Church dedication is impressive service

With a beautiful new church full of people, an excellent service with fine singing and speaking, the First Baptist Church in Capitan was dedicated Sunday afternoon.

Mrs. Joe Shafer played a prelude, then invocation was given by H.T. Fillingim. The hymn singing was as fine as will be heard at any time in Lincoln County. Verlin Prince extended a welcome to the many visitors and had members of the Baptist congregation stand up to be recognized for their work in building the church.

Special music was furnished by Larry Miller, a guest pastor from Las Cruces. The choir sang well under direction of Mrs. Bill Jenkins.

Prof. W.C. Ribble, guest speaker, had a fine message for all people in the church, centered on the thought that this new church should be intended to proclaim the gospel of Christ.

Prof. Ribble said the new Capitan Baptist Church would do credit to any congregation in any town anywhere. "Mrs. Bill Jenkins invited me here three years ago to a meeting where I met seven or nine women and one man. I could hardly believe my eyes this afternoon. I congratulate you for erection of this building to the glory of the Lord."

Prof. Ribble said he was an ex-dean who is trying to be practical administering funds of the Baptist Foundation. The Capitan church had borrowed considerable more than the income of the church would warrant.

"We ask the Lord to dedication, it is our obligation to teach the unsearchable reaches of the Lord in this church. No matter the task, the Lord has been going before you. We can be assured that the Lord has prepared the way."

We have to pay the price for what we want. You had to work hard for this church. The future of this church depends on you. Many churches have poor credit, the integrity of this church depends on the membership.

Never before has the Church and Christianity been faced with problems like now. We must preach that God is a God of love. Too often we take our freedoms for granted. The Gospel of Jesus Christ has made America great. In other areas of the world people are much behind America, this is the fruit of Christianity.

We dedicate this building that we might walk in His way, that all the people may know that the Lord is our God. We dedicate and ask God to dedicate our lives to the use of this building.

Bro. Burten Wallace of Las Cruces gave the dedicatory prayer, the closing benediction was given by Walter Jones. After the close of the service a reception was held in a large meeting room of the new church. Some work remains to be done, and it was at 10:00 p.m. Saturday night that the carpet was put down in the pastor's study.

Amalita Jenkins is chairman of the candy committee, funds raised by local clubs, and there should be a bag of candy for all youngsters.



News From Your County Agent

By Ralph Dunlap

An outbreak of cattle scabies was found in Rio Arriba County. The Livestock Inspector were able to trace the animals sold from this herd and stop any chance of its spread. The animals with scabies were reported to have come from Old Mexico in April and pastured in northern New Mexico this summer. The cattle scab causes an intense irritation and loss of hair and generally is most active in the fall and winter.

There is no substitute for freshness and this is especially true when applied to Christmas trees. Appearance and fragrance are greatly enhanced by freshness. But of greater importance is the safety factor. A fresh Christmas tree retaining plenty of moisture is virtually impossible to ignite by match or small flame.

On the other hand, a dry tree can be ignited with a small spark. Far too many people have a fire hazard in their homes during the holiday season, however, the danger of a fire from the family Christmas tree can be reduced.

The first step in preventing this fire hazard is the selection of a fresh tree. Keeping it fresh is the second and most important step. A tree won't remain fresh

more that a day or two in a heated room unless some provision is made for replenishing the tree's moisture losses. The tree will be kept fresher if the base of the trunk is submerged in water. Many commercial holders provide containers for adding water to the tree after it is placed in the home. Another tip is to saw off an additional inch or two of trunk immediately before placing the tree in the container. Then add water to the holder and check the level once or twice a day. It is amazing how much water a tree will absorb daily in a heated room.

Once a tree has dried out, it is virtually impossible for it to absorb moisture and become fire resistant again. Prevention is the answer. Start with a fresh tree and keep it that way.
