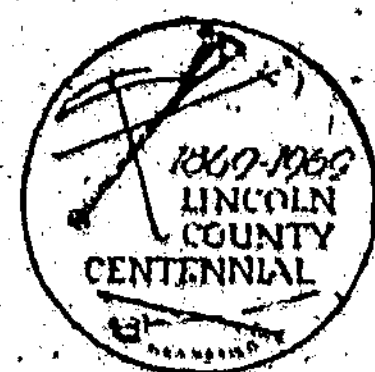

Golf course looks better than par

Mr. Robert J. Arkins, Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, U. S. Department of Interior of Denver and Wheeler Olcott of New Mexico State Planning Office in Santa Fe met with Carrizozo council members, recreation committee members, Mrs. A. N. Spencer, Engineer Tom Mann, and several interested people Wednesday afternoon to go over planning and details of the new golf course, a \$350,000 recreation project in Carrizozo.

As proposed the Country Club will turn over land it owns, all except ground occupied by clubhouse, to the Town of Carrizozo which will then enter into contract with the State of New Mexico, and Federal Government for funds, to be matched or better by the Bancroft Foundation, for construction of a new recreation facility using present sand golf course along US380 east of Carrizozo.

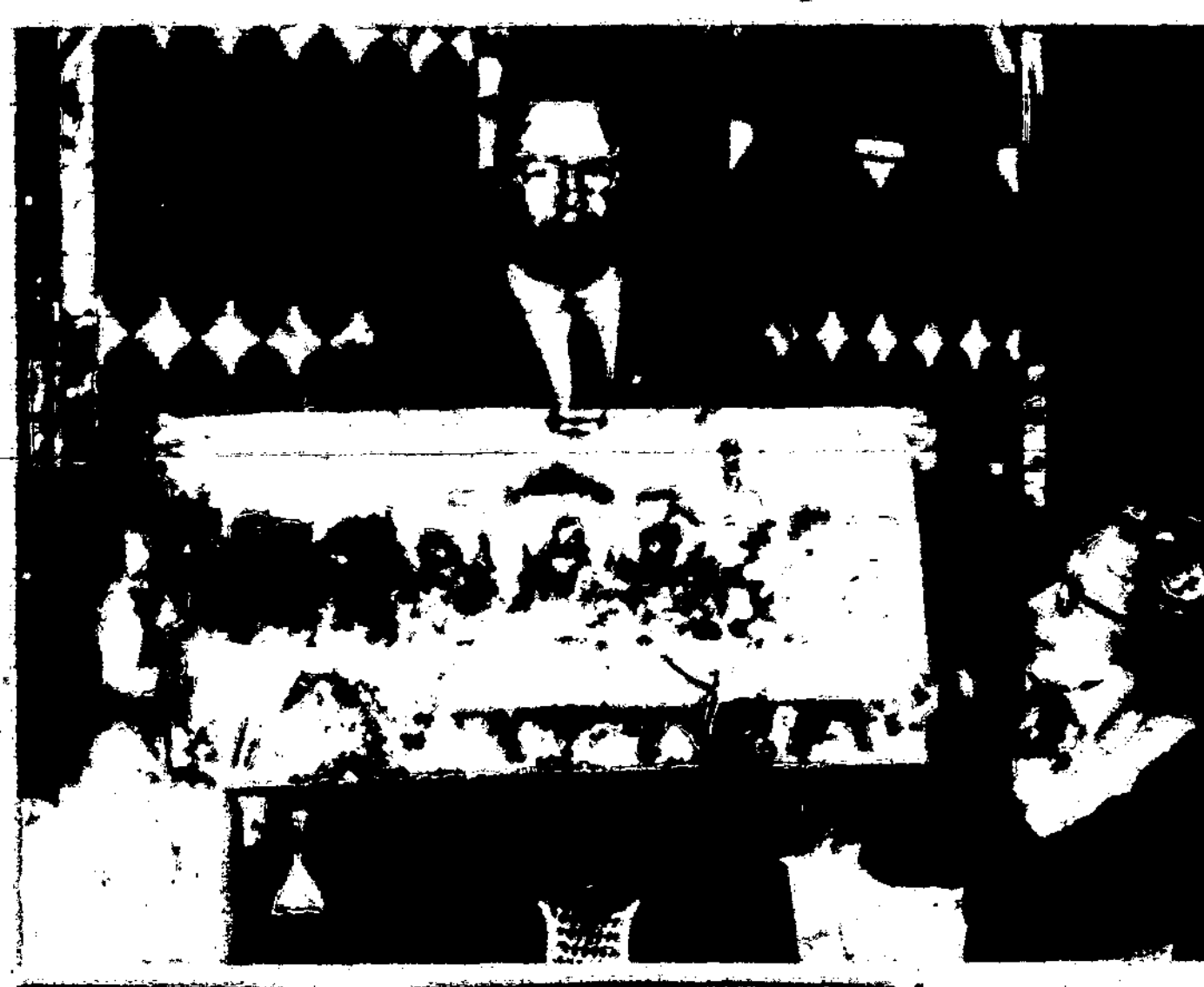

The Farm Bureau attended a dinner at the Wortley in Lincoln last Saturday night. All of their rooms were full. That has been such a busy place for some time.

A visit to the Ruidoso Hospital to see friends and neighbors who were ill I found that hospital to be full and running over with patients in the halls. It was so crowded, I have been told by some of the board members that the hospital has been 91% full every day for such a long time. They need to remodel and add more rooms but to date they have not been able to do it.

The last two days we have had warm winds, perhaps that means spring is with us. Our trees are nearly in full leaf. We are busy planting which is of course a joy to us and better still it will be more than a joy when those seeds come forward and produce food or beauty. What a grand time of the year.

Capitan school will close this weekend for the summer.

Final part of the Berleman trip: Thursday - Up early again and off to Yokosuka Naval Base by bubble "chopper". During our trip we passed over the "bullet train" which travels at 125 MPH across Japanese countryside, over a Japanese shipyard where they are building the world's largest tanker, so large that half is being constructed in one dry dock and the other half in another. We also flew over the Nigishi Heights Racetrack which is now a beautiful golf course and which was a POW Camp during WW II for Americans. I pause to think that the men camped there 25 years ago could never have envisioned the beautiful and peaceful area it is now. We arrived in a flurry of wind from the chopper blades to be greeted by Rear Admiral Smith, Commander U. S. Naval Forces, Japan. He had to rush off as he was going duck netting with his Majesty, the Emperor. We were escorted by Lt. Commander Kelly during our Yokosuka tour.

Off to the USS Mahan, a DLG, Destroyer Leader with Guided Missile capabilities, where we visited for about one hour. That is a fabulous ship equipped with Terrier Missiles and a huge computer which enables that ship to be tied in with her radar and all with many other ships in what ever area she might be. The Mahan is usually deployed to the Gulf of Tonkin for 5 weeks and then back to Yokosuka for two weeks. In the gulf the Mahan's "PIMZ" - Positive Identification Radar Advisory Zone. They call themselves the Piraz Pirates and have a clever flag depicting all the ship's symbology. There is a help pad on the deck and the ship has the capacity for supporting a Sea and Air Rescue Station when necessary. The hull number for the USS Mahan is (1) which was rather appropriate inasmuch as I'm the eleventh Mrs. U. S. Savings Bonds. Their motto is "Double one -- second to none." It was interesting that Jerry Keeley spent four years in the Naval Aviation, but this was his first time aboard ship.

We went to the U. S. Naval Hospital where I visited about 100 men in three wards in about one hour, ran across a young man, Phillip Robinson from Roswell and one whose grandmother Mrs. Joe Robinson lives in Alamogordo. As we signed the guest book in the commanding officer's office, I turned back the page and that page was signed by Joe Namath, Bob Hope, Art Linkletter and Miss America 1968.

We "chopped" back to Tokyo discovered that the crew chief of the helo was formerly stationed at WSMR. After arrival we had minimum time to finish packing and rush to Tokyo International Airport to leave for Seoul, Korea about 4:30 p.m.

The weather had cooperated all five days, in fact, it had been like spring in Las Cruces (without the wind, though.) We hustled onto the Korean Air Lines plane and did our "homework" (reading up on Korean history and such) in anticipation of the busy 48 hours to be spent in and north of Seoul.

This story of Joy's trip has been so interesting and we all have enjoyed it with her. Thank you, for sharing it with us.

Roundup

Attention Fruitgrowers: A new program to lime spray applications was started in Lincoln County, two weeks ago. Live female codling moths are put in a trap with some sticky paper. The codling moths are counted each day to see when the majority of codling moths hatch. The Ruidoso State Bank is sponsoring the cost of getting a new shipment of the female codling moths to the growers each week. This program has been used for several years in Colorado and they have been able to reduce their sprays to three and get 98% worm free apples. All the growers in an area have to spray at the correct time if it is to work.

The three traps in Lincoln County are located at the Ptingsten orchard (near Hondo), the Coe orchard and the Srecongost orchard. The first week of May there was very little moth activity as the moths are not active when the temperature is below 65 F, or when the wind is blowing over 5 mph in the morning or evening.

During the past week moth activity has increased heavily. A. T. Ptingsten has caught from 20 to 50 moths each day. Dave Bonnell caught 10 moths with a peak of moth activity of 52 on May 19th in the Coe orchard; Bill Srecongost caught two at the peak on May 19th and none since then. For the best codling moth control, spray your apples about 6 to 10 days after the peak of codling moth hatch. This letter printed in a Texas

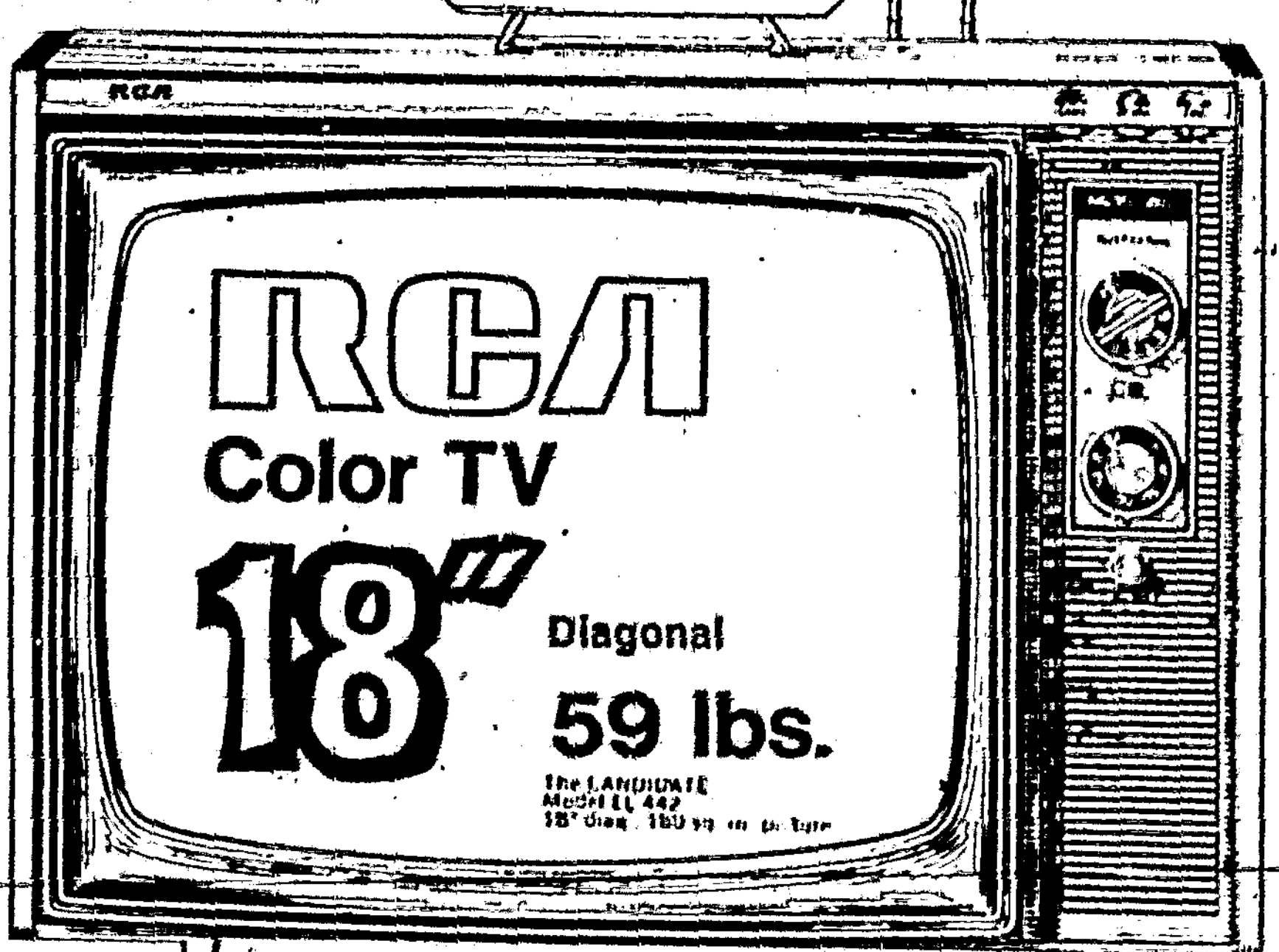

All of you are familiar with Ordinances that prohibit dogs being turned loose. We intend to enforce these and you are warned to keep your dogs at home.
