

Gampbell at state fair Friday through Sunday

Glen Campbell, a one-time Albuquerque entertainer who is now a top record and TV star, will headline the all-star rodeo in Tingley Coliseum at the 1968 New Mexico State Fair on Friday through Sunday, Sept. 20-22.

Born in Deight, Arkansas, Glen's musical career began at the age of four when his father bought him his first musical instrument, a Sears and Roebuck guitar. By the time he was six, Glen had become a musical child prodigy, singing and strumming his guitar on radio shows over a three-state area.

While still in his teens he came to Albuquerque to live with his uncle, Dick Billie, who was then a star on KOB radio and television. Glen was featured with Billie's band, then later formed his own group which toured the area for many years.

On the urging of friends, he took a crack at Hollywood, and started recording, first with an independent label. Later he was discovered by Capitol Records and signed to a seven-year contract. His first Capitol waxing, "Too Late to Worry - Too Blue to Cry" made the best seller lists.



Gold really grows on trees

Gold, unlike green money, really does grow on trees. Tissues of aspens, firs, willows, and some other plants hold tiny but measurable amounts of the precious metal. One of the best goldbearers is the horsetail. Though extraction is so expensive that the plants cannot be profitably used as a source of ore, some prospectors believe the presence of certain gold-bearing plants in an area serves as a clue to the location of big deposits in gravel or loess.

Oddly enough, the monarch of all metals is found, at least in minute amounts, almost everywhere in the world, the National Geographic Society says. Potomac Gold Fever

Scientists of the Interior Department's Geological Survey recently struck gold in the excavation for a new expressway in downtown Washington, D. C. The find was no bonanza; the construction gravel contained only 60 to 90 cents' worth of gold in every ton of dirt.

Far richer veins of gold, however, once supported a gold mine industry near the Nation's Capital. A small museum in Potomac, Maryland, perpetuates the history of the Maryland Gold Mine which yielded more than \$150,000 in gold from 1867 to 1940, when it was closed.

Although the American West has provided most of the Nation's gold, sizable nuggets have been found in such unlikely places as Maine, Massachusetts, and Michigan.

Surprisingly, Georgia, not California, was the scene of America's first major gold rush. Some 10,000 prospectors invaded the mountains of north Georgia in 1828, founded a string of roaring frontier towns, and mined so much gold that by 1838 the government had opened a branch mint there.

The gold-rush capital, Dahlonega, took its name from a Cherokee Indian word meaning "yellow metal."

Gold fever has flared up, at one time or another, in nearly every part of the world from Afghanistan to Zambia. The lure of gold triggered the exploration of the American and sped settlement of California, the Yukon, Alaska, Australia, and New Zealand. At one time, gold mining rivaled sugar as the national industry of the Fiji Islands.

Skindiving Sourdoughs There's even gold in them thar waters. Modern forty-niners, using snorkels instead of sluices, hunt for fortunes in the rivers of California and Alaska.

The gold is usually of the placer variety, jarred loose from veins by a swift stream and carried by water to resting gravel deposits. One lucky prospector reportedly picked up \$300 worth of gold nuggets in three days. "But there's one big difference between the forty-niners and us," says a skindiving sourdough. "We take a lot more baths."



Few things can cost you your home and one or more of your family more quickly and tragically than fire. Resolve to make your home a fire safe home. A home safe from fire, depends on two important factors: good family habits about fire and its hazards, and good construction.

Good family habits include such things as care with matches and smoking, good housekeeping to get rid of rubbish, proper use of electrical fuses, appliances, and extension cords, and a constant general awareness of the ways fires start and how to avoid them.

Good construction for a fire safe home includes: Build-in fire stops. These are barriers of wood or masonry between studs, joists, rafters or stringers that serve to prevent the spread of smoke and fire. Solid doors for every room. An ordinary wooden door can keep smoke and fire out of a room for as long as 30 minutes.

Good escape routes. Best exits lead directly outside, not through other rooms. Windows should be large enough and low enough to climb through, and operate easily enough for the youngest member of the family.

Interior finish of materials with low flame-spread characteristics. Wallboards made of gypsum, cement, asbestos and similar materials are noncombustible and resist flame spread. Fire-resistant roofing material, such as asphalt shingles, slate, asbestos or metal. Wood shingles never should be used as a roof covering.

More beef comes from selective breeds

The purpose of cattle improvement is to increase profits, reports a New Mexico State University professor in his new publication, "Range Cattle Improvement."

The second issue in the Memoir Series, published by the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, is written by Professor Emeritus John H. Knox of the Animal Science Department. It is designed to help the cattle producer in selecting, classifying, breeding, and producing a better cattle crop.

"Through selective breeding, cattlemen can produce more beef per cow, step up the efficiency of their herds, and improve the selling price of their cattle," "Fortunately, the rancher, feeder, and packer all want cattle which make -- fast and efficient gains and produce carcasses without excessive fat," he writes. "If a breeder raises the kind of cattle which do well for him he

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
