Openhouse at apple sheds

Lincoln County continues observance of its 100th birthday this month with open house at two apple processing sheds at Hondo. The sheds, the White Mountain and Rio Ruidoso, will open for tours at 9:30 a.m. Saturday and Sunday (Sept. 20-21), and will remain open until 3:30 p.m. each of the days.

About 150,000 boxes of apples are being grown this year on 1,300 acres of land in the Hondo Valley. Both growers and processors are looking forward to showing off the results of their labor during the apple shed open houses.

Singing Convention Here

The Rio Grande singing convention will be held in Clegg Hall in Carrizozo on September 27-28 beginning at 7:00 p.m. Saturday and 9:30 a.m. Sunday. Following a basket lunch Sunday noon singing of gospel songs will continue until 4:00.

The sheds, within one mile of each other, are located beside US 70-380 highways, and are easily reached by automobile. Travel on the highways, west out of Roswell, or east from Ruidoso or Carrizozo, leads to the apple sheds.

Apple processing is in full swing in the Hondo Valley, and fruit will be available at both processing sheds, should it be desired. Major apple varieties produced in the valley are Red Delicious, Jonathan, Golden Delicious, Rome Beauty, and

Stamen Winesap.

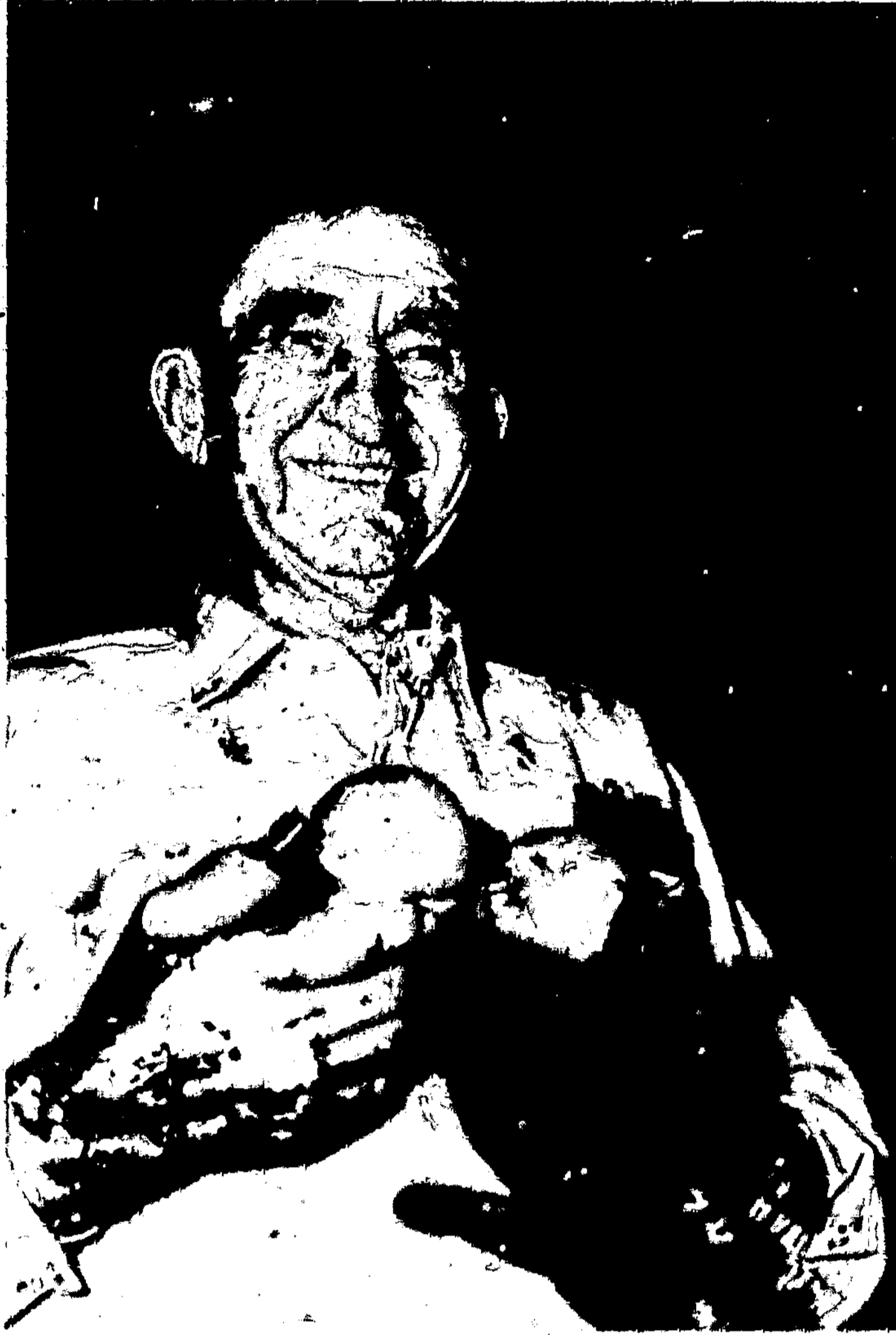
Apple recipe brochures will be available at the apple sheds. Ralph Dunlap, Lincoln County Extension agent with New Mexico State University who serves as chairman of the Lincoln Centennial observance, says the open houses will provide an excellent opportunity to see one of New Mexico's recognized fruit-growing areas, and the manner in which apples are processed for marketing. At the same time, Dunlap notes, the trip provides an opportunity for a family outing into the mountains at a beautiful time of the year.

The White Mountain Apple Shed is privately owned by A. T. (Bert) Pflingsten, and for the most part processes apples grown on 300 acres owned by Pflingsten. The shed has a cooling room capable of storing 10,000 boxes of apples at a temperature of 30 degrees. The plant itself can process 300 boxes of apples an hour, and employs about 28 people.

The Rio Ruidoso Apple Shed is owned by the 23-member Rio Ruidoso Apple Coop Association headed by I. C. Torres. Wyatt Stanley serves the cooperative as shed manager. The shed was put in operation for the first time last fall and employs between 16 and 22 persons.

ASC committee ballots sent

Ranchers are receiving by mail the official ballots for Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation community committee election, according to Lincoln County ASC Committee Chairman R. Archie Perkins.

He reminded voters that two envelopes accompany each ballot. After a voter has marked his ballot he should fold it and seal it in the plain envelope. The plain envelope should not be signed by the voter because its purpose is to insure secrecy of the ballot.

After sealing the ballot in the plain envelope the voter then should put the plain envelope into the second envelope which is addressed to the Lincoln County ASCS office and seal it. He should immediately sign his name on the back of this envelope on the line indicated; fill in the date; then mail the envelope.

Bank Securities recently acquired the majority stock of Security Bank & Trust of Alamogordo, Citizens State Bank of Vaughn, Carrizozo and Estancia and First State Bank of Cuba, Bernalillo and Corrales. Its application to bring American Bank of Carlsbad and Security State Bank of Ruidoso into the Bank Securities family are now pending before the Federal Reserve Board. Bank Securities is now the fourth largest banking organization in New Mexico with total resources of approximately \$73 million.

Eastern New Mex. State Fair requires lots of preparation

Last fall 4-11 youths around southeastern New Mexico did their annual shopping for young calves to raise and groom as club projects.

A hundred or so have faithfully fed and groomed their animals all year for the climax that's coming next week -- The Eastern New Mexico State Fair and its junior livestock sale. If each of those young people spent two hours a day for the past 300 days, they'll have a total of 60,000 man-hours rolled into the junior calf judging.

And that's just one of dozens of departments and divisions at the fair -- some involving many more people and entries. Easily, there must be a million man-hours in the annual event at Roswell county agent John Chappell estimates. And he's put in a bunch himself.

A couple of deadlines have already passed -- those for the reservation of booth space in the Commercial Exhibit Hall and for the entry of rabbits. Many other deadlines and "action dates" come this week, including:

Wednesday -- Fairgrounds open for delivery of livestock.

Thursday -- Fairgrounds open for delivery and display of all entries and exhibits; deadline to apply for entry of livestock.

Friday -- Deadline (at 6 p.m.) for all Women's Department entries except baked goods; dead line to enter the "Little Miss" fair queen contest; entries close for Sheep Department.

Saturday -- Deadline for entries in the fair parade.

By 6 p.m. Monday, Sept. 22, everything must be in place at the fairgrounds... it will be Fair Week.

That night, a field of 8 to 12-year-old girls from the area will compete in the Little Miss Eastern New Mexico State Fair Queen contest, with judges choosing a queen and three runners-up.

As judging continues Tuesday morning (Sept. 23) the formal public kickoff of the fair will be the annual parade through downtown Roswell. Set for 10 a. m., the parade will feature floats, antique cars, marching bands, horseback groups, entries.

Open to the public after the parade, the fairgrounds will bustle with activity for five full days. The nightly rodeo and 11 a. m. to midnight carnival will provide entertainment beyond the exhibit halls.

Attraction for homemakers

The department for antiques and hobbies and lapidary are of special interest to antique collectors and rockhounds of this area.

The metal work department offers 63 classes for exhibitors.

The sewing department is open to all, infants to grandmothers. Bond Baker, Inc. Wool Commission of Roswell, offers special awards for garments and articles made of wool.

This department will be open to receive entries, except baked foods, Thursday, Sept. 18 and Friday Sept. 19 from 9 A. M. to 6 P. M.

Baked foods can be entered on Monday, Sept. 22 from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. All exhibits will stay in place until 11 p.m. Sept. 23.

What's Cooking IN LINCOLN COUNTY

Those vegetables you freeze now can be a real taste treat next winter—if you prepare them properly. Blanching is still an important step in getting vegetables ready to freeze.

Several people have asked me if blanching is really necessary, the answer is an emphatic yes. Practically every vegetable should be blanched to slow the action of enzymes and preserve the fresh quality, color and vitamin content of vegetables. It also helps lengthen storage life.

Up until the time vegetables are ready to pick, enzymes help them grow and mature. But, if the vegetables are not heated before freezing, enzymes will continue to be active during frozen storage. The vegetables will develop off-flavors, discolor or toughen so they may be unappetizing in a few weeks.

Be sure to use plenty of water for blanching—a gallon of water for each pound of prepared vegetables. Use a large kettle and bring the water to a full rolling boil. Put the vegetables, already washed, sorted and peeled (if needed), in a wire basket or loose cheer cloth bag and submerge in boiling water.

Start counting blanching time as soon as you put the vegetables in the boiling water. If you wait to start timing until the water begins to boil again, the vegetables will be cooked too long. Keep the kettle covered during the blanching and keep the heat up high.

As soon as you have blanched

the required length of time, cool the vegetables in cool running or ice water. If you use ice, you'll need about one pound of ice for each pound of vegetables. It will take as long to cool the vegetables as it took to blanch them. Of course, to get top quality frozen vegetables, you must start with top quality produce. They should be mature, not overripe or green. Freeze them as soon as possible after you pick or buy them. And, work with a quantity that you can easily handle at one time.

Home rule being tested right now

Towns and counties would like to be their own boss as far as possible which is probably not the most urgent desire of New Mexico legislators.

Recent liquor legislation may have made sales legal state-wide without regard to any town or city ordinances on the books.

Carrizozo town ordinances were drawn up long before the liquor law was passed and Sunday sale of liquor prohibited here. Now comes the legislature

following the line that municipalities should adopt ordinances in specified areas and on other subjects not in conflict with the laws.

We think it should be the other way around. The legislature should not pass laws that conflict with a majority of town ordinances of the state. It will take a fortune spent for legal talent to sort out the rights and wrongs of the liquor legislation--totally bad from the beginning.

The need is urgent

The opinion and thinking of people who know about the Carrizozo hospital situation is that our need is almost desperate for making change that will make this county owned and locally operated institution solvent. It has been losing money for years and only the good grace of local patrons keeps the hospital going.

Carrizozo can not count on such patronage continuing

forever. But for those who are looking more at the tax picture than the urgent need let us point out that taxes in Carrizozo are quite a little lower than both Ruidoso and Capitan.

All Lincoln County towns pay \$7.28 per thousand in state taxes, \$7.32 in county taxes, other taxes are listed below:

They drove to Manassas to visit niece, toured Washington, D.C., saw old Appomattox courthouse, the old McLean house, got on turnpike to Charleston, Va., in terrible storm there, got out just in time, visited sister-in-law in Huntington, drove 85 miles in heavy rain to Tecumseh, Nebraska, where father, Eugene Manlove Rhodes, was born.

Grandfather, Colonel Hinman Rhodes, had store in Tecumseh just after civil war. Grandfather and family moved to Tularosa and mountain ranch when E.M. Rhodes was 12. The young Rhodes, Alan's father, got job with Bar Cross ranch, later owned Triangolo E Ranch of 45,000 acres.

Alan recalls experience of his father, time when famous outlaw Bill Doolin hid at this ranch for

two weeks unknown to Rhodes. Marshal Heck Thomas came after him caught him the next day.

The Rhodes stopped in Abilene, Kansas to visit President Ike's home, then on west to Promontory Point, Utah, the famous rail joining point. From there they went to Salt Lake City, saw Bridal Veil Falls at Orem, Utah, visited Ghost Ranch museum in northern New Mexico, visited old friend of father, Fred Lambert, at Cimarron. Lambert knew E.M. Rhodes for many years, was lawyer all of his life, only 16 when he got the drop on a couple of killers and marched them up to sheriff who shortly pinned a deputy badge on Lambert. Lambert has made an old grist mill into a museum.

Their visiting in New Mexico included stop at Las Vegas to see Mr. and Mrs. S. Omar Barker, saw the entrada at Santa Fe; then on south for visiting in Lincoln and Otero counties.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Rhodes remarked that they had never seen New Mexico look so green. The minute they get into the Land of Enchantment they start to relax and enjoy life.

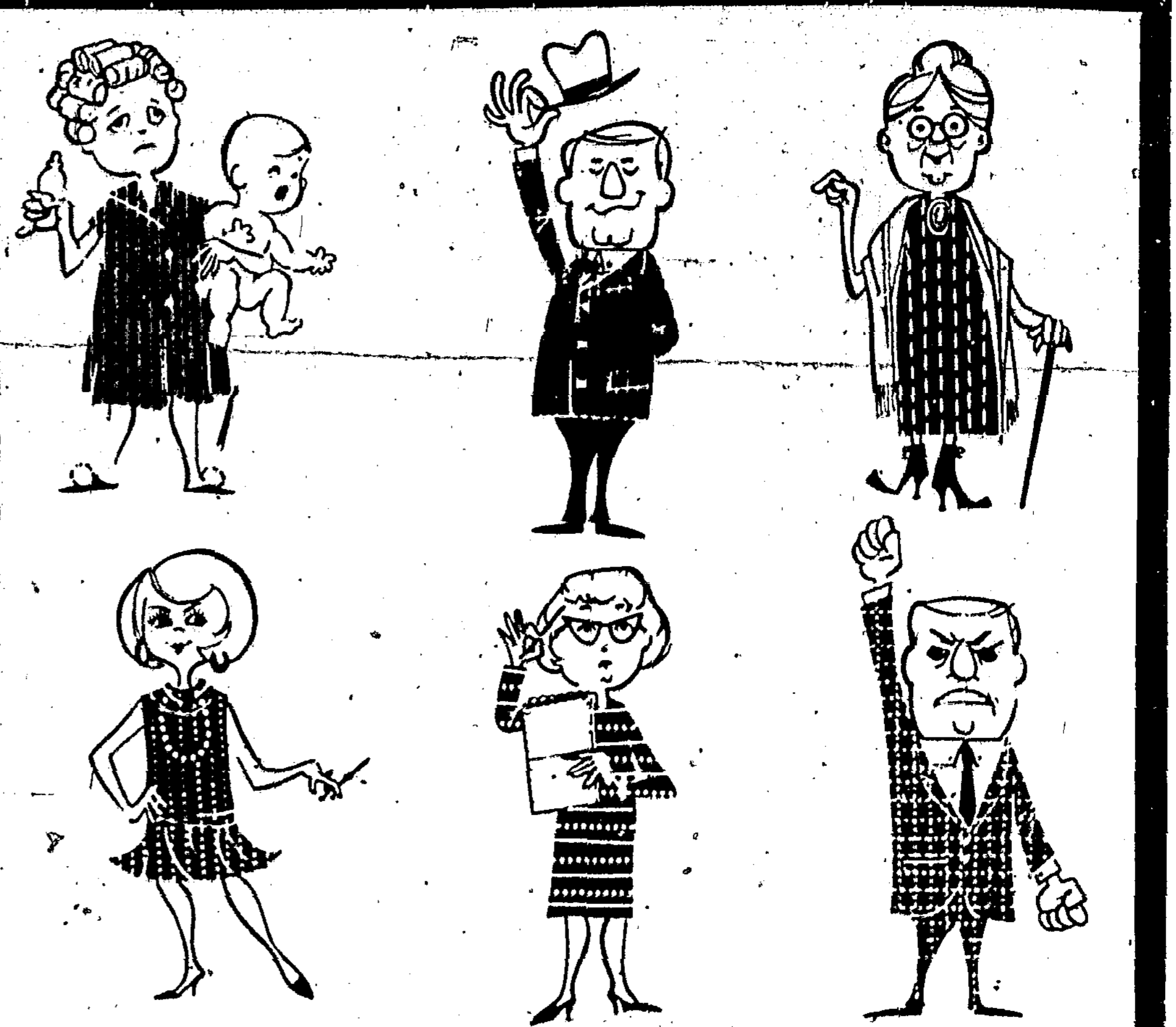
Audrey Coca elected

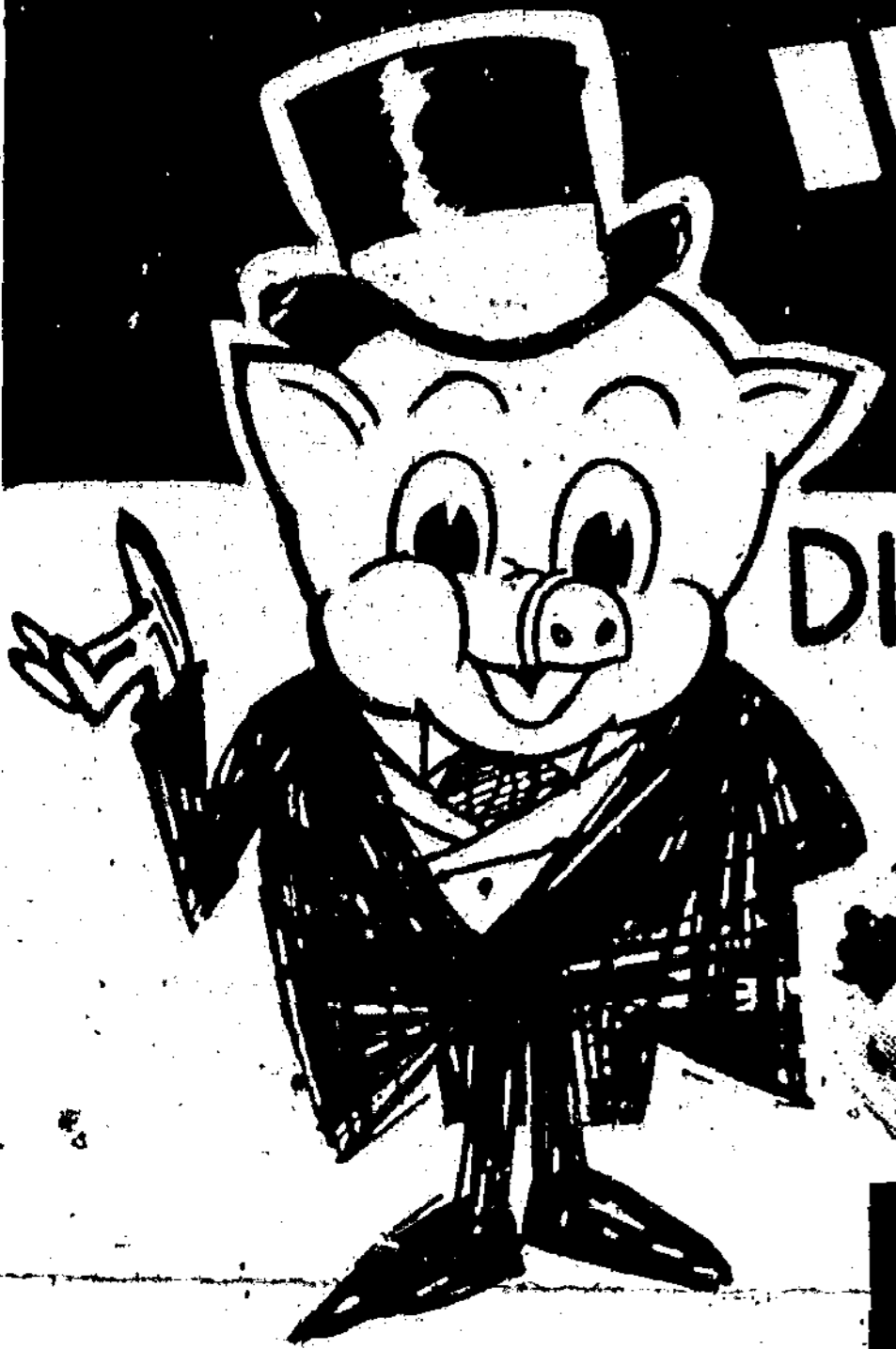

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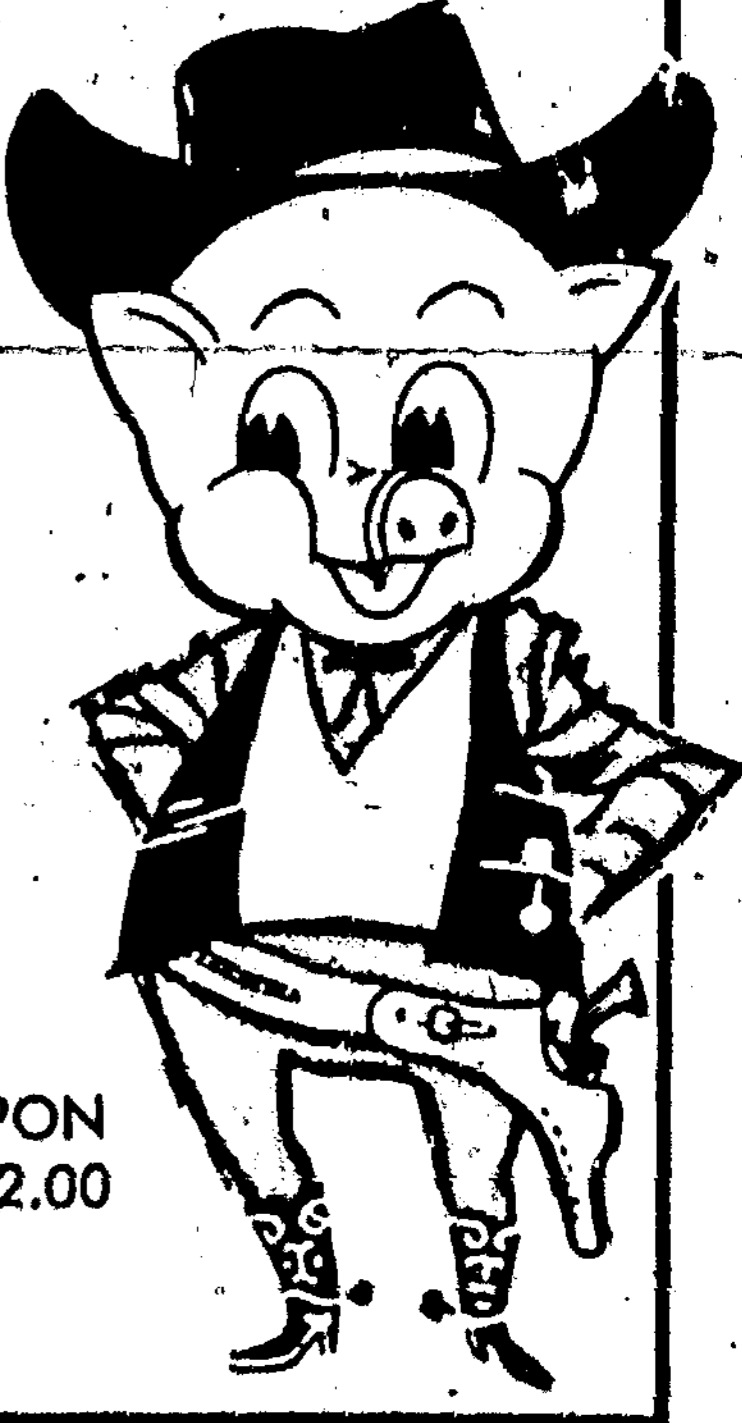
