The Lincoln County News first started putting papers in the postoffice when it was located on Front Street across from the depot. Sometime in the 20's the postoffice moved to the Thornton building, then in 1941 to the east part of the Prehm building and in 1951 to the Harkey building. The last move for a long string of years was made Wednesday, October 1, 1969 to the finest sectional center postoffice in the southwest — where you will get this "first edition" of the News today in Carrizozo.

Both hospital improvement bonds carry

In the first bond election in Lincoln County since the court house bond vote in 1963 which carried by a big majority, Lincoln County property owners-voters put their stamp of approval on \$807,000 in bonds to finance improvements for the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital and the Lincoln County Municipal hospital in Carrizozo. The bond money is split \$665,000 for the Ruidoso Hospital and \$142,000 for the Carrizozo nursing home facility.

for. Only three precincts voted against the Ruidoso issue, Both Hondo and Picacho down in the valley were opposed, presumably because their hospital trade partly goes to Roswell and the same reason could apply at Corona where a good part of the hospital trade goes out of the county.

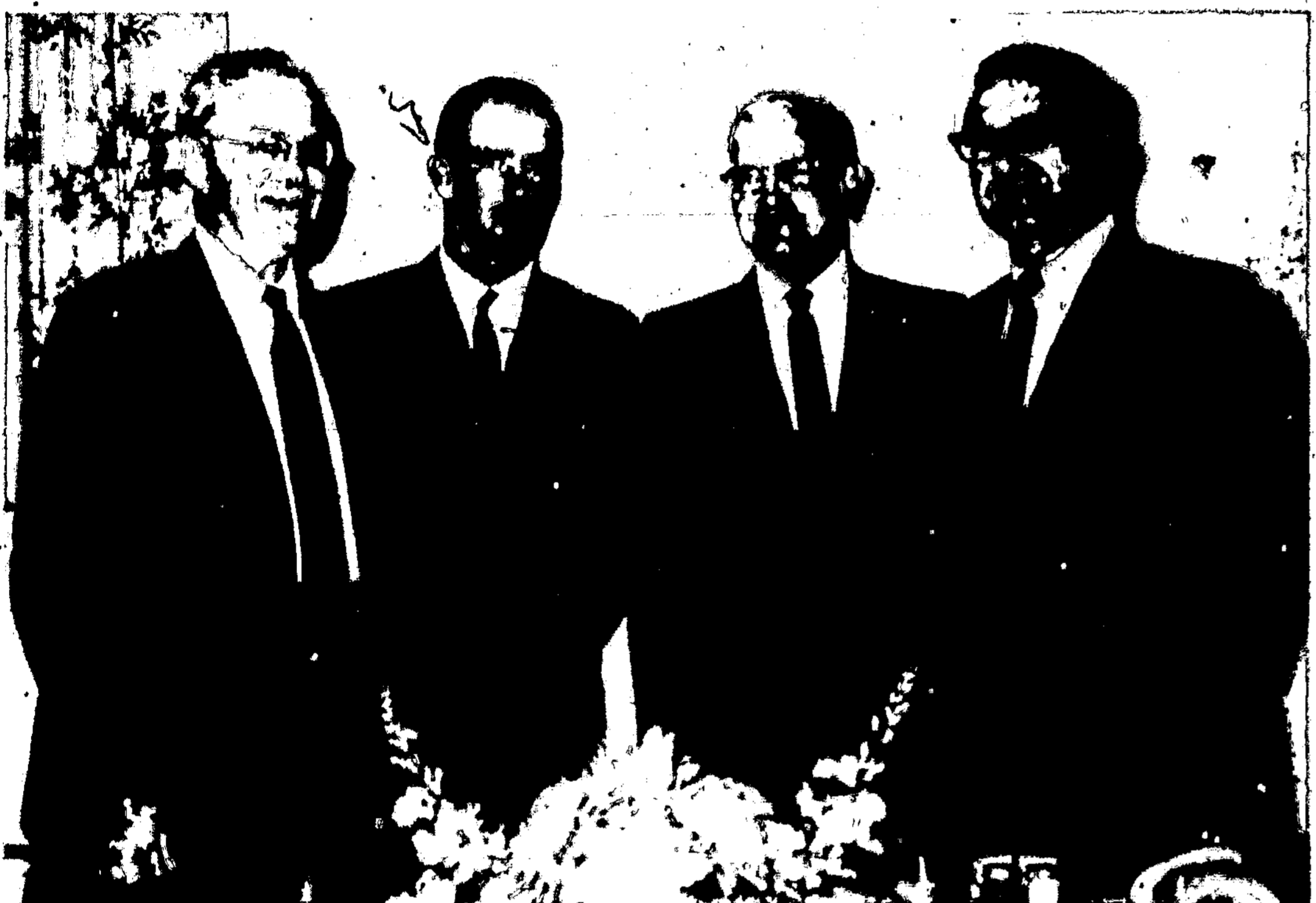
Voting for the hospital improvement in Carrizozo followed the Ruidoso vote real close, only Greentree voting down the Carrizozo bonds while voting for the Ruidoso bonds, in a number of precincts people voted for one set

of bonds and did not vote on the other.

The Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital will make extensive improvements with its \$665,000, plus \$353,000 expected in government grants and local gifts. The patient capacity will be increased and service facilities improved.

The Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo will make use of its \$142,000 in bonds, plus local contribution from Bancroft Foundation of \$80,000 to construct a nursing home facility to care for all county residents wanting to make use of such a facility.

Binyon receives Banker's Award

At the annual banker's award banquet Tuesday night, sponsored by the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District and the Citizens State Bank of Carrizozo, Raymond R. (Jake) Binyon, rancher east of Corona, was awarded a plaque for outstanding conservation practices in this district.

Mr. Binyon became a cooperator with the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District on March 3, 1965 when the Corona area petitioned into the district. He operates an eight-section ranch three miles east of Corona with a cattle and sheep operation.

He entered into a Great Plains Conservation Program contract in September 1965 consisting of brush control on pinon and juniper covering 3000 acres, five erosion control dams, one stock tank and cropper grazing on 4800 acres.

This amounted to about \$30,000 in conservation work. He bought a Cat tractor and did all his own work. Today all that is left to be done are some small dams. He has also done some outside work as a conservation contractor in his area. Jake is also on the steering committee of South Mountain Resource Area and is interested in projects to improve the community.

Bill Atkinson, Resource Conservationist of Roswell, speaking to the group told how a great change has come about in objectives of conservation districts. There was a time when such districts were concerned primarily with water control for agriculture and farming and ranching practices. But as conditions in the United States have changed the objectives of conservation districts have changed.

Now there are a great many people who rarely get off a paved highway, the world has many more golfers, fishers, hunters and people engaged in other sports activities than are engaged in agriculture, so the work of conservation has changed to include projects of interest and value to people in towns and cities as well as on farms and ranches.

Mr. Atkins mentioned specifically the Elephant Butte Dam (filling up with sediment too fast) and the large number of people who drive great distances to fish, boat, ski on this water and the good this body of water does not only for Truth or Consequences but people in El Paso, Alamogordo and many other towns in southern New Mexico.

Roy W. Davidson of Raton representing the N. M. Bankers Association, a guest at the banquet, is in close contact with the constitutional convention in Santa Fe and told some of the work being done by the convention. He said that the greatest values coming from this activating was spotlighting the areas where change is needed in our constitution. That even if the new constitution was not put into effect that the needed changes, having been pointed out, could be brought about one at a time.

Ed Tatum, of Santa Fe, president of New Mexico Banker's Association, made the presentation to Jake Binyon and was especially complimentary to this Lincoln County rancher for the work he has done in conserving our natural resources.

Johnson Stearns was master of ceremonies for the banquet, held at the 4 Winds.

SWCR Annual Report
Following is the annual report of the Carrizozo Soil & Water Conservation District for fiscal year 1969.

The Carrizozo-SWCD was organized October 11, 1945 for the general purpose of promoting soil and water conservation. Since that time there have been six annexations to the District and one disannexation. At present there are 1,000,217 acres in the District, mostly rangeland. There are approximately 85 ranch units.

The District is managed by a Board of Supervisors who are elected by the landowners. The Board operates on a long range plan for the wise use and development of all resources in the District. Landowners and operators are encouraged to enter into cooperative agreements with the District and to develop and apply conservation plans on their land.

The Board of Supervisors consists of the following:

- Leo Straley, Ancho Chairman
- A. W. Gnatkowski, Ancho Vice-Chairman
- Bill Stephenson, Carrizozo Secretary-Treasurer
- Bill Gallacher, Jr., Carrizozo Member
- Johnson Stearns, Carrizozo Member

The Board meets the first Wed. of each month to conduct District business. The meetings are held in the Soil Conservation Service office at 7:30 P.M. and anyone interested is invited to attend.

The Board of Supervisors make heavy equipment available to co-operators for conservation and development of work. This is a non-profit operation for the purpose of providing a means of applying conservation work. The equipment is owned and operated entirely by the District. Books and accounts are kept by the Secretary-Treasurer who is bonded and audited annually. Scheduling and job arrangements are made by the Board and Randall Greer, District Operator. The equipment consists of a D6C Caterpillar Tractor, carry-all ripper, plow, and truck.

The Zone meeting at Lincoln was attended by all members. Two resolutions were presented regarding extension of the Great Plains Conservation Program and funds for conservation on public land.

The District participated in the County Fair and again recognized 4-H members exhibiting livestock from the District.

The fifth annual Bankers Award Program was held with Fred La May receiving the award. The program was on animal nutrition. The State Convention in Alamogordo.

Fort Stanton, N. M. Mar 2, 1888

Mr. J. J. Cockrell Lincoln, N. M. Dear Sir:

Please find enclosed a telegram for you, and one for Judge Long, which I forward to you, as the Judge has gone. The latter telegram is from U. S. Attorney Smith on important business, and instructions may have been left with you. Very Respectfully John J. Pershing Acting Post Adj.

Roswell, Lincoln Co., N.M. July 28th, 1888

John J. Cockrell Esq. Dear Sir:

I want you to push and get my patterns issued for me. Keep posted as to examination of Hampton entry find out if you can what the trouble is I am in the least afraid of an investigation there is not a man in this neighborhood but what knows he acted in good faith. Would like to get the \$3000 and give mortgage on 320.

BUREAU LAND MANAGEMENT

TO LEASE GRAZING LANDS

Two hundred fifty thousand (250,000) acres of grazing land on McGregor Range are to be let to the highest bidder on October 21, 1969.

Ten grazing units have been improved and declared ready for grazing by the Las Cruces District Office of the Bureau of Land Management.

McGregor Range is located about 25 miles south of Alamogordo, New Mexico and lies east of U. S. Highway 54.

Last year the BLM let eight units to eight different bidders who grazed almost 3,000 head of cattle.

According to Phil Kirk, Area Manager for the Alamogordo Resource Area, the ten units this year will run close to 4,000 head of cattle.

The units have been improved considerably over the past year by the addition of new pipelines, dirt tanks and steel storages.

Four of the units will be grazed yearlong starting in November and six will be grazed from November until August of 1970.

Rainfall has been good over most of the area since the last of August. Up to seven inches have been recorded in some areas.

A site inspection trip over the range will be held on Monday, September 29, 1969 beginning at the U. S. Highway 54 junction with State Road 506, 12 miles north of Oro Grande, starting at 7:30 a.m.

Printing Committee named

A committee of three New Mexico graphic arts professional men has been named by state purchasing agent Paul F. Becht to act in an advisory capacity for the conduct of the inter-agency service, the state's duplicating agency.

Ed Lewis, of Newspaper Printing Corporation, Albuquerque and Gil Torres, editor of the U. S. A. F. Nuclear Safety Magazine; a former manager of the U. S. Government printing plant at Kirtland Air Force Base, in Albuquerque were named on the recommendation of the printing industry Association of New Mexico.

Paul Payton, editor of the Lincoln County News and operator of an offset printing plant in Carrizozo was named upon the nomination of the New Mexico Press Association.

The committee will work with Lucien A. File, director of Inter-Agency in standardizing and improving the services furnished by the department to over 150 state and local government units.

\$238,400 in FHA Loans

Mr. Richard Floyd, County Supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration for Chaves and Lincoln Counties stated his office had advanced \$238,400 for operating loans this last fiscal year. The year ending June 30, 1969, also showed they had collected on this years advances and previous years loans-\$226,345. He stated \$486,122 were outstanding on operating loans as of June 30, 1969. A total outstanding on all types of loans was \$2,488,332.

During the past year, Floyd said, operating loans have enabled Chaves and Lincoln county farmers to modernize their farming operations, raise their incomes and give families a higher standard of living. Operating loans are made to meet farm operating costs, to finance machinery, equipment and livestock and for refinancing debts. They can also be used to develop recreational facilities or other non-farm enterprises which will supplement farm income.

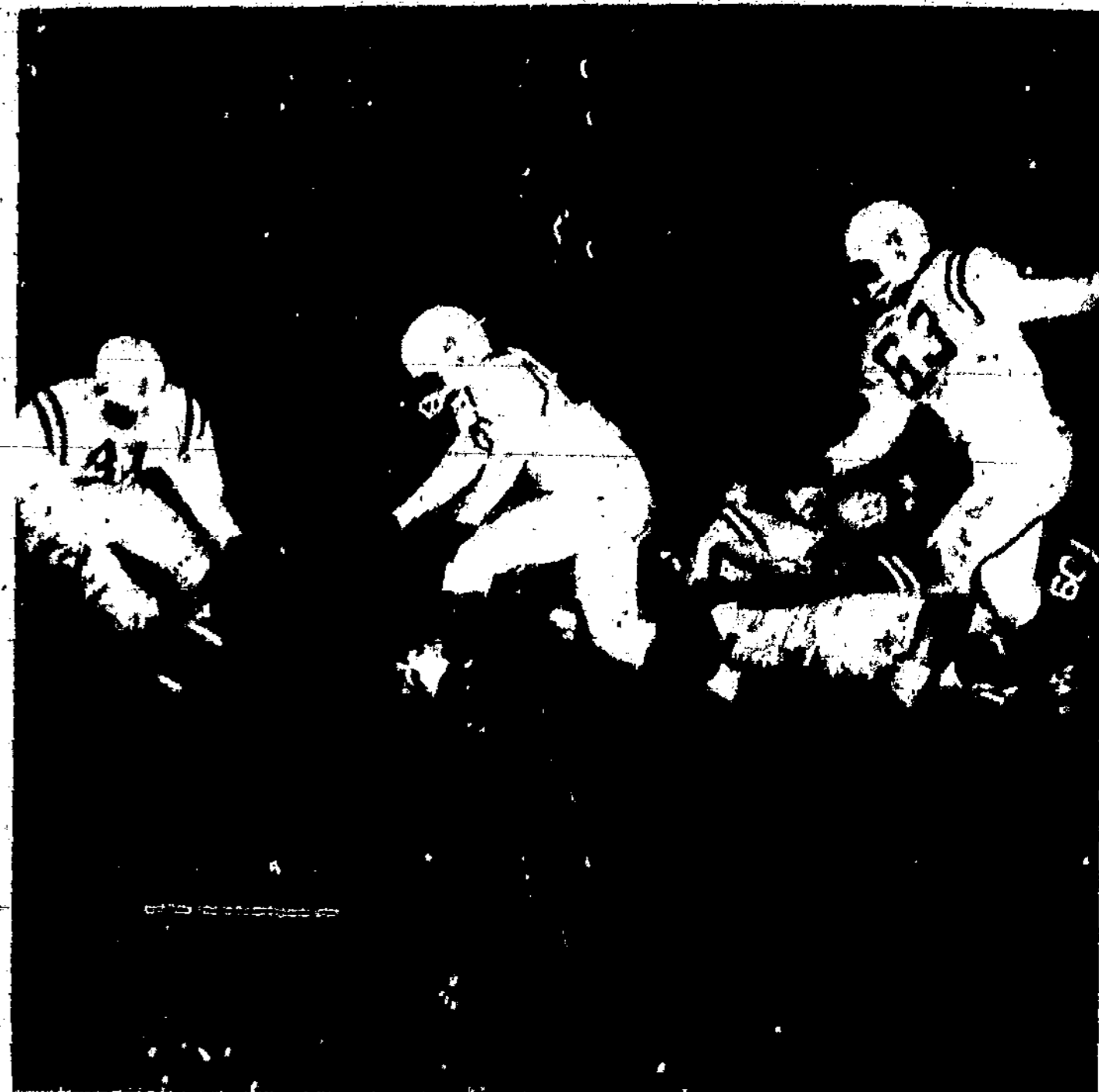

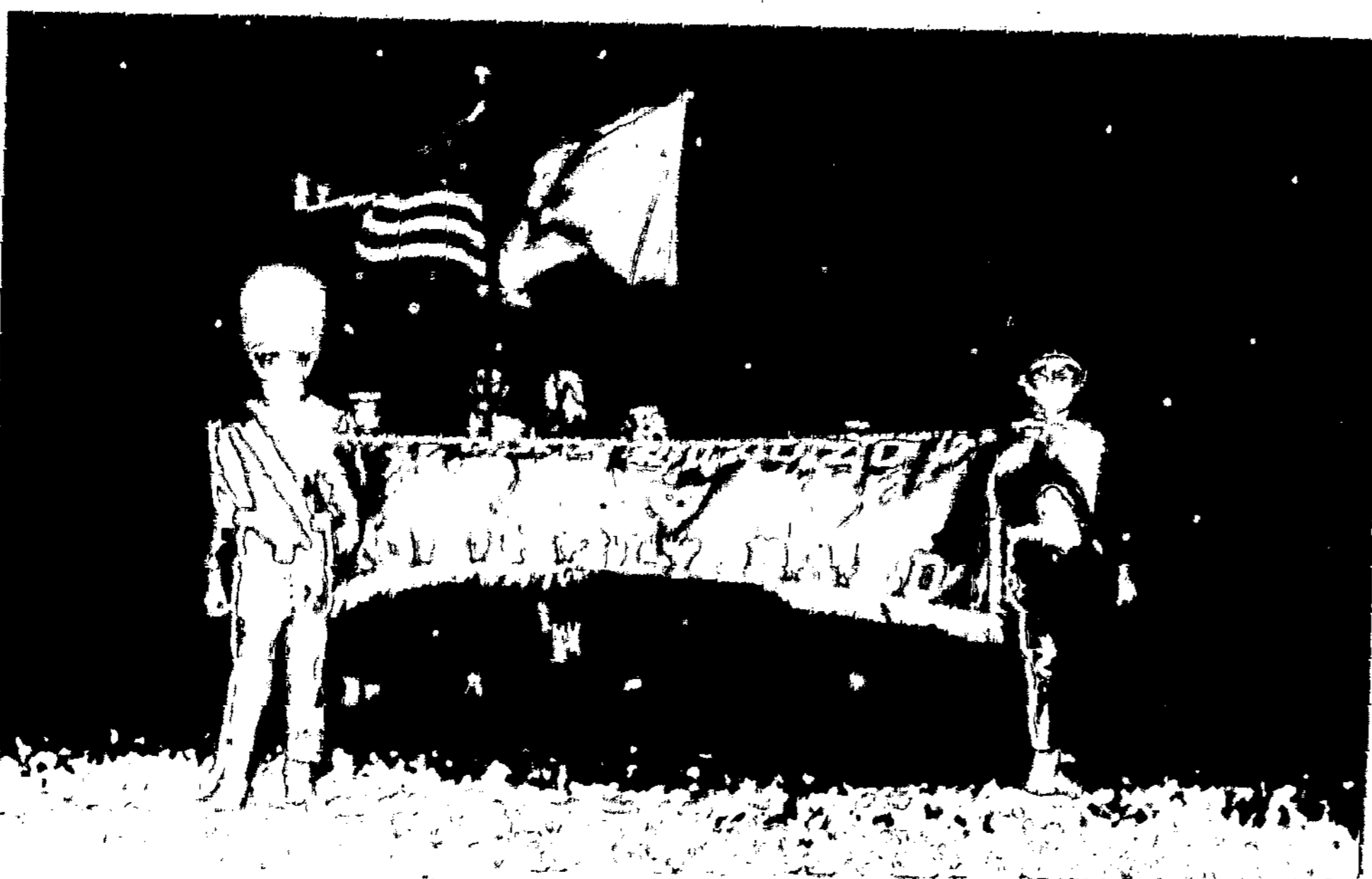

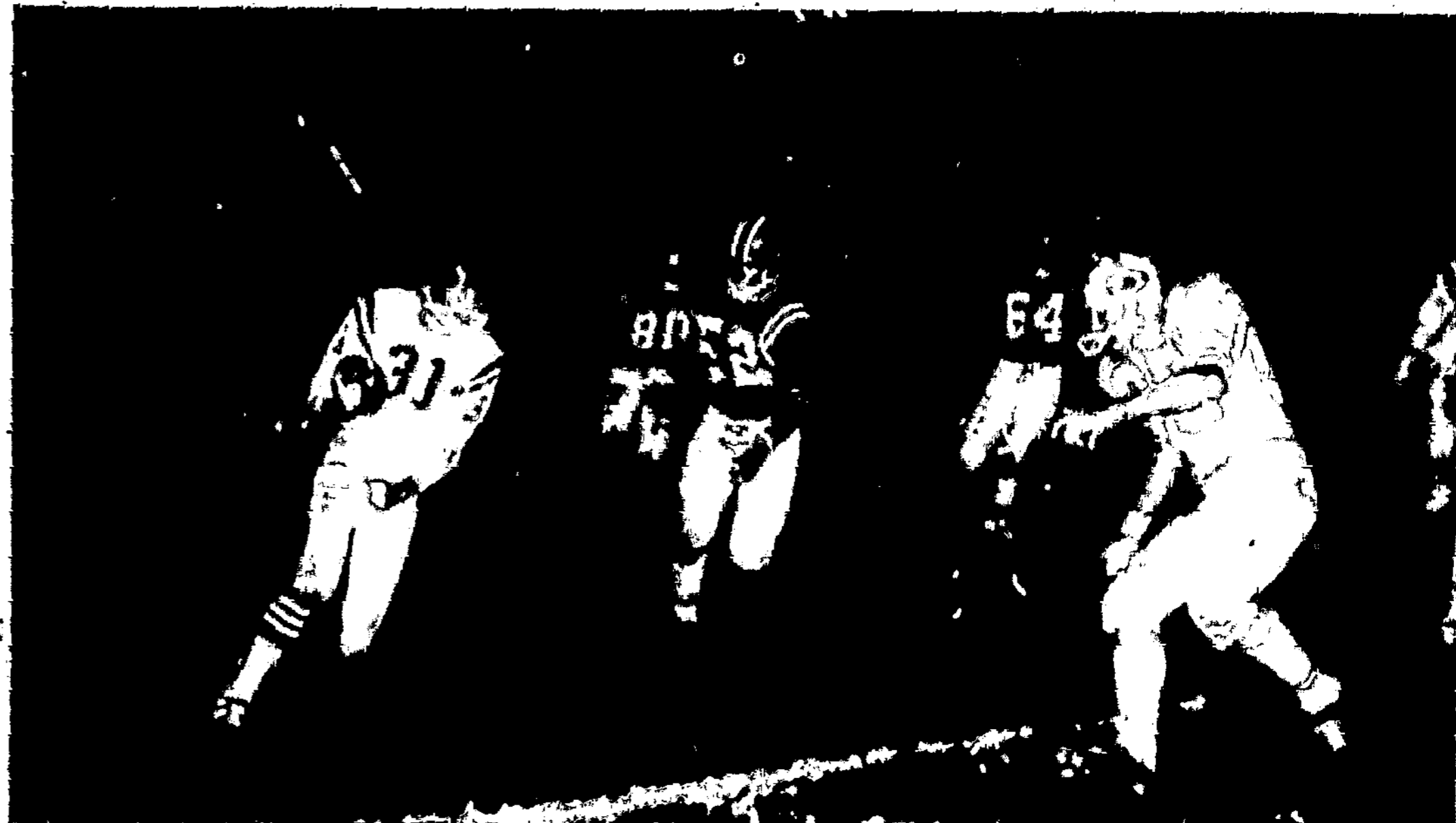

The equipment was up-dated by the purchase of a new D6C Caterpillar tractor equipped with hydraulic till dozer. This was financed by the Citizens State Bank with a loan guarantee furnished by the State Conservation Committee.

Soil Stewardship Week was observed and published in the Lincoln County News. Other news articles were published as appropriate.

The Board initiated studies to be made on benefits of Cholla Cactus control. These studies are to be made by NMSU with the Technical Action Panel constructing the plots and assisting.

The Board has supported and participated in the South Central Mountain Resource Area, W W Gallacher Jr., and Johnson Stearns are Steering Committee members. To date there have been eleven Project Proposals accepted from within the District. This

organization is devoted to total resource development in Lincoln and Otero Counties.

Eleven regular meetings and one special meeting were held during the year. The Ladies Auxiliary met twice and attended the Zone and State meetings. Attendance at the regular meetings was 78%. The Carrizozo SWCD has Memorandums of Understanding with the Soil Conservation Service, Bureau of Land Management, State Department of Forestry, and cooperates with ASCS, Extension Service and the U. S. Forest Service. These Agencies assist the District obtain their objectives.

The Board of Supervisors wish to express their appreciation to these agencies, the District Co-operators, and others for their support of the District Conservation Program.
