Message from Santa Fe is - re-appraisal suit is stalled

Lincoln County Commissioner Max Oliver was in Santa Fe Friday with county officials from all over the state attending a finance board meeting where the discussion centered on assessment ratio for the state.

Nelson has never been served with any papers in Santa Fe, so that the board can take no action.

Commissioner Oliver spoke for the 14 counties now using 33-1/3 percent, other speakers represented counties assessing around 25 percent and counties wanting a low rate, down to 16 percent, were heard from.

The immediate need is to acquire from Nelson all records of work done on re-appraisal of Lincoln County so that a new firm can take over the job and complete the re-appraisal. The district attorney is dragging his feet, reason not known.

It was Oliver's opinion that the 33-1/3 ratio would probably prevail.

The finance board meets in November and is anxious to have Nelson's records at that meeting so that some action may be taken.

Meeting with Haskel Smith, member of state finance board, on re-appraisal of Lincoln County, Oliver learned that although the district attorney has filed a suit against Lon E. Nelson Asso-

Oliver recommended to county officials and the state board that the state go on the 33-1/3 ratio. Propping down below that figure would work a real hardship on Lincoln County.

The paving from Angus to Nogal has been postponed year after year and it is a disgrace that tourists coming into a state recreational area, some with house and horse trailers, anticipating a paved highway which is shown on some maps as paved are surprised and disgusted to find that they have to endure such a difficult road as this is. In addition to being rough and dusty, this highway is almost impassible when wet, due to the slippery mud.

During the past year the residents of Carrizozo and Ruidoso, while transacting business have found it necessary to travel on Highway 40 via Capitan in order to stay on pavement which is approximately sixteen miles longer for the round trip, thereby adding additional time as well as inconvenience.

Ruidoso owes its prosperity to the tourist trade and in order to take care of the anticipated increase of the future tourist travel, we feel that the improvement of highway 37 is imperative.

It is high time that needed improvements should be accomplished by justification and not further delayed by political influence of a few old worn out Bull Dozers who have temper tantrums each time this highway is about to be improved, disregarding the financial improvement that this highway will bring to both Carrizozo and Ruidoso, plus the convenience of a Good Highway.

I believe that investors have and are investing money in resort properties between Nogal and Angus than any other part of the state since the new survey has been going on, thinking that the highway is coming through, this time. We were not encouraged too much in Santa Fe two weeks ago.

Gentlemen we urge you to give this matter your most careful consideration. Write to our Governor and ask for his support of this greatly needed improvement. The preliminary of the planning and engineering has been accomplished, the utilities are being moved, and now we should all see to it that no political maneuvering shall delay, hinder, or stop the completion of this Highway 37. Let us all give it our hand.

Springer head snafus Sierra

Recent publicity has concerned recommendation of Glenn Walker, superintendent of the Boys School at Springer, that Sierra Blanca Forestry Camp be closed as economy measure. Walker did not know at the time he made this recommenda-

tion to the new institutional board that he would not be hired to head up the combination of Springer Boys Home, Girls Welfare Home in Albuquerque, and two forest camps at Eagle Nest and Fort Stanton. The Springer board of direc-

tors gave orders to Walker in June to strengthen the Sierra Blanca Forest Camp at Fort Stanton, and there has been no intent at any time to weaken or close this camp. The recent publicity about closing camp at Fort Stanton has roots in origin of this camp for

boys, all coming from the Springer Boys home. The Springer superintendent was not in sympathy with the move and has not accepted the idea for what it is, and what people think who are working with juveniles -- one of the best programs in the state.






