Lost Spanish mine found

The search has been long, a lot of men are still looking, the treasure could be fabulous, but according to C. H. Philpot, owner of J & J Mining Co., a long-sought treasure mine originally operated by Spanish explorers around 1784 has been located by Philpot on his claims at the east end of the Capitan Mountains.

The tunnel runs some 600 yards back in the mountain, ore is 200 yards wide and good half-mile long from showing on top of the ground. "The veins where I've dug are as much as 12 feet wide and they're awful good in hair silver, uranium, platinum, copper, asbestos, gold, silver, with some tin, manganese and hematite ore in the same mine."

It's locally called the Old Lost Spanish Cave (or mine). Originally dug by the Spanish explorers in the area who also operated a crude smelter at the same site, the tunnel is about eight by eight feet with cedar logs still in place

inside. The Spanish used donkeys and carts for moving ore out of the mine. Philpot thinks the Ute Indians killed off the Spanish because there are all kinds of bones, white, red, black around the mine. He said he buried a lot of them.

Discovery of the mine according to Philpot, was partly based on old map which led to general location then he saw silver nuggets where they had washed out of a spring. He got busy opening up the wash and discovered cool air coming out of hole he made; opened the excavation further and there was the old tunnel, some caved in but obviously a mining tunnel with valuable ores showing prominently.

Philpot has been a prospector for 40 years and has staked out claims all over the country and claims he is still the best prospector in the southwest. He has owned the lost mine claims since 1950 and has spent 19 years locating the mine.

He said the government once had 800 soldiers looking for the mine and that fellow named J. W. Lux from Arkansas, Col. Green from Colorado and Wally Hess have been active in search of this mine as recently as last week.

About 20 years ago Philpot found some old donkey shoes made of silver and sold them for \$20 each. They'd be worth a lot more now. He said that silver ore in the lost mine will grade out at 70 percent and has one chunk of silver that the Spanish had apparently smeltered.

The mine is located in Box Canyon. Philpot plans to sell the claims or lease to some mining company that might work the property. He lives a mile west of Lincoln, N. M.

Hickel to speak at GOP dinner

Selling tickets to the \$50-a-couple dinner will be Dale Wynn in Lincoln County.

Expected as honored guests along with Sec. Hickel are U. S. Representative Ed Foreman who will act as master of ceremonies and Governor David F. Cargo.

With the address the first public one in New Mexico by Sec. Hickel, a large turnout is anticipated and those interested in attending are urged to buy their tickets early.

Hickel, a former Governor of Alaska, was appointed as secretary by President Nixon. The U. S. Department of the Interior oversees federal lands in New Mexico along with national parks and policies for uranium, coal,

oil and gas extraction, all important industries within the state.

Born in Kansas where he was reared and where he became the state Golden Gloves welterweight champion in 1938, Hickel moved to Alaska after World War II where he became a home builder. Along with wide public service, he was also a leader in the fight for Alaskan statehood.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon in the First Baptist Church, Carrizozo with Rev. Milford Misener, of Belen and Dr. Clyde Sherman of Alamogordo, officiating.

Casket bearers were Buster Smoot, W. H. Rickerson, Welcolm Armstrong, Fred English, and Vernon Peety. Interment was made in the family plot in Evergreen Cemetery, Carrizozo, under the direction of Clarke-Wooten Chapel of Roses Mortuary.

Registration Board removes 1,000 names from voter list

The Lincoln County Board of Registration including members of both political parties met Sept. 16 in the commissioner room of the Lincoln courthouse to cancel all registration affidavits of voters who had not returned notice by the 15th.

Notice of pending cancellation of registration of voters were mailed to approximately 1500 registered voters who did not vote in the 1968 general election, this in accordance with Sec. 3-4-28 C of 1969 election code.

The board of registration noted that if a person did not return their card, they were probably cancelled by the board and will have to re-register before becoming eligible to vote.

For the convenience of quali-

fied electors and voters who desire to register, change registration or to cancel their registration the following places have been designated by the board of registration: City Hall at Ruidoso Downs, Ruidoso, Capitan, Corona, Carrizozo, and at county clerk's office in Carrizozo and with Mr. Leo Joiner at Honda. To become eligible to vote a person must live in state one year 90 days in the county and 30 days in the precinct.

The 1,000 cancelled registrations leaves approximately 3,600 on the role of eligible voters in Lincoln County. The board of registration included: Alton Whitaker, Chairman; Mrs. Wanda Carnell and Mrs. Georgia Harker, members.

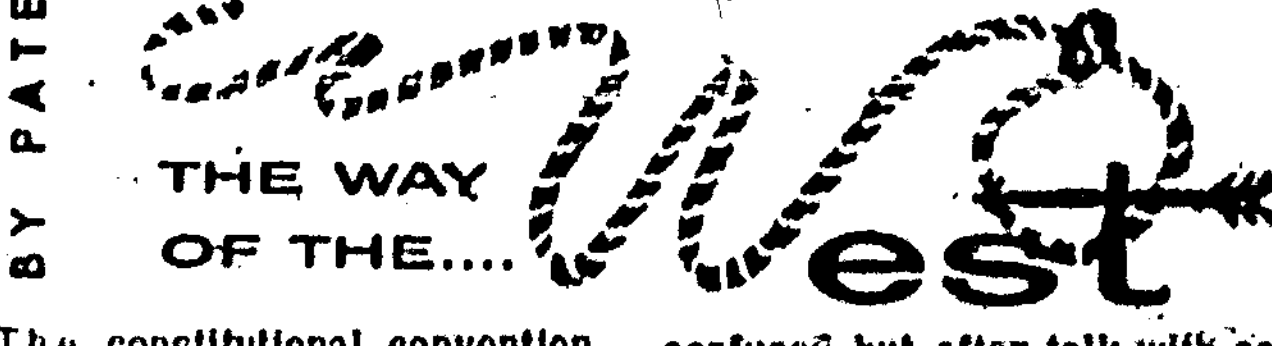
Remote presence sounds better

What's Cooking IN LINCOLN COUNTY



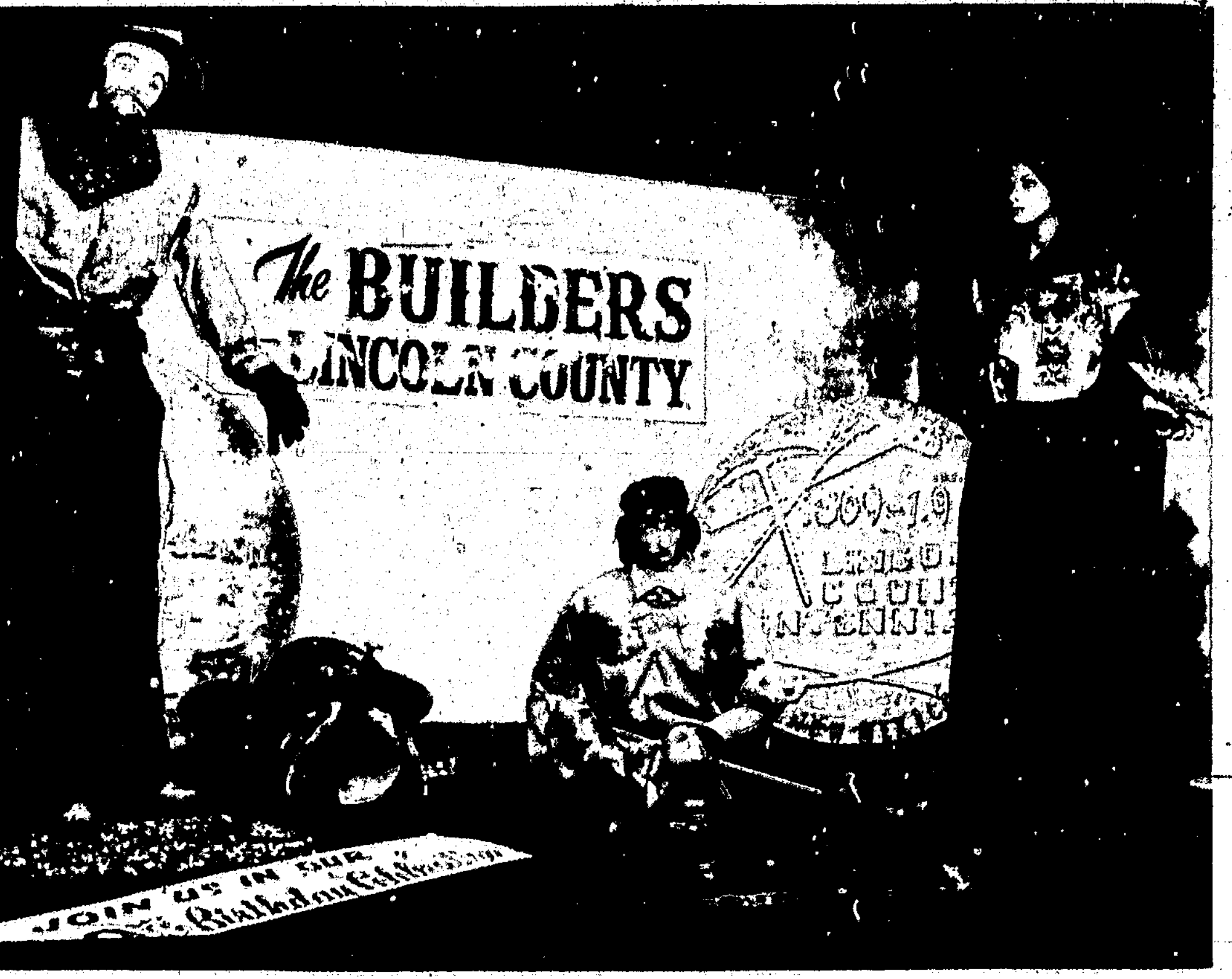

Have you ever wondered why eggs cooked at high temperatures for a long period of time may have a dark ring where their whites and yolks touch?

This is caused by a combination of sulphur in the white and iron in the yolk which forms ferrous sulphide.

This darkening is entirely harmless but it may detract from the yolk's appearance. The higher the cooking temperature and the longer the cooking time, the more darkening takes place.

Plunging the eggs into cold water immediately after cooking lessens the possibility of this darkening. This lowers the egg's temperature and helps prevent formation of ferrous sulphide. Immersing the eggs quickly and

holding them in cold water for a short time after cooking also makes it easier to peel off egg shells if the eggs are not too fresh or were treated with oil.

Harvest of pison nuts has begun in New Mexico on a limited basis, with fullscale harvest only days, or most a few weeks away. The annual event provides a good opportunity for a family outing into the forest, and also provides some income for commercial harvesters.

Gathering of pison nuts takes place in September or October, usually after frost, when the mature cones of the pison pine tree open, allowing the nuts inside to fall. However, some pison are gathered on a limited basis while the cones are unopened. Harvesters find that extracting the nuts from the unopened cones is come what unpleasant because of a sticky-resin. The resin is difficult to remove from the hands, although some forms of hand cream can be used as a cleaner.

Number of methods have been devised for speeding and facilitating pison harvesting, but the most popular ones continue to involve hand labor. You will find some who climb the trees; others who place a covering over the ground beneath the tree before shaking the tree to free the nuts; and, still others who pick the pison from the ground without benefit of the covering. A fast picker may harvest 20 pounds of pison a day, or about 28,000

nuts. Research indicates a locality must have a normal amount of rainfall and other favorable growing conditions for three successive years to allow pison pine trees to yield a good harvest. A pison pine tree is about 25 years old before it begins to bear nuts, and at 75 years of age the tree is large enough to produce nuts in commercial quantities. The tree is long-lived and may continue to produce pison for hundreds of years.

After picking, the nuts may be eaten in their natural state, or they may be roasted and consumed in that manner. Pison may be used in a variety of recipes calling for nuts, including candy, cookiecaker fowl dressings and mince meat turnovers.

Some people cherish pison for their flavor and although small is high in food value. The pison nut has a high percentage of kernel, and is excelled only by the peanut.

One of the most favorable characteristics of pison is their excellent keeping quality. Dry, unshelled nuts have been marketed after three years of storage in the New Mexico climate. The chilled nuts become rancid after three to six months, roasted kernels become rancid more quickly than when unroasted.

Humid weather is an enemy of the pison nuts. They should be stored under conditions where the relative humidity is low.

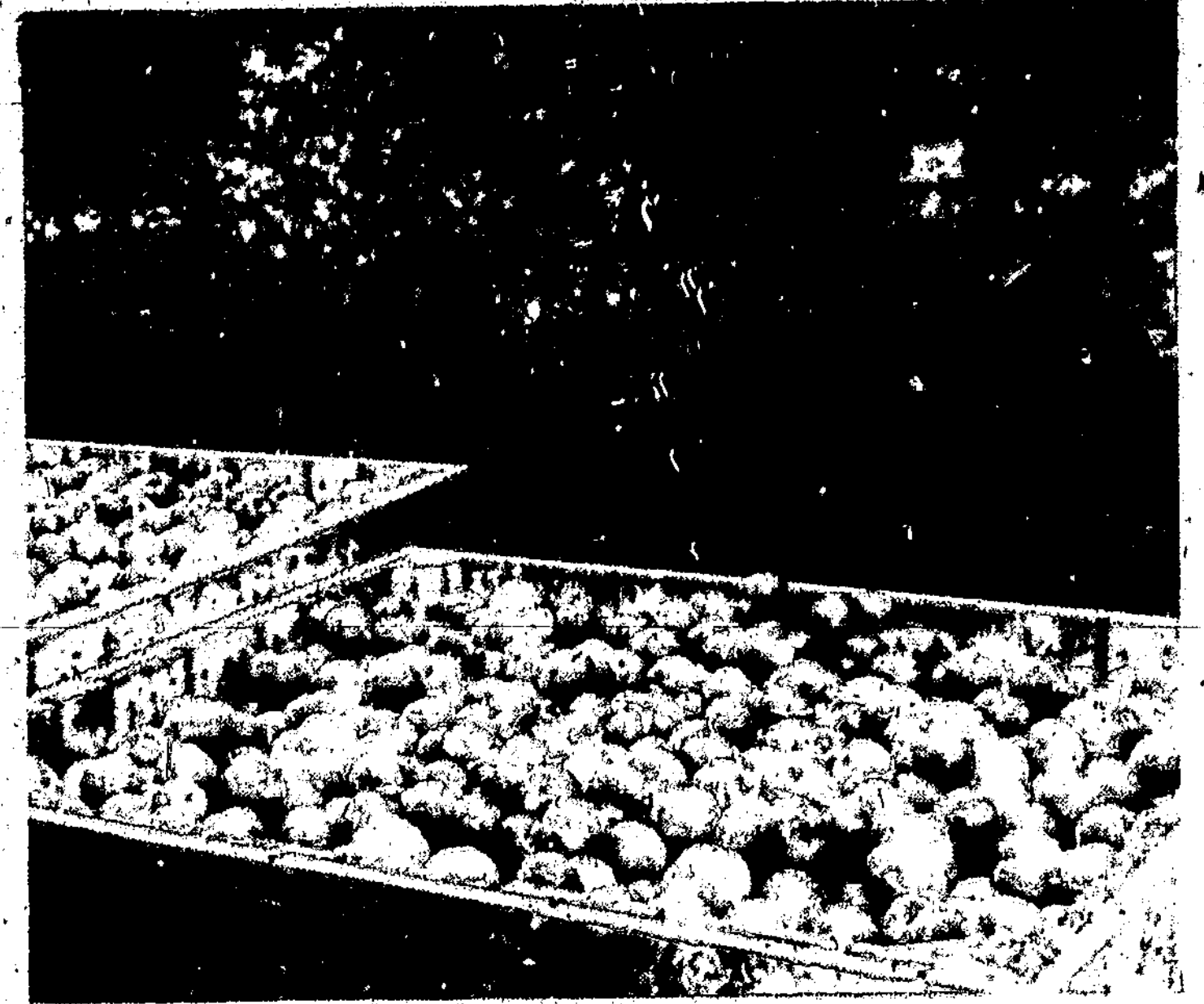

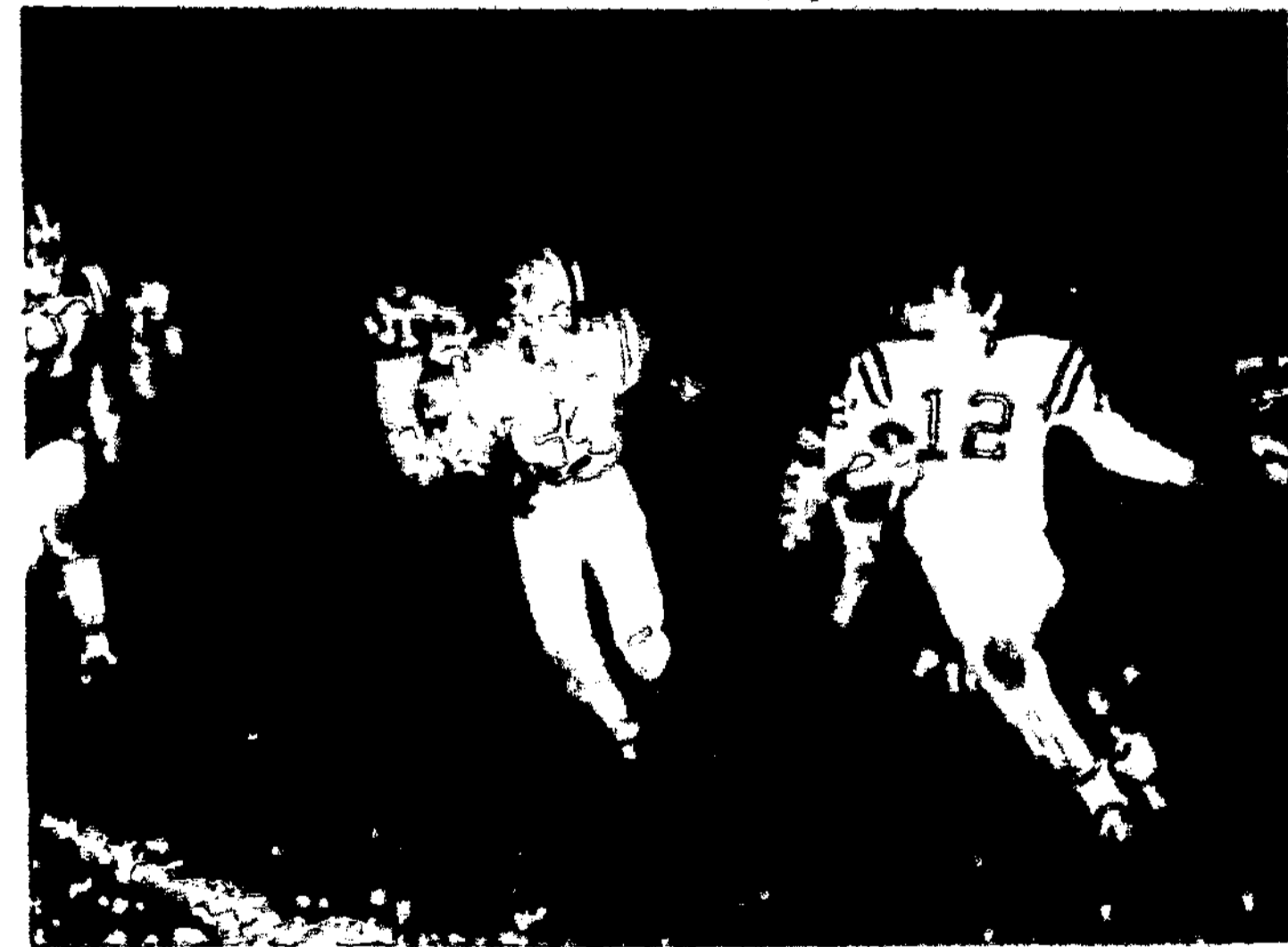

The freshman squad coached by Fred Hayes has 1-1 record, loss to Tulle and victory over Ruidoso.

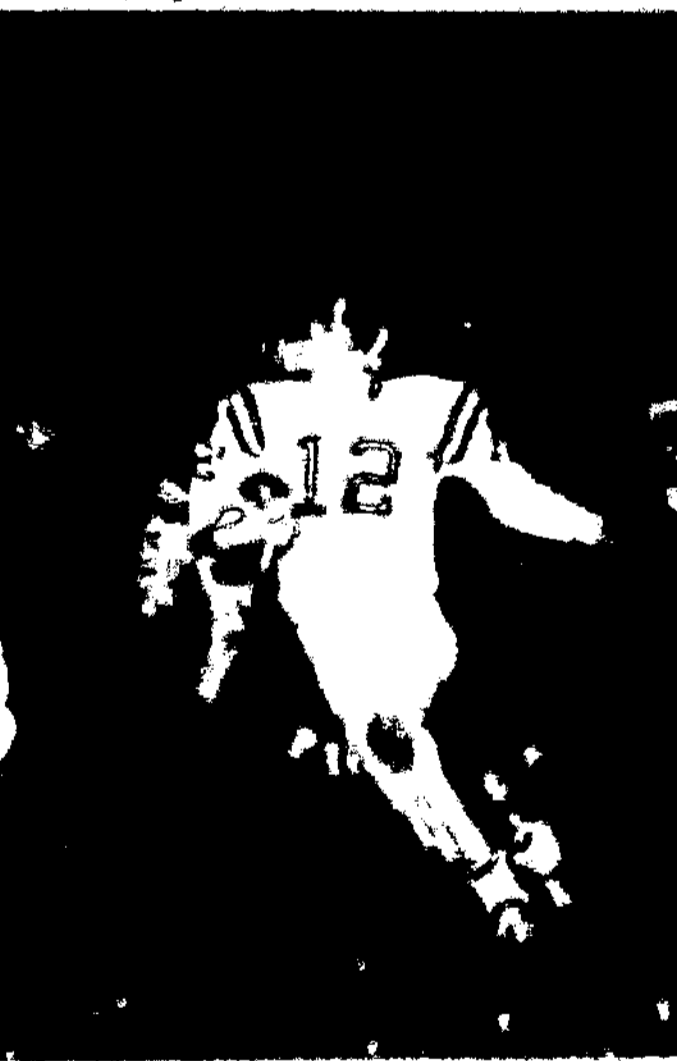
Cloudcroft Wins 18-0
