Lincoln County is commencing the commemoration of its 100th year, and doing so will focus special attention on the rich history and tradition of this -portion of New Mexico.

The Territorial Legislature of 1869 created Lincoln County with the seat of the government in La Placita de la Bonita, Af the suggestion of Capitan Saturnino Baca, the Legislature named the new county Lincoln. Later the same year the county seat was changed to Lincoln.

In the early years, law enforcement was non-existent, and the struggle for the magnificent rangeland led to the Lincoln County War.

By 1889 the Legislature began to whittle down the huge county jo its present mamageable size and in 1909 the county seat was

transferred to Carrizozo. 1869 BILLY

#### Severance bonds for Eagle Nest purchase

Office Of The Governor

SANTA FE - The legislature is now considering a measure which would allow the cale of \$3.3 million in severance bonds for the purchase of Eagle Nest Lake along with some surrounding land.

An appraisal was made and we have determined that the land - approximately 4,885 acres - and the lake can be purchased for about \$3 million. The additional money will be for improvements.

I think it is important to know that the acquisition of this lake can, be extremely important to porthern New Mexico, and will also be a vital part of our entire Park system.

If the state can acquire Eagle Nest, it will provide a major

thrust toward development of a : year-round attraction. Our early plans call for devolopment of a snowmobile trackaround the perimeter of the take, along with picnic facilities and restrooms. We also plan to develop ice fishing and will install picnic facilities.

The carly development will involve only 40 acres adjacent to the lake, but as further plans can be carried out, we should have a major attraction.

Our State Game and Fish Department will be working with the State Park and Recreation Commission to make Eagle Nest one of the top trout lakes in the nation, with ample extra facilities to provide attractions for the entire family.

In considering Eagle Nest, 1 think it's good to note the imnort of our State Parks on the economy of New Mexico.

I have received figures that indicate that visitation to our parks is dramatically increasing.

In 1967 we recorded 3,641,863 visitions to our parks, in 1968 this figure rose to 3, 876,551 - an increase of more than

six percent. As one major example, we counted 1,131,567 visitors to Elephant Butte Lake, Although much of the money being spent might not have been at the lake " itself, when you consider this number of people traveling to the lake you have a considerable

## Sunrise service at Malpais is first Lincoln centennial event

The glory of Easter begins at dawn. This year, Lincoln County Centennial folks will fill the early morning air with joyful voices singing "Up From The Grave He Arose." You will hear the trumpet tribute, "Mine Eyes Have Seen The Glory," if you arrive at Valley of Fire State Park, Northwest of Carrizozo, well before 6:01 AM on Sunday. April 6th.

Few will find a more fitting and memorable setting anywhere in these United States than those who assemble near the 16 foot high cross, above the rolling waves of black Mal Pais volcanic rock, where more than

200 gathered in 1966. Young and old are invited to size the anthem Christ The Lord Is Risen Today".

Because all towns in Lincoln County are celebrating our 100th anniversary, the youth of these 5 towns are merging into the one town. The OCOCO Chorus has set a reachable goal of 150 voices to rehearse at Valley of Fire on Saturday morning, April 5th at 10 a.m.

-Catholic -- and Protestant families joined together for the Easter Surrise Service in the Valley of Fires in 1966, Father Rebold delivered the sermon. Because the Easter Sunrise Service is the first county-wide

event this centennial year, time is extremely short to properly prepare for the outstanding experience that can be for all who live here, and for all others who may decide to be our guests on Easter.

Postmaster General Blount announced yesterday that a contract has been awarded to J. B. Roberts, Box 337, Plainview, Texas 79072, to build the new post office in Carrizozo, N. M. 88301 and lease it to the post Office Department.

Mr. Roberts has men and materials ready to start as soon as demolition of three remaining buildings on the site is completed. Bud Payne and Clarnece Griffin have the job of removing old Shorty Miller saloon, old telephone building and old bakery, none of the three in use for several years. and other types of business have been in these locations.

The announcement of the award to the successful bidder advances the new building closer to the construction stage. When fully operational, the Postmaster space and more modern equipment will, in the long run, more than offset the extra cost involvedin producing more efficient handling of the mail, in accord with President Nixon's directive to provide the best possible postal service at the least possible cost.

"This project is in accordance with our policy of building new post offices only where they are urgently needed," Mr. Blount said. We are constantly re-assessing our construction program to take care of our expanding mail volume.

"We now have about 45,000 postal lecations throughout the country handling an anticipated volume of 83 billion pieces of mail for the 1969-70 year. "Our employees are doing a

great job of processing the mail,

but it is clear that if we are

to meet the demands of our growing population we must make use of the best mechanized equipment available in areas where it is economically justified,

"We are also constantly seeking to develop new ideas and new postal techniques, such as Zip Code to help process. the mail more efficiently and ecconomically."

The new building at the east side of Sixth Avenue, between 12th and 13th Streets will represent an estimated total investment of \$140,900 by the successful bidder. It will be leased to the Department for 10 years with rental options running through twenty years at an annual rental of \$16,320 for the basic

This represents the lowest responsive bid of two received by the Department on a compeli-

tive basis, and reflects what Departmental studies have determined to be a reasonable and economical rental for leased space in this area.

The new one-story building will be air conditioned, and will have an interior space of 5,566 square feet, compared with 2,299 square feet in the present building. The area for parking and movement of vehicles totals 20,212 square feet, more than five times the 3,778 square feet now available.

This post office is expected to be completed about November 1, 1969,

Mr. Blount explained that the Department's capital investment is limited substancially to postal equipment. The building will remain under private ownership, with the owner paying local real estate taxes.
