpose of this field trip was to help achieve three major objectives.

- These objectives are:
1. To develop an interest and understanding of industry.
 2. To develop consumer knowledge in reference to selection, care and uses of all industrial materials.
 3. To provide experiences for students to learn about the

occupational opportunities in the many areas of our industrial economy.

Our bus arrived at Albuquerque at about 9:30 a.m. April 26. The next two and one-half hours were spent touring the facilities at Sandia Corporation accompanied by three security policemen. The first area visited was the electronics assembly and printed circuitry. This machine was operated automatically by numerical or tape control. In the sheet metal area there were all types of machines for forming and shaping sheet metal. Some of these machines were also numerically controlled. Wooden patterns of all shapes and sizes are formed on huge lathes, woodworking equipment, and by intricate hand work in the pattern shop. These patterns are used in the foundry area for shaping mold cavities into which hot metal is poured to form needed metal shapes. We were indeed fortunate


to have the opportunity to watch a nose cone being poured from an aluminum alloy. The last area we visited was the welding area where all of the newer welding processes were being used, particularly those used in aluminum welding.

We spent from one to two o'clock visiting the Groves Archery Corporation where a complete line of fiberglass bows are made and marketed, the more expensive ones costing around \$180.00. Our major interest here was learning how the fiberglass and wooden bows were laminated and the hand skill required to form and shape the bow grips.

The next hour was spent visiting the Francisian Furniture Co. which makes a complete line of commercial furniture from read oak. We were able to watch a piece of stock go through all the different processes until

it emerged as a fine piece of furniture. Some of the woodworking equipment the boys wanted to bring back to school to use include a straight line rip saw, a \$25,000.00 belt sander and a waterfall type finishing booth. Just before leaving Albuquerque, we stopped at the Paxton Lumber Co. and made a quick tour of this huge lumber yard. This held special interest for the group since many of the wood products used in our shop are purchased here.

Each boy was impressed after watching the many different machines in operation and realizing the amount of work done by each machine and the skilled manpower needed to keep each machine operating efficiently. Each boy should be more aware of the many different job opportunities that await him if he possess the required skills.

ORDINANCE NO. 94
 AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE ANNUAL MUNICIPAL LICENSE TAX UPON THE PRIVILEGE OF PERSONS HOLDING STATE LICENSES UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 46 OF THE NEW MEXICO STATUTES, 1953 ANNOTATED; FIXING THE AMOUNT OF SUCH LICENSE TAX AND THE DATES AND MANNER OF PAYMENT OF SUCH TAX; RE-ENACTING SECTIONS 5-3-3, 5-3-4, 5-3-5, 5-3-6, 5-3-7 and 5-3-8 OF THE CARRIZOZO MUNICIPAL CODE. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO:

Section 1. The following sections of the Carrizozo Municipal Code are hereby re-enacted:
 5-3-3: APPLICATION: A person desiring to sell liquor shall file an application with the Clerk stating the location of the place of business, the kind of alcoholic liquor to be sold, the length of time he has been in business or the date on which he intends to commence business and such other information as may be required. The license fee specified shall be paid at the time of application and may be returned to the applicant in the event the license is refused.

5-3-4: INVESTIGATION OF APPLICATIONS: Upon receipt of application for a license accompanied by the license fee, the Chief of Police, within ninety (90) days thereafter, shall cause to be made a thorough investigation of all matters pertaining thereto and report his findings to the Council. The Council shall then act upon said application according to the facts presented and either approve or disapprove the application. Upon approval by the Council the Clerk shall then issue said license; or, upon disapproval by the Council the Clerk shall so notify the applicant and return the license fee, less the cost of investigation, to the applicant. In making the investigation required by this Chapter the Chief of Police shall have the power to investigate and examine the books and records of the licensee and any person having a financial interest in any business to be conducted on the licensed premises.

5-3-5: SURETY: At the time of making application for a license under the provisions of this Chapter the applicant must furnish three (3) sureties each of whom shall be a resident approved by the Board. At the time application for a license is made a fee of five dollars (\$5.00) shall be paid to the Clerk to be used to pay for the cost of investigation of the proposed sureties.

5-3-6: LICENSE; TERM: The Board of Trustees shall act on all applications not less than ten (10) days following the date of receipt of application and shall either grant or reject each individually. Each license approved by the Board shall expire June 30 of each year.

5-3-7: TYPES OF LICENSE:
 (A) A person who is the proprietor or owner of any grocery store, drug store or other mercantile business who shall have been continuously in the same business in the same area for a period of one (1) year next preceding the date of application for a license may be licensed to dispense alcoholic liquors in unbroken packages and from the original bottles or containers of less than five (5) gallons each for consumption other than on the premises.
 (B) A restaurant, hotel or cafe which shall have been continuously in business under the

same management for a period of one (1) year next preceding the date of application for a license may be licensed to sell alcoholic liquors where sold with the food regularly served to be consumed on the premises.
 (C) A person selling or delivering alcoholic beverages at wholesale for resale by dispensers or retailers may be issued a wholesalers license.
 5-3-8: FEES: License fees for the sale and handling of alcoholic liquors shall be as shown in the following table:

All kinds of alcoholic liquors Consumption of alcoholic liquors the premises \$150.00
 (B) Consumption on the premises \$400.00
 (C) Wholesalers \$100.00

Section 2. The license tax imposed by this ordinance does not apply to any taxable event that occurred prior to the effective date of this ordinance. The payment, collection or enforcement of taxes, the liability for payment of which was incurred by reason of events occurring prior to the effective date of this ordinance, shall continue under the provisions of the applicable ordinance previously in force in every manner as though this ordinance had not been passed and adopted.

Section 3. The provisions of this ordinance are severable. If any part or application of any part of this ordinance is held invalid, the remainder of its application to other situations or persons shall not be affected.

Section 4. All other sections of Chapter 3 of the Carrizozo Municipal Code not herein amended are continued with full force and effect.


