The next meeting of the South Central Mountain Resource Area Steering Committee has been set for July 16 at the Desert Aire in Alamogordo, starting time 7:30.

### Halsten At Vaughn

Robert R. Bell is the new committee chairman, elected at the June 18 meeting held in Carrizozo. Bell accepted the chair from A.T. Pfingsten who has served since the start of the organization.

Four new project proposals were presented and accepted at the Carrizozo meeting as follows:

#23 - Silt Removal from Stock Tanks - Motion to accept by Raymond Binayon, Second by

Bonnell - passed.  
#24 - Wildlife Enclosure at Valley of Fire State Park - Motion to accept by Bell, second by Pfingsten - passed.  
#25 - Road Improvement from Bluewater to Pinon, motion to accept by Gage, Seconded by Faulkner - passed.

#26 - Extend State Road 521 designation at Sacramento by four miles - Motion to accept by Gage, seconded by Faulkner.  
Other business included discussion of projects. A meeting will be set up with Kenneth L. Towle, highway commissioner. Trespass laws from several states to be reviewed. Designs completed on Maxwell ditch and started on Casey ditch, Ruidoso

Watershed has been submitted to SCS planning staff. Irrigation study is under way in Ruidoso, Hondo and Bonito Creek. Funding and water rights are being investigated on the Capitan Lake.

Rosalio Ditch is complete and bids will be opened soon on Tularosa Ditch. Planning party is working on Texas side of Dell Valley Watershed. W.F. Barker of Producers' Livestock Marketing Ass'n. was guest speaker who outlined how the organization works and advantages to livestock growers.



### Welcome for Fighter Wing

Lieutenant Governor E. Lee Francis will represent the State of New Mexico at welcoming ceremonies for the 49th Tactical Fighter Wing at Holloman Air Force Base on Monday, July 15. Nationally prominent military figures planning to attend the ceremonies will include: General James Ferguson, commander, Air Force Systems Command; Lieutenant General Albert P. Clark, vice commander, Tactical Air Command; and Major General Charles R. Bond Jr. commander, 12th Air Force.  
The public is also invited to attend the welcoming ceremonies which will take place at the Holloman Main Area flight line. The ceremonies are scheduled to begin at 2:30 p.m., when the first contingent of six F-4D Phantom II aircraft is due to arrive. The jets will have flown non-stop from their operational base at Spangdahlem, Germany, to Holloman, using mid-air refueling enroute.  
Also open to the public at 3 p.m. will be the tour of the 49th Tactical Fighter Wing facilities. The wing's redeployment to Holloman will result in a significant economic impact on the surrounding area with more than \$18 million being added to the \$60 million in annual payroll already being paid to Holloman AFB personnel. In addition, more than \$2.4 million in military construction is under way at Holloman as a result of the redeployment of the 49th.







Wendell Faught writes "Plain talk" column for Deming Graphic, following "Lament to the New Midnight Sun" by Tough Riggs is from his column:

'Down here in the land of the midnight sun... What was twenty to twelve is now twenty to one... We arise from our beds in the moonlight's glow... Then wait around hours to hear the cock crow.

'Our dinner is eaten at six by the clock... Then four hours later the wife gets a shock... All the children troop in from the settling sun's head... Yelling, 'Hey Ma, we're hungry; Yeah, when do we eat?'

'To the partial abstainer who won't drink 'til noon... Our newer time system should prove quite a boon... For no matter what hour the poor soul awakes... He may start somewhat sooner to get over the shakes.

'And the five o'clock tippler finds the newer time fruitful... By the time the sun sets, he should have quite a snoot full... But for those who drink mornings, at night time and noon... Well, the two o'clock closing 's one hour too soon.

'There are those who say no one does ought about weather... Well, our Congress may add to their caps this one feather... They gave us the shaft like an old time harpooner... When they started the sand storms a full hour sooner.'

Today the Absent Voter Act will become law in New Mexico. At last, and through the efforts of many individuals genuinely interested in government by the people, New Mexico has a complete absentee ballot. As Secretary of State, I am gratified that this has been accomplished and that we are now catching up with our sister States.

Any registered qualified elector of New Mexico, who cannot be present at his voting division's polling place on election day because of his duties, occupation, business, vacation, illness, injury or disability shall be entitled to vote as an absent voter for all questions and candidates appearing on the ballot.

Application for an absent voter's ballot shall be made in person or by mail to the office of the County Clerk of the county in which the applicant is registered not less than ten days by mail or three days in person before any Primary, General or Special Election.

Absentee ballots are provided for members of the Armed Forces; Federal Employees serving outside the territorial limits of the United States and their spouses, and dependents residing with or accompanying them; and members of Religious Groups and Welfare Agencies who are assisting members of the Armed Forces, without permanent registration.

Federal postcard application for absent voter's ballots for the Federal non-registered voters may be obtained from the Voting Officer on a Military Base or from the County Clerk. Application must be received by the County Clerk of the county of residence at least 15 days prior to the election in which the voter offers to cast his ballot.

An Absent Voter Ballot will be mailed by the County Clerk as soon as available. Voted ballot must reach County Clerks no later than noon of the day before the election.

**Pat Garrett left Louisiana for big west**  
PEOPLE in Haynesville, Louisiana, say this is the homestead where Pat Garrett, famed Lincoln County sheriff, who gunned down Billy the Kid shortly after the Lincoln County War, discovered the world and spent the first few years.  
It was from this place that Garrett told Louisiana adios, and rode away to the Big West, for more fame that fortune, as it turned out, a life that terminated in plight and murder.  
Today, Mrs. H.C. Nelson, occupies the old Garrett homeplace. The colonial home burned a few years back. This one replaced it.

The gracious oaks and magnolia trees, however, are original, a beautiful setting in the Haynesville corporation limits. The little town is rich in oil and early oil-boom history. It could be as justly named Garrettsville, for many Garretts live here.  
Mrs. Nelson was formerly Mrs. C.T. Garrett, who was the son of John T. Garrett, a brother of the famed Lincoln County sheriff.


