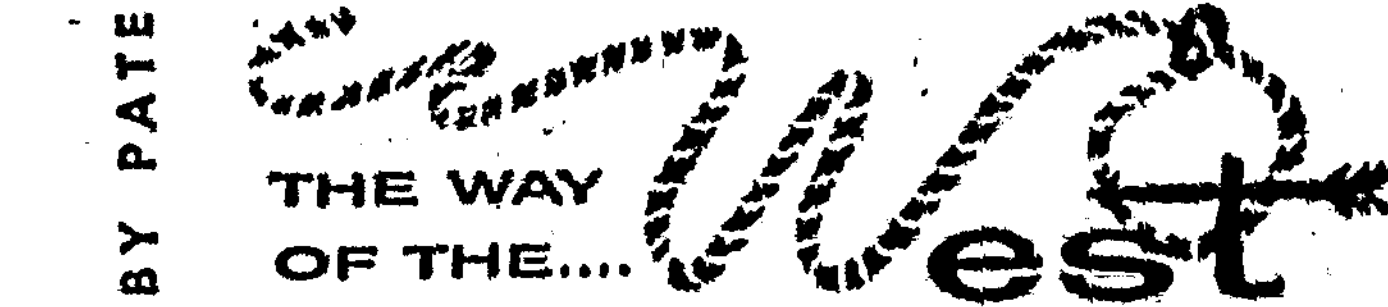

Eight boys to be inducted

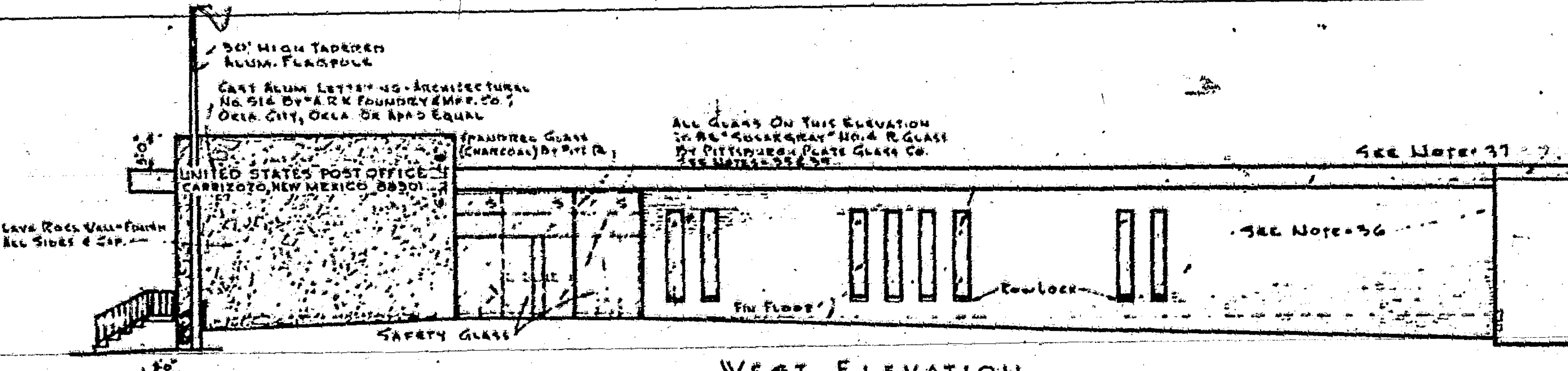

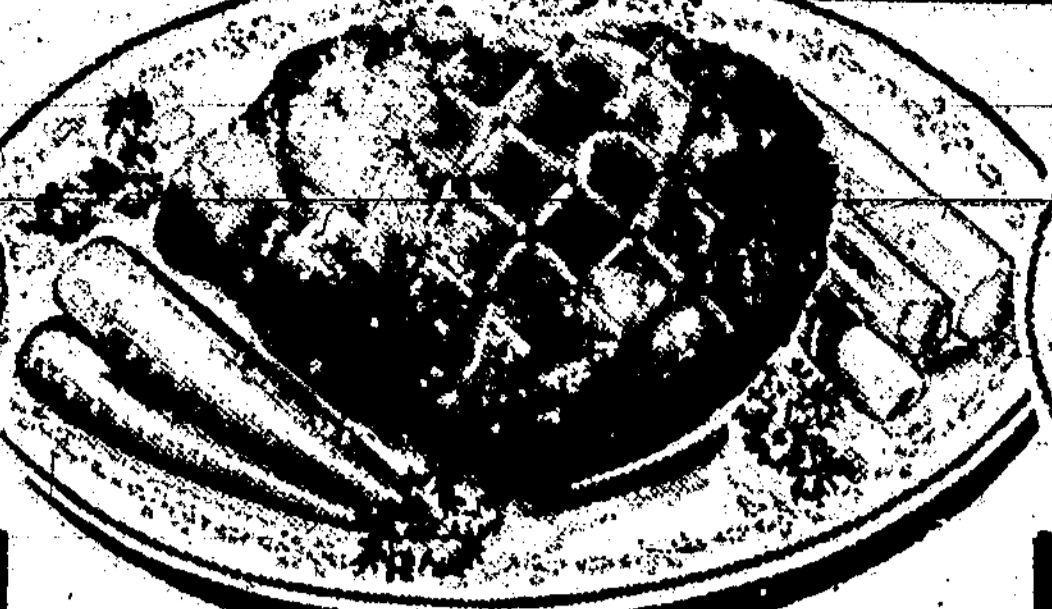
