A team composed of Harry Wugalter, chief public school finance division; Carl Whittemore, assistant to division chief; Enos Garcia, transportation; Bob Esparza, director of secondary education; and Al Garde, Title I representative; were in Carrizozo all day Tuesday hearing budgets prepared by Lincoln County school officials.

Also at this hearing were Ernest Vigil, liaison man for state board of education and local board of education and Grady Mayfield, member of state board of education.

Costs of fuel, parts and new equipment have increased without any increase in pay to operators, Wugalter said that he would recommend to the legislature that funds be increased for school bus operation, should be done by 1969.

Cox leases 66 station



Medicare helps

Mrs. Tilda Millegan

"I couldn't lay up enough when I worked, so Medicare has helped a lot," Mrs. Tilda Millegan, of Carrizozo, commented recently.

"I never had to worry about the doctor bills. I asked him about them, but he told me not to worry, that Medicare would take care of them," she said. "Also I had a hospital bill of \$471.89 and all I had to pay was \$40."

Mrs. Millegan was one of over seven and a half million persons whose hospital admission was paid for under the Social Security Hospital Insurance in the period since July 1, 1966. About 28 million medical bills have been paid, as well as over 40,000 admissions in Extended Care Facilities. Of course, each patient must pay the deductible amount—\$40 per spell of illness for hospitalization and \$50 per calendar year on the doctor bills and certain other medical expenses.

Although Medicare is a government program, New Mexico Blue Cross, under contract with the fiscal intermediary makes payment to the hospital. Mrs. Millegan understands that all information furnished to Social Security is confidential, but she has allowed us to tell her story to help others know of the benefits of Medicare.

McDonald papers go to state archives

The archives of the State of New Mexico are richer this year due to the work of University of New Mexico senior Steven McDonald Spencer.

Steve is the great-grandson of New Mexico's first governor after statehood, W.C. McDonald. He was raised on the family ranch at Carrizozo established by Gov. McDonald, and thus came into possession of a truckful of private papers and public documents from the McDonald administration, 1912-16.

"I started work on the papers in a government class under Prof. (Dorothy) Cline," Spencer said. "I went through them as far as I could, but I'll be graduating soon, so I turned them over to the state record center in Santa Fe."

"The collection, he said, contains speeches, proclamations, letter, campaign material and other files from his great-grandfather's term in office.

"The parallel between political issues of those days and issues today is amazing," Steve said. "The big issues then, as now, were things like education and roads and jobs."

Steve came to UNM after finishing high school and junior college at New Mexico Military Institute. To finance his education at UNM, he has driven a school bus for the Albuquerque public schools for the past three years.

Need of convention for revising or re-writing Constitution questioned

As the time approaches for holding an election on the proposition as to whether there should be a convention for revising or re-writing the State Constitution, the people of this State should be apprised of a few facts, namely:

1. The proponents who seeks a new constitution seem to have one main objective in mind; that is, to bring about a "short ballot" where no more than governor and lieutenant governor will be elected by the people.

2. The absentee ballot, so long sought by veterans' groups and the League of Women Voters, has been brought to New Mexico by an order of the Supreme Court and implementation of the court order has already been accomplished by a recent legislature, thus ending the time when New Mexico stood alone in denying its voters the use of the absentee ballot.

3. If a constitutional convention is called for by a majority of voters in the general election on November 5, 1968, there will be a procedure for holding that convention, to be prescribed by the Legislature of 1969.

4. Once the delegates to the convention have been elected and assembled, they will be given large dockets of the conclusions of the "constitutional review commission" which, has, in fact, been writing a new constitution for the past several years and their conclusions will be kept before the convention, so far as possible, to the exclusion of any other views on constitutional government.

5. The plan of the "constitutional review commission" revolves around the principle

that the people should have as little as possible to do with the selection of state officials, only the governor and the lieutenant governor, are to be elected on the state level. All other functionaries, both judicial and executive, on the state level, would be appointed by, and serve at the pleasure of the governor, in some cases, with the approval of the State Senate.

6. The people, then, would let their will be felt only through the governor, whom they would choose once each four years, if this provision is adopted by the voters. The will of the people would have to permeate a maze of state governmental channels to reach the controlling state official whose screen against public scrutiny and reaction would, on the other hand, be the maze of governmental channels back through the governor.

7. The approach toward a new (for New Mexico) concept of constitutional government, would be nothing more than the imposition upon this state of the present federal system with its countless bureaus and program entanglements. Here, the President and the Congress have completely lost control of the cancerous growth of governmental functions and objectives, and the bureaus have completely taken over the bureaus, where original purposes are sometimes lost.

8. Can New Mexico afford such a government of its own, and still do its share to support the top-heavy federal government?

Triviz cleans court docket

The Honorable David F. Cargo, Governor of the State of New Mexico, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87501

Dear Governor Cargo:
In accordance with, and for the reasons indicated in, my previously announced intentions, I herewith tender my resignation as District Judge, Division One, Third Judicial District, effective at the close of business at the end of this month. So that the records may be accordingly noted and I may be taken off the payroll by the end of this month, I am sending a copy of this to Chief Justice Chavez, the Clerk of our Supreme Court, the Court Administrator, and other personnel noted. On July 1st, I am entering private practice.

May I add that while I did not get to complete my term, nevertheless I sought to give as much service as possible during my tenure. By the end of June, I will have been in office nineteen months, and except for a month (during July, 1967) that I was in attendance at the National College of State Trial Judges in Philadelphia, I have been on duty every day, including Saturdays. By the end of April, 1968, my records show that I had disposed of 3,500 cases; and by the end of June, 1968, it is estimated that I will have closed 3,800 cases, including juvenile cases. For in this county, I personally handled all juvenile cases, and in the juvenile field, I have sought to make as wide a use as possible of local resources, volunteers (and groups organized for possible establishment of a half-way house); in short to strengthen our probation and Court procedures. On out-of-district assignments, I have undertaken to act -- and if possible -- to dispose of any matters within a month after designation -- unless prevented by the parties not being ready or some other good reason. For I truly believe that justice delayed is justice denied. Necessarily, this has required working Saturdays and most Sundays, for trial preparation.

So as I leave office, I hope it may be said that I was of some service, and that all of us will have been better off for the experience.





SECTION 2. All other sections of Chapter 4 of the Carrizozo Municipal Code not herein amended are continued with full force and effect.

RCA gets contract



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
