Reappraisal snarl is untangled

1,233 Voters Off Roll
Lincoln County Clerk Alice King told the News this week that her office has completed the purge of voters in the county, 783 Democrats, 383 Republicans and 67 other registrants, total of 1,233, having been taken off the rolls. Official notices of change in voting precinct for all registered voters are being prepared in the clerk's office now and should go in the mail about November 3, in plenty of time to let people know where they will vote in the constitutional election to follow about a week later.

After nearly two years of mis-handling of the project of reappraisal for Lincoln County by contractor, suits and counter suits, claims of this and that by the contractor, and quite a little fiddling around on part of state people in charge of reappraisal, a new start is close at hand. District Attorney Ernest Williams has prepared a

stipulation which has been submitted to the attorney general and other parties for their signature which should be completed in the next ten days and put in the hand of Judge Wm. R. Hendley. A story in the Lincoln County News of November 28, 1968 stated that the first mistake was made when the State Department of Finance OK'd letting the reappraisal contract without a surety bond. The second mistake was employing an inexperienced firm and not riding herd close enough on the work, Lincoln County commissioners were not in on the blame because the work from the beginning was guided by state officials. Estimated loss to Lincoln County, particularly to county schools, was \$86,000.

The stipulation prepared by Williams will require Lon Nelson and associates, the first reappraisal contractor, to turn all materials to Lincoln County commissioners who will in turn employ a new contractor. Nelson was reported to have said that the reappraisal work was 80-90 percent complete. The commissioners will not know until materials are examined and there may be less than half the necessary work completed. The stipulation exists that Lincoln County will get added funds for completion of the job.

Water order will stand

Dr. and Mrs. William H. Dobbs together with Atty. Bill Payne attended a meeting in the state engineer's office in Santa Fe last week in regard to extension of the Hondo underground water basin which was extended effective Sept. 5 to take in about four additional townships which include Capitán, almost to Nogal, Angus and Alto. The meeting last Thursday was a protest meeting. As it now stands one person can have one well with a limited amount of water. Before the new order one person could have several wells and pump as much water as desired. The new order particularly affects developers who like to have sufficient water for entire subdivision. Now it will be necessary to sell lots on basis of lot owner providing his own water. The September 5 order was not rescinded following the protest meeting. Dr. Dobbs has property under development in the Nogal area.

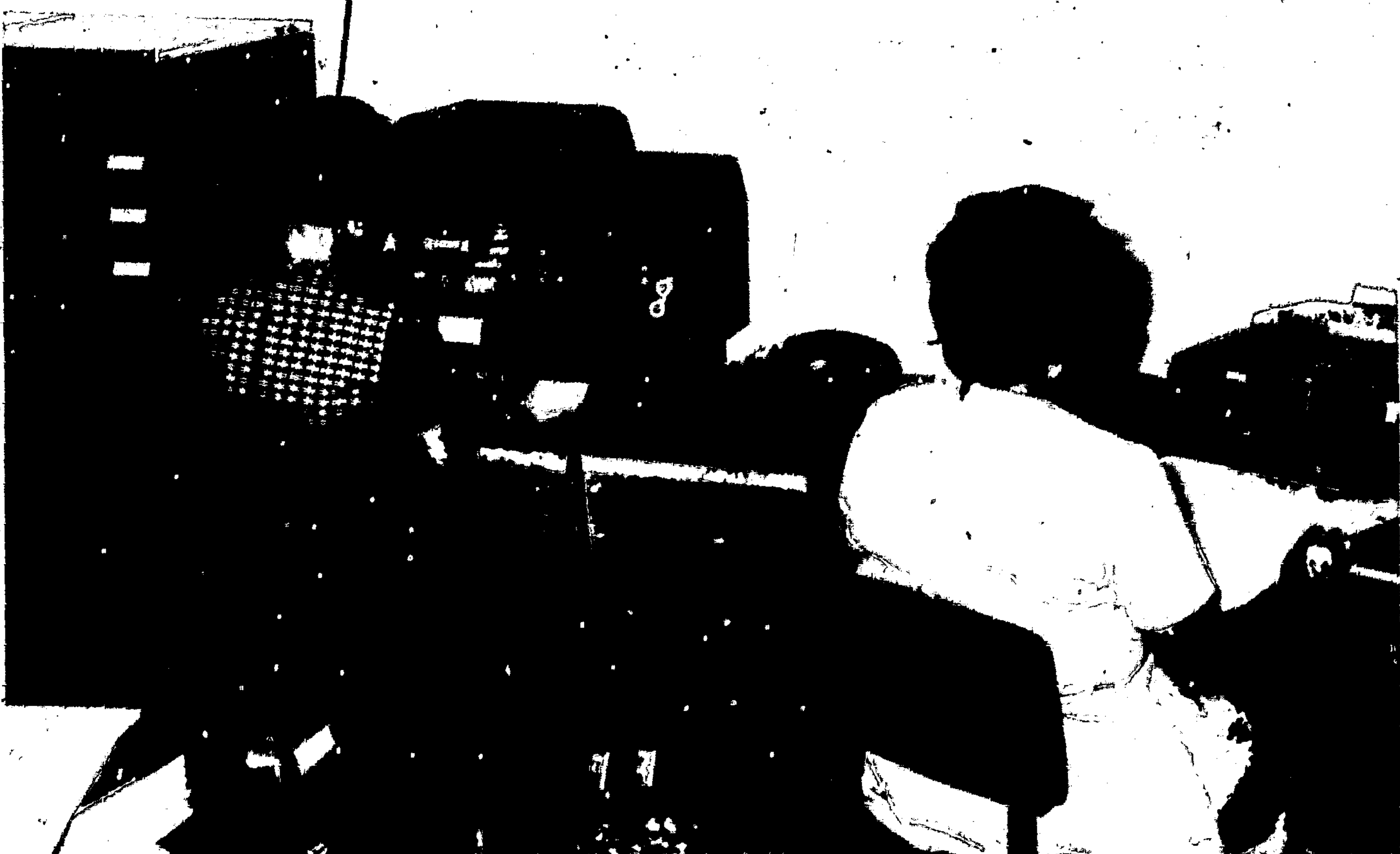

is seated at the printout machine which uses the metal plates to print tax information on statements and tax rolls. The equipment was purchased last year and will be in use for the first time during tax mailing in November.

Equipment ready for tax work

The job of getting information about more than 8500 separate pieces of property in Lincoln County on metal plates in the assessor's office has been immense, but the task is complete now except for normal run of changes and this should be the last year that tax statements are late getting in the mail. The new process of handling tax information in the assessor's office started when Addressograph equipment was received in the latter part of 1968. This equipment includes a stamping machine with typewriter keyboard which stamps information on metal plates. A small proofing machine is used to check the work. The metal plates are inserted in larger plate holder which has card showing name and address

of property owner. The plates are kept in trays or drawers and fed into printing machine which will print out an entire ledger sheet full of names with property description in about 18 seconds, a job that could take an hour or several when done by hand or on typewriter. The metal plates will be used for three purposes, (1) making up assessment lists, (2) printing tax rolls, (3) printing tax statements. Three copies of tax assessments are made, one for assessor, one for treasurer and one for state tax office. The number of plates required for individual property owners will vary considerably. The average property owner in town will need only one plate, plus another if he owns a business property. The

people in the land development business and owning a number of lots may require 25 or more plates to list their property. The practice for large ranches is to state on one plate that all tax information is listed in the clerk's office, giving book and page. The printout machine has the capability to select most any desired group of property owners. For instance, church property is on the assessor's list but is not taxed. When tax rolls are made up such property may be excluded automatically. In the near future the county clerk will be making use of this equipment for voting lists where several are needed for secretary of state, and party chairmen. Lincoln County Assessor Marlon Schlarb has done most of the plate

making while her chief deputy, Julia Samora has been running the printout machine. It's a real modern operation, one that will serve Lincoln County people real well for many years to come. The metal plates carry vital information and have the added advantage of being nearly indestructible, would take a real bad natural disaster to destroy them. Because of new equipment in both the assessor and treasurer office, tax statements will probably go in the mail after the middle of November 1969. Treasurer Mary K. Lynch said that she would get a court order allowing taxpayers an extra 30 days to pay their taxes this year.

US380 Closed 9:30 TO 10:40

Tax law helps property owner

A recent revision of New Mexico property tax laws has served to protect the property owner. A list of property taxes in Lincoln County for year 1968 has been prepared by the Lincoln County treasurer and this property will be decided to the State of New Mexico on the third Monday in January 1970 if taxes are not paid by that date.

However, the property owner has two years following take over by the state in which to pay the tax bill and redeem the property. If such property is not redeemed in the two-year period the state will hold a tax sale. The new law actually gives the property owner five years in which to pay taxes.

Interest is charged at the rate of one percent per month on all unpaid taxes, plus 2 percent handling cost plus \$1 for certificate of redemption. As of November 1, 1969 the bill of 1966 unpaid taxes would be 32-1/2 percent.

Mrs. Hendricks died Friday evening in St. Mary's Hospital.

Mrs. Hendricks, a 40-year resident of Chaves County, was born March 4, 1886, at Terrell, Tex., to A. R. and Evelyn Stamp-loh Slinger. She married A. C. Hendricks in 1901 at Comanche, Okla., and the couple moved to New Mexico in 1929 when her late husband bought the Flying H Ranch in the Sacramento Mountains from S. S. Ward.

Mr. Hendricks died Jan. 23, 1947, in an aircraft accident on the ranch.

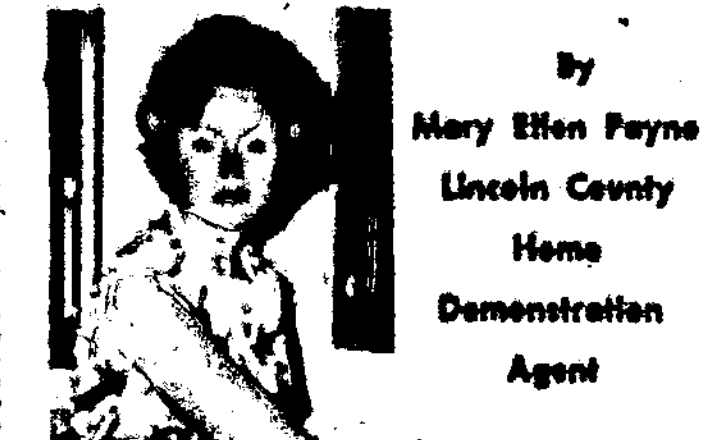

TIME IS NOW!

For Overseas Mail



The Post Office Department has announced mailing dates for those wishing to use military overseas mail during the Christmas period. Parcels that will travel by surface should be mailed between Oct. 13 and Nov. 8; air mail parcels between Dec. 1 and Dec. 13.

Greeting cards also should be posted within these dates to insure delivery prior to Christmas.

Special parcel mailing rates-- Parcel Air Lift (PAL) and Space Available Mail (SAM)--schedules also were announced.

PAL, any parcel weighing up to 30 pounds and not exceeding 60 inches in combined girth and length will be air transported on space available basis on payment of a \$1 fee in addition to the

regular surface rate of postage. It must be mailed between Oct. 27 and Nov. 29.

SAM, limited to 5 pounds and measuring not more than 60 inches in girth and length, and addressed to members of the armed forces in Vietnam, will be airlifted from the West Coast even though prepaid at the surface rate between Oct. 20 and Nov. 22.

Postal officials point out the importance of legible printing in either typewriter or ink and stress the necessity of including the five digit APO or FPO number. Addresses should show name, rank, service number and organization.
