## Cable TV sees ghosts at town meeting

An angry standing-room-only crowd of TV watchers came to town meeting Tuesday night to let Color Cable TV of Ruidoso know they were real unhappy with service, interference and didn't like the looks of the people too well either.

It was that kind of a meeting, with plenty of valid grounds for complaints the watchers called the cable people everything but bad names and probably were thinking plenty of those.

The ground work for this trouble goes back to original installation of cable service in Carrizozo when some materials were not up to par, that coupled with problem of keeping good service men on the job, a big summer of work in Ruidoso, maintenance sags in Carrizozo, some vandalism and wind (not nearly as bad as talked at the meeting) all put together present a serious problem.

From the numerous complaints it seemed certain that cable TV lines do cause interference with television reception by antenna. Any number of people testified that with cable power turned off, as was done several times, their antenna reception immediately improved.

In addition, Channel 13 sends poor signal into Carrizozo, even the cable tower has trouble with rolling on this station, Channel 7 real good most of the time, Channel 4 fair to good.

Another area of trouble is lack of qualified service people in town, bad communication between cable company and local people, the fact that reception is going to be poor on either antenna or cable some days when people are ready to blame the handiest source, makes out a bad case for the other guy, cable TV people in this instance.

Mayor Johnson-Sleas opened the meeting by inviting comments, many of which follow:

Gladney, They came to my house, cut off cable, admitted my picture was perfect, said they found trouble but picture did not clear up.

Elizabeth, We asked them to disconnect cable, they didn't. Bill, I rolled up that cable line hung it on the fence, could see picture clear up as I went back.

Gladney, they put out pamphlets to solve all our problems, none solved.

Buster, I said cable will affect antenna reception but went along with franchise. Cable people have got to correct trouble or franchise revoked.

Paul, He came to my house year ago, turned off cable, admitted to me that cable was causing trouble, have not had good reception since cable went down alley.

Floyd, Channel 13 has two ghosts all day on cable.

Cora, You cleared up trouble, it came back second time. Repairman informed me only way to cure trouble was to go on cable, I have ghosts on 4 also.

Wayland, I refused to pay cable bill several months because they would not come to repair trouble.

Dale, I can't get cable people to help trouble.

Joyita, who left this note on my door, they can see antenna.

Bill, I had TV 20 years, never

had ghosts before, Herbert, Been here 30 years, first I heard of Red Canyon causing trouble.

Wayland, when cable was first installed it was just like a picture show.

Dale, we have no picture on 4 and 13 now, tonight, I've called cable people several times.

Fred, thanks for one thing, we have four sets of ball players. Angelina, real bad trouble on my set.

Max, Cable people said it was my set, I bought new set, still have no picture.

Jack, not on cable, have no complaints, I wonder why.

Welcome, there are ghosts on our TV.

Herman, lots of double pictures.

Erlina, I have new set, just as bad as old one.

Elfred (atty. for town), should seem evident to you there's something wrong.

There are too many complaints. The council will have to do something, if you can't make a change the council will have to revoke franchise.

There was big demand that test be made at once, about 9:30 p.m. Tuesday, with Fred Volquardson, cable TV manager asking for later test date and crowd yelling him down.

Councilman Petty put in word that testing tonight would not prove anything that has not already been proved by testimony, test time was set up for night of October 9, this action by motion of the council.

The council concluded its meeting with re-appointment of Jeto Voss to serve another term on the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas board of directors, and Fred Vega to serve on recreation committee. ## BankAmericard is explained

At a meeting in the Four Winds last week Dan King and Herb Bruhn from the Security Bank and Trust of Alamogordo talked to a room full of people about use of the BankAmericard in this area.

With this card a person can go anywhere, buy anything and do anything on the credit of a Bank Americard. Right now 1650 merchants in Albuquerque, 150 in Alamogordo, 40 in Ruidoso, and 30 merchants in Vaughn accept the card for credit purposes.

BankAmericard was originated by the Bank of America in California and developed over a period of 11 years, one of the greatest things to come to banking in recent years, said Mr. King.

This credit system was started in New Mexico in July with nine banks. Now there are 26 banks making use of the cards.

## Zozo rolls Lordsburg

Carrizozo, playing its last season in class B, has shown the people that it can compete in that league. Zozo lost its season opener to Ruidoso 27-0 but came back the following week and tied Tularosa 13-13, then beat the Class C Capitan 52-6 and last Friday night the Grizzlies stunned the 8th ranked Lordsburg 37-13. The Grizzlies have two more district ball games, one with T or C and the other with Hatch, Nelmer Hatch or T or C have lost a ball game this year.

In Friday nights contest the grizzlies took advantage of the mistakes the Lordsburg team made and turned three of the mistakes into touchdowns.

Carrizozo was able to score in the second quarter after a sluggish first quarter showing that once the offense began to click the Grizzlies showed poise and ball control the remainder of the game.

The Grizzlies punched the ball over the Lordsburg goal line early in the second quarter when quarterback Danny Monreal found a hole off tackle and bulled 5 yards for the first touchdown. The P.A.T. kick by Sam Vega was blocked.

The second Carrizozo touchdown came after Ben Stuteville picked up a Lordsburg pass on the Grizzlies 28 yard line. Carrizozo then moved the ball 72 yards in 9 plays to score their second TD on an eight yard sweepy sophomore Fullback Ray Roper. The outstanding play during the 72 yard drive was a 28 yard pass play from Danny Monreal to Ray Roper. The point after was unsuccessful and the Grizzlies led at half time 12-0.



An abundant supply of apples are readily available in the Hondo Valley. They are now at their peak of quality. The varieties available in quantity are Golden Delicious, Jonathan, Red Delicious, Stamea Winesap, and Rome Beauty. The quality is excellent as the growers generally have sprayed timely enough to kill the codling moth. For general home use the Golden Delicious and Jonathan is a sweet apple and the Jonathan is a slightly tart apple. They can be used in salads, pie and baked as well as eaten out of hand.

Apple hour can be a bedtime snack - the perfect ending for a busy fall day. For hungry youngsters, a tasty apple will tide them over until dinner.

What better way to spotlight National Apple Week, Oct. 9-19, than by pleasing the family with lots of apples and apple dishes?

- Try Apple Coffee Cake
- 2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg
- 1 cup milk
- 4 tablespoons melted shortening
- 2 cups peeled, sliced apples
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 tablespoon butter

Sift flour, the measure. Add baking powder, sugar and salt. Sift into mixing bowl. Beat egg, add milk and melted shortening. Then add egg mixture to dry ingredients and mix thoroughly. Pour into 8x9 inch lightly greased pan. Peel and slice apples. Arrange in rows on top and press lightly into dough. Combine the sugar and cinnamon and sprinkle over the top. Dot with butter. Bake at 375 degrees F. for 35 to 40 minutes.


