

STATE CHAMPIONSHIP GAME HERE FRIDAY —

Grizzlies massacre the Navajos

The 1969 Carrizozo Grizzly football team earned a berth in the Class C state football finals Saturday by demolishing the Navajo Mission Eagle team 53-0 in a game played at Farmington.

The title game will be played Friday night on Laabs Field starting at 7:30 p.m., Carrizozo vs. Clouderoff. The Bears beat Vaughn Friday for their place in the finals.

Coach Tommy Pannell said they had a good trip to northwest New Mexico. The squad left Carrizozo early Friday and arrived at Farmington close to 5:00 p.m., in time for a workout on the high school field, then they ate, attended a movie and went to bed. After a late breakfast Saturday the Grizzly squad was on the field at 11:30 a.m.

Pannell said there were lots of Carrizozo football fans who made the 350 mile trip, otherwise the crowd was small. Weather was perfect and the team was back in Carrizozo shortly after midnight Saturday.

Paragraph from Farmington Daily Times, "The Grizzlies stunned a partisan crowd by keeping the Eagles penned up in their own end of the field nearly the entire ball game. Mission's deepest penetration was to the Carrizozo 41 in the late minutes of the game."

With Ben Stuteville doing most of the work the Grizzlies moved 45 yards to a touch down the first time they got their hands on the ball. It was Stuteville who set up the drive with a 20-yard punt return and later carried it over from the one. A pass failed for extra points.

Late in the first period the Grizzlies held Mission deep in its own territory then returned the punt to the NM 40. They scored in five plays with Ray Roper going over from the nine on the second play of the second period.

Pass again failed for PAT. Late in the first half Jody Wrye gathered in another short punt at midfield and returned it to the 33. On the next play David Lock rifled the ball to Wrye who went in for TD untouched. Lock pass to Charles Mackey was good for two and halftime score of 20-0.

Mission tried an onside kick to start the second half which resulted in Carrizozo taking over at the Eagle 49. Two running plays gained only a yard then Wrye passed to Mackey at the 29, Matt Ellison picked up 6 on an end around play, then Roper got to the 17. Willie Gallegos was held for no gain, then Stuteville carried twice to the 5. On third try Stuteville went into the end zone. Wrye pass to Mackey was good making the score 28-0.

Only a minute later a Mission punt was blocked by David Lock and the Grizzlies took over at the Eagle 16. Stuteville to the 11,

Gallegos to the 19, Stuteville to the 7, penalty back to the 12 but on 4th down Lock hit Wrye all alone in the end zone for the TD. Mackey tried dropkick, failed, score 34-0.

Dee Douglas set up the next Grizzly touchdown with a pass interception at the Mission 37. Lock ran to the 27, Gallegos to the 19, Ray Roper dashed to the 7 and David Roper scored on the next play. Mackey again missed dropkick, score 40-0.

By this time Carrizozo was playing a pretty young team, Joel Barham at FB, Matt Ellison at WB, Willie Gallegos at TB, Ernest Torres at center, Gerald Wells and Chris Monreal as guards, Bobby Hobbs and Mark Ellison as tackles, Milton May and Carl Ortiz as split ends.

Ortiz made a nice play going for 12 yards on reverse, Barham scored the final TD on a 6-yard run, and Mackey hit his dropkick attempt making the score 47-0.

The last Carrizozo score came with 2:43 in the game and Zoop facing 4th down and 19 yards to go. In punt formation Ray Roper took the ball saw an opening and took off weaving between Eagle tacklers, reversed his field and outran any wouldbe tacklers on a 54-yard scamper for TD. The kick failed, final score 53-0.

Ray Roper had 107 yards rushing in 8 carries, Ben Stuteville made 100 on 12 carries, Lock hit 2 of 3 passing and both for TD's, Jim Speight played an exceptional game as linebacker making 13 unassisted tackles and in on a number of others. "More than I've ever seen" said Pannell. Leland Jackson was strong on defense, getting to the passer a couple of times. The Grizzlies will suit up 27 boys, all in good physical condition for the state championship game here Friday.

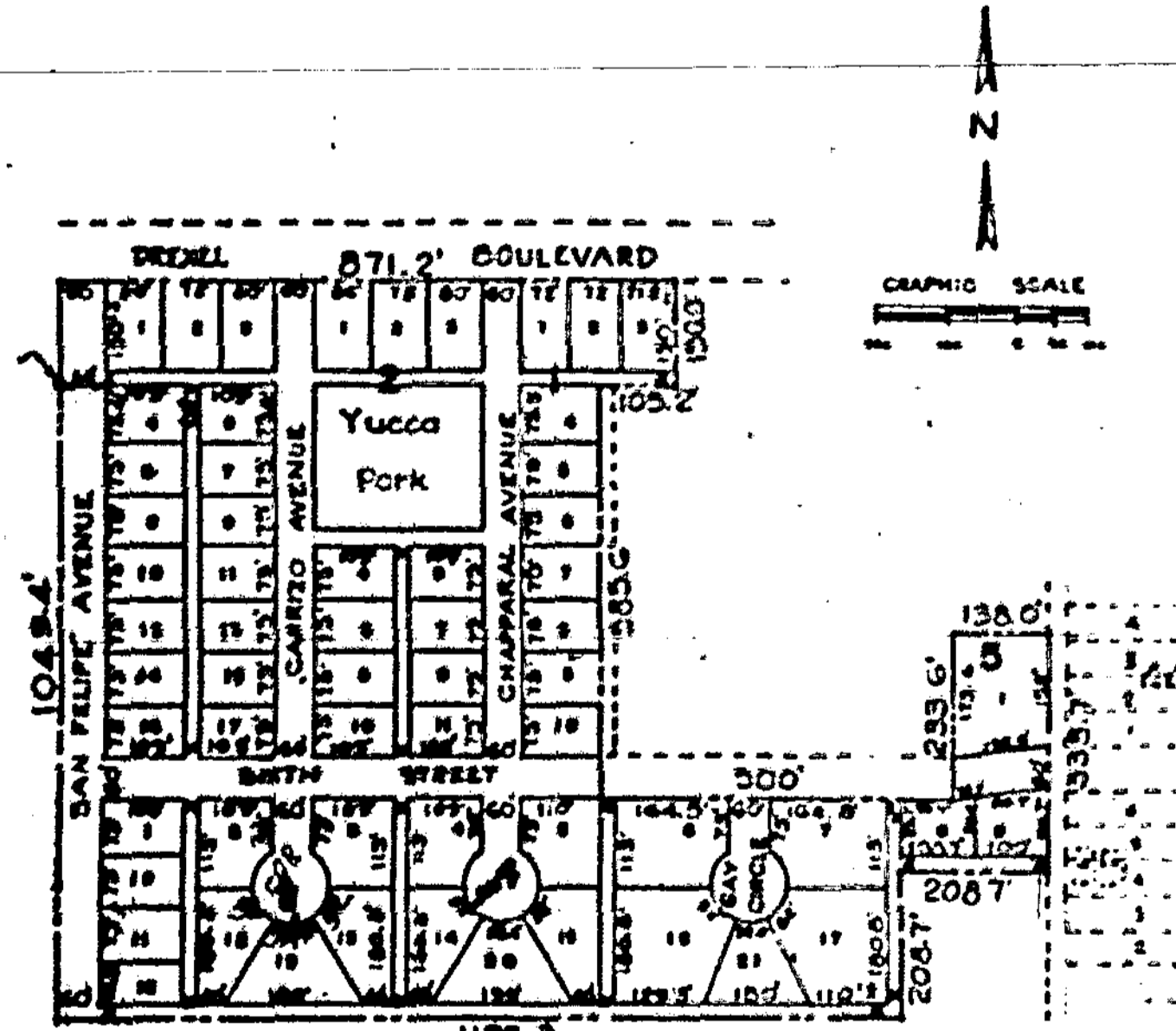
Zozo resident since 1915 dies

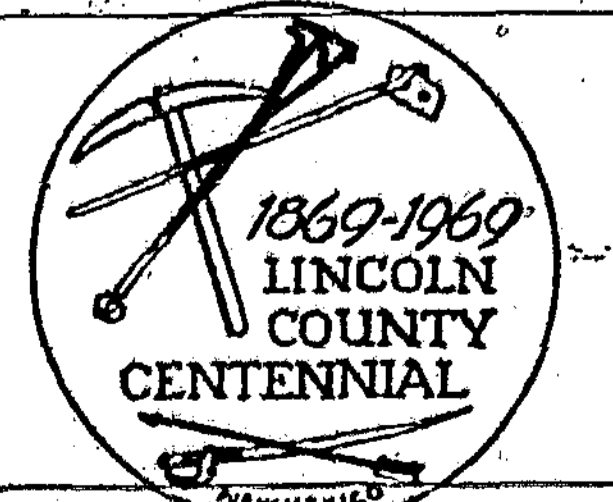

Town council approves first subdivision of recent history

The first subdivision to be platted and approved in Carrizozo for many years was passed on favorably by the Carrizozo town council last week. It is known as the Harper Subdivision in Section 3, township 8 south, range 10 east, actual location is near the old ball park in west part of town. The new subdivision already has utilities in the area, much road work complete and Harper has said he will provide both title insurance and financing for prospective purchasers. The map shows the subdivision layout, bounded by San Felipe Ave. and Drexel Boulevard, Yucca Park in the center and three circle drives on the south side of Sixth street, which goes clear on through to the west. Boyd Harper, along with Engineer Tom Pann made the presentation to the council. Other action of the evening included employment of Robert Hererra on the town maintenance crew, no bids received on fire hall windows, minutes approved and bills read and approved. By resolution adopted "C" Avenue (formerly Spring Street) between Blocks 7 and 8 in Highland Addition is abandoned as a street and may be closed by the owners. The street has never been opened, graded nor used as a thoroughfare. Present owners are Mr. and Mrs. Richard Coca. Attending the meeting were Mayor Johnson Stearns, Councilmen Vernon Petty, Joe Ventura, Duff May and Joe Ortiz, Marshal Choncho Morales, Clerk Nellie Lee Baker and Atty. Elfred Jones.



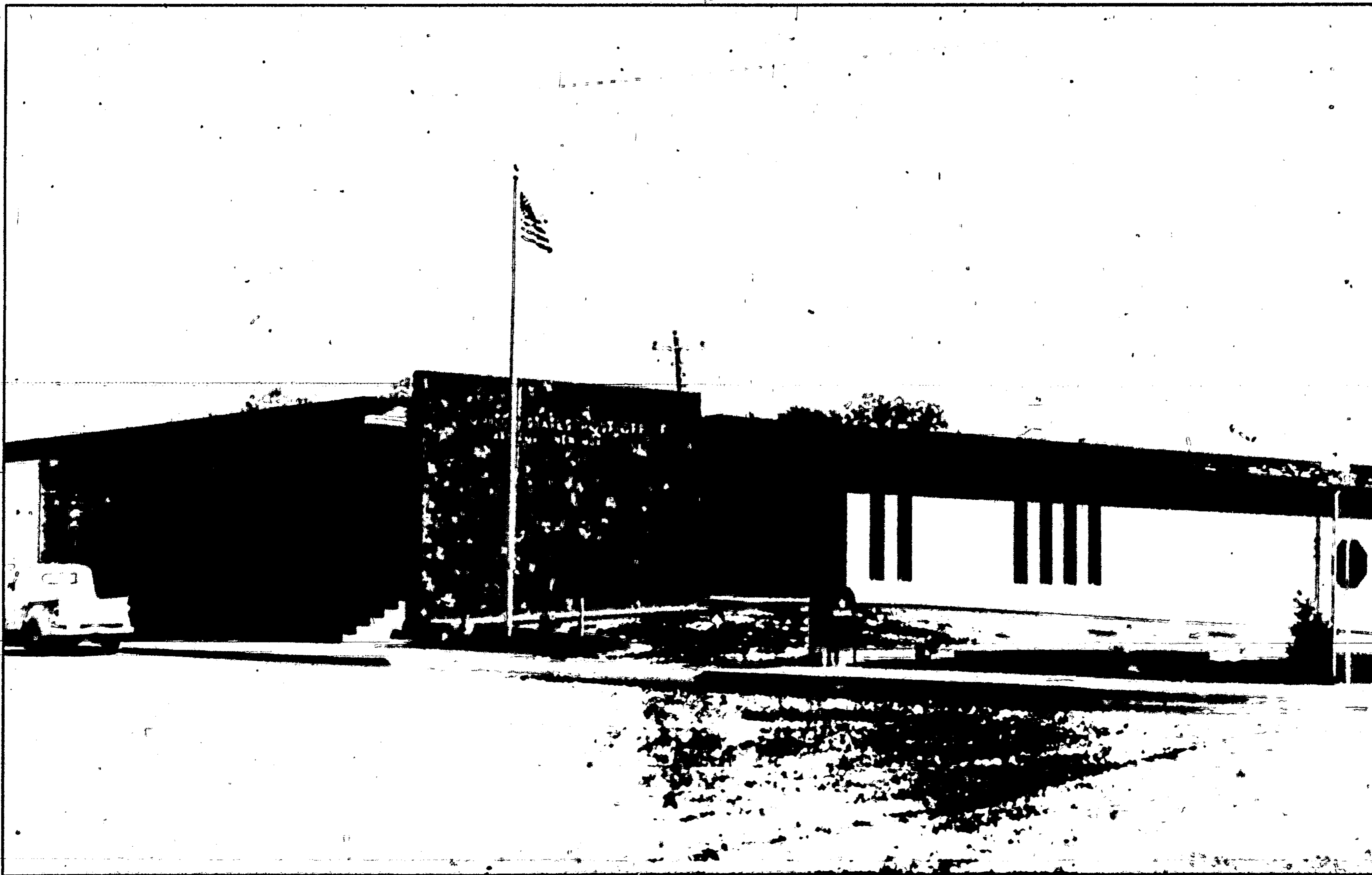

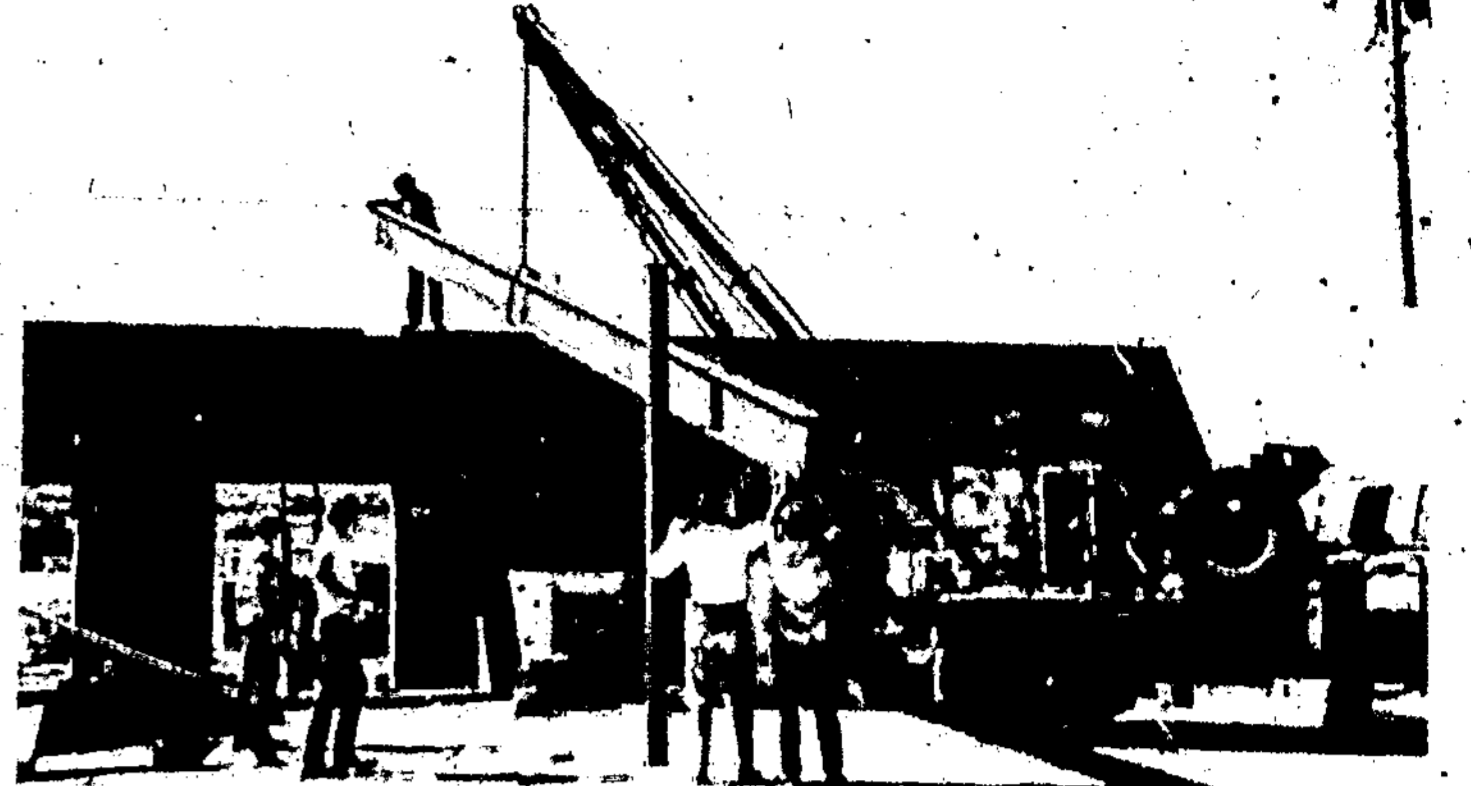

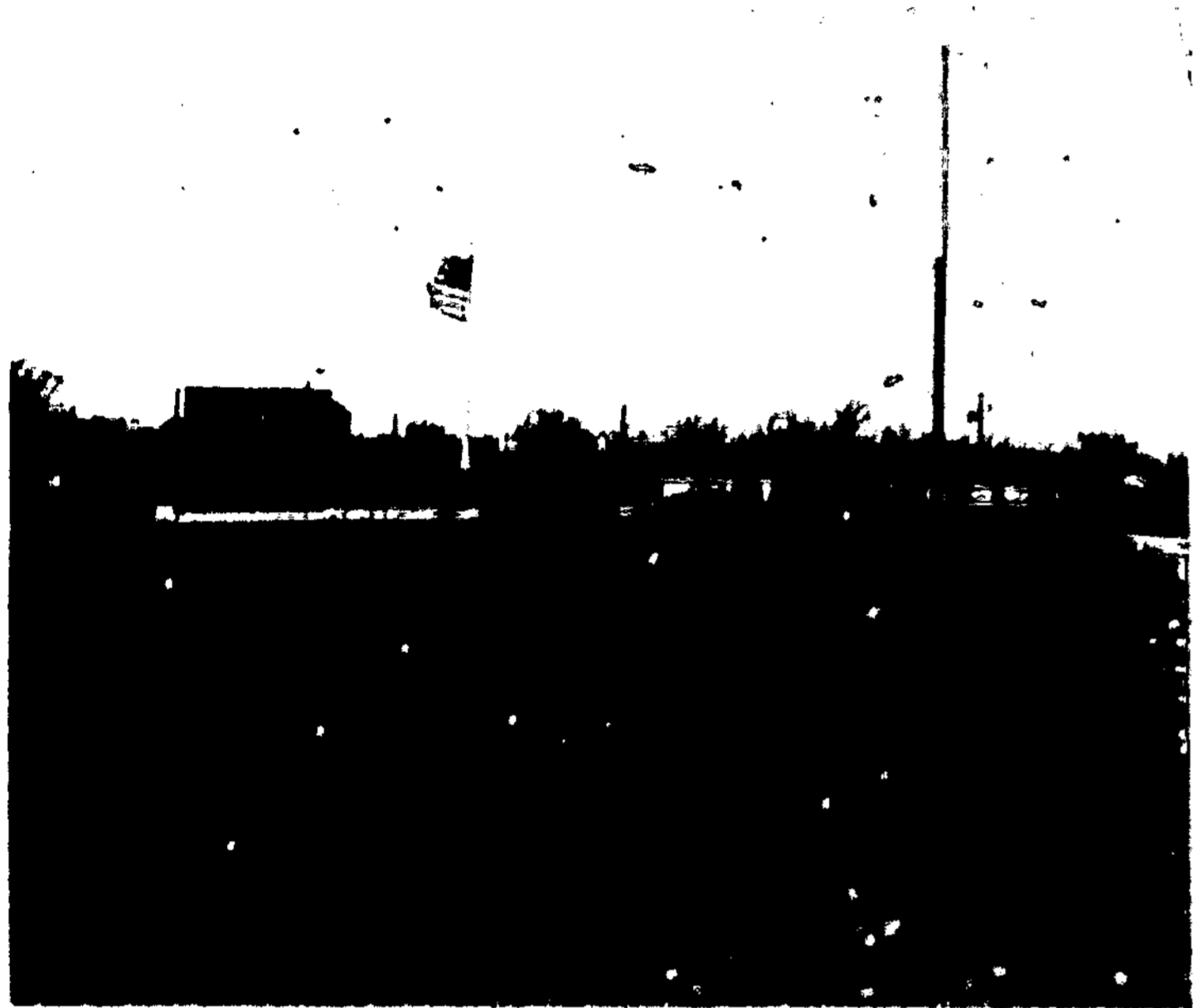

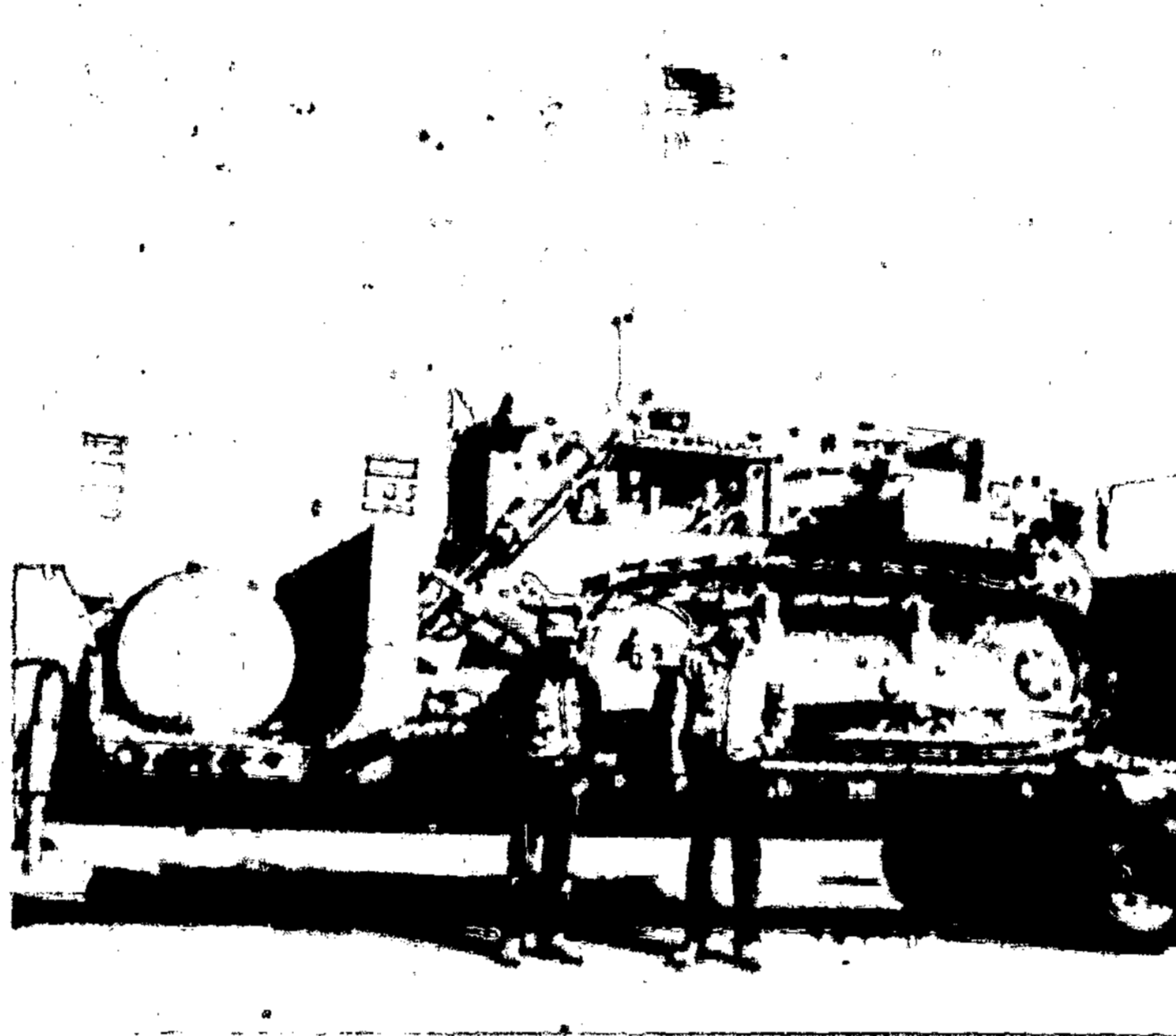

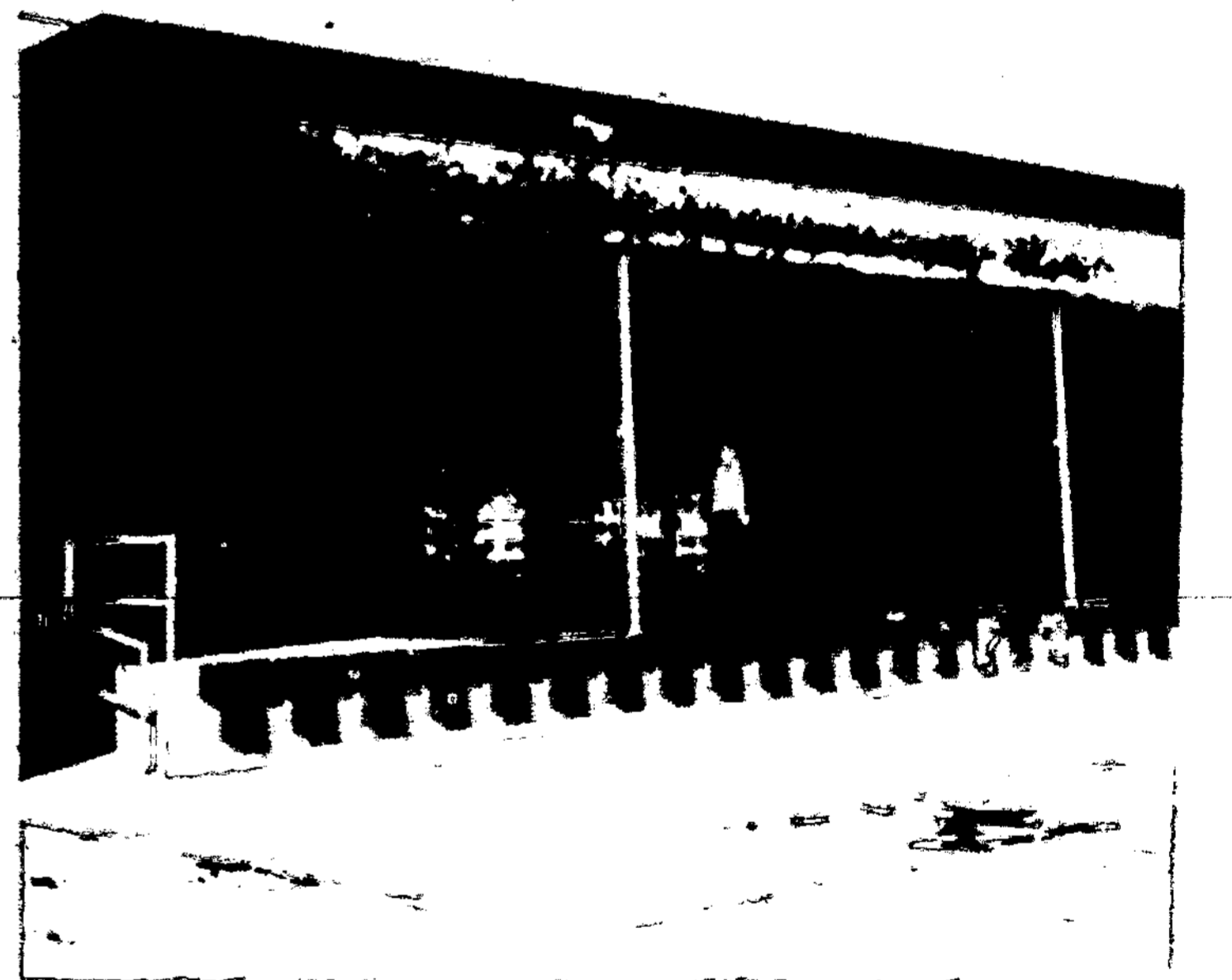

voters at the same election, each proposal title shall be placed on the ballot so that it may be voted upon separately...

Section 2. CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.--

A. The legislature may, at any time, by a two-thirds vote of all the members of each house...

B. At the general election in 1984 and every fourteen years thereafter, the question shall be placed on the ballot...

C. In calling a constitutional convention, the legislature shall prescribe at least seventy delegates to the convention...

D. A constitutional convention has plenary power to propose amendments or revisions of the constitution...

E. Any revision or amendments proposed by a constitutional convention shall be submitted to the voters of the state at an election held on a date set by the convention...

ARTICLE XIII COMPACT WITH THE UNITED STATES

Section 1. RELIGIOUS TOLERATION--POLYGAMY.--Perfect toleration of religious sentiment shall be secured...

Section 2. LANDS--TAXATION.--The people inhabiting this state do agree and declare that:

A. they disclaim all right and title to the unappropriated and ungranted public lands lying within the boundaries thereof...

B. the lands and other property belonging to citizens of the United States residing without this state shall never be taxed at a higher rate than the lands and other property belonging to residents thereof...

C. no taxes shall be imposed by this state upon lands or property therein belonging to, or which may hereafter be acquired by, the United States or reserved for its use...

D. No person who has been elected governor, lieutenant governor or state auditor prior to the effective date of this constitution shall again be eligible to hold the same office unless one full term has intervened...

Section 3. PUBLIC SCHOOLS.--

Provision shall be made for the establishment and maintenance of a system of public schools which shall be open to all children of the state...

Section 4. SUFFRAGE.--This

state shall never enact any law restricting or abridging the right or suffrage on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude.

Section 5. RECLAMATION PROJECTS.--There are hereby reserved to the United States, with full acquiescence of the people of this state, all rights and powers for the carrying out of the provisions by the United States of the act of congress entitled "An act appropriating the receipts from the sale and disposal of public lands in certain states and territories to the construction of irrigation works for the reclamation of arid lands," approved June 17, 1902...

Section 6. LIQUOR CONTROL.--Whenever hereafter any of the lands contained within Indian reservations or allotments in this state shall be allotted, sold, reserved or otherwise disposed of, they shall be subject for a period of twenty-five years after such allotment, sale, reservation or other disposal...

Section 7. STATEHOOD ENABLING ACT LANDS.--This state and its people consent to all and singular the provisions of the act of congress approved June 20, 1910, concerning the lands by said act granted or confirmed to this state...

Section 8. COMPACT IRREVOCABLE.--Provisions of this article are irrevocable without the consent of the United States and the people of this state...

ARTICLE XIV SCHEDULE AND TRANSITION SECTION 1. EFFECTIVE DATE.--Except as otherwise provided, this constitution becomes effective December 9, 1969.

Section 2. SAVING CLAUSE.--All laws not inconsistent with this constitution continue in force until they expire or are amended or repealed...

Section 3. LAWS INCONSISTENT WITH THIS CONSTITUTION.--All laws, ordinances and resolutions inconsistent with this constitution but effective prior to the effective date of this constitution are void and have no effect after June 30, 1971.

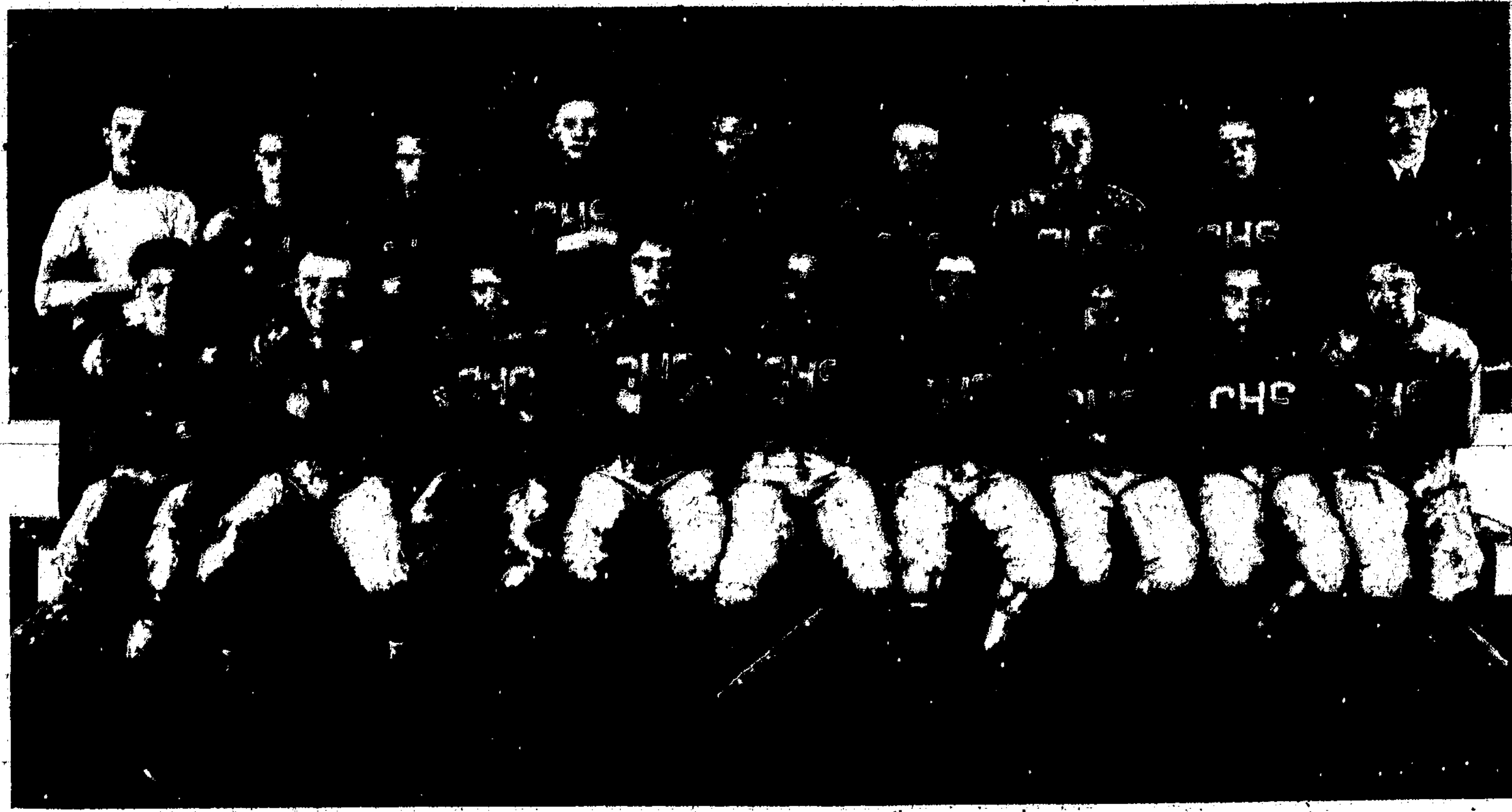
Section 4. OFFICERS.--A. Except as otherwise provided in this constitution, all officers holding office on the effective date of this constitution, other by election or appointment, shall continue to hold office until their terms expire...

(1) the secretary of state, state treasurer and attorney general shall exercise all powers and perform all duties provided for in the constitution existing prior to the effective date of this constitution until otherwise provided by law...

(2) succession to the office of governor shall continue as provided in the constitution existing prior to the effective date of this constitution until changed as provided in this constitution...

(3) until otherwise provided by law, the state canvassing board shall continue to perform the duties assigned to it by the constitution in effect prior to December 9, 1969.

Section 5. LEGISLATURE.--A. The members of the legislature holding office on the effective date of this constitution shall continue to serve until their present terms expire...

lators shall be elected at the general election in 1970. Vacancies shall be filled by appointment as provided by law...

B. The second session of the twenty-ninth legislature is not limited either to subject matter or duration. Legislators holding office after the effective date of this constitution shall receive the salary provided by law...

Section 9. STATE INVESTMENT COUNCIL.--The members of the state investment council and the state investment officer holding office on the effective date of this constitution shall continue to serve until their successors are elected and qualified...

Section 10. TAXABLE VALUE.--Until December 31, 1971, the taxable value of property which is established by statute on the national convention...

Section 11. REORGANIZATION.--Until the adjournment of the regular session of the legislature in 1972, all executive orders issued by the governor in accordance with Article IV of this constitution...

Section 12. EXECUTION AND DEPOSIT.--This constitution shall be signed by the president and chief clerk of the constitutional convention, and such delegates as desire to sign the same, and shall be deposited in the office of the secretary of state...

Section 8. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION.--A. The members of the state board of education provided for in Article VIII of this constitution shall be appointed by the governor within thirty days after the convening of the second session of the twenty-ninth legislature in 1970...
