## New bank at Ruidoso opposed

State Banking Commissioner Grant Brumlow this week took under advisement the application of a Ruidoso Alamogordo group for a charter for a second state bank in Ruidoso.

The commissioner's hearing on the application was completed Monday afternoon. Further action will follow the completion of a court reporter's transcript of the testimony.

The group seeking the new charter is Security Bank of Ruidoso. Numbered among its sponsors are the stockholders

and officers of Bank Securities, Inc., a newly registered bank holding company with headquarters in Alamogordo. However, T.A. (Ted) Bonnell, president of Bank Securities, said the founding group includes 73 stockholders, 60 of whom resided in the Ruidoso community.

The charter application was strongly resisted in testimony by officers of Ruidoso's only existing bank, Ruidoso State Bank, and some Ruidoso businessmen.

Spokesman and witnesses for

Ruidoso State Bank found themselves in the peculiar position of speaking disparagingly of Ruidoso, its economic development and its lack of recent growth in permanent residents.

But Don Stark, manager of Ruidoso's chamber of commerce, took the side of Security Bank of Ruidoso, maintaining that Ruidoso is growing, its growth prospects are bright, and the operation of a second bank in the community would expedite the growth and economic development of the community.

His views were echoed by Ralph Petty, franchise operator of a Gamble store in Ruidoso. Edward L. Wimerly, president of Ruidoso State Bank, expressed the fear that a new bank charter in Ruidoso would give the city "two \$4 million banks instead of the present \$8 million bank" and that the margin for neither would be at a profitable level. He also expressed concern that Bank Securities, Inc., "would eventually take us over."

Funeral services were held for Roy Shafer Saturday morning, February 15 at the Trinity Methodist Church. Mr. Shafer died in Carrizozo February 13. Roy Shafer was born in Hamburg, New York on July 24, 1892. He came to New Mexico in 1913 and remained here for two years. He returned to Hamburg and married Mae Jewell on June 15, 1915 and he and his wife moved to the Half Way Ranch near Carlsbad.

The Shafers remained in the ranching business until 1929 when they moved to Carrizozo to open an automotive business which they operated until 1953. At that time they opened Shafer's Feed Store which Mr. Shafer operated until his death.

He is survived by his wife, Mae of Carrizozo, one son Robert M. of Carrizozo; three daughters, Mrs. Johnson Stearns of Carrizozo; Mrs. J. B. Howell of Roswell; and Mrs. Donald Young of Denver; and one sister, Mrs. Lola Davenport of Washington, D. C. He is also survived by nine grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Mr. Shafer was a member of Carrizozo Masonic Lodge A. F. & A. M. #41, Trinity United Methodist Church, where he served as a trustee, and Carrizozo Lions Club. He had served as a school board member, county commissioner and was on the local draft board for 25 years. He was a valued and respected citizen of the community.

Rev. Dan Heckert officiated at the services. Casket bearers

were Duff May, Vernon Petty, Roy Harman, Arrell Posey, Bill MaeVeigh, and C. E. Burns. Honorary bearers were W. W. Gallacher, L. Z. Manire, C. E. Degner, Pat Murphy, Joe Chavez, C. A. Snow, Albert Roberts, Tino Lopez, Friday Sherrill, R. E. Lemon, Louis Huffman and Mark Sloan.

Interment was in Evergreen Cemetery under the direction of Clarke - Wooten Chapel of Roses Mortuary.

### Fulton Duggar service in Nogal Cemetery

Fulton Duggar, a well-known and lifelong resident of Lincoln County, died suddenly at his home at Nogal February 16.

Mr. Duggar was born July 14, 1912 at Bonito and lived all his life in that area attending school in Nogal and Carrizozo. He is survived by two sons, Steven and Mike; two sisters, Mrs. C. A. Terrell of El Paso and Mrs. Hattie Wells of Tucumcari and one brother Bryce of Carrizozo.

Graveside services were held February 18, at Nogal Cemetery with Rev. Dan Heckert officiating. Active casket bearers were Albert Roberts, W. H. Rickerson, Bud Crenshaw, Dean Fredekind, Mack King and Bonney Zamora. Honorary bearers were Buck Harvey, Gerald Farr, H. O. Burnson III, Phil Richardson, Jimmy Dunn, Fred LaMay and Arrell Posey. Clarke - Wooten Chapel of Roses Mortuary was in charge of the arrangements.

### Lincoln County sales reported

Lincoln County merchants reported gross sales of \$1,208,816 for the month of December, according to the State Bureau of Revenue.

The figure reflects an increase of \$212,329 over the previous December's report.

Almost all the sales were in the five municipalities, which reported as follows:

Ruidoso \$730,001; Carrizozo \$186,721; Ruidoso Downs \$112,492; Capitan \$43,386; and Corona \$40,957.

### Bud makes good points

Dear Paul  
I have just read the article concerning the Grasshopper hearing. It was well covered and fairly presented.

Although some of the main points in our favor were not brought out.

First - All the state witness testified that a rancher knows what is best for his own ranch. Second - Some areas needed spraying and the wooded areas did not.

Third - That a very poor set of books was kept and a lot of juggling of figures and acreage had taken place.

Some people had a very small acreage assessed to them. While the defendants had complete acreage assessed and in my case approximately 600 acres that belonged to other people. I can only assure you that if the defendants witnesses had testified, you, the judge and the public would have a clearer picture of the whole thing.

Judge Stanley was very brave and fair man to make his decision in the face of all the local, state and government political opposition.

But for the defendants being morally obligated to pay for something we never needed, received or wanted is another decision altogether. We paid very dearly, attorney fees, work days lost, talking to witnesses etc.

I repeat it would be very interesting to the public and very embarrassing to some over the way some people try to "bully" their way over others for selfish motives. Going through locked gates etc.

I wish to inform you that we are not the only ranchers who object to this program, some people paid after threats, some wrote on their checks, paid through protest and some were plain disgusted. Spraying hot spots is O K, but to upset the balance of nature completely is wrong. Some folks would kill all coyotes, bugs, coyotes, birds, fish etc. just so sheep would exist.

My son Bob is a graduate of N. M. State with major in biology and pest control. We together with Pat Dunning went over the defendants ranches Bobby told me not to spray because of killing out the good bugs which eat grasshopper larva just as the enclosed letter of June 24 1968 from N. M. State tells us.

His comment was to spray the hordes of government employees to run up and down the road in great numbers. With all the free advice and contradicting themselves.

They would I suppose have us wind up in the same mess the U. S. Government is in today.

The book "The Silent Spring" answers all the questions why you should never have a big spray program. This book should be read by everyone. It can be found in the Carrizozo School Library.

Bobby Dan advised me not to spray because it would cause all the good bugs to die, and the grasshoppers would return faster, and then we would really have to spray every year. My neighbors and defendants who are big ex-farmers told me the same.

We find people who have over-grazed their range and had dry years looking for something

## \$10,000 recovered

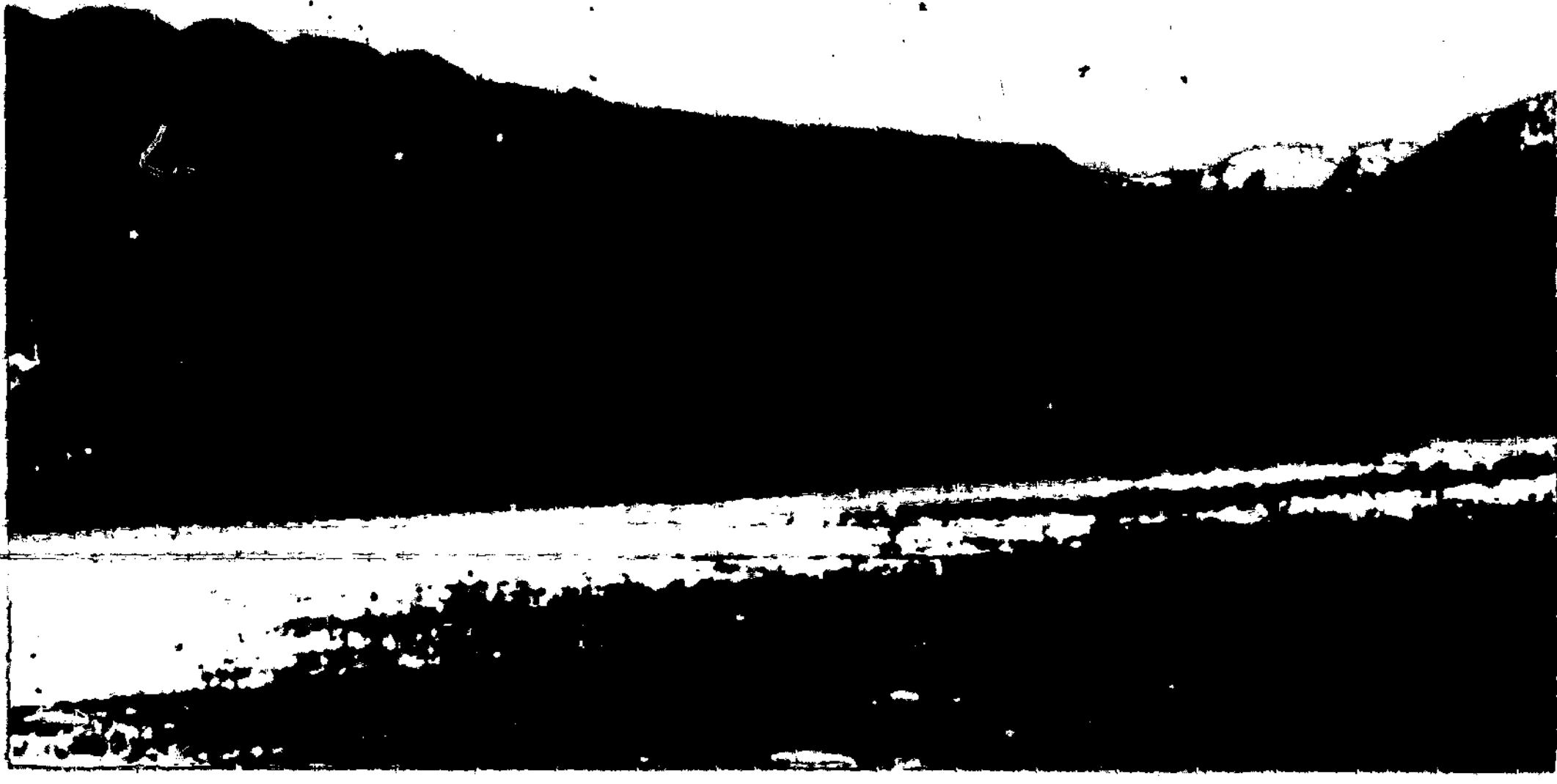
U. S. Postal Inspectors Thursday recovered \$10,000 from a safety deposit box in an Albuquerque bank, allegedly placed there by a man arrested for the Feb. 7 theft of the Carrizozo Post Office.

On a search warrant issued by U. S. Commissioner Robert W. McCoy, Albuquerque postal inspector E. S. Sampaola and two agents from Denver, seized the money from the Eubank branch of the First National Bank in Albuquerque.

Michael D. Jackson, 25, a postal clerk at the Carrizozo Post Office, was arrested Wednesday night by the inspector and arraigned before U. S. Commissioner, Mrs. Tom Charles of Alamogordo. Jackson is accused of stealing the money from a registered shipment containing the currency - all in \$20 bills.

Postal inspectors called in to investigate the case were W. F. Chaney and H. E. Cooper both of Denver, and M. E. Provost of El Paso. They arrested Jackson Wednesday.

Mrs. Tom Charles told the News that Jackson pleaded guilty. He was to be taken to Albuquerque Tuesday night or Wednesday and criminal arraignment be made possibly Friday in U.S. District Court.

## Town of Carrizozo endorses conservation, development

"A resource conservation and development project is a locally initiated and sponsored activity to expand the economic opportunities for the people of the area," states Mr. Johnson Stearns, Mayor of Carrizozo.

"The town of Carrizozo will be a sponsor and help in developing and carrying out our plan of action for the orderly conservation, improvement, development and wise use of our natural and human resources," added Mr. Stearns.

The South Central Mountain resource area includes almost all of Otero and Lincoln County. The legal boundaries of the Upper Hondo, Carrizozo, and Otero Soil and Water Conservation Districts constitutes the initial boundaries of the SCMRA.

The Soil Conservation Service is designated as the Departmental agency of Department of Agriculture for administration of the activities relating to RC

and D projects. The SCS also is assigned the responsibility for contacts with Federal agencies outside the Department of Agriculture and with State and local agencies and organizations to assist the RC&D projects.

"The concept of a resource conservation and development project is that local people of an area working with the total development and use of all resources, natural and human through their own effort at a local level," stated Mr. Stearns. "We will do what needs to be done, with our own resources to solve our own problems. This does not mean that we will not be asking for assistance from all agencies and organizations who have the ability to help us."

The South Central Mountain Resource Area has been following this concept for about 18 months and considerable

Man, you can get off the deep end when you start talking about what is morally right or wrong. There was a time, maybe 50 years ago, when people pretty much ran their own lives in this southwest country, made their own laws, and did not have to report their every move to the federal government.

There was a time when young men were eager to defend the honor of their country, but not so eager now to fight an undeclared war.

There was a time when the paycheck was not hit so hard by our government for the support of our good many give-a-ways and hairbrained schemes (plus a military budget more burdensome each year.)

There was a time when nature well took care of farmers and ranchers, good some years, better or worse the next but people in this section of the world have learned to live with nature.

Pollution of our beautiful country is becoming more and more the biggest hazard of all, and we can thank federal government forces fully as much as little-type individuals for this condition.

Morals have to do with what is right and proper, morals also pertain to principles of right and wrong, conduct and intentions.

Are you ready to state flatly that every edict fostered on you personally, by federal government forces is right. Are you ready to say that others can eat for free while you work for a living, that the federal government should stay big in

## Central Mountain Resource report

The Steering Committee of the South Central Mountain Resource Area met Tuesday, January 21, 1969, at the Summit Lodge, near Mesalero.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Robert Bell at 7:30 p.m.

Mr. Johnson Sterns had asked that his resignation as secretary treasurer of the SEMRA be accepted because he was not able to attend as often as he desires due to his responsibilities to the City of Carrizozo as their mayor. His resignation was accepted and Mr. Bell asked for nominations from the floor to fill this vacancy. Mr. Scribner nominated Mr. W.W. Gallacher, Jr. Mr. Charles Jones seconded the nomination. There were no more nominations and Mr. Gallacher was elected by acclamation.

Mr. Minton Weaver, and Mr. W.E. Mouser, who are with the Bureau of Indian Affairs and assigned to assist the Indians on the Mesalero Indian Reservation, made an excellent presentation of the different programs in which they assisted.

Mr. Bell asked for a progress report on project proposals and they were given as follows:

Ruidoso Watershed - The Ruidoso Committee had met with the Mesalero Tribal representative to coordinate plans on the watershed being scheduled for February 6, 1969, in the preliminary report to consider solutions in the feasibility of the Ruidoso Watershed.

Nogal Lake, Robert Scribner, Fred Thompson and Kurt Ziebarth had met with Mr. Ortiz de Pino, of the Governor's Office in Santa Fe, to discuss the Nogal Lake Project. They explained the proposal with regard to a temporary transfer of Ft. Stanton water to the Nogal Lake. It was felt that the proposal was favorably accepted.

White Oaks and Ft. Stanton Cemetery - The White Oaks Committee had scheduled a meeting with a representative from the State Planning Office to discuss procedure in getting White Oaks and Cemetery designated as an historical site, and also for Ft. Stanton Cemetery. Other historical sites would be discussed.

Roads - Mr. Bell reported that his committee had met with the New Mexico Highway Commission in Carlsbad and explained the different road proposals.

Wildlife Management - Mr. Gallacher reported that the trespass law which had been developed by his committee and Senator William C. Schauer, was completed and ready to be introduced at the present New Mexico State Legislature which is now in session. Mr. Gallacher stressed that the law was written to protect private property and prevent vandalism, and not at any special group.

The overall progress of the SEMRA was discussed and the members stated they were making good progress but needed to step up the publicity and information program of the SEMRA. All agreed they would help in increasing the amount of information released to newspapers, radio, etc.

The next meeting will be Feb. 26, 1969, in Tularosa, commencing at 1:00 p.m.

## Sachse talks to woolgrowers

Start supplemental feeding of sheep about six weeks before lambing and continue until the ewes have given fact was the advice given by Jim Sachse to the woolgrowers at the meeting in Corona last week. The ewes need this for energy and protein increases during the last part of pregnancy. For the lambs, especially twins to be vigorous at birth this energy is necessary.

Jack Ruttle told the group that lambs can be weaned early and they will make quick and efficient gains. They must be fed a balanced ration. The trials on early weaning are continuing and the results are considered preliminary. This year's trials include feeding a higher energy ration. By weaning the lambs early, the rancher can run more ewes or have this means of reducing stocking rate.

March 1st, the annual Junior Dairy Judging Contest and Field Day will be conducted at the Price-Black Farm at Arrey, New Mexico, starting at 9:00 a.m. The contest and field day is sponsored each year by the Cooperative Extension Service at New Mexico State University, the State Department of Vocational Agricultural Education, and the New Mexico Guernsey Breeder's Association.

Awards will go to the high individual in Senior 4-H, Junior 4-H and FFA divisions, with trophies to be awarded to the winning team in each division. Coupled with the judging contest and field day will be the auction of eight high-quality registered Guernsey heifers.

## Historic Area Defeated

People of Old Lincoln Town voted down 35-34 the move to create a historic area at Lincoln. The vote was climax of several meetings; some heated discussion and mailing of ballots to all property owners. County commissioners would have been asked to create a special zoning district to be known as Lincoln Historic Area.

## Montoya fights for Highway 70

WASHINGTON - Citing local benefit and national defense gain, U.S. Senator Joseph M. Montoya (D. - N. Mex.) again introduced a measure, S. 343, in the Senate that would designate portions of U. S. Highway 70 in New Mexico and 60 in Texas as part of our National System of Interstate and Defense Highways. The segment of Highway 70 proposed for incorporation, approximately 301 miles in length, runs from Las Cruces through Alamogordo, Ruidoso and Portales to Clovis and the New Mexico - Texas border. Highway 60's segment approximately 98 miles in length, runs northeast through Hereford, Texas and Amarillo.

Highway 60 and 70 are the most common route used to travel from the most populated areas of the Texas Panhandle to Las Cruces and El Paso. Its improvement would be of significant economic importance to the entire area. Designation of U. S. 70 would form an important diagonal connection between Interstates 10, 25 and 40.

Ray Roper filled in for Stuteville and scored second high for the Grizzlies with 11 points. High point man was Frank Hein with 18.

Guevara was high point man for the Tigers with 19 and Aidaz had 17.

High rebounder for the Grizzlies was Danny Monreal with 10.

Carrizozo B team won their game at Capitan 45-38, Jody Wrye was high scorer with 19 and Dan Harkey second with 11.

Harkey also was top man in rebounds with 10. Pumphrey of Capitan scored 12 points.

The last home game of the season was with Cloudcroft Saturday evening when Carrizozo lost 49-69. The Grizzlies were outsize all the way and although

they shot a good percentage from the floor, were unable to take command on rebounds. Stuteville saw limited action.

David Lock and Tiny Mackey tied for scoring honors with 13 each and Danny Monreal had 11. Lock was also high rebounder for Carrizozo with 7.

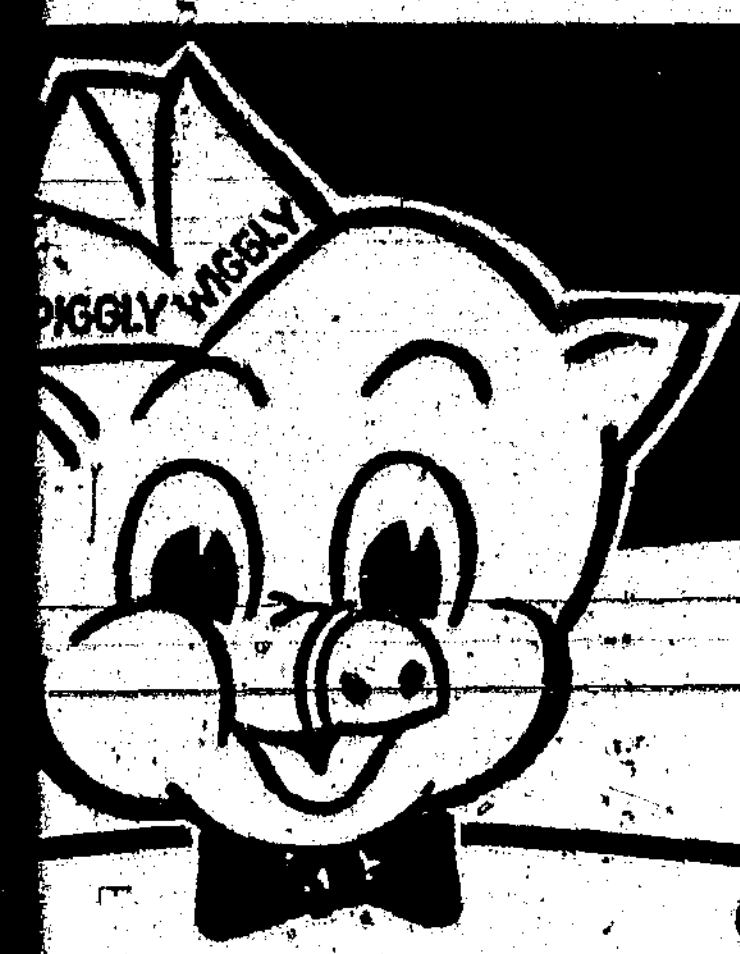

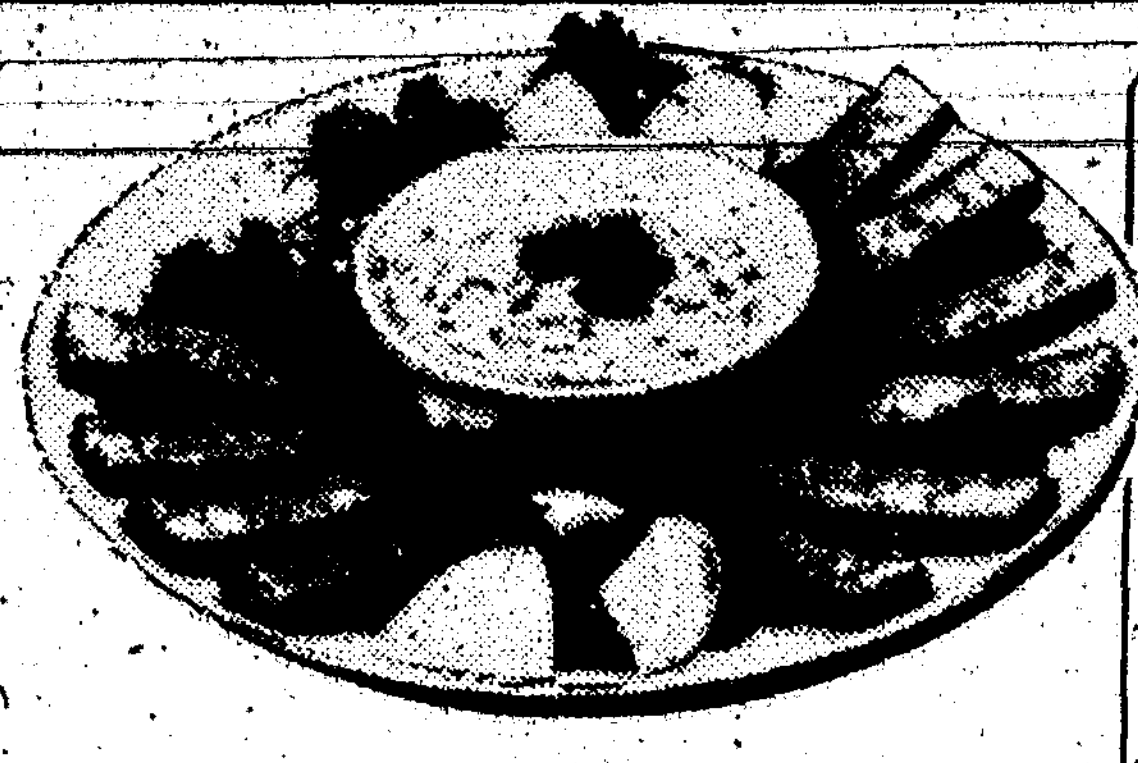
