

Old headstones tell interesting history of White Oaks

I am sure that you are aware that the White Oaks Cemetery has been designated as an historical site.

I would like to compliment you on your selection of the cleaning of it as your project for the preservation of the history of this area and for doing something worthwhile to preserve our American Heritage. I have been told that in numerous parts of the United States students are banding together on projects for the good of their communities. I am proud of you and all of those in other schools who are doing this. My feeling is that you are our only hope for a better future for America.

With the discovery of gold at White Oaks in 1879 there came a rush of miners and prospectors. Gold has always lured man on in the hopes of making a fortune. As a result it has been estimated

that the population of White Oaks grew to 2,500 people in a very short time. With this also came deaths from mining accidents, pneumonia, diphtheria, and other causes. At first they were interred near and just west of the present cemetery. The Knights of Pythias Lodge recognized the need of the proper place so purchased a tract of land which is part of the present cemetery and had it surveyed into lots. The earliest records of this cemetery were kept by John B. Slack who became in all probability the first undertaker at White Oaks. He is buried on your left from the gate. Mr. Slack was an excellent penman and had led a very colorful life although he had made one mistake in taking part in the famous San Francisco Diamond Swindle. He had been a great soldier and was considered a hero while in the

service of his country. Books have been written about him. One was entitled "Diamond in the Rough" and the other "Billy the Kid and the White Oaks Undertaker".

As you move among the graves you will find one with a marker inscribed Susan McSween Barber, who was the wife of Alexander McSween, the lawyer killed at Lincoln during the Lincoln County War. She later owned a ranch near Three Rivers and was known as the cattle queen of New Mexico. As a small boy in White Oaks I visited her with my brother, Lloyd. She would tell us stories and give us cookies. She was a great music lover and Mrs. Murphy of White Oaks, has one of the pianos she had had, in her home in White Oaks. It is truly a beautiful one.

You will find a number of graves of veterans of the Civil

War, one Spanish - American War, World Wars I and II, and one from the Korean War. Units such as the First Kentucky Volunteers, First Texas Cavalry and others are inscribed on the markers. It is altogether fitting and proper to honor these brave men who served our country so well.

Near the large lilac bush in almost the center of the cemetery you will find the grave of Judge John Y. Hewitt. Judge Hewitt practiced law in White Oaks and Lincoln County for many years and was widely known for his ability and desire to bring about justice for all.

Just beyond you will find the grave of Paul Mayer. Paul was a man of sterling character and was trusted to carry the gold bars from the White Oaks mills to San Antonio, New Mexico where it was sent on by rail. This was prior to the building

of the railroad from El Paso Paul would check the saloons about 9:00 p.m. to see if there were any suspicious characters in town. If there were none he would go to his livery stable and saddle a good horse, place the gold in the saddle bags and start the long journey to San Antonio in the night. He related that on one occasion, when he neared the upper end of the Mal Pais, he heard riders coming rapidly toward him and his first thought was that they were after the gold but they were cowboys hurrying back to a ranch after a good time in town.

Over on the south side of the cemetery you will find the graves of W. C. McDonald and members of his family. When he first went to White Oaks he was a surveyor, later becoming owner of the Carrizozo and Block Cattle Companies and in 1912 was elected the first Governor of

New Mexico after it became a state. As Governor of New Mexico he conducted the affairs of the state in an exemplary manner. He steadfastly refused to use his official position for personal gain. I have a copy of a newspaper printing of a speech he made on Memorial Day, May 30th, 1890. The speech would have been a credit to any statesman today. He was educated in New York and was a shining example of a man who could rise to the heights. We, in Lincoln County, have reason to be proud that this great man was a part of Lincoln County and New Mexico history. He has two grandsons in Carrizozo: Truman A. Spencer, Jr. and Dr. A. N. Spencer. The Bar W brand

is still in use on the ranch. Dave Jackson took care of the cemetery until his passing a few years ago. His wish was to see the grave of Governor McDonald properly dedicated and it appears that will be realized this year.

I could go on telling you of the wonderful people buried in White Oaks Cemetery but time will not permit.

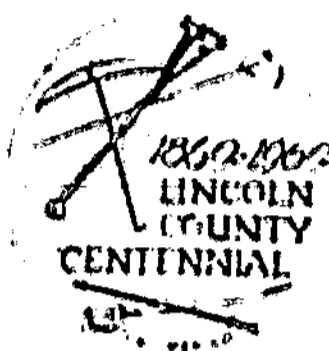
May your work there today be a labor of love and as you pass among the tombstones pause a moment and think of the children who are buried there. Life was not as easy then as now.

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Pony Express Race will travel 41 miles, White Oaks to Old Lincoln Town

1. Entry shall consist of one or two riders and four horses.
2. If there are two riders, the first rider shall go from White Oaks to Encinoso and the second rider from Encinoso to Lincoln.

3. A western style saddle must be used, rider must dress western (jeans, western shirt and hat).

4. Entrant must follow marked course and will be checked at various points, entries will be allowed to travel within 50 feet of the road or marked course.

5. Entry fee will be \$20 per team (\$5.00 per horse) and will be jackpotted, including added money at 60% to the winner and 40% to second place. The winner will also be awarded a silver engraved plate.

6. Because of terrain and road conditions, all horses must be shod.

7. Each entry will furnish in duplicate a complete description of each horse to be entered in the race and designate which lap each horse will run. This must be turned in to the starter by 7:30 a.m. on July 26th. The first horse must be ready to go by 7:45 a.m. with the race to start at 8:00 a.m.

8. The entrant will provide his own transportation for his

horses and provide someone to receive the ridden horses to cool, etc.

9. Any horse being abused can be disqualified and that entry removed from the race by persons of authority.

10. Riders must be 14 years or older. Only horses can be used, no mules or burros etc.

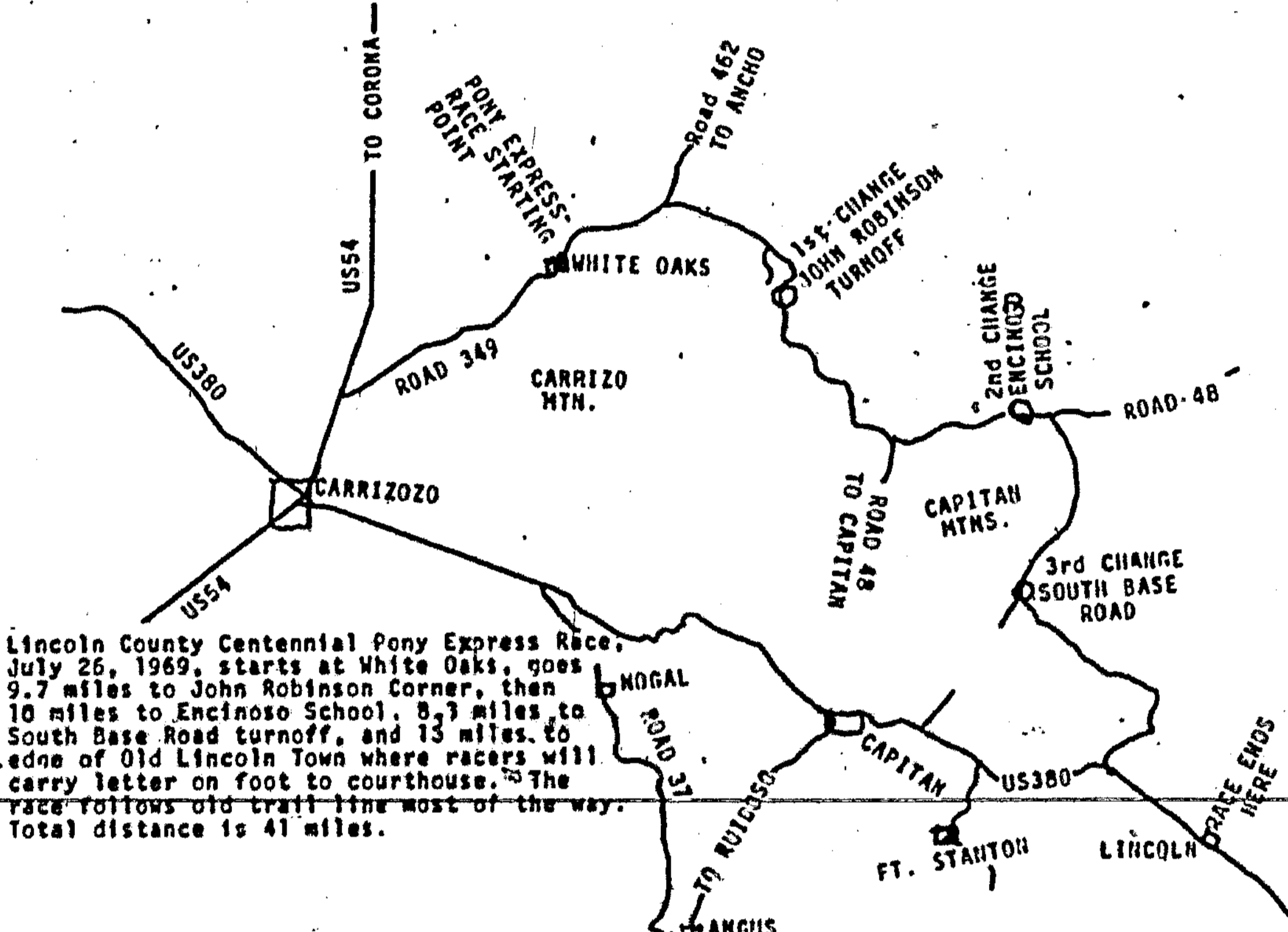
11. Each rider must carry a letter given to him at the start of the race and deliver to the judge at the finish line. The rider must dismount at the edge of Lincoln and carry the letter on foot to the courthouse to complete the race.

12. Only the first and third horses can be previously saddled. The saddle must be changed at the start of the second and fourth laps by the rider.

13. The first lap is from White Oaks to the John Robinson turn-off (0.7 miles). Second from Robinson turn-off to Encinoso (1.3 miles). Third from Encinoso to south base road turn-off (8.3 miles) and fourth from south base road to Lincoln a distance of 13 miles. The total distance is 41 miles. No vehicles off the road please.

14. Entries will close July 20th at 5:00 p.m.

Lincoln County Centennial Pony Express Race, July 26, 1969, starts at White Oaks, goes 9.7 miles to John Robinson Corner, then 10 miles to Encinoso School, 8.3 miles to South Base Road turn-off, and 13 miles to edge of Old Lincoln Town where racers will carry letter on foot to courthouse. The race follows old trail line most of the way. Total distance is 41 miles.

Sadler to Kansas

Troy L. Sadler, local Industrial Arts teacher, has submitted his resignation and will move to Johnson, Kansas. Sadler came to Carrizozo eight years ago and has been in charge

There are 11 members on this committee.

The Sadlers have four children ages 10, 8, 6 and 5. Mrs. Sadler is Past Worthy Matron of the local order of the Eastern Star and is presently employed as bookkeeper at Petty's Gambles Store and Petty Motel. The Sadlers are members of the First Baptist Church where he is a deacon and leader of the young people training union. The Sadlers own their home here, which they remodeled last summer.

Daylight savings time arrived this year with a minimum of confusion in Carrizozo.

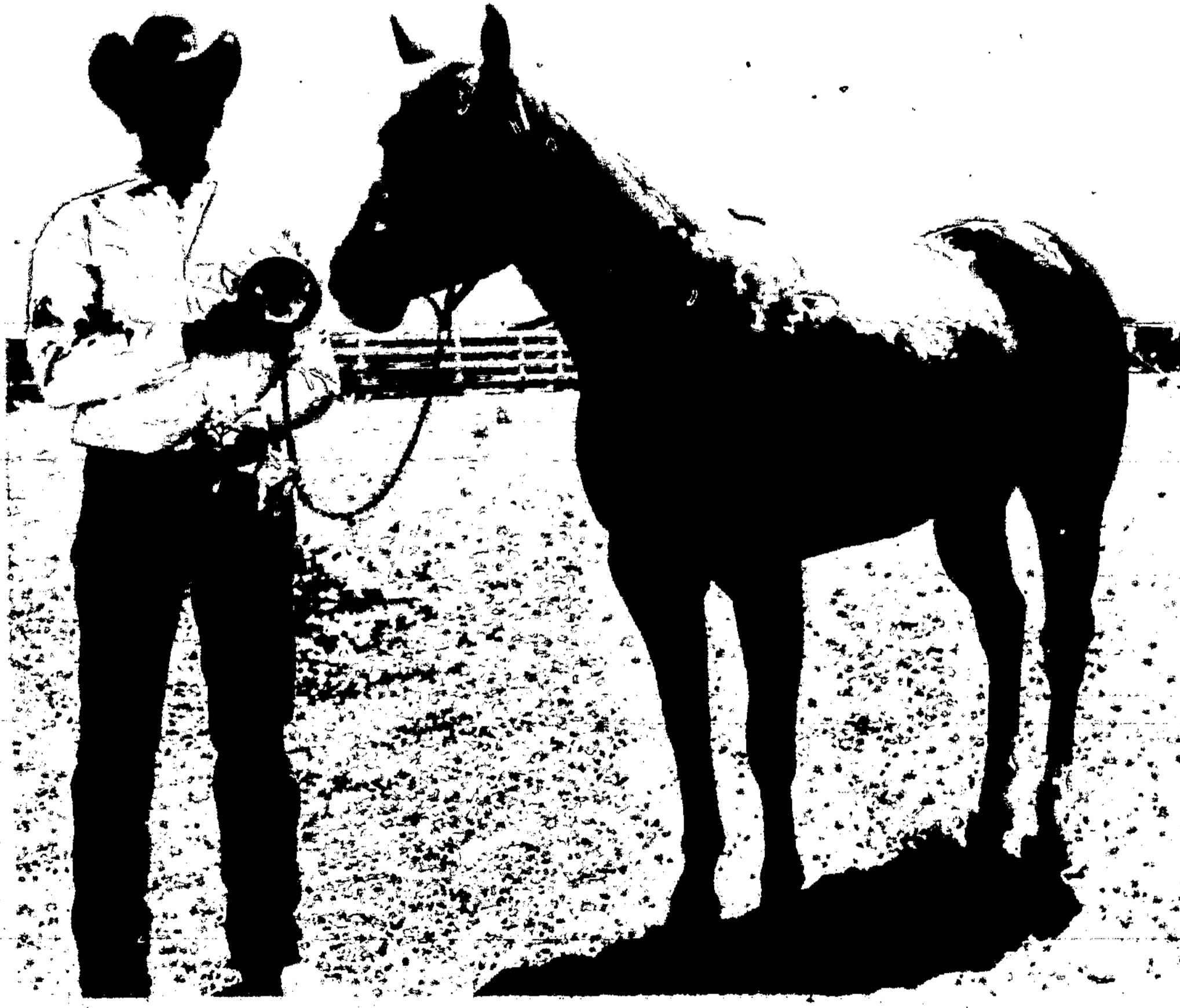

Got to get that crazy education thing out of our head, but first we'd like to put two and two together and see what it comes to.

From what we read, rural areas are getting the shaft again on closing out Job Corps centers, and if there be a bad situation it is the fact that such centers are to be continued in metropolitan areas while those like Mountainair and Eight Canyon are closed.

The Eight Canyon people discovered that many boys coming to that camp cannot read or write. To correct this situation they have 52 employees at the center for 182 boys. That is one employee for each 3 1/2 boys.

What ratio do public schools figure to be right -- around 20 students per employee is close.

Our question goes like this: where have our schools failed, why weren't special schools or classes established by going

schools to teach those problem boys, why does our nation set up another bureau to do a job when the biggest tax bite we're paying in New Mexico is for education.

It's sort of like the parent sending the youngster to school to learn such things as how to eat, toilet training, manners, honesty, trust in God, or any of those things parents should teach. Schools are surely failing in their duty, their primary duty, when they fail to teach reading and writing, let alone how to think.

Parents are at fault, and probably blame the fast changing world, or the preacher or teacher. Schools are not preparing our youngsters for a place in this world, and lack of money is an excuse used there.

Neither poor parental care or poor teaching is excuse enough for another big government deal. Does that two and two make four, five or millions?

Roundup

Lincoln County fruitgrowers met last week at the Wortley with the dinner hosted by Gary Cunningham of Gely Chemical.

Codling moth sex lure traps were discussed by John Durkin, Extension Entomologist at New Mexico State University. The traps are used to time the insecticide spray application more accurately. A small container of female codling moths are put inside a larger container. The inside of the larger container is coated with a sticky substance, then the number of codling moths are counted each morning. Five days after the peak number of codling moths, the apple grower needs to spray his orchards to get the best control. This method has been used in Colorado for several years now and some growers have been able to reduce their sprays from seven to nine applications to 3 applications.

H. L. Jacobson, U. S. Weather Bureau, illustrated on posters how frost occurs and what growers can do about it.

Douglas Bryant showed the group some excellent slides on roadside stands and how they can be made more attractive.

Lincoln County chose its wool judging team last week. There were 20 boys and girls competing. The senior team is Carol Cooper, Christina Pacheco, Carol Davidson and Mitch Tyree. The junior team is Janet Davidson, Jack Davidson, Ginger Cooper, and Cecelia Pacheco. These teams will compete in the senior wool judging contest at Roswell Wool and Mohair this Saturday with the top team representing New Mexico at the National 4-H Wool Judging Contest June 10-12 in Sonora, Texas. The trip is sponsored by the New Mexico Wool Growers Association. The first place senior team in the state contest will receive a trophy from the A. D. Jones Estate of Tatum. The Deboillet Sheep Breeders Association will present a plaque to the high point senior individual in the contest here. The Artesia Wool Co-op will award medals to the first, second and third place senior team as well as to the second and third high point individual.

Serving as judges will be Dr. W. D. McFadden, New Mexico State University's department of Animal Sciences, and Tony Treat, Picacho. Entrants will be evaluating wool for grade, length and shrinkage, and will place four commercial classes. They will be required to defend their placings by giving oral reasons.

The State 4-H Wool Judging Contest takes on added significance with the knowledge that there are more than 1,000 young people in New Mexico currently participating in lamb and sheep breeding projects. New Mexico is one of the major wool producing states, and the state's wool has a good reputation in the U. S. Wool market. The wool judging contest provides an opportunity for young sheep producers to learn the methods of wool evaluation and classification.

Trip to Far East described

Mrs. U. S. Savings Bonds, Mrs. Joy Berleman visits the Far East and Southeast Asia, Japan.

Friday: This was the day I would take the big step and make my first transoceanic trip. I must say I approached it with a little apprehension, flying over the Pacific for such a long time, being gone for three weeks from my family, traveling with a couple that I had never met before. . . . But off I went via American Airlines to San Francisco, Seattle and thence by Northwest Orient Airlines to Tokyo. I left El Paso at 10 a.m. on Friday and arrived in Tokyo at 9:30 Saturday night. I lost 16 hours due to crossing the International Date line. I was met by Jerry and Ursula Keeley, who would be traveling companions and confidants for the next three weeks. I loved them both instantly. Ursula presented me with a beautiful orchid corsage and then they introduced me to Al and Susan Mott. Jerry is the Far East General Manager of the Military Banking Division of American Express Co. and Al Mott is the Yokohama manager and had made quite a few Mrs. U. S. Savings Bonds arrangements for the Japan tour. We went immediately to the Tokyo Hilton where I had a gorgeous suite of rooms all done in the Japanese motif. My first impression of Tokyo was: "Wow." The taxi drivers do drive fast and seemingly as reckless as I had always heard, but we always got to our destination in one piece.

Sunday: The Keeleys and I had a leisurely breakfast and decided on the agenda for the day as I didn't have to start working until Tuesday. We started about noon and did some sightseeing. We visited a Shinto Shrine near the hotel and were fortunate enough to witness the equivalent of an infant baptism -- It is a purification ceremony which takes place on the 30th day after birth of a male child and 33rd day if the child is a female. We also picked up another tourist, a Japanese girl, from Kyoto, who was visiting in Tokyo and seeing the sights, we were. She joined us for the rest of the day as we visited the Imperial Palace Gardens Park, a beautiful section of country and trees in that looming and busy city. It was here we ran across a group of about 30 G.I.'s

on R & R from Vietnam. They were tickled to see us and visit a bit and asked us to be photographed with them in their official tour photograph. They were a swell bunch of boys and this made me look forward to my tour in Vietnam two and one half weeks hence.

We then visited the beautiful Meiji Shrine and the Meiji Jingo Gardens. The weather cooperated beautifully with us, the temperature was in the 50's, it was sunny and just brisk enough to make one feel good. That evening we visited a teahouse and watched authentic Japanese dancing. In fact we were the only "round eyes" in the audience.
