Everything ready for centennial rodeo & baile

The biggest event in Carrizozo this Lincoln County Centennial year will be the two days of rodeo this weekend, August 15-16 starting at 7:00 p.m. in the Joe Sargent Memorial Arena. A great amount of work has been done by many people shaping up the arena, moving in bleachers, moving in for the chuck wagon feed, getting the concession stand cleaned up and ready, checking out the lights, and the final details will be worked out Thursday morning to make this rodeo go off real smooth.

The Billy the Kid Rodeo used to be in Carrozo back a good many years, then it was moved to Three Rivers where it had a 17-year stand. The Centennial Year is a good one for this special rodeo to come home to Lincoln County where Billy the Kid was well known, and well-liked by a lot of people. Friday and Saturday rodeo events ought to be real good entertainment. Held in the cool of the evening with plenty of bleacher seats, there won't be a better place this week in Lincoln County for fun and excitement. The rodeo is a one-go-around affair which means that part of the contestants will perform Friday and part Saturday, the ones scoring highest either night will win the entry money plus saddle, buckles and ribbons. Chancos are real good that the best performances could come on Friday night. Saturday is a bit special with a flapjack breakfast served by Carrizozo Lions starting at 6:00 a.m. in Spencer Park near the recreation center. Lions will keep the flapjacks hot until everybody is fed. At 5:00 p.m. Saturday, Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce will be serving a chuck wagon supper at the rodeo arena and this will continue until everyone is fed. Members of the Carrizozo Woman's Club will be operating the concession stand both Friday and Saturday with sandwiches, candy, drinks, Methodist Church ladies plan a spaghetti supper at the church Friday, open to all comers.

The Billy the Kid Baile is another first in Lincoln County for a long time. It ought to be a real nice party with music by the Aggie Ramblers and a good place to spend an evening visiting with your friends, listening to the music and dancing when you like. You all come. Rodeo events will start promptly at 7:00 p.m. each evening with some contestants in both age groups for boys and girls going in the arena each night. Rodeo books will close at 10:00 a.m. Friday and the list order of events set up Friday. Some of Lincoln County's real old-time cowboys are expected to be in the arena to make the awards right after the close of the rodeo Saturday night. Southwest New Mexico has been noted for its rodeo performers during much of the one hundred years that are being celebrated in 1969. This week end will be a good opportunity to check out future prospects in the Joe Sargent arena at Carrizozo.

\$900,000 tax lien filed on three marihuana carriers

The Federal Government filed a Federal Tax Lien under Internal Revenue Laws July 31 in the amount of \$320,000.00 against Jeffery Allan Spreen, and a similar lien against Marcus Lee Roe and Virgil John Bland, the three men who were picked up on the White Oaks road and charged with possession of approximately 200 pounds of new (wet) marihuana. The three liens total \$980,000.00, on file in the Lincoln County clerk's office. The case of State vs Jeffery Allan Spreen of Maplewood, Mo., charged with possession of marihuana, was heard in Judge Richard A. Stanley's court Aug. 12. Spreen pleaded nono contendere and was sentenced to one to three years in the state penitentiary. Spreen told Lincoln authorities that he was interested in marihuana and intended to write a book on the subject, which was the reason for him being along on the trip. Roe of Laguna Beach, California, and Bland of Maplewood, Missouri, are both out on bond. The liens are for excise marihuana transfer in favor of the United States upon all property and rights to property belonging to said taxpayers.

Steve Ortiz, Albert Najer, and Leroy Chavez, charged with destroying property, were released to Probation Officer Manuel Ortiz.

Joseph Salazar, charged with aggravated battery was released to the probation officer. Greg Baca, charged with affray and assault on officer, was sentenced to ten days in jail to be served on week ends.

Joseph Grubb, Efrem Candelaria, charged with snuffing paint, were released to Steve Bonnell of Catip Sierra Blanca.

Cox reports on convention

Robert Cox, Lincoln-Sierra delegate to the constitutional convention now going on in Santa Fe, called Tuesday with message that committees are getting down to work, public hearings are starting but are called in short order. About the only way people can find out when such hearings will be held is to check your radio news broadcasts, Cox says. Cox will be serving on three committees, local government, revenue-taxation and style committee, the one that puts the new constitution in final form. He thinks majority of delegates will favor keeping the 20 mill tax limit, will oppose consolidation of government such as elimination of county officials. Cox commented that he thought our constitution should be mostly an updating of present document, that if the convention makes many radical changes people will reject the entire business in the vote this fall. King is running a good convention, said Robert Cox.

EDITOR'S CORNER

Wonderful help all around

Ladies are preparing lots of goodies for the concession stand, another group will be book-keeping the rodeo, others likely helping the men prepare a chuck wagon supper, and quite a few ladies are signing checks for their youngsters to enter this event.

A surprising number of men and boys are turning out to put the arena in shape, so it will look spick and span this week end, other men tending to the lights, bringing bleacher seats, carrying publicly materials, signing up entries, getting pledges (mostly rain insurance), fixing to tend the gate at both rodeo and baile, and the head chef of the town is preparing a feed for

Saturday night. Undoubtedly there are other people doing things not mentioned here, all a part of a big centennial year in Lincoln County -- we're proud of their efforts, and want to say "Thanks" for time spent. It just takes people to get things done.

Whether or not the Centennial Billy the Kid Rodeo in Carrizozo this week end turns out to be fantastic or somewhere between good and common remains to be seen -- but from the way people have been pitching in to help for the two nights August 15-16, they can hardly miss being fine fun and entertainment for all who attend.

Where the action is

Stock market's been off most of the summer, strikes in the farm area hurt some agriculture interests, summer business in most down-town small-town stores can be real common, but none of that means that people aren't spending money -- lots of money -- on recreation.

State Parks attendance has increased from 125,000 in 1953 to an estimate 3.6 million in 1967, expected to surpass 8 million by 1980.

Expectations are that total resident and non-resident fishing licenses will nearly triple from 1950 to 1975, rising from 48,000 to 187,000.

Total attendance at western ski areas nearly doubled from 1955 to 1960 and increased more than threefold from 1955 to 1963. Some 400,000 visitors at ski area expected each year by 1980.

Recreation visitors at national forests will increase about four times between 1960 and 1970.

New Mexico boat registrations in 1964 numbered 10,000 or about 10 per 1,000 population. The estimate is that by 1970 some

37,000 boats will be registered or about 30 boats per 1,000 population.

That being the way things are going, it stands to reason that Lincoln County, and particularly Carrizozo, might as well get with the trend. Many, many things can be done that would improve our image and usefulness as a recreation area.

We should push harder to get the projected golf course, some person-ought to personally take on the project of developing a lake (sure would take a man of character and patience), the little things that make a town look inviting should be done (need no discussion here), airport should be blacktopped and as these projects are completed the types of business that go with recreation are bound to develop in the immediate area.

Recreation is defined by New Mexico Business Study as "activities performed or enjoyed in a rural outdoor environment for relaxation or pleasure". Lincoln County sure has plenty of outdoors of a rural type.

The apple, a most delicious fruit, will appear in abundance in Lincoln County in the weeks to come. The picking of the Red Delicious will start this weekend (August 16-17) in the Hondo Valley. What better time is there to talk about the versatility of this delightful fruit.

Eating out of hand is the way many people prefer to eat apples. An apple, eaten raw, makes a pleasant, low-calorie snack or dessert. A medium size apple contains only 70 calories.

In menu planning the apple can fit anywhere from the appetizer to dessert. Have you thought of "Apple Meat Loaf" or "Apple Smothered Pork Chops" as a main dish? For a vegetable dish you would enjoy sweet potato-apple casserole.

We all know of many salads and desserts that use apples as a major ingredient. Discussing apples as they have appeared

in history and mythology, and how they are used today could take up a large part of this newspaper. Just let me whet your appetite with this recipe for:

- Apple-smothered Pork Chops
- 6 loin pork chops, 1 inch thick
- 1/4 Teaspoon salt
- 1/4 Teaspoon sage
- 3 tart apples
- 3 tablespoons molasses
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 2 cups hot water
- 1 tablespoon vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/3 cup raisins

Sprinkle chops with salt and sage. Brown slowly in hot skillet. Place in large baking dish. Pare, core and slice apples in 1/4 inch slices or rings; arrange on chops. Pour molasses over apples. Add flour to fat in skillet; cook until brown, stirring constantly. Add water; stir until mixture boils. Add vinegar, salt and raisins. Pour over chops and apples. Cover and bake at 350 about 1 hour, or until apples are tender. Makes six servings.

There are a lot more recipes for using apples in the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Bulletin entitled "Apples in Appealing Ways". If you would like a copy, please ask at the Extension Office.

Apple picking starts this week in the Hondo Valley and should be in full swing by August 20th. Apple production is estimated

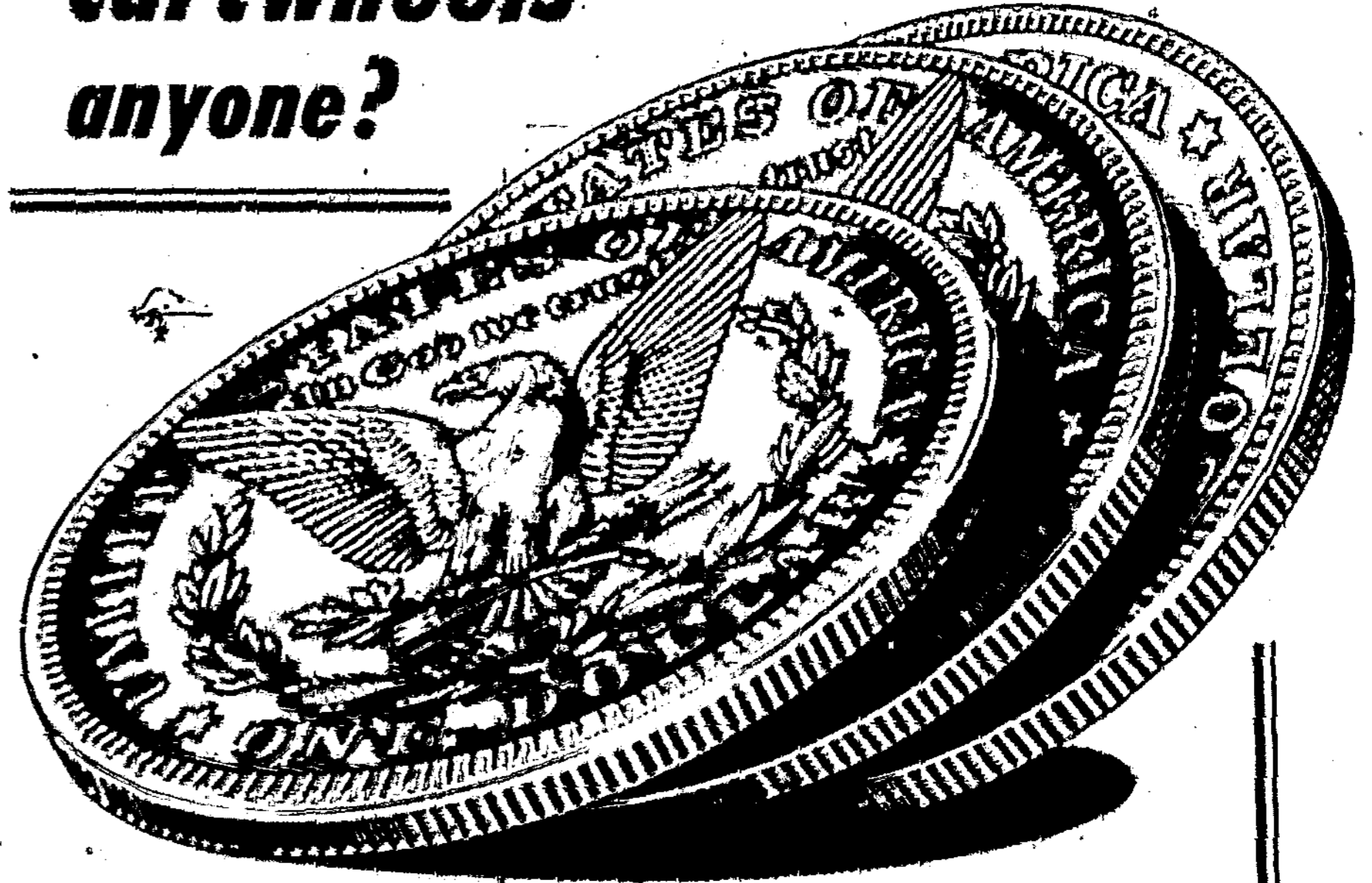
at 150,000 bushels this year. Red Delicious make up the majority of the apples in the area. The other varieties available now are Jonathan and Golden Delicious. The early apples bring prices, therefore growers try to get all their apples sold as soon as possible. Both sheds, the White Mountain Apple and Rio Ruidoso Cooperative are getting their equipment ready for the packing season.

Recent statistics show that 32 pounds of apples per person are produced in the nation. This means about 126 apples per person for the year in all product forms. So each person can only have two glasses of cider, a couple of pieces of apple pie and a snack on the proverbial apple a day. He has then used up his supply. Do you eat your share or not?

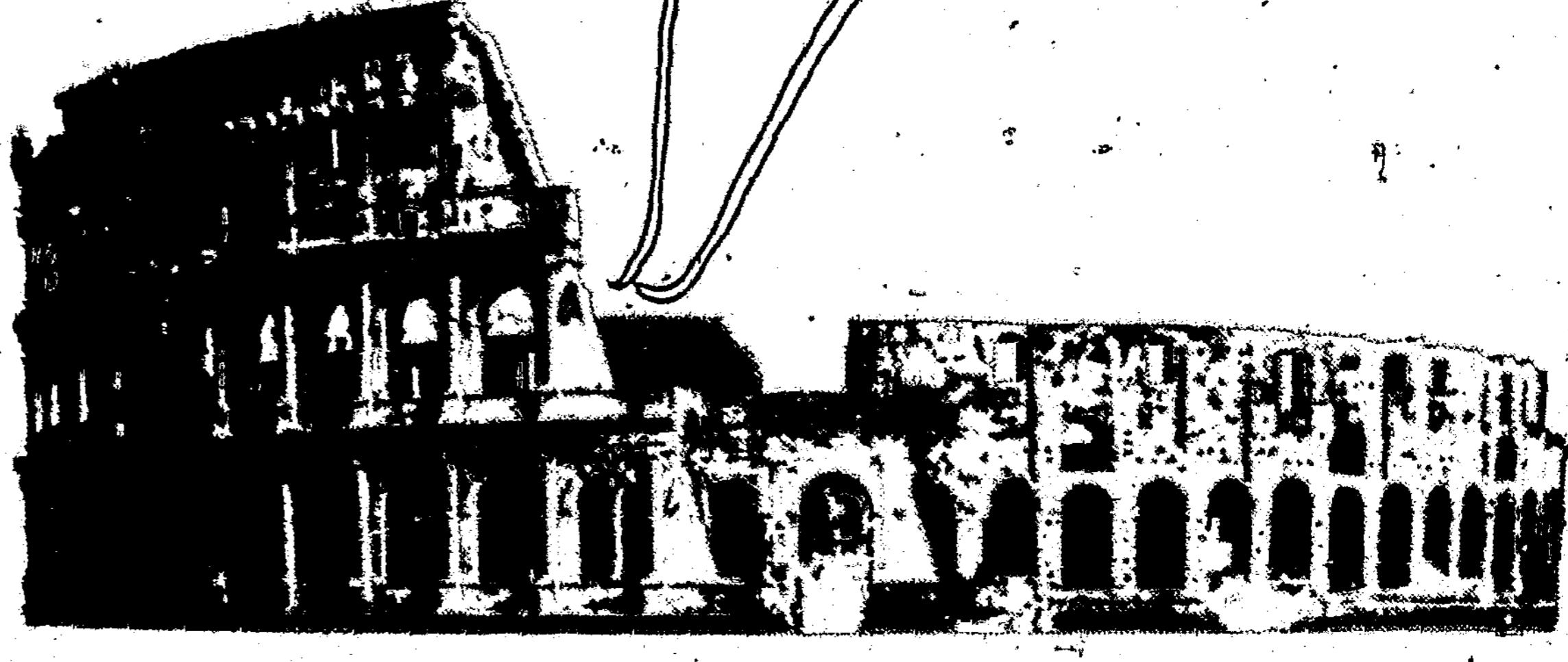

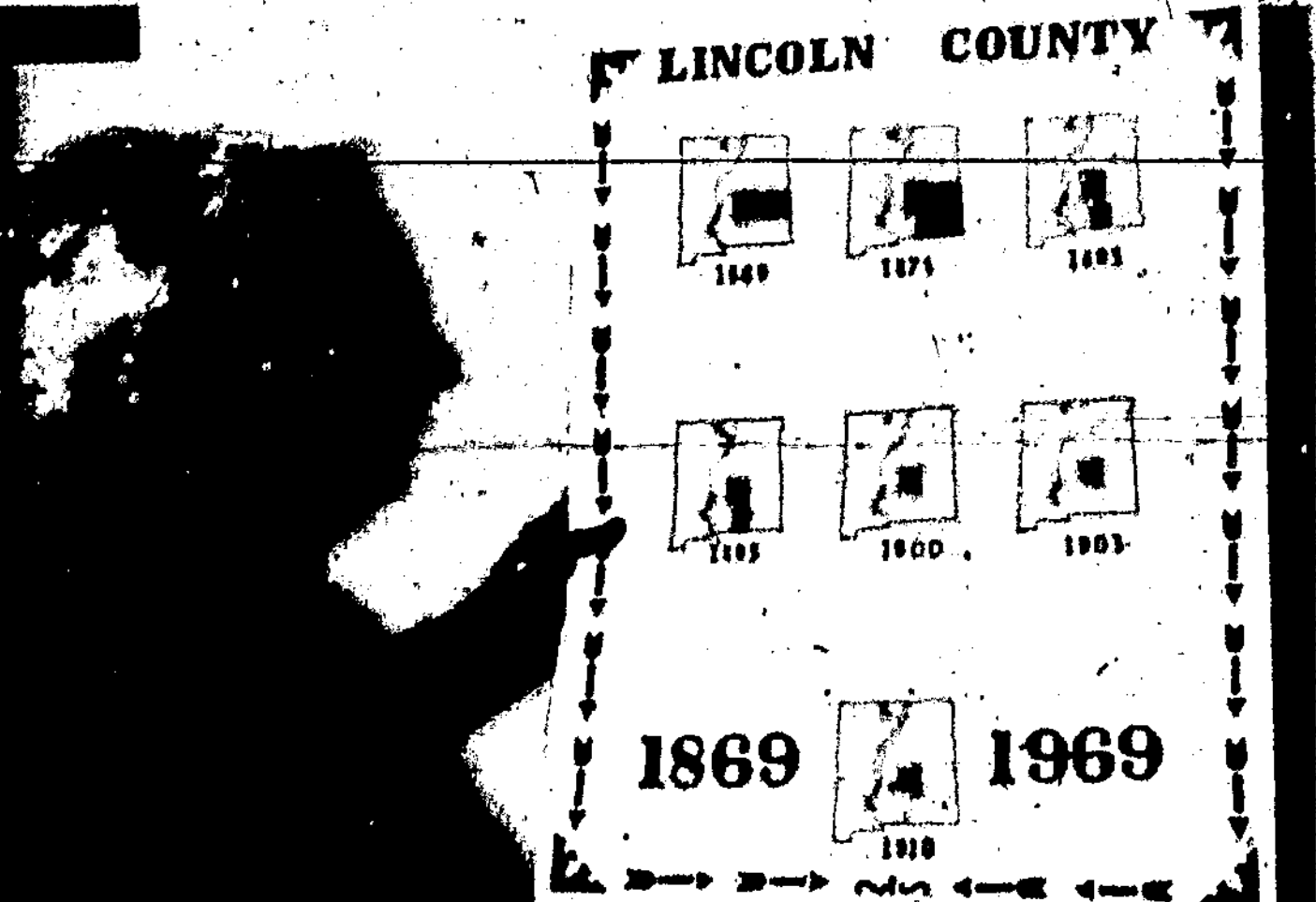
