Sumner firm bids low



Bids were opened Tuesday afternoon on airport building, 1,680 square feet of floor space, lavae stone veneer on outside.
Two bids were received, The bid of Bixby Builders Inc. of Fort Sumner was low at \$21,000. This figure was \$2,000 higher than architect's estimate but acceptable to the town.
The contractor will have 120 days for construction job which will have to be worked right along with contract to install lighting at the field. The lighting contract is now ready to submit to Federal Aviation Agency for approval, a 90-day contract.
Engineer Tom Mann was present at the bid opening. He told the council that their next move would be to list county and city equipment which could be used in blacktopping the runways, make list of salaries of town and county workers, then make formal presentation to the FAA asking approval of project to do the blacktopping. Mann said a road mix job should be acceptable to the federal agency and this could be done by town and county crews.

Commission asked to keep right-of-way open


Paul Jones, Jim and Gerald Tulley, Lloyd and Jim Gibson, Candolaro and T.O. Montoya from around Glencoe met with Lincoln County commissioners Bob Shafer, Joe McKnight and Max Oliver Tuesday to request that Elton Gughrie not be allowed to fence off old right of way which they use as access to new highway.
Assistant DA Bill Payne was called in on the discussion and after listening to the men Payne said he would have to study the situation before making a decision.
Means Motor Supply was awarded contract for two trucks, a dump truck with trade-in for \$4,918.40 and tractor truck with trade-in for \$8,000.00.
The commissioners are asking legal counsel to draw up ordinance which when published will legalize the formation of a county planning and zoning board. Several names have been suggested for this 9-man board but the appointments have not been made official. The planning and zoning board will have control of all subdivision outside the incorporate towns of the county.
Six plats were approved by the commissioners, four presented by Neal Chapman, one by Robert Stevenson, and one by Herbert Smith, all in the Alto area.
Leonard Morris was present at the meeting to request his road be worked.
John Thompson presented a partial vacation of McCarty subdivision for commissioner approval.

Official visits Museum

Tuesday, May 21, Mr. Mal Hardy, Director of the Cooperative Forest Fire Prevention Program for the USDA, Forest Service, in Washington D.C., was here on an informal fact-finding trip. Mr. Hardy was accompanied by Mr. George Worley, Information and Education Director for the Southwest Region of the U.S. Forest Service. Mr. Hardy had never visited the Smokey Bear Museum or Capitol before, and was interested in seeing the Museum's presentation of Smokey Bear to the public.
There is a law governing the use of the name Smokey Bear and his image. Perhaps the local citizens do not realize that there is such a law, its official name is: "Public Law 359, 82nd Session, s. 2322, An Act: Prohibiting the manufacture or use of the character 'Smokey Bear' by unauthorized persons". The Smokey Bear Museum was issued this special license several years ago. The two local commercial establishments in Carrizozo that use the name "Smokey Bear" have also been licensed and approved by the U.S.D.A.
Mr. Hardy's impression of the Museum was basically good. He mentioned the idea the museum was sound, but that the displays were definitely below standard. The responsibility for the Museum is, of course, in the hands of the people of Carrizozo. They created it, therefore they maintain the standards set forth by the law governing Smokey

At present, the Capitol responsibility is being shouldered by three individuals, Mrs. Hollis Cummins, Mrs. Gerald Dean, and Mrs. Richard Beaubien. It was pointed out to Mr. Hardy that these three (non-paid) individuals are doing the best they can with the facilities at their disposal. Lack of funds, other than those that meet the expenses of the Museum, is a handicap.
Mr. Hardy and Mr. Worley expressed sympathy for our problems and offered many constructive suggestions and helpful information. He explained the importance of the law, and the need to protect the image of Smokey Bear. Smokey is not just a local celebrity, but a national figure.
The items sold in the Museum, which cover the operating expenses, are purchased from manufacturers who have been issued a license by the USDA. Upon inspection of the merchandise, it was found that some items have come from non-licensed manufacturers. This infraction of the law by the Museum has already been corrected.
Mr. Hardy and Mr. Worley expressed concern over the substandard display material and expressed a desire to be of assistance. Their suggestion were very constructive and it is hoped that with their cooperation these ideas may materialize before the 1969 season. Mr. Worley has at his disposal an outside Smokey Bear display that he is willing to loan to the Museum for use during the 4th of July celebration, if transportation

from Albuquerque can be worked out.
Mrs. Richard Beaubien, representing the Trustees of the Museum, discussed many of the Museum problems with Mr. Hardy and Mr. Worley. Mrs. Terry Strickland, Museum employee, explained the displays and merchandise to the visitors. It is the hope of Mrs. Beaubien and Mrs. Strickland that a definite improvement of display material will be forthcoming as a result of the visit by these two gentlemen.
After Mr. Hardy and Mr. Worley's departure, Mrs. Cummins, Mrs. Dean and Mrs. Beaubien held a brief meeting to discuss the things that had been mentioned by Mr. Hardy and Mr. Worley. The ladies expressed their concern over the difficulties of improving the display, since they feel unable to handle an undertaking of this kind. If the assistance that the gentlemen mentioned is not forthcoming, the ladies discussed the possibility of changing the name from Smokey Bear Museum to Smokey Curio Shop. In order not to misrepresent Smokey Bear to the general public, Taxes were also discussed. The Museum pays sales tax to the State, plus Social Security, State and Federal withholding taxes from the wages of the employees, creating a burden of responsibility more complex each season. Hiring a full time paid Museum administrator, or closing the Museum as a solution to the problems, will be discussed at the February meeting with the Trustees.

Sewer rates go up in July

Carrizozo town council was short two members Tuesday night, Petty and May, and had a short meeting.
Bids on gasoline and diesel fuel were opened and the contract awarded to Continental Oil Co. of Capitan, gas at .2259, diesel fuel at .1189.
The town will advertise for bids on piping town hall and fire department building for natural gas.
The ordinance increasing sewer rates was read to the council by Attorney Elfred Jones. Residence sewer rates will be increased 50¢ per month. Hotels, motels, tourist and trailer courts rates will be 75¢ per unit. All business offices will pay \$2.50 per month. Restaurants, filling station, drug stores, garages, bars will pay \$3.50. Public institution such as court house will pay \$10 per month, hospital \$8, railroad \$2.50 and \$3.50. The complete ordinance will be published next week.
Willos Hill brought a complaint about outhouse near his property to the attention of the council. No action will be taken until ordinance is drawn.

\$8,000 grant to be given

The search for the first women to receive an \$8,000 grant from Alpha Delta Kappa International Honorary Sorority For Women Educators for a research project utilizing the arts and humanities for the benefit of mankind today has produced results unexpected in several ways, Ofelia Salas, Lincoln, New Mexico, president of ETA chapter here, said today.

"I have just been informed by Mrs. Jeanne Neal, coordinator of this program in our headquarters in Kansas City, that more than 250 requests for applications had been received by the first of this month and that the requests continue to come in steadily," Mrs. Salas said.

We know that the big problem would be to get the word of this research grant program to qualified women, women who have completed work for their master's degree. We certainly did not expect the number of inquiries we already have received. We been amazed by the vast range and value of the projects suggested to date.

Even more indicative of the need for this kind of assistance for research is the fact that quite a few men have requested applications, although our announcements have always specified our sponsorship is for women. We hope our pioneering work in this area will attract other sources of support for projects by both men and women.

Alpha Delta Kappa plans three \$8,000 grants, the first winner to be selected late this year. Subsequent winners will be selected in the next two bienniums. The sorority, founded in Kansas City 21 years ago, now has more than 1,200 chapters and about 35,000 members.





Cows get vitamins and tick eradicator

Cows and calves on the north part of I Bar X Ranch, operated by Kelly and Billy Stephenson, were rounded up last Saturday and on a hot Sunday these critters were put through the chutes for spring treatment.

The cows get a shot in each ear from oil can full of mixture of diesel oil and tick dope. This kills ticks in the critter's ears and keeps them free of ticks for maybe as much as two months. While Jerry Sidwell was applying the tick eradicator Billy Stephenson was applying the needle to each cow, giving them about 4 cc's of vitamin A, a practice followed on the I Bar X for several years and the Stephensons think it pays off nicely in better condition of the animal.

The young Herefords were getting the full treatment (all but one operation pictured here). With Paul Marquez holding the calves' head, Jerry Sidwell does an ear notching or marking job. Next Billy Stephenson nips the horn buds with a knife and then seals the wound with a gearing iron. At this same time Kelley Stephenson is giving the calf one of two shots it get, one for black-leg and another vitamin A shot.

Calves get the full treatment

The last thing the calves get is 'branded'. The I Bar X people use a single bar for branding iron and with a bit of artistry come up with neat brand. Marquez opens the gate of the branding chute and out comes a young Hereford, ready for a summer in high mountain country.

The price of vitamin A has gone down a lot according to ranch owner Kelley Stephenson. When he started it was around \$60 an ounce, and now sells around \$12. With a reasonably good year and the kind of care you see pictured here a Hereford weighing 350 pounds is expected to nearly double in weight during a season.

Note -- What were bulls in the making, come out of the branding chute as steers, a short and sweet maneuver the way Sidwell does it.

Bruce Sidwell and Leon Reed were helpers back in the pens keeping the cattle moving. At noon Sunday Mrs. Billy Stephenson and an old cowpoke named Claude Branum drove up with a chuckwagon full of food.






