Nogal PO first opened for business May 1880

The Nogal postoffice was originally known as Galena having been established under that name on November 4, 1880 with George Wellford as its first postmaster. On May 9, 1882 the name was changed from Galena to Nogal. Galena means native lead sulfide and was derived from mining operations in that vicinity. The Nogal means walnut and came from the black walnut trees that grew in Nogal Canyon.

Tax records accuracy up-dated

Lincoln County is taking bids on addressing equipment this week which is expected to improve the accuracy of tax work throughout the courthouse. This equipment uses a metal plate which, once property or anything that goes on the tax roll is typed on the plate, will print tax rendition, tax rolls and tax receipts.

Name and address of property holders, land description will go on the metal plates and will not be changed unless the description or other taxable property changes.

The plates will be made up in the assessor's office, then proofread for accuracy. Changes if needed can be made before the plates are used.

The clerk's office can use the addressing equipment for registration lists, and these can be kept up to date real easy with the plate system.

The changeover should be complete in time for the 1969 renditions. Reappraisal is expected to be complete by 1969 and the new information will go on the plates. The equipment is to be used by all county offices that have use for it.

Carrizozo Municipal hospital doing well

The board of directors of Lincoln County Municipal Hospital at Carrizozo met for its quarterly session Monday noon at the hospital. Present were Mrs. A.N. Spencer chairman, Johnson Stearns secretary, Bill Edgar and Dimmit Bond members, Dr. A.N. Spencer, and Alton Whittaker administrator and Paul Payton.

The comparison of figures for 66-67 fiscal year with 67-68 shows that the hospital served 992 out-patients a year ago when there were two doctors in Carrizozo and during the past year served 885 out-patients with only one doctor on the staff.

Accounts receivable are being held under good control, with only a small increase in this total figure over a year ago. By law monies owing to the hospital are carried on the books from the first day the hospital did business. In February of 1950, the accounts receivable amount to \$51,103.59. A year ago this figure was 49,227.98. Whittaker said he thought collections had been going good, that most unpaid bills were left by people from out-of-town. Travelers in car wrecks and then hospitalized are a bad risk for the hospital, they leave large sums of money owing.

Room fees were increased slightly a year ago so that billings for in-patients are up nicely over the 66-67 fiscal year and room fees in the Carrizozo hospital are still lower than in any hospital of this area.

A semi-private room at Carrizozo costs \$20 per day, based pretty much on amount of insurance allowed. A private room costs \$25 per day. The difference between semi-private and private rooms in the Carrizozo hospital amounts to difference in distance to bathroom. Room rates at Ruidoso are \$32.50 per day.

Billings for in-patients in 66-67 amounted to \$44,916.83 this amount went up to \$48,890.22. The hospital now has private phones in most rooms thanks to Pat Dunning who spent some time in the hospital and paid \$765.61 to have the system installed. The operating fund is in the black thanks to the Spencer family.

The board discussed at length the possibilities of adding extended care or nursing home service to the present hospital. All the board members were in agreement that whatever is done should be done with present staff including doctor, administrator, nurses, cooks, and custodians. The answers as to what could be done with the Carrizozo hospital making use of federal money or medicare were not known and several of the members will inquire as to how other hospitals are handling their nursing home situation.

Mrs. Spencer said that the small hospital in Springer had worked out a nursing arrangement for small number of people and this had put the Springer hospital in the black and it was her desire that the Carrizozo hospital do what is necessary to make it self supporting. She was not interested in construction of nursing home which would require another doctor (not available), administrator or staff or nurses, it would just be an added burden to the town and county. She was complimentary to the management of the Carrizozo hospital.

Carrizozo hospital now receives from medicare \$125 for each \$100 in bills sent to this agency because of the formula used and fact that the hospital operates in the red.

A new furnace has been installed, and almost ready to use. The old furnace is still serviceable and the two can be used singly or double in coldest weather.

He will represent commissioner district one if elected. Charlie is Roswell Chapter 18 member of Lodge. He is campaigning on the Democratic ticket.




Charlie A. Jones

Max Oliver seeks representative job

Max Oliver, a resident of Ruidoso Downs, is seeking election as state representative on the Republican ticket. The Oliver family operates the Mitchell Motel and Restaurant, one of the busiest places in the Downs. Only one other motel family has lived in the Ruidoso area longer than the Oliver family.

Mr. Oliver will complete four years of service as Lincoln County commissioner this year and was chairman of this board during his first two-year term. He has a good background of experience in government.

Before moving to Lincoln County Mr. Oliver was mayor of Balmorhea, Texas for six years, and has served as mayor protem of the Village of Ruidoso Downs, also on the zoning and planning committee for this town.

Max is a 20-year member of Lions International, has served as director of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Chamber of Commerce. The Olivers are members of the Methodist Church.

Oliver told the News he expected to campaign vigorously in Sierra County as well as in Lincoln County right on up to the primary election August 27.



An unusual request received last week from the New Mexico Genealogical Society, P.O. Box 8734, Albuquerque 87108, asking that we inform our readers about a service performed by this society, that of printing in its quarterly report as many cemetery records as people will send in -- the letter states, "Whatever the circumstances, many of these graves or the records will be completely lost in a few years and the chance to record them will be gone. We are appealing to any of your readers who will take the time to copy the records on tombstones and send them to us along with information as to where the graves are located".

A welfare department application had this choice sentence, "I am forwarding my marriage certificate and three children, one of which is a mistake as you can see".

While considering political candidates, use this measuring rod -- The political mechanism enforces conformity. If 51 percent vote for more highways, all 100 percent will have to pay for them. If 51 percent vote against highways, all 100 percent must go without them.

Contrast this with the market mechanism, if 25 percent want to buy cars, they can, each at his own expense. The other 75 percent neither get nor pay for them. Where products are separable, the market system enables each person to get what he votes for. There can be unanimity without conformity. No one has to submit.

A specific problem often can be resolved by a law--generally one that imposes costs on some to benefit others. But along this road, there is no end to demands. These will inevitably call for more than the total of the nation's resources--however ample they may be.

Johnnie Annarotone out in his business lot at Capitan with a pitchfork picking up bits of trash is one reason why this place always looks neat and their yard as beautiful as any in Lincoln County.

Capitan people serving tourists, Irene Rentfro, Miles Williams, Herman and Toni Otero, Mariano Garcia, report more traffic than usual and business is good. Maybe due in part to the highway construction down in the valley. Max Oliver, in the motel and restaurant business in Ruidoso Downs, adds to this report by saying that the season in his town is terrific.

A January 1967 traffic flow map of New Mexico shows that quite a few more vehicles cross the intersection of US54 and US380 at Carrizozo -- than travel the interstate highway from San Antonio south, Both 54 and 380 carry a good load of traffic and at the point of intersection the total mounts up.

Paul and Eleanor attended "welcome" ceremonies Monday at Holloman AFB for the first six planes of the 49th tactical fighter wing. We'll see more jets in the air over this area when all 72 of the F-4D Phantom II fighters arrive from Germany, also, some of the \$18 million in payroll being added ought to get up this way 3rd or 4th handed when the 6,000 additional people arrive, the number expected later in the year.





Stray raccoon stages sit-in

Cut down the raccoon's tree, and he may nest in the nearest draft pipe. Fill his cornfields with housing developments, and he may raid somebody's kitchen.

The mischeivous mammal with a black mask often is the first to call on suburbanites. Uninitiated newcomers to a neighborhood have been appalled to discover what appeared to be footprints of toddlers near overturned garbage cans.

Raccoons enjoy cities as well as suburbs. Not long ago, a stray coon staged a sit-in on a second story ledge of the Treasury Department. Finally the animal jumped to the ground, and led frustrated rescuers on a merry chase through downtown Washington, D.C.

Raccoons will eat almost anything, however. A pampered coon that found human friends in suburban Cleveland thrived on liver sausage, ice cream, cake, and candy bars.

Raccoons fatten themselves for the winter months but do not hibernate. In cold country, they take long naps, their ring-tails curled over sharp muzzles and black button noses.

In spite of periodic depredations, the common raccoon, Procyon lotor, still roams much of North America from southern Canada to Panama.

The attractive little animal appeared in American literature and lore at an early date. Captain John John Smith wrote in 1612, "There is a beast they

call Aroughcum, much like the badger, but vseth to live on trees as Squirrels doe."

Pioneers used coonskins in barter. In the old State of Franklin, now eastern Tennessee money was so scarce that officials were paid in pelts. The governor's secretary received an annual salary of 500 coonskins.

Few animals are more cunning or curious than the raccoon, the National Geographic Society say. Some scientists rank raccoons next to monkeys and chimpanzees in intelligence.

A Maryland veterinarian supports the view. He found a raccoon with a broken jaw waiting at his hospital door one morning. After treating the self-admitted patient, the Marylander adopted him as a pet.

"You could get indigestion eating an animal as smart as this one," the vet said.

When pursued by dogs, coons employ many ruses, such as tapping a tree with forepaws to leave a scent or swimming a creek to break a trail. Recalls a veteran hound-dog man: "I have stood near an old coon while he looked down from his tree on a pack of dogs that couldn't harm him, and I swear he grinned and grinned and grinned."

Mother raccoons teach their young -- they usually arrive in groups of four or five -- to hunt, climb, fish, and outwit the enemies. Nocturnal by nature, coons prow about the banks of ponds and streams, hunting for frogs, crayfish, crabs, oysters, insects, or berries. Green corn is a special seasonal treat.

Roundup

 Fifteen Lincoln County 4-H members will be among 500 senior 4-H club members from 29 counties at the 4-H Conference at New Mexico State University July 28th - August 2. Ceal Pacheco, Carol Davidson, Joe Winchester, and Mitch Tyree along with 130 4-H'ers will attend the Teen Leader Conference to develop leadership talents.

The conference will officially open July 29 and the keynote speaker will be Mrs. Jean Shaeffer, 4-H and Youth Development program leader with the Federal Extension Service. Dr. Roger B. Corbett, NMSU president, will welcome the group Wednesday night followed by a get acquainted mixer.

On Thursday, August 1, Lincoln County 4-H'ers will compete for state honors in Livestock Judging, Dress Revue, Range Plant Judging and Home Economics presentation. Those competing are: Carol Cooper, John Davis, Dan Knight, Scott Shafer, Gordon Parham, Pete Gnatkowski, and Cristina Pacheco. Thursday's program will also include a trip to White Sands and a box cupper. A recognition program and dinner will be held Friday and awards will be presented to state winners in the various contests.

A cattle chute could be called the rancher's right hand man. A chute with a suitable head gate or squeeze for holding cattle is a key piece of equipment on any ranch.

In choosing a location for the chute, make sure the area is well drained and conveniently located in the corrals so that cattle may be handled rapidly. Be sure there are no sharp edges or projecting boards that will bruise or cripple the animal. It has been estimated that bruise damage in the U.S. amounts to over \$25 million a year.

A squeeze gate can be used along the corral fence to guide the animals into the chute. The chute should be 20 to 25 feet long in order to accommodate three or four animals. Most cattlemen prefer a chute 36 inches wide at the top tapering to 14 inches wide at the bottom with five to 5 1/2 foot sloping side walls. With a tapered chute, all ages of stock are less apt to turn around. The sides of the working chute should be boarded solid, 24 to 30 inches above ground. A walkway on the outside will complete the chute.

Many pesticides can be just as toxic to honey bees and other beneficial insects as they are to harmful insects. Since honey bees play a major role in pollinating crops, it is necessary that we do our utmost to safeguard them from hazardous sprays and dusts. To avoid contamination, it is suggested that pesticides not be applied during periods of plant bloom. Treatment when bees are foraging in the field may also be dangerous because of wind drift. Bees sometimes forage as far as two miles from the colony, so beekeepers in the vicinity should be notified before spraying hazardous materials. Caution should also be taken in dumping pesticides when spray operations are concluded. Since bees frequently drink from small surfaces pesticide puddles can be dangerous invitations.

Minor or trace elements are required by plants in very small or trace amounts. Of the fourteen minor nutrients known at present, iron (Fe) and zinc (Zn) are of greatest concern to homeowners. A deficiency of one or both of these nutrients produces certain deficiency symptoms in lawns, ornamentals, and gardens. Iron deficiency or chlorosis is a condition that appears when the green coloring matter in plants, chlorophyll,

fails to develop. Leaves of chlorotic plants change from light green to yellow in color. Control of iron chlorosis requires a soil or foliar application of a soluble form of iron. To control iron chlorosis use iron sulfate (coppers) or iron chelate according to the directions on the label. These chemicals are available from nurseries and fertilizer dealers. Zinc deficiency has been known for many years as "rosette" on pecan trees. Typical deficiency symptoms are: a shortening of the internodes on pecans, giving an appearance of "rosette"; and the development of a broad band of yellow or white on both sides of the midrib in grasses.

Zinc deficiency can be controlled by a soil or foliar application of zinc sulfate or zinc chelate. As in the case of iron chemicals, zinc should be applied according to the directions on the container label.


