J. N. Scott and Kenneth Warren of Andrews, doing business as a Texas corporation, and Frank Lindsey of Carrizozo, general manager for the corporation, met with Carrizozo town council Tuesday afternoon asking for lease of property and well recently acquired by town from Frank McBride as location of gravity-concentrate mill to process both gold and tungsten ore which will be brought down from Miner's Cabin and Silver Cliff claims and Hudspeth property at White Oaks. The company expects to be in operation in about 90 days.

Same is true of apple growers, not all apples find a ready market but the crop was a good one. People in tourist business give different reports, all the way from the best year ever to so-so, and the tourist business was at least a good average for the county.

Lake Arthur team was guilty of cursing officials, fighting, kicking players and walked off the floor in championship game with Cloudcroft, which put Alamogordo in lead and Zozo in 3rd place. Zozo lost to Lake Arthur 74-50 in its first game. Stuteville was high scorer with 16, Frank Hein best player of evening with 10 points and 10 rebounds. Tny Mackey hit 10, 5 rebounds and 5 intercepts. Alamogordo brought big team averaging around 6'4" to tournament and won easily over small Zozo team 69-32, Mackey high with 10, Hein had 9 rebounds, Stuteville best player with 5

points, 8 rebounds, 4 intercepts (hit only 16 percent of free throws and had bad passes).

L. Z. Manire will be the honored guest at dedication of Manire Elementary School Sunday, January 5, 1969 at 2:00 p.m. when the new building will be officially dedicated.

Mr. Manire first came to New Mexico in 1928 after graduation from North Texas State at Denton, and teaching rural school in Wise County. He received his masters degree from University of New Mexico.

Manire was superintendent at Tatum for five years, Vaughn for nine years and he took over the top job at Carrizozo school in 1942.

There were two school buildings at that time, the present high school and the grade building recently torn down. Basketball was played in the store building now used by Piggly Wiggly in 1941-42. New gym was opened in fall of '42. L.Z. made the goals now in use in new gym.

L.Z. says that enrollment in Carrizozo school has been rather stable, around 400 when he started in 1942 and about the same when he retired in 1953. At start of his second year here, Supt. Manire changed to 6-6 plan using the two buildings.

Education was changing from year to year during all of Manire's career as a superintendent. They started teaching refresher course in Math in 1942, two years of Spanish was required for graduation then, "We were changing all the time," said Manire.

There will be a short program of dedication at 2:00 in the multipurpose room of new building, refreshments served and entire building open for school patrons to view.

The 4-5-6th grades have classrooms in this new building, the art room is for entire school as is material center and faculty lounge. Classes moving into this building will clear up crowded conditions in other buildings.

Over 1000 people receive social security benefits

There are over 1,000 people in Lincoln County who received monthly Social Security benefits according to Bob Noble, Jr., Social Security Field Representative from Lincoln County.

Many of these people are already past 65 years of age but have never enrolled in the insurance program under Medicare. "However, a new general enrollment period for this insurance will begin on January 1, 1969," Noble said. This enrollment period will last until March 31, 1969, and is especially for those people who did not enroll before they were 65 years old.

Noble will be in the commissioner's room of the court house in Carrizozo on the first Friday of every month to assist those people who wish to enroll for the Supplemental Medical Insurance.

Hondo school offers personnel service

To supplement its Academic Program, the Hondo School offers essential student Personnel Service, including Mental Health Services, academic advising and Program Planning, testing, counseling and guidance, and consultation in many areas. Individual and group counseling. Each student is required to have the Principal's approval of his program of courses.

The counseling center also provides counseling, individual testing in connection with counseling, and reading and study skills classes.

In its counseling program, the Counselor works with students, individually or in groups, also when they seek help with educational, personal, or vocational

concerns and plans. If the student faces problems of choice, planning, or adjustment, your counselor may assign tests that would be helpful. In your career and educational planning you may wish to consult the center's library of educational and vocational information.

The Center's Reading and Study Skills Laboratory offers credit courses to Hondo students interested in self-improvement. Reading courses stress such skills as vocabulary improvement, comprehension development, and speed flexibility. Study Skills, such as effective techniques for remembering textbook material, notetaking, test-taking, and budgeting time.

The Center and Counselor is also responsible for most of the National Testing Programs, such as the ACT.

The last major First Fleet exercise of the year, the eight-day exercise involved 28 ships and 3 air squadrons, including four Canadian units.

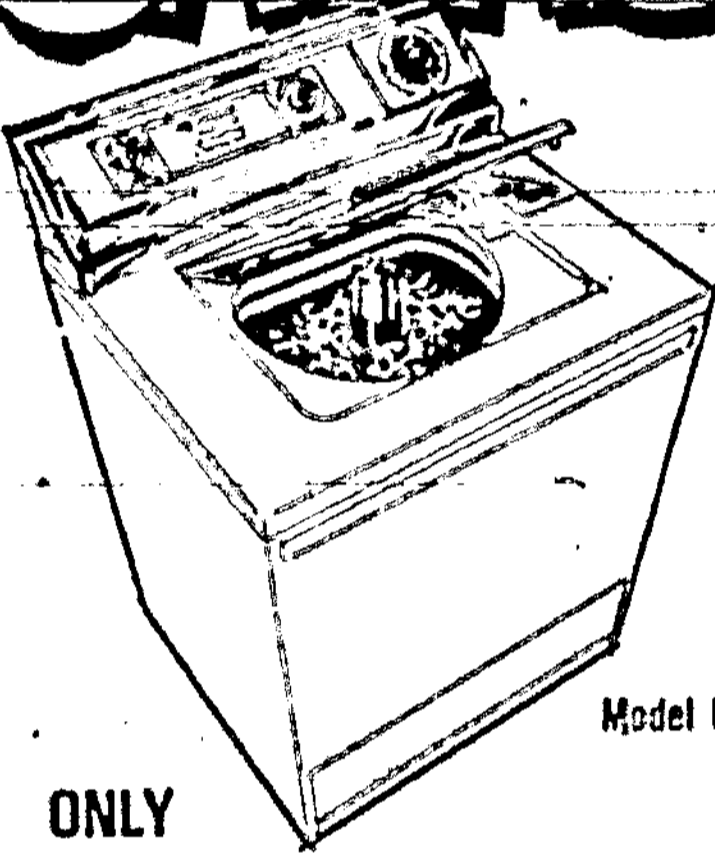

When asked how a city boy learns the way of ranching Freeman had a ready answer "Slowly."

The G Bar F began as an escape from the Depression's "unpleasant litigious people," and it continues as a remote haven for the Freemans and their guests. (A recent dinner for 12 on six hours' notice was a typical experience. "Too many guests," he complains, and invites more.)

But the ranch also has become insurance against one of Freeman's greatest fears: retirement without a purpose.

"The great tragedy is not that a man is old but that he's no longer needed. He's useless. Every morning when you're retired you have to have a reason to get up, and every night you've got to be thinking about what you're going to do tomorrow."

"If you buy a nice home in Florida, or in Sante Fe, a lovely place where they have opera in the summer, you're just waiting to die. You're not doing a damned thing useful."

"The ranch is a business, an activity. It involves work planning and hope and dreams. It's a legitimate project that involves intellectual and physical effort."

"We had a friend here for dinner last night who has half a million shares of a high-priced

stock. And yet this guy suffers more over whether he gets 31 1/2 cents or 31 cents for his calves than he does about the price of his stock.

"It's the challenge and the feeling that you're building up something that ought to be better. I could make a lot more money much easier than I could ever on this, so that gives a little of this life to my statement that this is a legitimate business project."

"It isn't very profitable, really. In fact it is a loss right now, but I am hopeful that by the time I retire I will have the ranch in such shape that it will earn more than current expenses."

And Mrs. Freeman interjected "There's a great satisfaction, too, in dealing with simple things. Life in Chicago can get pretty complicated."

"We like to go out and help drive the cattle into a particular pasture, even though we may not be a helluva lot of help," Freeman said. "And chopping wood, and repairing the gate."

"I even enjoy washing the windows," Mrs. Freeman said.

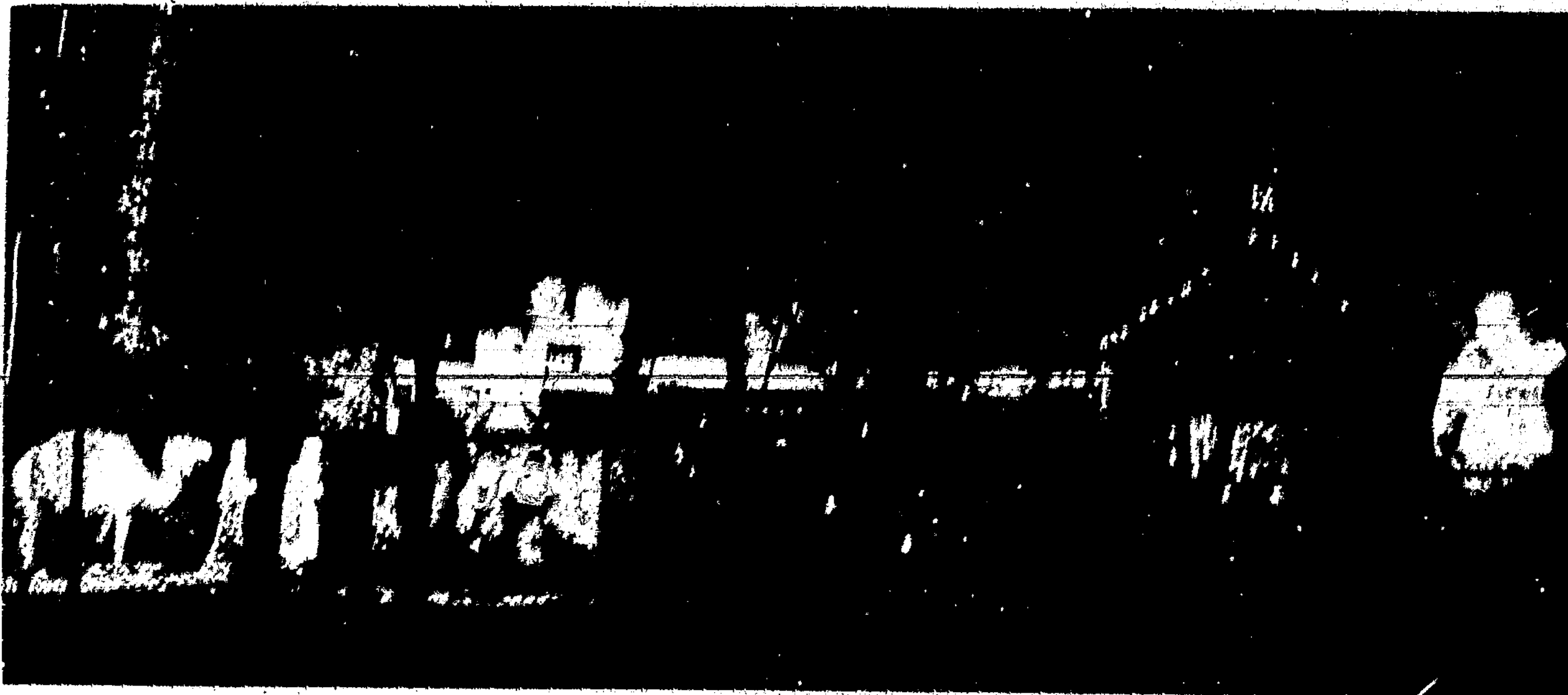
