Many questions asked at budget hearing

· The state budget hearing crew composed of Harry Wugalter, ... public school finance director, Carl Whittamore, assistant to Wugalter; Fred McDonald, director of secondary education, representing state department of education; Dave Brennan, representing Title I office: Enos Garcia, represents the state transportation department; is the most courteous, most knowlegeable and hard-working of any state groups we hear any time, any place.

This group of men, plus Grady Mayfield, member state board of education; Ron Coss, director of legislative school study committee: Nora Chavez, with federal impact office; C. A. Kiesler program office for U.S. office of education at Dallas, Texas; Louis M. Stepanski and Harry L. Stark, representing Southern Pacific Co. plus numerous school board members, administrators and teachers were at the budget hearings in Carrizozo Tuesday and Wednesday,

Carrizozo school budget was first up Tuesday morning, Prior to getting down to hard figures Harry Wugalter made a number of comments to the News and then more to the group. The following account is not a hard news writeup, but includes some discussion without answers some opinion from the reporter and as best possible, a report of what went on during nearly three hours of talk about school problems state-wide and in Carrizozo.

Even with the thoroughness of the budget hearing crew, the answer to most important question, of whether or not your youngster is getting a kind of education that will fit him/her for something after graduation, was not answered. This crew is Geelog that tax money is properly spent on such as tissue, texts and tassles -- but they have to leave the educating to the teacher, and local school people, which leaves the tax payer right where he was when

the budget hearing started -wondering, if they think about the matter, if they are getting value received for money spent -on-education-

It was pointed out at the budget . hearing that for a school to qualify as being North Central accredited, this school functions to prepare students for college, and less than half, maybe as few as 23 percent, of Lincoln County students go to or complete college. Both Carrizozo and Corona schools are accredited by North Central, Corona does not ask for this accreditation.

The legislature has asked that one-third of state schools be investigated on site during the next school year, Wugalter said that Carrizozo and Capitan would have such an investigation. This is expected to be an attempt to determine how well the school may be functioning, that is according to state standards.

Wugalter stressed the fact to school people present that a tax payer revolt is to be expected in July when the public first gets hit with new state tax to pay the education bill. An increase of \$25 million was put into education this year, making pay raises possible in all schools, such increase may be hard to come by next year.

The same format of budget hearings is followed for all size schools in the state; This year the legislature has battery of questions to be answered for the purpose of seeing how well the new money furmula is working as well as gathering other information.

The legislature wants to know the reaction of school boards to the new formula. Ray Wells, speaking for Carrizozo school, said they had to stretch money, could use more. Carrizozo will. receive \$23 less per student than a year ago, partly due to lower enrollment.

A check is being made of effect of reappraisal under the 33 1/3 assessment level. Lincoln County has not been reappraised

but is using 33 1/3 as assessment figure.

The pupil-teacher ratio statewide is important. Most severe criticism of Carrizozo school came in this area, where one teacher handles 30 some students in lower grade (1-2-3) and the ratio drops down to 1 to 20 or less in upper grades, Many school people think that to get students properly involved in education the first grade (probably 2nd and 3rd as well) is most important, that twenty studenis is plenty for a first grade teacher.

Use of federal money coming to school district, Carrizozo will probably receive around \$11,097, is wanted information, C.A. Keisler said that the exact sum of money to be spent by federal government which might filter down to Carrizozo has not been set and could go as low as \$187 million or possibly as high as \$600 million. Action on this

money could make difference of \$2-3 thousand to each Lincoln County school.

Other questions asked, whether or not the new formula is providing sufficient staff to meet new standards, is school meeting state standards, about building and facilities. Carrizozo is well up here, plenty of classroom space and adequate facilities. Substitute teacher pay is important it's \$12 and \$15 per day in Carrizozo.

Carrizozo has low percent of master degree teachers by state standards, and possibilities not good that this number will be increased. Are leachers professionally prepared to teach subject, does school have sufficient supplies, does board intend to hire added staff, cost of transportation gone into at length.

The words 'isolated and essential" were used in transportation talk, Too long a distance to school, probably

more than 50 miles, is considered a hardship, Carrizozo, Capitan and Corona are in such a class.

The 44 course offerings in Carrizozo high school was considered real high, but then Zozo school people figured out that 8-10 of these were for 7-8th grades leaving 36 courses offered in upper grades still high but much closer to state average. Wugalter pointed this out in connection with bad teacher-pupil ratio in grades, that less courses could be offered in high school and more teachers added to grade school.

Salary schedule was discussed, too low in Carrizozo by state average, each teacher will get \$400 minimum raise for next year. Supt. Ellison said that after the 15-13 vote last year whether or not to walk out) he invited the teacher ansociation to set in on budget making this year. Evelyn Kressyman and Grace Romero are the teacher reps both at the budget hearing.

5-3-7: TYPES OF LICENSE: (A) A person who is the proprietor or owner of any grocery store, drug store or other merchantile business who shall have been continuously in the same business in the same area for a period of one(1) year next preceding the date of application for a license may be licensed to dispense alcoholic liquors in unbroken packages and from the original bottles of containers of less than five (5) gallons each for consumption

other than the premises. (B) A restaurant, hotel or cafe shall have been continuously in business under the same management for a period of one (i) year next preceding the date of application for a license may be licensed to sell alcoholic liquors where sold with the food regularly served to be consumed on the premises.

(C) A person selling or delivering alcoholic beverages at wholesale for resale by dispensers or retailers may be

issued a wholesaler's license." 5-3-8: FEES: License fees for the sale and handling of alcoholic liquors shall be as shown in the following table:

(B) Consumption of Consumption on the premises - "the premises All kinds of \$400.00 alcoholic liquors Wholesale \$150.00 \$100,00

Section 2 The license tax imposed by this ordinance does not apply to any faxable event that occurred prior to the effective date of this ordinance. The payment, collection or enforcement of taxes, the liability for payment of which was incurred by reason of events occurring prior to the effective date of this ordinance, shall continue under the provisions of the applicable ordinance previously in force in every manner as though this ordinance had not been passed and adopted.

Section 3 The provisions of this ordinance are severable, If any part or application of any part of this ordinance is held invalid, the remainder of its application to other situations or persons shall not be affected.



Centinued Frem Page One under Title I will be continued next year. Lots of work being done on humanities course in Carrizozo school, in attempt to involve youngsters in the school, The Miami language program is part of this program.

Question was asked where do Carrizozo grads go. Most boys go right into service, maby 20 percent of class to college, girls don't leave town as fast as boys but few stay here.

Days of teacher leave discussed. Zozo teachers have 10 days when they can pay substitute. Zozo grade one has 31 pupils, Grade 2 has 37, 3rd has 50, 33 pupils in each of grades 4-5-6. Wugalter said there was definite downtrend state wide in school enrollment. Of any first grade only 50 percent are expected to graduate, \$129,87 is allowed for each disadvantaged, child in Carrizozo school.

Wugalter said that the new money formula or pattern fits Carrizozo perfectly, yet it looks like something is amiss, McDonald then suggested Zozo get more teaching help into the grades. The Zozo board was advised by McDonald to review extent of course offerings in high school, Supt. Ellikon made comment that school should offer

courses students want. C.A.
