## WAY, WAY WEST!

Football is our game and it makes us real happy to see the Grizzlies play -- and win -- a real hard fought game against big (but not too tough) opposition. The players find out what it means to outplay, outcharge, outsmart their opponents and that's worth a lot to any growing boy.

Willie Gallegos of Carrizozo has made the top ten scoring list in New Mexico, part of a three-way tie for 8th place with Billy Gary of Hatch and Steve Pettes of Las Cruces, each with 44 points. Mike Lopez of West Las Vegas leads state scorers with 106 for the season.

One of the daily newspapers we read is supporting the one-man one vote jazz for New Mexico. We oppose such thinking and believe that one house of our legislature should be apportioned geographically, as the only way rural areas will have any voice in government.

A nephew of the Ben Fritchett family in Carrizozo is going places in national politics. He's Bill Low of Topeka who has been appointed as executive director, political division of the national GOP committee. Low has been serving as executive secretary of the Kansas Republican State Committee.

Always hurts to read statements like Sen. Jerry Apodaca (D, Dona Ana) made recently. Apodaca said that tests show New Mexico children below the national norm in educational levels, that people of New Mexico have failed to provide adequate funds to public schools. Money is only a small part of the answer and Apodaca is only salting the educational people at the same time trying to dig deeper in pockets of all tax payers.

On this moratorium day -- Wednesday -- Carrizozo is keeping cool, thank goodness. All of us home folks want our boys brought back from Viet Nam, but few of us want to give aid to the enemy like the moratorium is doing.

Good news stories travel fast. The old lost Spanish mine story originated in the Lincoln County News, the Associated Press picked it up and notes from friends around the country show this story traveled nation-wide. What's more fun than a lost Spanish mine?

You can read elsewhere in the News about Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission getting raked over the coals. We don't like the thought of our legislative finance committee suggesting that the Lincoln facilities being closed during the winter -- they draw more tourists to this area than any other one attraction on year-around basis. Probably the hotel and restaurant should be leased out and operated on private basis which would eliminate most of the loss and also eliminate the state from being in competition with restaurants in the area. Getting the restaurant and hotel off the books would slimmer cost of operation down to pay of curator and upkeep, like half of present cost. Be good idea for you Lincoln people to write to any member of the legislative finance committee, their names are in the AP news story.

Kind of sad coincidence happened last week. Real good friend in Bucklin, Kansas wrote letter to Payton dated 4-12-69 telling some of his problems connected with running for mayor against entrenched forces (most of them are friends, too). On trip up through Bucklin this guy said he had written, but never mailed the letter. Next we know from reading Bucklin Banner is that Aulis Day up and died, then a week later his wife cleared the hardware desk and found the letter, mailed to us.

## P.O. dedication Nov. 6th

Postmaster Roy Harman, a director of Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, told the group meeting Tuesday night that the Postoffice Department has confirmed November 16, 1969 at 2:00 p.m. as the date and time for dedication of Carrizozo's new postoffice building.

The Chamber of Commerce will assist with this big celebration with a number of details. Harman said that this Department would issue invitations to the congress-

sional delegation and postmasters of the entire area. The Chamber of Commerce will send invitations to the governor and lieutenant governor, Lincoln County legislators and commission members.

Mayor Johnson Stearns will be asked to serve as master of ceremonies. The main speaker will come from the postoffice department. Carrizozo band will be present and is expected to give a short concert after the formal dedication program.

The Chamber of Commerce will tend to setting up a stand for visiting dignitaries, a public address system, refreshments for the crowd, and any other details to help the program.

The Carrizozo sectional center is unique in that this postoffice serves less than 1500 local people but goes far beyond that local service as a sectional center. Mail is distributed out of Carrizozo 86 miles north, the

same distance south, 57 miles east and almost that far west.

A postoffice official recently told Harman that the operation here would get bigger in the near future. At present there are twelve people employed at the Carrizozo sectional center.

A tour of the new facility will be an important part of the dedication program.

## HOMECOMING HAD LOTS OF THRILLS --

### Grizzlies over big hurdle for District 3 C Championship

In the best football game played on Laabs Field in Carrizozo for a number of years the Grizzlies outcharged and out fought a big senior Mountainair team that out weighed them something like 30 pounds per man. The Grizzlies were doing a better job on their blocking assignments, except for one short letdown, making big holes in the Mustang line and making sweeps around end work real good.

Mountainair won the toss and took the ball which gave Carrizozo the wind at their back, a favorable factor as the game progressed. The Zozo kick carried into the end zone and brought out to the 20, on the second play the Mustangs fumbled, Dee Douglas recovered.

A 5-yard penalty helped and the Grizzlies were on the 3, then had 6 inches to go -- plunged over. Pass for extra point was good, score 8-0.

Mountainair received but could make only 6 yards in 3 downs and had to kick. Grizzlies took the ball on the 30, a 5-yard penalty for too much time set them back and they had to kick.

Mountainair took the ball on the 26 and tried a pass which was intercepted by Ray Roper who skirled down the sideline for about 60 yards and Carrizozo's second score. PAT failed, 3:35 remaining in quarter.

The Mustangs started on their 45, made 1 yard in three plays, kicked and Zozo started on the 27. A quick kick on 3rd down was blocked, ball crossed the line not touched by Mountainair, Zozo recovered but it was ruled the Mustang's ball on the Grizzly 15. The Mustang drive was blunted and they kicked.

Ben Stutville had hot feet about this time and made 1 & 10 twice, then Willie Gallegos made another but the drive stalled and Zozo kicked. The Mustangs started on their 14 and really threw a bomb, but the ball was overthrown beyond a man in the open, their drive failed. The Grizzlies took the ball on the 30 with 2:35 to go. Only real bad play of the game came up when the Grizzly passer threw the ball to two Mustangs and one Grizzly, interception resulted. With 22 seconds remaining they were on the 3, TD was made with 1 second showing. PAT pass failed, score 14-6.

After the homecoming festivities at the halftime Zozo received and immediately racked up another penalty for too much time, were forced to kick. The Mustangs started on their 20, couldn't move the ball. The Grizzlies had it on the 35, drive failed. Mustangs took the ball on the 18 and this time made their running attack look good, they flat drove the ball home with 8-10-15 yard runs. Extra point failed, score 14-14 with 10:46 left in the 4th quarter.

The Grizzlies took the ball on the 49, stand off on reverse (sort of the old statue of liberty play) was bobbled and the Mustangs got the ball on the 35 with 7:00 showing on the clock. Their drive bogged down and Zozo took over with 5:10 left. Nogo Grizzlies and Mustangs got the ball again, but didn't go. With 53 seconds remaining the Grizzlies had their last chance and they made it good. One long run by Willie Gallegos completed pass Lock to Harkey on 3rd and 12 was good, the Zozo called time out for sideline huddle.

The strategy was to attack the Mustangs where they were weakest and have David Lock clear the way for Ben Stutville. On 4th and 2-foot to go, the Grizzlies scored making the final 22-14. Mountainair had time for two or three plays but couldn't hit. The game was clean, few

hassles with officials were only the heat of the moment. Coach Tommy Pannell gave a lot of credit to all of his 17 boys who saw action and played real good defense and offense as well. Ray Roper made a crucial play when he intercepted and scored as well as playing a fine defensive game.

Charles Mackey did the finest dance seen in Lincoln County since the Billy the Kid Ballie when he got leg cramps and was trying to shake them loose. David Lock had the same problem but didn't perform so fanatic where all the fans could see. Coach Pannell said that with cold weather they would probably quit taking salt which helped bring on the cramps.

Jimmie Ham received ankle injury, probably won't play this week.

The Grizzlies travel to Dexter Friday for game with team that lost last week to Ft. Sumner 33-6 in District 4B. Ruidoso beat Ft. Sumner 21-14 the previous week.

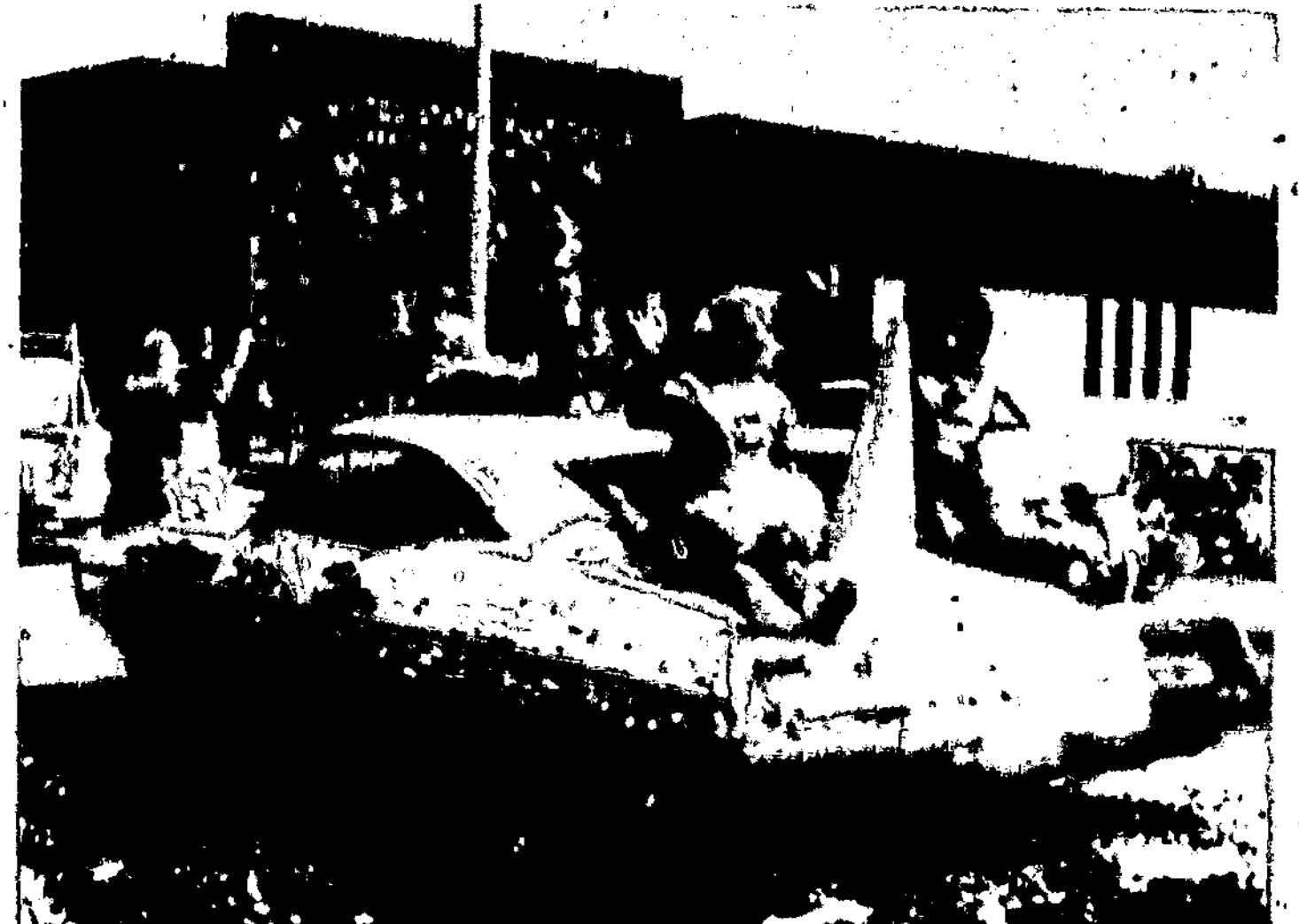

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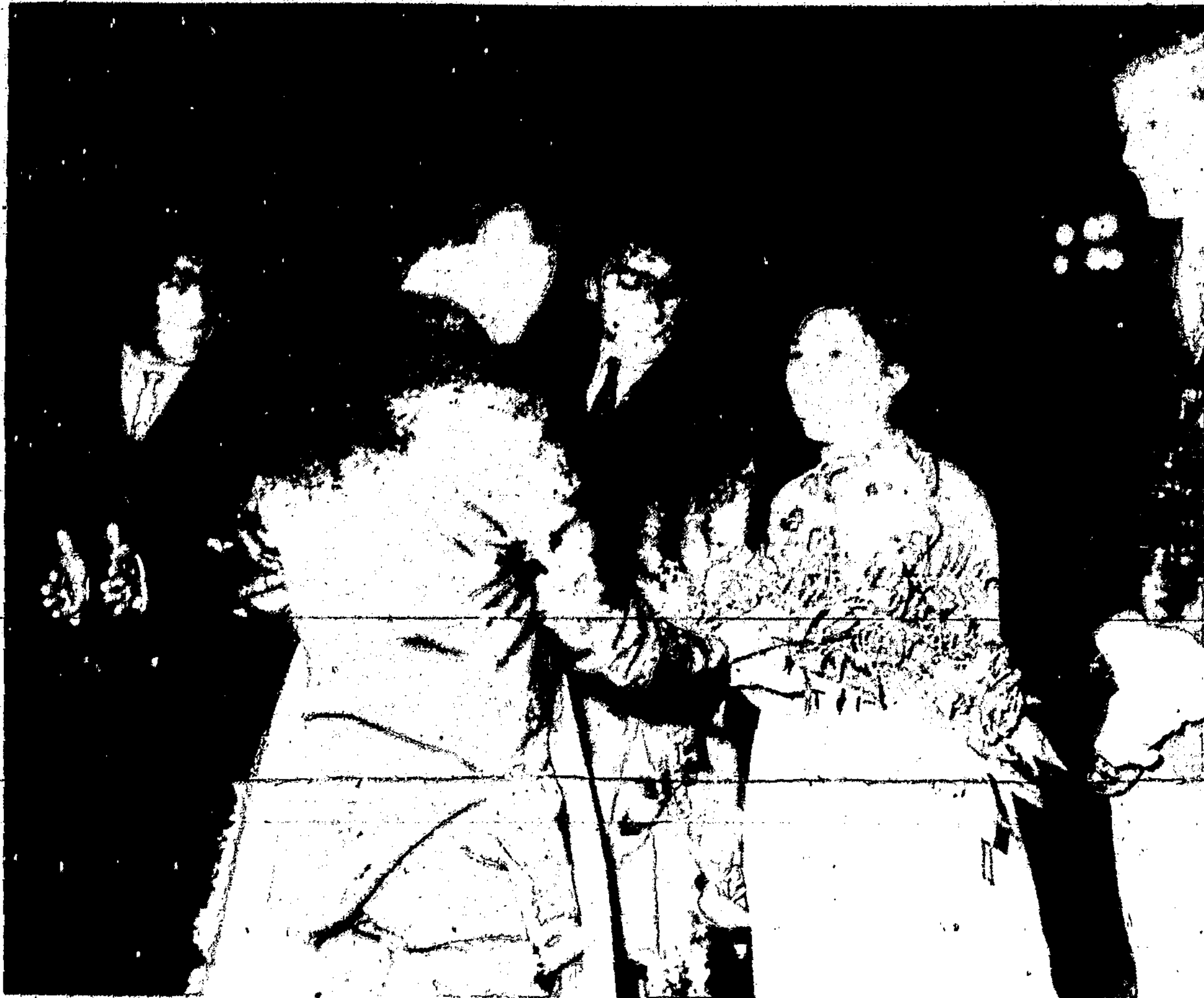

## What's Cooking IN LINCOLN COUNTY

Autumn is here and who can deny it? The smell of burning fireplaces and the frost in the early morning makes us realize that winter is very close. I enjoyed such a good bowl of split pea soup at a Ruidoso Restaurant this week that I thought you may enjoy a recipe that is a favorite with many homemakers.

**Split Pea Soup**  
2 cups dry split peas  
2 quarts water  
1 ham hock  
1/2 cup finely chopped celery  
1/2 cup finely chopped carrots  
1 teaspoon finely chopped onion  
Place all ingredients into large kettle. Boil gently about 2 hours or until the consistency desired for soup. Remove ham hock. If desired, press peas through a coarse sieve to get puree. Chop meat from bone and return to soup. Season with salt and pepper to taste and add water if needed. Makes 8 delicious servings. For added flavor and to stretch quantity, you can add a can of cream of potato soup just before serving and reheat, if you like.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture reports especially big supplies of dry peas on the market now. Current production is set at about 4.8 million hundredweight a crop 28 percent greater than last year.

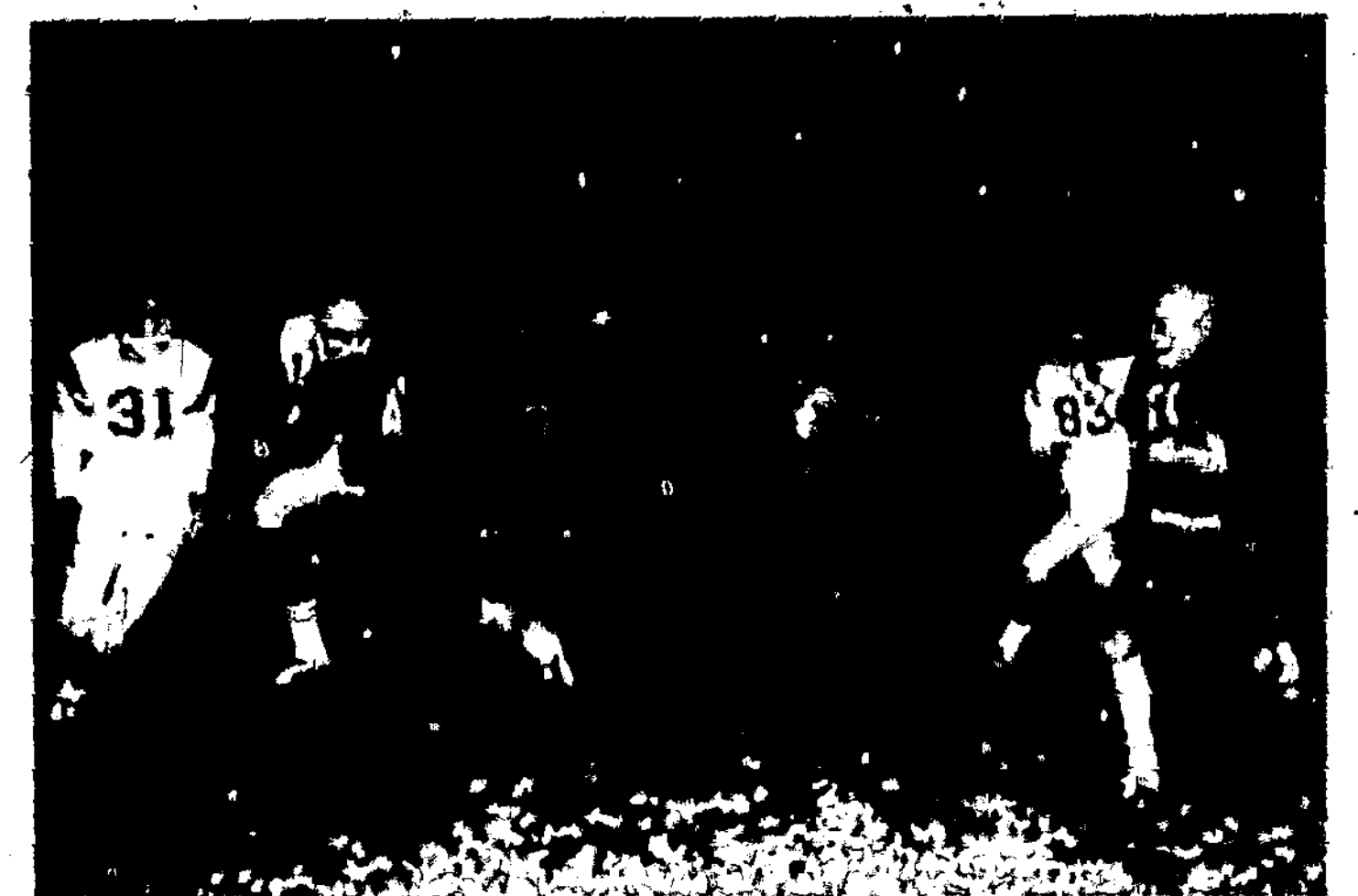

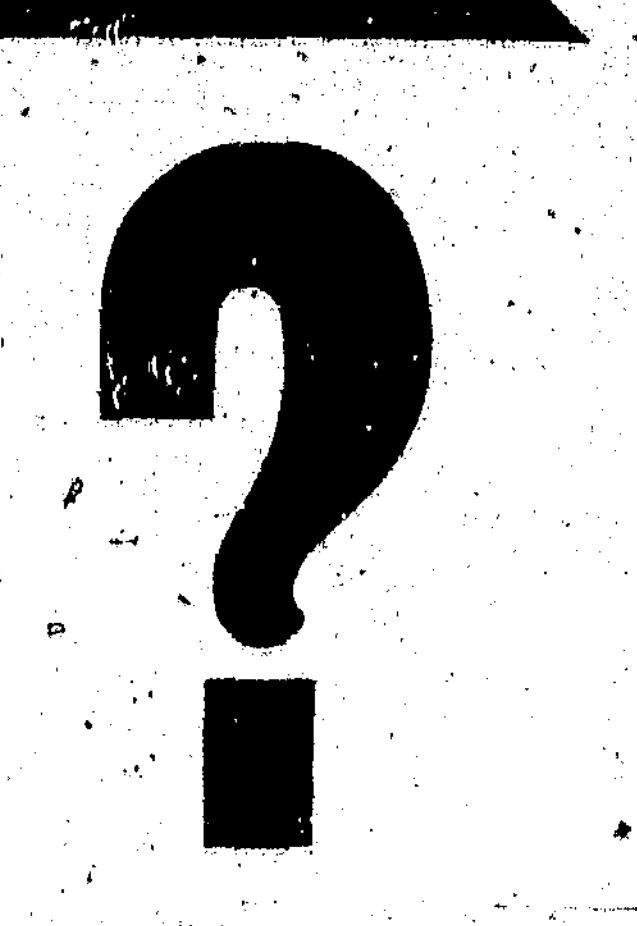
