## Mrs. Gene Murfin dies of injuries

Mrs. Gene Murfin died Monday night in the Ruidoso - Hondo Valley General Hospital as a result of injuries she received in a 2:30 p.m. two-car crash across from Sierra Blanca Motor Co. in Ruidoso. She died at 7:30 p.m. Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon at 2 p.m. at the First Baptist Church in Carrizozo.

Others in the car with Mrs. Murfin were her 4 year old daughter, Rogene, Mary Hobbs and her children, Bobby James Hobbs, 15, Bonnie, 12 and Gladdis, 2.

Driver of the vehicle, a 1964 sedan was Bobby James Hobbs, who police said has a valid New Mexico learner's permit.

The other vehicle was driven by Mr. Bert M. Blasingame of Alameda, California. Police report said the Blasingame car was traveling west on U.S. 70 and the Hobbs car exited from side road and was crossing the highway at the time of impact. Both vehicles were total losses.

Funeral services have been set for Friday, August 8 at 2:00 p.m. in the First Baptist

Church in Carrizozo, Rev. Varl ball will officiate, interment will be made in Ancho Cemetery. Chapel of Roses will be in charge.

Survivors are three sons, E.D. Bond, Corona, Dr. Bob Bond, Roswell, Tarleton Bond of Pagosa Springs, Colorado, one brother, H.E. Bond, Menlo Park, California, one sister, Gladys Kiddar, San Diego, California and seven grandchildren. His wife, Mrs. Betty Bond, died in Roswell in 1959.

Graveside service were held Wednesday morning at 10:00 a.m. in South Park Cemetery in Roswell. Rev. Joe Brown of the First Presbyterian Church of Roswell conducted the services.

# County to vote Sept. 9 on \$665,000 bond issue

Lincoln County Commissioners Don Stark and Holt Lovelace (Jones on vacation) had a full day Tuesday with a lot of business and many visitors.

The Commissioners adopted a resolution calling for election September 19, 1969, to vote on \$665,000.00 in general obligation bonds for the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital.

Elfred Jones presented a plat for Mrs. Lula Runnels which divides property for East part of A.N. Runnels Garden Plot, approved.

S. B. Boykin requested improvements on three miles of road from Nogal south to Pfingsten Ranch, granted.

Francis Owen, Martine Yrlart, Clyde Seely, L. D. Sparks and Luther McInnes of Corona met with the commissioners to request that 25 miles of road be improved and ten cattle guards installed on school bus route southeast of Corona between Highways 42 and 48. The work will be done.

The commissioners approved at for Highland View subdivision north of Capitan presented by Neal Chapman.

Fred Wood, Lincoln Otero sanitarian, Douglas S. Rogillo Jr. of the state health Department and Ruth Eckland, county health nurse talked with the commissioners about services provided to the county by the health department.

Harold Broom and Carol May Smith were present to request road improvements in the Bonito Lake area. This road work is complicated by ownership of several interests, including state, county, and forest service.

C. D. Browning, project supervisor for the state road department told the commissioners, and Mr. Broom and Mrs. Smith, that he had recently toured all of the county's roads, 1,362.5 miles of roads now being maintained by the county, and found them in real good condition. He expressed the opinion that the Lincoln road department has

been doing a real good job.

The county road crew will move into the Bonito area in about two weeks and do some repair there, but must get after school bus routes later this month.

The commissioners approved application for transfer of liquor license from Joe Phillips to Kathryn Taylor, Coy Maroney and L.W. McDonald.

Ramon Maes presented application for transfer of his liquor license to new location 140 feet east at the George Curry saloon on north side of US380. Action on this application will be delayed until the September 8 meeting.

## Former University of Oklahoma QB will be new Grizzly football coach

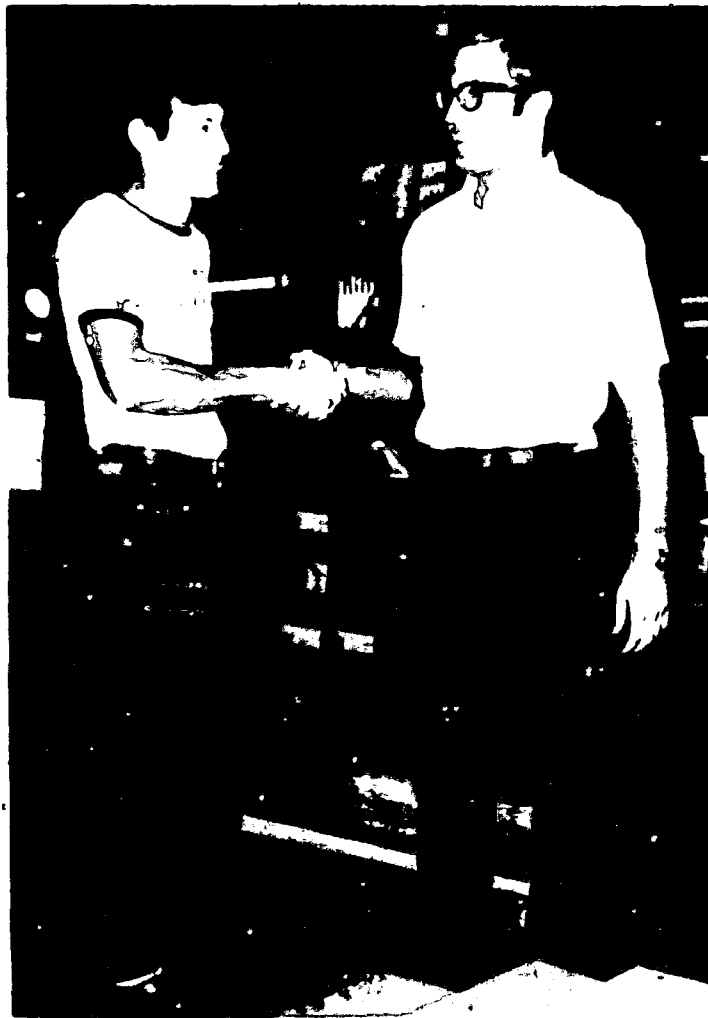
Tommy Douglas Pannell, who played three years of football under Coach Bud Wilkerson and two years under Gomer Jones at the University of Oklahoma has contracted to coach the Carrizozo Grizzly football team and teach four classes of English in grade nine through twelve.

Pannell was commissioned as Second Lieutenant in the Adjutant General Corps in 1968 and was responsible for all financial transactions for 16 postal units in Southern Germany, later served a year in Vietnam and was discharged as a Captain. Pannell played on some of the teams when Oklahoma was piling

up a win record that still stands as the best in the nation for a major college. His home is Norman, Oklahoma where he was all-conference, all-state, and outstanding back in the Oklahoma all-star game.

The purchase was made in name of Newco Industries, Inc. and 97 per cent of the Ruidoso Downs stock was purchased from Gene Hensley and Billie Jo Hensley and several minority stockholders.

Culver purchased the Raton track four years ago from Wood Erwin. Lots of 1,729 and 2,012 shares were bought for amount said to be around \$4 million. Total stock at Ruidoso Downs was set at 8,000 shares in recent financial report.

# One go-round for entries in Billy the Kid rodeo

Planning and preparation for two big rodeo and baile nights in Carrizozo August 15-16 is coming along fine. The rules and events as originally advertised need no changing, but a little clarification will help.

Boys and girls in any age group may ride horses or ponies of any size in such as the barrel race, pole bending, flag race. Stock for the bull riding and bareback bronc riding will all be supplied by the Millburn Bros., rodeo producers and will be under 46 inches in height.

Entries are limited to 32 contestants in all events, as the posters state and entries will close at 10 a.m. Friday, Aug. 15. This means there will be only one go-round, 16 entries will contest on Friday night and 16 more on Saturday night, and the highest score from the two nights will win the trophy saddle as well as second and third place awards and money.

There is a good possibility that award money can total \$384 for any one age group, split 50-30-20 means that first place can be worth \$192, second

\$115.20 and third place for any age group winner be worth \$76.80.

The trophy saddle and centennial buckles should be the fanciest rodeo trophies awarded in New Mexico any year. The saddle is specially tooled for the Lincoln County Centennial, the buckles for all rodeo events, including the Billy the Kid State Champion Calf Roping and Adult Calf Roping will have bronze centennial medallions attached, the only buckles of this kind ever made for rodeo winners.

Entries are coming in real good from Otero County, the clarification of just one go-round will let contestants compete in Carrizozo Friday night and take in the Harding County Fair events on Saturday. Rodeo officials have had several calls from Tucuman about this matter.

Advice from the temporary rodeo secretary at the News office for all Lincoln County kids wishing to enter this rodeo is to get your entry blanks filled out, notarized and money put down to make your entry official. Truman Spencer figures to get

help from Carrizozo football boys at their first practice session to load bleacher seats in a truck and haul them to the rodeo ground so there ought to be plenty of good seats for spectators.

There will be a breakfast meeting at the Payton residence Thursday, August 14, chow to be served up from 7:00 a.m. on until everyone is fed, and last minute details will be taken care of at that time. Any one doing anything for this rodeo is welcome and cordially invited for breakfast of buttermilk pancakes, ham, bacon, eggs, coffee.

Tickets are being sent out for the Saturday night Baile this week, and should you not get one, please contact the News office and get your ticket. This will also be a one-of-a-kind event. Hasn't been a genuine baile held in Carrizozo for quite a spell. The Aggie Ramblers will be on hand to make good dancing music and the evening ought to be a lot of fun, starting right after the Saturday night rodeo.

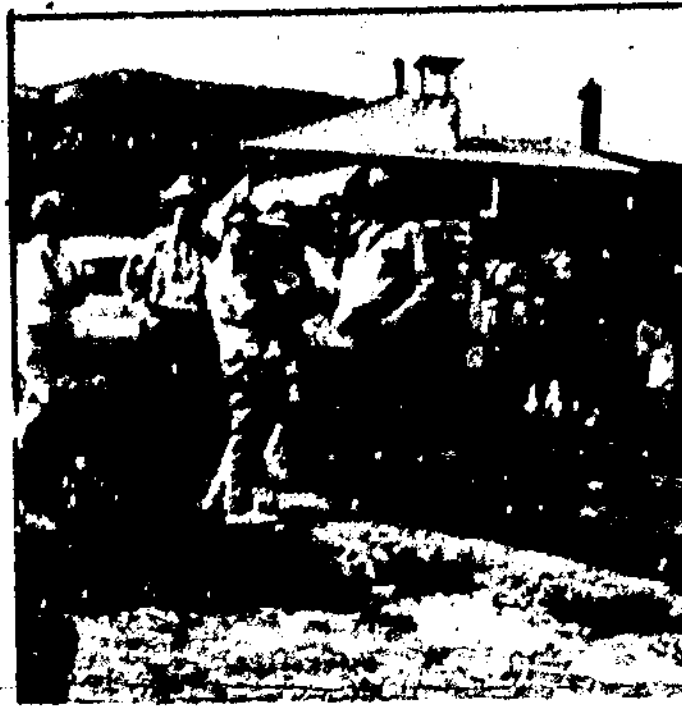
It's all fine except one spot -- the lake, which is lined with rubbish most of the time, water down so low that crawdads far out number any other living thing

## ROOM FOR CHANGE IN AGRICULTURE PROGRAM

U.S. Representative Ed Foreman says there are numerous signs pointing to the need for restructuring government programs in the agricultural field.

"The present depressed economy in rural America, which can be directly traced to past and current farm programs, should be foremost in the minds of the Members of the House Agriculture Committee as it begins hearings on new farm legislation this week", said Foreman.

"An examination of the gloomy economic picture confronting the nation's farmers -- especially the small farm income lagging far behind the rest of the economy. Farm costs however, rose almost twice as fast as prices for farm products during the past five years. This failure to keep up with the rest of the economy has caused an enormous \$20 billion increase in the farm debt since 1963. While the price of farm goods has jumped greatly for the housewife, the price paid the farmer has not made great gains.

The New Mexico Congressman expressed the viewpoint... "Any program that purports to deal adequately with rural and agricultural problems will have to be a total concept package that covers all of the factors involved such as farm income, foreign trade in agricultural products, urban migration and rural economic development.

Hensley asking that defendant corporation be ordered and required to purchase and acquire equipment owned by plaintiff, to be required to extend concession contract between the parties through 1972 racing season. In the alternative, plaintiff have and recover damages in the sum of \$230,000. That defendants be enjoined and restrained from disposing of stock pending outcome of this suit. Case filed July 25, not set yet.

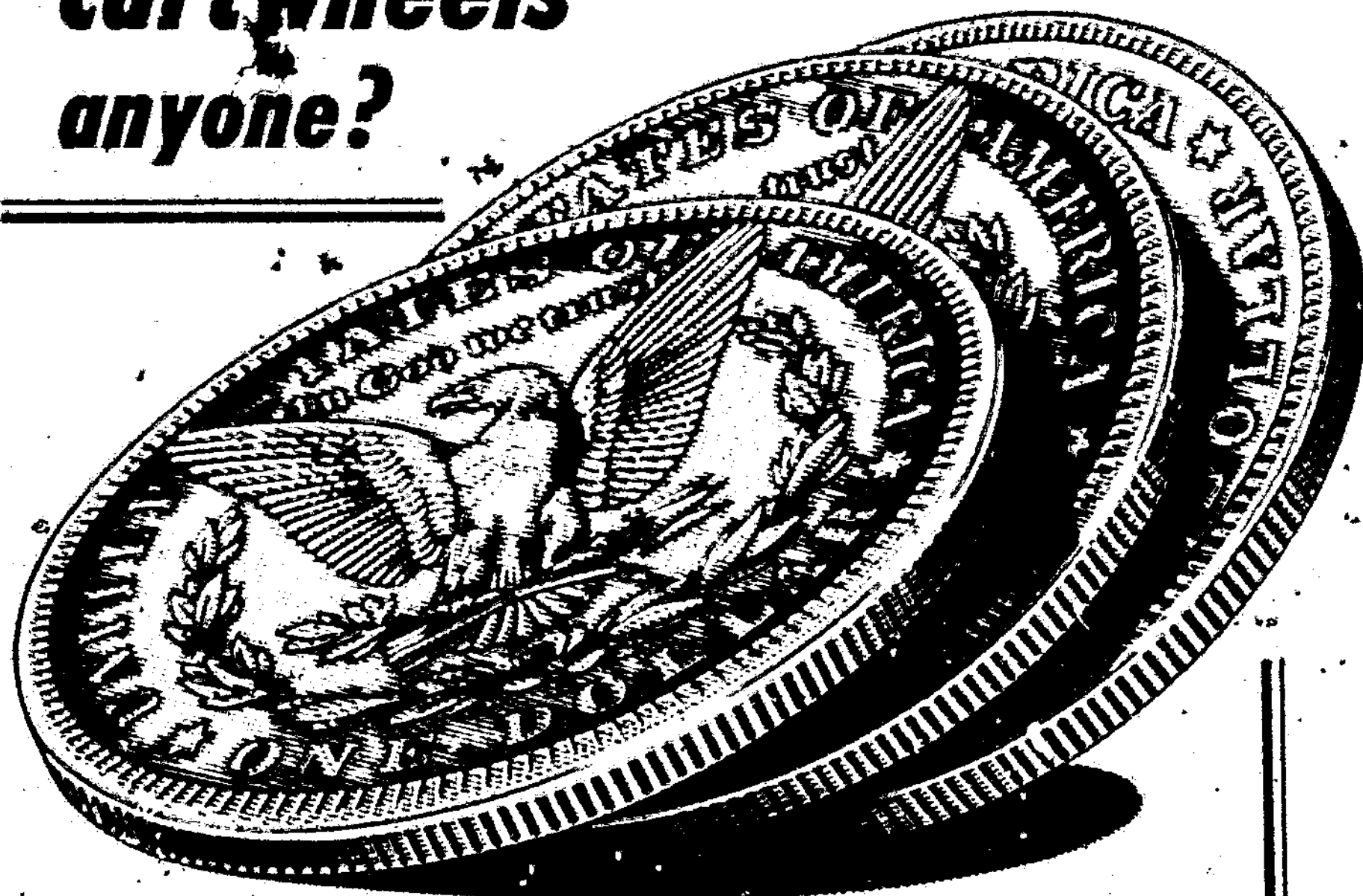

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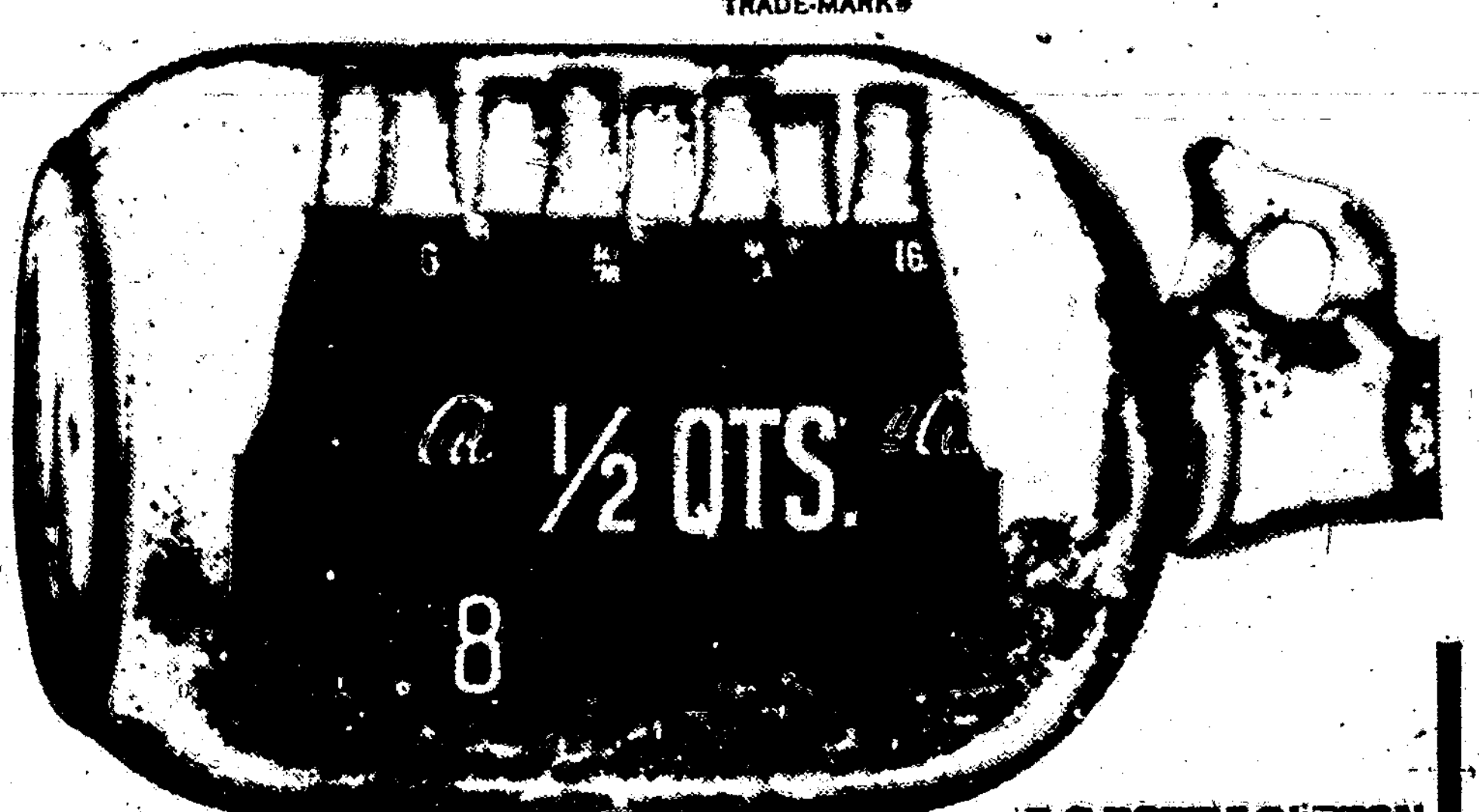

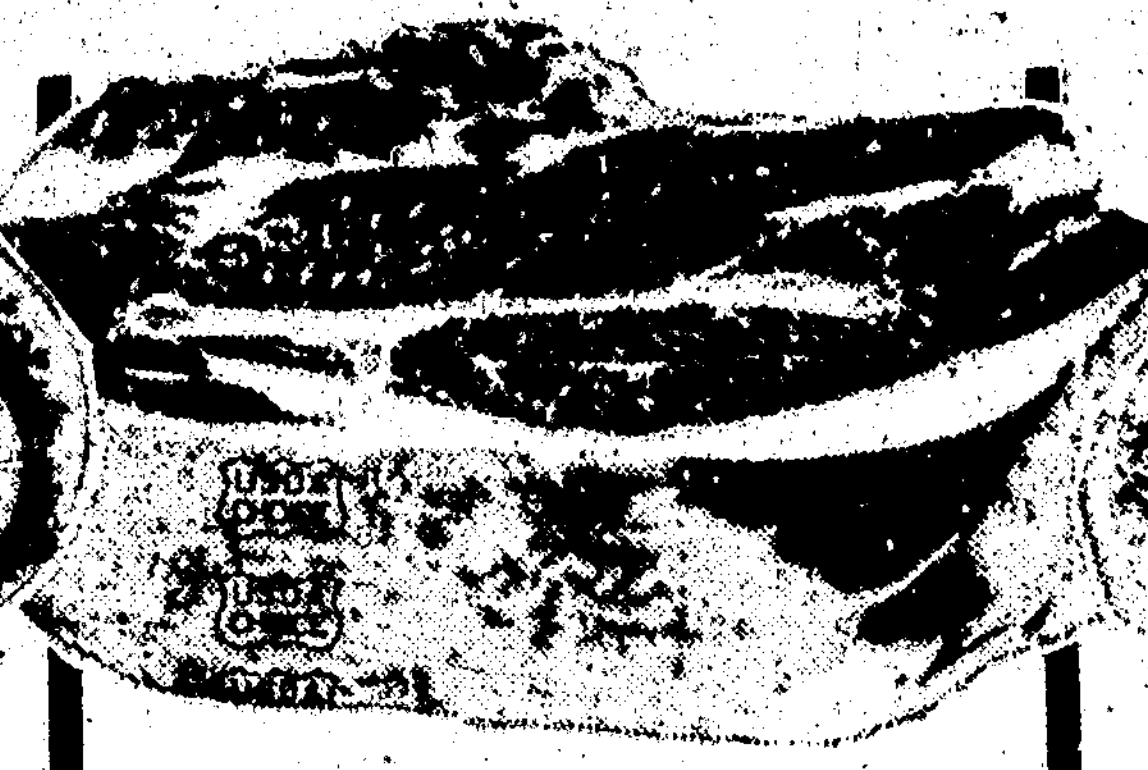

**Reminiscence of Texas Park**

Unless you have lived in Lincoln County, New Mexico, for at least half a century you may never have heard of Texas Park. But such a place did exist, fabulous as it may seem, and there are still a few of the younger generation who can attest to the fact. But a person not too familiar with this long-forgotten part of the world needs give free rein to his imagination in order to get the picture.

This was an isolated community with not even the slightest semblance to the smallest of towns. Scattered here and there, often long distances apart, lived a number of families in an environment of quiet contentment, a state not always seen in rural communities.

From the foot of statey and mysterious Patos Mountain on the west extended miles and miles of rolling hills and valleys to the east, which afforded room -- and to spare -- for any who chose to dwell "far from the madding crowd."

White Oaks was on the west side of the mountain and about ten miles distant -- the nearest town, and a wagon road wound around the mountain and a trip to town took all of half a day. It was much nearer by going over the mountain, directly "as the crow flies," but this could be accomplished only on foot or horseback, the road being only a faint cow-trail.

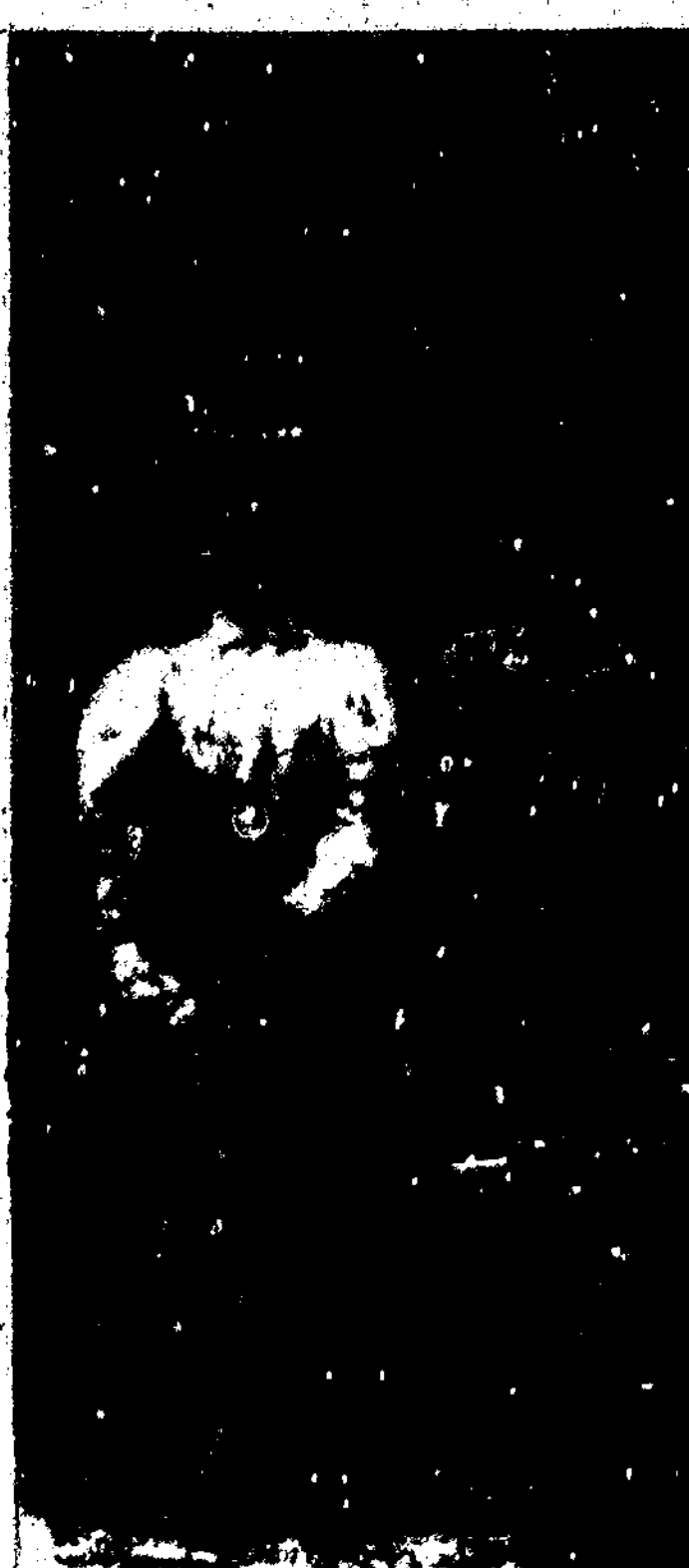
The trip to town was considered a very important event, particularly to the youngsters, for it meant that on his return Papa's pockets would be bulging with candy and peanuts, and maybe he would buy a new slate and slate pencil to replace those broken ones; he might even bring back a pair of new shoes. Shoes didn't wear very long walking to school over rocks and brambles... (some boys were known to carry their shoes until within view of the schoolhouse). Then there would be the Post Office to go to -- there might be a newspaper or two -- and a magazine, maybe; or a letter from the folks back home.

But I haven't yet told you how this community got its name. It was like this: All these families (with the exception of mine) had migrated from various parts of Texas, perhaps with the idea of economical betterment, or... who can say? there was government land to be acquired by filing claims. A big lumber mill somewhere in the Capitan Mountains was feasibly accessible; so these strong-hearted migrant Texans built for themselves the best homes they could afford and settled down to the task of making a living.

Soon they acquired small herds of cattle and other farm animals. They farmed in sufficient amounts to provide winter feed for their stock and raised an assortment of foodstuff for their own use.

However, all was not always peace and prosperity, by any means, for along would come the lean years interspersed with the fruitful years, for these ranchers depended wholly upon the rain for their crops and pastures, and there were years of drought of such vast proportion that even the scrub-oak dried up and the cattle could find nothing to eat and died of starvation.

Because of the severity of the winter at that time, and the long distances the children had to walk, school was conducted during the summer months and as a consequence the school sessions were sadly short. Everyone walked, including the teacher who roomed and boarded with one of the families during the few months of school. Riding



horses couldn't be spared because they were needed for work on the farm, but a few of them rode burros.

Ours was the traditional "Little Red Schoolhouse," except that the red, as I remember, had faded away long ago. It was built of raw lumber and there were two windows on each side and only one door. It sat on wooden blocks (or perhaps rocks) at some altitude from the ground, which together with the numerous cracks in the walls afforded sufficient ventilation. A home made table standing on a high platform at the back served the teacher for a desk. The pupil's desks were obviously home-made.

At one side of the door there was a stand, of a sort, that held a large galvanized waterbucket equipped with a long handled tin dipper, and once in the morning and once in the afternoon teacher would choose one of the larger boys to "pass the water around", the water was carried every morning from Lacey's well about a quarter of a mile distant.

When noon rolled around there was a scramble for the old fashioned tin lunch buckets, with each family forming its own little family circle to share its contents, sitting or reclining in the shade of their favorite tree. After lunch the boys played marbles, while the girls engaged in one of those wholesome old games that only the old folks remember about. Needless to say

they never ran out of ideas for play and fun.

This picture has withstood the diversity of vicissitudes to which all old pictures are subjected. The girl standing in the doorway beside the teacher has tenaciously clung to it for the past seventy-two years and I am to treat it most tenderly, under penalty of untold punishment if I should let anything happen to it -- She's my sister!

This group represents the major part of the families that composed the Texas Park of long ago. The land has no doubt changed owners many times over the years. Not a trace remains of the former habitations, except perhaps, for a pile of stones here and there, where chimneys once cast a glow of welcome to the stranger passing by, now

silent reminders of a generation of pioneers who traveled far under difficult circumstances in order to build for themselves and their posterity a more promising future.

There are memories that remain with us for a lifetime; one of my fondest memories reverts to my childhood days in our Valley where the skies are just a little bluer and the stars seem to shine a wee bit brighter than anywhere else in the whole world. Nor shall I ever forget those wonderful friends whose response to a neighbor's need was prompt and with no thought about recompense.

This was "Texas Park".

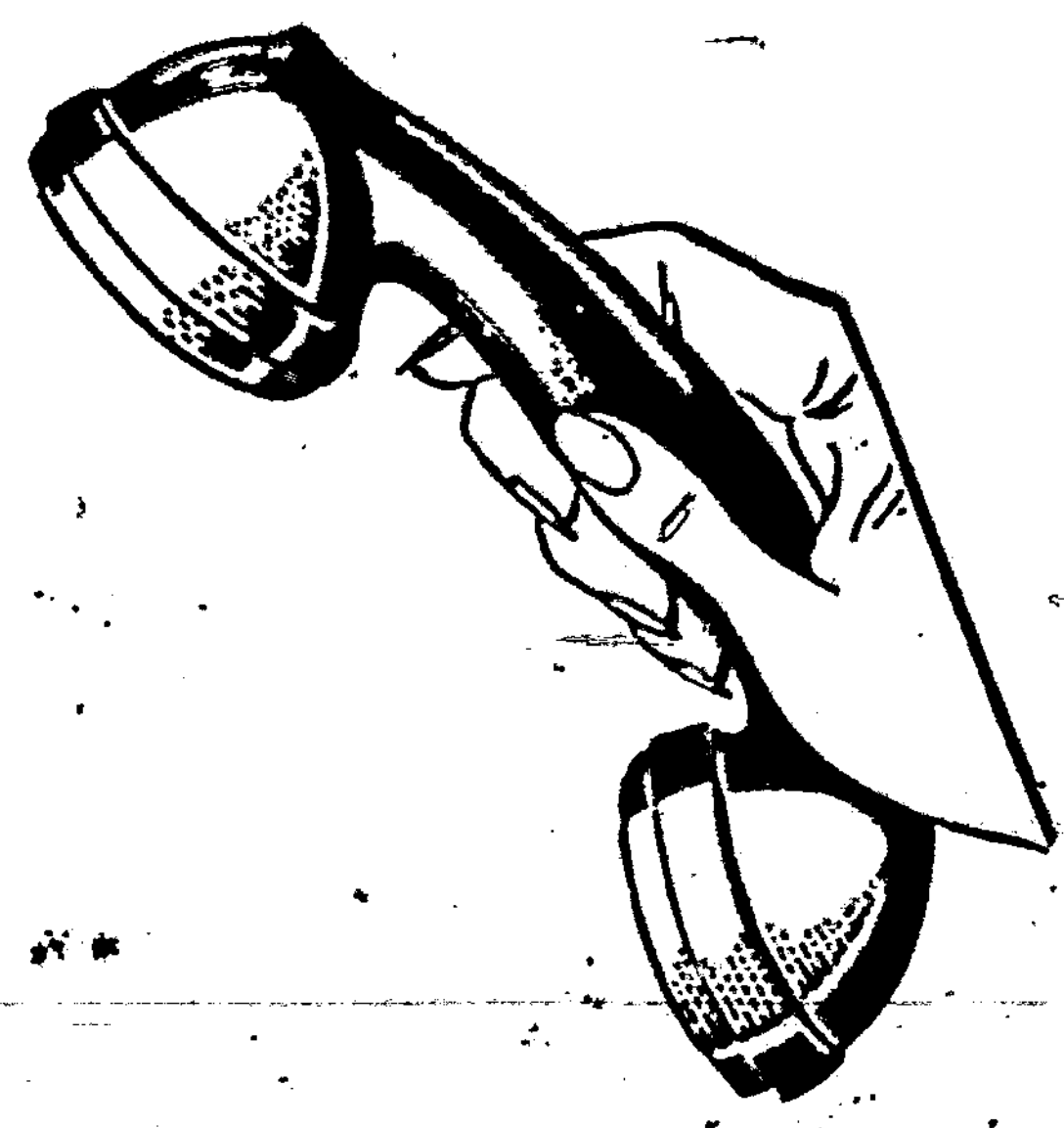
